

said orders, it shall be lawful to remove dung, hay, straw, and fodder, not likely to propagate infection, from place to place within their jurisdiction as such local authority, with a licence from a Justice of the Peace for the said county, as directed in the resolutions published as aforesaid, provided that the farm or premises from which it is proposed to remove such dung, hay, straw, or fodder, shall have been free from cattle plague for not less than thirty days immediately preceding such intended removal, and a certificate to that effect subscribed by two tenant farmers shall be presented to the Justice of the Peace to whom application is made for such licence, along with such application.

CATTLE PLAGUE.

PUBLIC NOTICE.

Borough of Faversham.

At a Special Meeting of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the borough of Faversham, in the county of Kent, holden in the Council Chamber of the Guildhall, on Friday, 2nd day of March, 1866, duly convened:—

It is ordered that, in pursuance of "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," Mr. Abraham Sherwood, of this town, Veterinary Surgeon, be, and he is hereby appointed Cattle Inspector for the borough of Faversham. It shall be the duty of the said Inspector, at the request of the Mayor, or his deputy, to inquire into and report upon every case of cattle plague, or supposed cattle plague, arising within this borough; and at the like request, to give any certificate that may be required for the purposes of the Act, or to enable the Mayor, or his deputy, to grant any licence for the removal of cattle, either into the borough, or from one part of the borough to any other part thereof. That the Cattle Inspector shall be paid for his services such remuneration as the Cattle Plague Committee shall think just and reasonable.

It is ordered that, in pursuance of "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," the Superintendent of Police for the borough be, and he is hereby appointed Cattle Reporting Officer. That it shall be his duty, at all times, to report to the Mayor, or Deputy Mayor, any cases of cattle plague, or supposed cattle plague, occurring in this borough, or any contravention or breach of any of the orders now made, or any other order to be made, by the local authority under the provisions of the said Act; and to carry out the instructions of the Mayor, or his deputy, and of the Cattle Plague Committee, and that his remuneration shall be fixed by such Committee.

It is ordered that from the 2nd day of March, 1866, it shall not be lawful for any person to bring or send any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, or calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine to any market or fair, or to any place whatever, within the borough, for the purpose of exhibition or sale.

It is ordered that on and from the said 2nd day of March, 1866, no cow, heifer, bullock, ox, or calf, shall be brought from any place without the said borough to any place within the said borough; nor be on, nor pass over, along or across, any highway or public road within the said borough.

It is ordered that on and from the 2nd day of March, 1866, to the 15th day of April next, no dung, offal, horns, bones, raw or untanned hides, or skins of any sheep, cow, heifer, bull, bullock,

or calf, horse, swine, or any other animal (except as by the Orders in Council excepted) shall be unloaded within the borough from any barge, boat, or other vessel, or from any railway truck, or cart, waggon, or other vehicle, or be sent or brought into the said borough in any way from the Metropolis, as defined in the "Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," or from any other place where the cattle plague is existing or has existed within the last six months previously.

It is ordered that the Mayor, or Deputy Mayor, shall have power, at all times, hereafter, to grant to any person licence to move any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, not affected with the cattle plague, to any place within this borough, or from one place in this borough to any other place within this borough, and that such licence shall be in force for such time only as shall be specified therein. That the Mayor, or Deputy Mayor, may require any person applying for such licence, to produce the certificate of the Cattle Inspector that the cattle to be removed is not affected with the cattle plague.

It is ordered that any person desirous of obtaining any such licence must apply, in the first instance, to the Cattle Reporting Officer, who will forthwith report thereon to the Mayor or Deputy.

It is ordered that in pursuance of "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," the following members of the Council, viz:—the Mayor, the Deputy Mayor, Messrs. Hogben, Coulter, Spong, Anderson, jun., and Cresswell, be, and they are hereby appointed a Committee, under the said Act, for the borough of Faversham, and that the said Committee shall be called "The Cattle Plague Committee," and subject to the foregoing orders, all the powers conferred by this Act on the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses, acting by the Council, shall be delegated to the said Committee, excepting the power to make a rate. That the said Committee shall have power to revoke or alter any of the foregoing orders, and to make others in lieu thereof as often as they shall deem it expedient so to do.

It is ordered that the town clerk shall, by the direction of the Mayor, or his Deputy, convene a meeting of the Cattle Plague Committee as often as necessary.

It is ordered that the foregoing orders should be printed and distributed in the town and neighbourhood, and advertised in the Faversham Mercury and East Kent Gazette.
