WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and seven, intituled "An Act to prevent until the 1st day of September, 1850, and to the end of the then session of Parliament, the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders amongst sheep, cattle, and other animals," which Act has since been from time to time continued by divers subsequent Acts, and lastly by an Act passed in the session of the twenty-eighth and twenty-ninth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, chapter one hundred and nineteen, it is (amongst other things) enacted that it shall be lawful for the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Privy Council, or any two or more of them, from time to time, to make such Orders and Regulations as to them may seem necessary for the purpose of prohibiting or regulating the removal to or from such parts or places as they may designate in such Order or Orders, of sheep, cattle, horses, swine, or other animals, or of meat, skins, hides, horns, hoofs, or other parts of any animals, or of hay, straw, fodder, or other articles likely to propagate infection, and to make any other

Orders or Regulations for the purpose of giving effect to the provisions of the said Act, and again to revoke, alter, or vary any such Orders or Regulations; and that all provisions for any of the purposes aforesaid in any such Order or Orders contained shall have the like force and effect as if the same had been inserted in the said Act; and that all persons offending against the same shall for each and every offence forfeit and pay any sum not exceeding twenty pounds, or such smaller sum as the said Lords or others of Her Majesty's Privy Council may in any case by such Order direct :

And whereas a contagious or infectious disorder now prevails among cattle within that part of the United Kingdom called Great Britain, which disorder is generally designated as the "Cattle Plague:"

And whereas an Order, dated the 3rd day of November, 1865, has been made under the authority of the said Acts by the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council, with a view to prevent the spreading to the "North-Western District of Scotland" of a contagious or infectious disorder generally designated the "cattle plague," now prevailing in many parts of Great Britain :

And whereas it is expedient to make provision for the return of sheep belonging to persons who occupy lands within the North-Western District of Scotland, and which sheep are presently wintering without the said district :

Now, therefore, the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council do hereby, by virtue and in exercise of the powers given by the said recited Act, and by the several Acts continuing the same as aforesaid, order as follows :—

1. In this Order the expression "North Western District of Scotland" shall be interpreted to mean and embrace the whole of the county of Argyll, in Scotland, and the whole of Scotland lying to the north and west of the Caledonian Canal. The words "Local Authority" shall mean the local authority under "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866." The word "Inspector" shall mean any inspector appointed under any Order made under the authority of the recited Acts by the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council, or appointed under "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866."

2. It shall be lawful for any person who occupies lands within the North-Western District of Scotland to remove to such lands any sheep of

which he is the owner, and which are presently wintering on farms without the limits of the said county, on obtaining a license signed by order of the Local Authority, and subject to the conditions contained in such license.

3. Every license for removing sheep into the North-Western District of Scotland, shall contain a statement of the place in which such sheep have been wintering, and of the route by which they are to be moved; and no Local Authority shall sign, or authorize to be signed, any such license until a certificate, signed by an inspector, has been produced, certifying that such sheep are free from disease, and that the county in which such sheep have been wintering is free from cattle plague. And no Local Authority shall sign, or authorize to be signed, any such license if the route, by which such sheep are to be moved, passes through a county which such Local Authority has reason to believe is infected with cattle plague.

4. This Order shall come into operation immediately on the publication thereof in the Edinburgh Gazette, and shall continue in force until revoked by any further Order.

5. Every person offending against this Order shall, in pursuance of the said Act, for every such offence forfeit any sum not exceeding twenty pounds, which the Justices before whom he or she shall be convicted of such offence, may think fit to impose.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and seven, intituled "An Act to prevent until the first day of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty, and to the end of the then session of Parliament, the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders amongst sheep, cattle, and other animals," and which Act has since been from time to time continued by divers subsequent Acts, and lastly, by an Act passed in the session of the twenty-eighth and twenty-ninth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, chapter one hundred and nineteen, it is (amongst other things) enacted that it shall be lawful for the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Privy Council, or any two or more of them, from time to time to make such Orders and Regulations as to them may seem necessary for the purpose of prohibiting or regulating the removal to or from such parts or places as they may designate in such Order or Orders, of sheep, cattle, horses, swine, or other animals, or of meat, skins, hides, horns, hoofs, or other parts of any animals,

or of hay, straw, fodder, or other articles likely to propagate infection; and also for the purpose of purifying any yard, stable, outhouse, or other place, or any waggons, carts, carriages, or other vehicles; and also for the purpose of directing how any animals dying in a diseased state, or any animals, parts of animals, or other things seized under the provisions of the said Act, are to be disposed of; and also for the purpose of causing notices to be given of the appearance of any disorder among sheep, cattle, or other animals, and to make any other Orders or Regulations for the purpose of giving effect to the provisions of the said Act, and again to revoke, alter, or vary any such Orders or Regulations; and that all provisions for any of the purposes aforesaid in any such Order or Orders contained shall have the like force and effect as if the same had been inserted in the said Act; and that all persons offending against the said Act shall, for each and every offence forfeit and pay any sum not exceeding twenty pounds, or such smaller sum as the said Lords or others of Her Majesty's Privy Council may in any such case by such Order direct:

And whereas a contagious or infectious disorder now prevails among the cattle of Great Britain, which is generally designated the "Cattle Plague:"

And whereas divers Orders have from time to time been made under the authority of the said Acts by the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council, with a view to check the spreading of the said disorder:

And whereas it is expedient to make further provisions with a view to check the spreading of the said disorder:

Now, therefore, the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council do hereby, by virtue of and in exercise of the powers given by the said Act, so continued as aforesaid, order as follows:—

Every Railway or other Company or person carrying animals for hire within any part of Great Britain shall forthwith thoroughly cleanse and disinfect all pens, carriages, trucks, and boats used by such Company or person for holding or carrying animals, by a washing of lime water, or, with the approval of the Board of Trade, by some other process; and until such pen, carriage, truck, or boat has been thoroughly cleansed and disinfected as aforesaid, no animal nor any article shall be placed or carried in any such pen, carriage, truck, or boat; and when such pen, carriage, truck, or boat has been thoroughly cleansed and disinfected as aforesaid, such Company or person, as aforesaid, using the same, on every occasion after any animal has been taken out of such pen, carriage, truck, or boat, and before any other animal or article is placed therein, shall thoroughly cleanse and disinfect every such pen, carriage, truck, or boat in such manner as the Board of Trade shall from time to time direct; and if any pen, carriage, truck, or boat shall at any time be used in contravention of this Order, the Company or person by whom it is so used, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding £5 for every time that such pen, carriage, truck, or boat is so used.

In this Order the expression "animal" shall mean bull, bullock, cow, ox, heifer, calf, sheep, goat, and swine; and the expression truck shall include any horse-box, or other vehicle used in the carrying of animals.

THE following Notices have been received by the Clerk of the Council from the Local Authorities appointed under the Orders of the Lords of the Council relating to the "Cattle Plague," and are published in the London Gazette in conformity with the requirements of their Lordships' Orders:—

CATTLE PLAGUE.

Isle of Ely.

At the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace for the Isle of Ely, holden by adjournment, at March, in and for the said Isle, on Tuesday, the 13th day of March, 1866.

It was resolved and ordered (pursuant to the powers vested in this Court, by Orders of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, respectively dated the 23rd day of November, 1865, the 16th day of December, 1865, the 20th day of January, 1866, and the 23rd day of February, 1866).

1. That so much of an Order, made at the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace, holden at Wisbech, in and for the said Isle, on the 3rd day of January last, as directs that no person should remove any sheep or swine (except such of the said animals as were intended for slaughter), from any place within the limits of the said Isle to any market or fair, or to any place whatever, within the said Isle, for exhibition or sale be, and the same was thereby rescinded.

2. That the Order made at the said Quarter Sessions of the Peace to the effect that no sheep or swine (except such of the said animals as were intended for slaughter), be removed from any place in Great Britain, beyond the limits of the said Isle, into any place within the said Isle be, and the same was, thereby rescinded.

3. That the Order made at the said Quarter Sessions of the Peace, to the effect that no person should remove any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf from any farm within the said Isle, to any other farm within the said Isle, be read with this proviso, That any person may with the licence of one Justice of the Peace for the said Isle, move any bull, cow, or heifer, to and from any place in the said Isle to and from any other place in the said Isle, for breeding purposes.

4. And it was further resolved and ordered that the above Orders shall commence immediately after the publication of this notice, and continue in force until altered or revoked.

And notice is hereby given, that every person offending against the terms contained in the proviso of the third of the said Orders will be liable to forfeit any sum not exceeding twenty pounds which the Justices, before whom he or she shall be convicted, may think fit to impose.

CATTLE PLAGUE.

Oxfordshire Adjourned Sessions, 10th March, 1866.

At the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace of our Sovereign Lady the Queen, holden at the County Hall in Oxford, in and for the county of

Oxford, on Monday in the first week next after the 28th day of December, in the 29th year of the reign of our Sovereign Lady Victoria, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland Queen, Defender of the Faith, and afterwards holden, by adjournment, at the County Hall aforesaid, on Saturday, the 27th day of January, 1866; and afterwards holden, by further adjournment, at the County Hall aforesaid, on Saturday, the 3rd day of February, and again on Saturday, the 24th day of February, 1866, and thence continued, *de die in diem*, until the 1st day of March, in the year aforesaid, and then holden at the said County Hall; and now, by further adjournment, holden at the County Hall aforesaid, on Saturday, the 10th day of March aforesaid, before Charles Edward Thornhill, Esquire, Chairman, the Right Honourable the Earl of Macclesfield, the Right Honourable the Lord Churchill, and others, their fellows, Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace of the said county:

Whereas the said Justices in Quarter Sessions are the local authority constituted for the purposes of the several Orders of Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council now in force under the Act (since continued by several subsequent Acts), "to prevent, until the 1st day of September, 1850, and to the end of the then session of Parliament, the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders amongst sheep, cattle, and other animals,"—and also, by virtue of "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866." And whereas at the said sessions, holden, by adjournment, on the 27th day of January last, the Court (by notice duly published) amongst other things, declared it to be expedient that, from and after the 6th day of February last until the 1st day of March instant, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf should be removed from any one farm or place in the said county to any other farm or place therein; and that no hay, straw, fodder, or litter, likely to propagate infection,—should, for and during the same period, be brought from any other part of Great Britain into any place within the county of Oxford:

And whereas, by virtue of an Order of Lords of the Council, dated the 23rd day of February, 1866, the several Orders in Council, dated respectively the 23rd day of November, 1865, the 16th day of December, 1865, the 20th of January, 1866, and the 6th of February, 1866, were severally continued, and the said recited notice of the 27th of January, 1866, was continued until the same respectively should be altered or revoked by any further Order in Council, or by this Court; subject, nevertheless, to the provisions of "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," or of any Act which might thereafter be passed:

And whereas this present Court hath determined partly to revoke, and partly to vary and add to the said notice of the 27th of January last: now, therefore, this present Court doth hereby declare (by this notice, to be published on the 17th day of March, 1866, in newspapers circulating within the county of Oxford):—

1. That the said notice of the 27th day of January last be revoked, so far as the same relates to hay and straw, neither of which has been used as fodder or litter for or about animals.

2. Where any farm shall be partly in the county of Oxford and partly in another county, it shall be lawful to remove any uninfected cattle from any part of such farm without the county of Oxford to any part of the same farm within the county.

3. That it shall be lawful to remove, in any part of the said county of Oxford, any uninfected cattle along the uninfected parts of any highway or highways, from any uninfected farm or place, to any other uninfected farm or place, subject to the definition and restrictions hereinafter declared; that is to say:—

The following places, areas, or specified parts, are hereby declared to be infected:—

(a.) In the Bampton East Division, a circle for the radius of a mile from the homestead of the City Farm, in the parish of Ensham.

(b.) The whole of the Bullingdon Division, excepting such parts thereof as lie to the south-west of the high-road from Oxford (through Cowley Marsh and the parish of Garsington) to Chislehampton Bridge; and as lie to the south-west of the River Thame for the distance from the said Bridge to Newington; and also excepting the parishes of Ascot, Cowley, Forest Hill, Garsington, Horsepath, Shotover, Stanton Saint John, and Tetsworth.

(c.) So much of the Ploughley Division as lies to the south-east of the following line; that is to say, an imaginary line from the Buckinghamshire frontier to Newton Murrell; thence along the Buckingham and Bicester Road to the turnpike-gate at the north entrance to Bicester; thence by an imaginary line drawn round the east side of Bicester to the Railway Station (such line being part of a circle having Bicester Church for its centre, and a radius of half a mile); and from the said Station along the Railway as far as the 67th milestone; and thence by an imaginary line to Heyford Bridge, intersecting Middleton Park.

(d.) And so much of the Wootton South Division as is bounded as follows: on the south by the Bullingdon Division and the county of Berks; on the west by the River Evenlode; on the east by the River Cherwell; and on the north by the following line, that is to say, the Great Western Railway, from the bridge over the Cherwell at Thrupp to the corner of Langford-lane; thence by that lane to the Oxford and Woodstock turnpike-road; and thence, by an imaginary line, to the River Evenlode at Hanborough Bridge; also, so much of the Wootton South Division as lies to the east of the River Cherwell; and also Hanborough Mill Farm.

4. That no part of any road or driftway shall be considered to be uninfected, which on either side adjoins any land or field being part of an infected place, or which is within a mile of any infected place.

5. That no animal shall be considered to be uninfected (within the meaning of this notice), unless it shall have been in an uninfected place for thirty consecutive days immediately preceding the date of any license for its removal; excepting that every calf under the age of thirty days, being the produce of an uninfected cow, and not having been separated from such cow, shall be considered to be an uninfected animal.

6. That no removal (as above authorised) of any animal shall take place without a license, signed by a Justice of the Peace of this county; and that every such license shall be in the form and verified in the manner indicated by the sub-joined Schedule. But it shall be entirely in the discretion of the Justice either to grant or refuse a license.

7. Where it happens that a farm is intersected by a boundary line dividing an infected from an uninfected area, and where it also happens that the principal homestead of the farm is wholly or

in part on the uninfected side of the boundary line, the whole of such farm shall, for the purposes of this notice, be considered to be on the uninfected side.

8. Nothing contained in this notice shall be construed to prohibit the removal of cattle from one part to another part of an infected farm.

9. That the power be, and is hereby delegated to each District Committee to appoint, from time to time, any further Inspectors for a district, and to revoke any appointment already or hereafter to be made:

Also to appoint a Clerk of each Committee; and that the remuneration to each Clerk be one guinea for each meeting of the Committee, to include intermediate correspondence, with the addition of actual payments for stationery, postage, &c.:

Also to appoint valuers and other officers; and from time to time to revoke such appointments.

And to assign to such Inspectors, Clerks, Valuers, and other officers such duties and powers as the Committee may, from time to time, think fit; so that no such duties or powers be inconsistent with the directions of any Act of Parliament, or with any orders or instructions of this Court:

That the remuneration to the Valuers be the same as that allowed to the Inspectors, minus travelling expenses.

That there shall be no appeal from a District Committee to the Court of Quarter Sessions upon any question of compensation.

10. Mr. Henry Bateman having declined to act as Cattle Overseer and an ex officio Member of the Committee of the Bampton East District,—ordered that Mr. Joseph Druce, of Eynsham, be substituted for Mr. Bateman.

11. That the said county of Oxford is, for the purposes in question, defined to be the whole area of the county, excepting the district of the Local Board of Oxford and the borough of Banbury.

12. That any person offending against these presents will, for every offence, forfeit such sum, not exceeding Twenty Pounds, as the Justices, before whom he or she shall be convicted, may impose.

CATTLE PLAGUE.

City of New Sarum.

We, the Mayor, Aldermen, and Citizens of the city of New Sarum, in the county of Wilts, acting as the local authority for the said city, do under the authority of the several Orders of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, now in force, made in pursuance of the several Acts of Parliament therein recited, with a view to check the spreading of the "Cattle Plague," and of "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," hereby order and declare, that from and after the 14th day of March instant.

1. No cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, nor any raw or untanned hide or skin, nor any horn, hoof, or offal of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf (except such hides, skins, horns, or hoofs, as are directly imported into the United Kingdom from India, Australia, South Africa, or America), nor any dung likely to propagate infection, shall be brought from any other part of Great Britain into any place within the said city, except as hereinafter mentioned, viz. :-

(i) It shall be lawful for any person to remove any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, *bonâ fide* his or her property, from land in his or her own occupation, in any adjoining parish or place within the county of Wilts, to land also in his or her own occupation in the said city.

(ii) It shall be lawful for any person to remove from any land in his or her own occupation in the county of Wilts, into the said city, any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, fit for immediate slaughter (every such animal having been marked by the police by clipping the hair off the end of the tail previous to removal, and to be slaughtered to the knowledge of one of the Inspectors, within forty-eight hours after reaching its destination), or to remove into the said city any bull or cow for breeding purposes, or any calf in a covered cart or waggon for the purpose of being weaned, or for the purpose of stocking a farm or land (such cattle being in every instance the *bonâ fide* property of the person removing the same) under the following conditions, that is to say :-

(a) That an order in writing for such removal be first obtained from the Mayor or one or more Justice or Justices of the Peace for the said city, and which shall be executed within seven days after the date thereof.

(b) That no such order be granted except on the production of a declaration in writing by the owner, to the satisfaction of the Mayor or Justice, that the cattle proposed to be removed are in a healthy condition, and have for twenty-one days previously been in the possession of the said owner, or in the case of a calf, within twenty-one days from the day of its birth, and of a like declaration by such owner, and a certificate in writing from the Superintendent of Police for the division from or out of which it is proposed to remove such cattle, that the cattle plague does not exist, nor within the space of thirty days previously has existed within two miles of the parish or place whence it is proposed to make such removal, such Order to be shown, on demand, to the police, or any ratepayer in such city, by any person in charge of the said cattle.

2. That no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf be removed, brought, or sent for exhibition or sale to any market or fair within the said city.

3. That no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, goat, or swine, nor the raw or untanned hide or skin, nor any horn, hoof, or offal of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, or goat (except such hides, skins, horns, or hoofs as are directly imported into the United Kingdom, from India, Australia, South Africa, or America), nor any dung likely to propagate infection, shall be brought into the city, or removed from any farm, or along or across any highway, or the sides thereof, in any parish or place within the city, after the Inspector or Inspectors shall have certified that the cattle plague exists, or within the space of thirty days previously has existed within the said city.

4. That no removal of any animal, under any of the foregoing Orders be made, except between sunrise and sunset.

5. That the Mayor, Ex-Mayor, Mr. Alderman Hussey, Mr. Alderman Fawcett, Mr. Alderman Woodlands, Mr. John Waters, Mr. Stephen Eldridge, and Mr. Edwin Whitlock, who are severally members of this Council, be, and they are hereby appointed and constituted a Committee (three whereof to form a quorum) to carry out the provisions of the said "Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," and that all powers conferred on this Council by the said Act, except the power to make a rate, be delegated to such Committee.

6. That Mr. Edmund Caldwell, the Superintendent of Police of the said city, be, and he is hereby appointed Chief Inspector, for the purpose of carrying into effect, within the said city, the provisions of the said "Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866."

7. That Mr. Thomas Aubrey and Mr. Joseph Charles Truckle, of Salisbury, Veterinary Surgeons, be, and they are hereby appointed Inspectors for the said city, to act within the said city, for the purpose of carrying out this Order.

8. That the foregoing Order, declaration, and appointments be, and continue in force until the same shall be altered or revoked.

At the Court of General Quarter Sessions of the Peace, held by adjournment at the Castle of Chester, in and for the county of Chester, on Saturday, the 10th day of March, 1866.

In pursuance of Orders of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated the 20th day of January, 1866, and the 23rd day of February, 1866, this Court doth by this Notice declare, that on and after the 12th day of March instant, any person may move any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, or calf in his possession (if sound) from any part of a farm to any other part of the same farm.

Also, that in order to allow for the breeding of stock a cow or heifer (if sound) may be moved with a license on any turnpike road, highway, or occupation road, or the sides thereof respectively, to and from any place where a bull (certified

sound) is kept, and that such license and certificate respectively be granted by a member of the respective Committees appointed pursuant to "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," for the districts for which such cow or heifer is to be sent, and in which such bull is kept, and that such license and certificate respectively be in force for a period not exceeding three days from the date thereof.

At Peebles, within the County Hall the 13th day of March, 1866, at three o'clock, afternoon, being the first meeting of the local authority in the county of Peebles, held in virtue of "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866 ;"

Present—John White, of Drumelzier; John Miller, of Leithenhopps; James Tweedie, of Quarter; Arthur Burnett, Sheriff substitute of the county; Robert L. Ritchie, tenant, Cloverhill; John Paterson, Provost of Peebles; Robert Murray, tenant, Mailingsland; Robert Tod, tenant, Cardrona Mains; Thomas Lindsay, tenant, Flemington Mill; William Stuart, W. S., Peebles; Edward Jackson, tenant, Altarstone; Charles Alexander, tenant, Whitfield; James Somerville, tenant, Ladyurd;

There was laid before the meeting a letter of the following tenor, by the Lord Lieutenant of the county to the Convener of the county:

"Belford, March 1, 1866.

"To the Convener of the county of Peebles.—By virtue of an Act, entitled 'The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866,' I hereby nominate the following gentlemen to act on the County Board, for the purposes of this Act:

"Robert Tod, Cardrona Mains, Traquair; Robert Murray, Mailingsland, Peebles; Edward Jackson, Altarstone Stobo; Robert L. Ritchie, Cloverhill, Broughton; Charles Alexander, Whitfield, Linton; James Somerville, Ladyurd, Noblehouse; Thomas Lindsay, Flemington, Leadburn.

The present meeting was called by circular of the following tenor:

"Netherurd House, March 7, 1866.

"Sir,
"As Convener of the county of Peebles, I hereby notify, that the first meeting of the local authority for the said county, constituted under 'The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866,' is to be held in the County Hall, Peebles, on Tuesday the 13th day of March current, at three o'clock, afternoon.

"I am, Sir, your most obedient servant,

Mr. Burnett, Sheriff-Substitute within the county, produced mandate from the Sheriff of the county, authorising him to act in his absence as a member of the local authority.

The meeting elected Mr. White chairman of the local authority, and specified that any five members thereof should be a quorum.

The county being at present free from cattle plague, the meeting delayed considering the propriety of forming one or more committees, and also of making any provision with reference to the sixteenth section of said Act, and of fixing any salaries or allowances to the Inspectors.

The meeting appointed the following parties Inspectors, viz., Patrick Fergusson, Veterinary Surgeon, Peebles, Inspector within the following parishes, viz., Eddlestone, Traquair, Innerleithen, Lyne and Meggat, Manor, and Peebles, including the Burgh of Peebles, so far as said parishes are situated within the county of Peebles.

James Ker, Veterinary Surgeon, Peebles, Inspector within the following parishes, viz., the united parish of Kellucho, Broughton and Glenholm, Culter, Stobo, Tweedsnuir, and Drumelzier, so far as said parishes are situated within the county of Peebles.

William Young, Veterinary Surgeon, Hallmyre Dean by Leadburn, Inspector within the following parishes, viz., Linton, Newlands, Kirkurd, and Skirling.

And the meeting conferred upon the said Inspectors, respectively, all the powers competent to such officers.

The meeting specially directed the said Inspectors respectively:—

1st. To carry into prompt execution the 13th and 14th sections of the said Act.

2nd. To make such reports and give such information, from time to time, as the Privy Council or the local authority may require.

3rd. In the event of any case of cattle plague, or case of a suspicious nature occurring in their districts respectively, to give instant information thereof to the clerk.

4th. To certify to the clerk, on the last day of each week, the number of days that they have respectively actually been engaged in the performance of their duties under said Act; and the number of miles travelled by rail or otherwise, separately, by them respectively while so engaged.

5th. In the event of any person refusing or delaying to comply with, or contravening, the orders of the local authority, to give instant information thereof to the clerk.

The meeting resolved and declared:—

First. That it is expedient, from the 13th day of March current to the 15th day of April next inclusive, to prevent the removal of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, and swine, from any part of Great Britain into any place within the county of Peebles, excepting sheep, from a healthy district, from any land or premises in the occupation of the owner of such sheep and beyond the jurisdiction of the local authority, to any other land or premises in his own occupation, within the jurisdiction of the local authority which sheep may be brought into the county, but only under a license of any two members of the local authority for the county of Peebles, granted on production to them of a certificate dated not more than two days preceding the date of such license, by two proprietors or farmers near neighbours to the lands from which such sheep are proposed to be removed, certifying that they are well acquainted with the lands from which such sheep are proposed to be removed, and that to their certain knowledge cattle plague does not exist on any part of those lands, or of the farm of which they constitute a part, and has not existed there for the period of thirty days before the date of such certificate, and under the

provision that such removal shall take place within three days of the date of such license; and that such sheep shall be driven only along public roads; provided nevertheless that no such license shall be granted by any members of the local authority, unless they shall believe that the roads by which such sheep are intended to be driven are situated in districts entirely free from cattle plague.

Second.—That it is expedient to prevent the removal of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, and swine, in the county of Peebles, from the 13th day of March current to the 15th day of April next, inclusive (with the exception of fat cattle or animals for immediate slaughter), provided always that it shall be lawful, but so long only as cattle plague shall not be certified by any of the Inspectors to the clerk to exist in the county, and only under the license of any two members of the local authority, for any person to remove from one place to another within the county to be specified in such license, but only within three days of the date thereof, any number of cattle or animals to be specified in such license, and under the condition that such cattle or animals shall be driven by public roads only.

Third.—That it is expedient to prevent the removal of any fat cattle or animals in the county of Peebles, from the 13th day of March current to the 25th day of March current, inclusive, except for immediate slaughter within said county, and under the conditions that such fat cattle or animals respectively shall, before leaving the owner's premises, have the hair clipped off the end of the tails, and shall be taken direct, on public roads, to the place of slaughter.

The meeting directed the clerk, in the event of his receiving instructions that any person has refused or delayed to comply with, or has contravened, the order of the local authority, to give information thereof to the Procurator Fiscal of the county, with a view to proceedings being instituted by him in terms of said statute.

The meeting authorised the clerk to call meetings of the local authority, on twelve hours notice, by circular letter at any time, and without prejudice to such authority the meeting adjourn this meeting to the 20th day of March current, at one o'clock, afternoon, within the County-hall, Peebles.

The meeting instructed the clerk to have the said rules and regulations as to the removal of stock printed and circulated by handbill, and published twice in the Daily Courant and Daily Scotsman, and once in the Peebleshire Advertiser.

The clerk was also instructed to get a form of license printed.

CATTLE PLAGUE.

Glamorganshire.

At the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace of our Sovereign Lady the Queen, held by adjournment at the town of Swansea, in and for the said county, on Thursday, the 8th day of March, in the year of our Lord 1866, before Robert Oliver Jones, Henry Hussey Vivian, Esqrs., and others, their associates, Her Majesty's Justices assigned to keep the Peace in the said county, and also to hear and determine divers felonies, trespasses, and other offences done in the said county—

This Court, having taken into further consideration the several Orders of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council for the prevention of the disease called the "Cattle Plague," and the

Act of the present session of Parliament, intituled "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," and the several orders made by this Court with relation thereto, and considering that it is expedient to amend and consolidate the said last-mentioned orders, doth hereby order,—

That, with a view to prevent the extension of the disease called the "Cattle Plague," the removal of any bull, cow, ox, bullock, heifer, calf, sheep, lamb, or swine from any part of Great Britain to any market or fair, or to any other place whatsoever within this county, for exhibition or sale, be absolutely prohibited until further order, provided that nothing in this Order shall be held to prohibit any person from exhibiting or selling, on the farm and premises held by him, any animal which shall have been on such farm or premises not less than twenty-one days previous to such sale.

That no such animal shall be brought into this county until further order of this Court, except such as shall be fit and intended for slaughter, and which shall have been examined and certified to be healthy by some one of the Inspectors appointed by this Court, and provided that such animals, so certified, shall be slaughtered within forty-eight hours of the giving of such certificate, at some place to be named in such certificate, provided that it shall be lawful for any person, with the consent, in writing, of any one Justice of the Peace of the said county, to remove any such animals from any premises in his own occupation beyond the boundaries of this county to any other premises in his own occupation within this county.

No such animals shall be moved, nor be permitted to proceed along any highway within the county, unless the driver or person in charge of them be furnished with a declaration in the form (herein set out), made by the owner of such animals before a magistrate resident in the division in which the premises from which such animals are to be moved, are situate; and every person in charge of such animals shall be, and is hereby required, to produce such declaration, on demand, to any police constable or other officer appointed by the local authority; in default whereof, such animals shall be impounded until further orders from the local authority, and the owners of them shall be liable to the penalties attached to offences against these orders. Provided that nothing in this order shall be held to prohibit any person from moving any animal along a high road communicating directly between different premises in his own occupation, distant from each other not exceeding two miles, or to and from any watering-place usually resorted to by the occupier of such premises, or to and from any place or places within such distance for breeding purposes, and no such declaration shall be valid for a longer space than three days from the date thereof.

FORM OF DECLARATION.

I, the undersigned, do hereby solemnly and sincerely declare as follows:—

1. That I purpose, within three days from the date hereof, to send [number and kind of animals] from my premises, situate at _____ in the parish of _____ in the county of Glamorgan, to ["to other premises in my own occupation, in the parish of, &c.," or "to the premises of A. B., in the parish of," &c.], by the direct and usual route thereto.

2. That such animal ["is" or "are"] intended for slaughter, and to be slaughtered within the

time specified by the Orders in Council, or have been purchased of me by the said as store.

3. That the said animal ["has" or "have"] been in my possession, and ["has" or "have"] been kept on my said premises during the whole period of twenty-one days last past at the least.

4. That there has not been, within my knowledge and belief, nor have I heard of any case of the disease commonly called the "Cattle Plague," occurring within two miles of my said premises.

5. And that the said animal ["is" or "are"] to the best of my belief, at the present moment, sound and free from any disease.

And I make this solemn declaration, conscientiously believing the same to be true, and by virtue of the provisions of an Act made and passed in the sixth year of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, entitled "An Act to repeal an Act of the present sessions of Parliament, entitled 'An Act for the more effectual abolition of oaths and affirmations taken and made in various departments of the State,' and to substitute declarations in lieu thereof, and for the more entire suppression of voluntary and extrajudicial oaths and affidavits, and to make other provisions for the abolition of unnecessary oaths."

That the county be divided into four districts, and that each such district have a separate committee.

No. 1. That the hundreds of Kibbor and Dynaspowis, with the borough of Cardiff, form a separate district, and that the Justices acting at the Petty Sessions for such respective hundreds, with the Mayor and ex-Mayor of the borough of Cardiff, be the committee for such district.

No. 2. That the hundreds of Caerphilly and Miskin form a separate district, and that the Justices acting at the Petty Sessions for such several hundreds be a committee for such district.

No. 3. That the hundreds of Cowbridge, Newcastle, and Ogmores form a separate district, and that the Justices acting at the Petty Sessions for such respective hundreds be a committee for such district.

No. 4. That the hundreds of Neath, Llange-felach, and Swansea, with the boroughs of Aberavon, Neath, and Swansea, be a separate district, and that the Justices acting at Petty Sessions for such respective hundreds, with the Mayors and ex-Mayors of the said boroughs of Neath and Swansea, be a committee for such district.

That the Chief Constable of the county be Chief Inspector under the said Act.

That the several Superintendents of the County Police, and the Head Constables of the Police for the boroughs of Cardiff and Swansea, be appointed Cattle Inspectors for the county, and that they be allowed such salary or other payment as the respective committees may think fit, but not exceeding one pound per week.

That the police constables of the county and of the boroughs of Cardiff, Neath, and Swansea, may be appointed Deputy Inspectors; those of the county by the Chief Inspector, and those of the said boroughs of Cardiff and Swansea by their respective Head Constables. Such police constables shall at all times obey the orders of the several committees, the Chief Inspector, or their

respective Head Constables, and be paid such sums as the local authority or committee may, on the recommendation of the Chief Inspector or Head Constables, think fit.

That the respective district committees be empowered to order the removal or destruction of all dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, which shall have been brought with, or used for the purposes of any such animal as aforesaid, and be likely to propagate infection.

That they require the value of any animal slaughtered in their respective districts, under the provisions of the said Act, to be ascertained by proper officers or by arbitration.

That the said committees respectively have all the powers by the said Act, or by any Order in Council vested in the local authority, except as herein reserved or otherwise ordered.

That each committee meet at least once in every fortnight, and shall have the power to appoint Medical Inspectors (who may be removed at the discretion of the committee), and with such salaries or other payment as they may think fit.

That each committee appoint a Clerk, who shall attend all their meetings, and enter all their orders and proceedings, with such a salary as they may think fit.

That each committee appoint a place or places for the slaughter of cattle brought by sea into their respective districts.

That the Clerk obtain copies of the recommendations for disinfection, issued by the Royal Commission on the Cattle Plague, for the use of the several committees.

Every person offending against these Orders, shall, for every such offence, forfeit any sum not exceeding Twenty Pounds, which the Justices before whom he shall be convicted of such offence may think fit to impose.

And it is hereby further ordered, that every person allowing any of such animals to stray on, or to feed on the sides of any turnpike road or other highway in the said county, whether unattended or in charge of any servant or other person, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five Pounds for every offence.

The several Inspectors shall report weekly to the Clerk of the Peace, and to the Clerk of their respective committees, on all matters relating to the performance of their duties under the said Act and the Orders of the Privy Council now in force.

That this Court be adjourned to Saturday, the 17th of March, 1866, at one o'clock, at the Town Hall, Cardiff.

CATTLE PLAGUE.

City of Norwich and County of the same City.

THE Mayor, Aldermen, and Citizens of the said city and county, and acting by the Council as the Local Authority, constituted by "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," do, under and by virtue and in exercise of the powers conferred upon them by Orders of the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council, dated respectively the 23rd of November, 1865, the 16th of December, 1865, the 20th of January, 1866, the 6th and 23rd of February, 1866, some or one of them, hereby revoke an Order made on the 1st of February, 1866, by William Peter Nichols, Esquire, Mayor of, and the then Local Authority for, the said city and county (except in respect of any offences committed

under such Order), and do hereby declare that from the date hereof, until further notice in that behalf, it is expedient, and therefore order,

That no animals, viz., bulls, cows, oxen, heifers, calves, sheep, goats, or swine, and no hides, skins, horns, or hoofs, be brought from any place not within the said city and county to any place therein, or (except as hereinafter mentioned), removed from any place within the said city and county, to any other place within the same, without such license, and giving such notice as hereinafter mentioned.

That no bull, cow, ox, heifer, or calf (except such as are intended for immediate slaughter) be brought, sent, or removed to any market or fair in the said city and county, or to any place therein for exhibition or sale.

That bulls, cows, oxen, heifers, and calves, intended for immediate slaughter, and sheep and swine may, with such license as hereinafter mentioned, be brought, sent, or removed from any place without, or any place within, the said city and county, to the markets and fairs of the said city and county, and removed from thence to any slaughter house or railway station in the said city and county.

That the licence upon which any of the animals aforesaid, or any hides, skins, horns, or hoofs, may be removed from any place without the said city and county to any place within the same, shall be granted by a Justice of the Peace, or other competent person residing within the district from which such animal, or any hides, horns, or hoofs, is, or are, intended to be removed; and the license upon which any such animal as aforesaid, or any hides, skins, horns, or hoofs, may be removed from any place within the said city and county to any place within the same, shall be granted by a Justice of the Peace for and residing within the said city and county, or other competent person, such licenses respectively to be in the form and to be granted upon a declaration being made in the form hereunto annexed, and to be in force for such time only as in the license mentioned.

Provided that no such license as aforesaid shall be required for the removal of any animal from one part of a farm to another part of the same farm, when such farm is wholly within, or partly within and partly without the said city and county.

That all cattle, viz., bulls, cows, oxen, heifers, and calves, brought into the market or fair, intended for slaughter, shall, before being allowed to leave the same, be marked for slaughter, by having the hair clipped off the end of the tail.

That every license under which any animal or thing is being removed into or within the said city and county, shall be delivered to the person removing and having charge of such animal or thing during removal, who shall produce the same for examination to any constable or other person lawfully authorised to require the production thereof.

That every person residing with the said city and county, and receiving therein any of the animals aforesaid, removed from any other district (except such as are intended for immediate slaughter), shall forthwith give notice thereof to, and at the same time deliver the license under which such removal was made to the Cattle Inspector for the said city and county.

Any person acting in contravention of the above Orders, or the Orders in Council above referred to, will incur a penalty not exceeding £20; and when the offence is committed with respect to more

than four animals, a penalty not exceeding £5 for each animal.

At the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace of our Sovereign Lady the Queen, held at Bodmin, in and for the said county, on Tuesday, the 2nd day of January, in the twenty-ninth year of the reign of our Sovereign Lady Victoria, by the grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith, and in the year of our Lord 1866, before Sir Colman Rashleigh, Baronet, Sir Charles Brune Graves Sawle, Baronet, John Jope Rogers, Esquire, and others their companions, Justices of our said Sovereign Lady the Queen, assigned to keep the Peace in and for the said county; and also to hear and determine divers felonies, trespasses, and other misdemeanors committed within the said county; and from thence continued by several adjournments until this 15th day of March 1866, before the Justices aforesaid, and others their companions as aforesaid, and now

held at the Shire Hall, in the town of Bodmin, in the said county:—

In pursuance and by virtue of "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," this Court doth order that for the several boroughs in the county of Cornwall, for which this Court is constituted the Local Authority, the Justices acting in the respective Petty Sessional Divisions of the said county within or adjacent to the area of which divisions the said boroughs are situate, shall, with the Mayors of such boroughs respectively, be committees under section 8 of the said Act, till the 14th day of April next.

And this Court doth delegate to the said committees the like powers as by the Order of this Court made on the 26th day of February last, are delegated to such Justices in their several Petty Sessional Divisions.

And this Court doth resolve that two of every such committee shall be a quorum, and that the several directions and instructions contained in the said Order shall be carried out by the said committees in the said boroughs.

This Court doth assign to the Inspectors already, or to be hereafter appointed for the purposes of the said Act in any of the said boroughs the like duties as in the said Order are set forth, and such Inspectors shall be entitled to the payments in the said Order mentioned.

This Court doth appoint Mr. George Arnall, of Bodmin, Inspector for the parishes of Warleggan and Cardinham, in the place of Mr. George W. Lamb, of Liskeard; and doth appoint the said George W. Lamb Inspector for the parish of Saint Michael Penkivel, in the place of Mr. George Page, of Truro; and assigns to them the like duties as in the said order of the 26th day of February last are mentioned.

And whereas the said Justices in Quarter Sessions are the Local Authority for the purposes of the several Orders of Her Majesty's Privy Council now in force under the Act passed in the 11th and 12th years of the reign of Her present Majesty, c. 107 (and since continued by several subsequent Acts), and also under and by virtue of "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866:"

And whereas, by virtue of an Order of the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council, dated the 23rd day of February last, the several Orders in Council dated the 23rd day of November last, the 16th day of December last, the 20th day of January last, and the 6th day of February last, were severally continued, and a certain order and notice of this Court made and given on the 27th day of January last, with a view to prevent the spread of an infectious disorder called the "Cattle Plague," were continued until the same should be altered or revoked by any further Order in Council, or by this Court, subject nevertheless to the provisions of "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," or of any Act thereafter to be passed; and by the said Order of this Court of the 26th day of February last, the said Order of the 27th day of January last, was confirmed and continued, except as the same was altered by the said Order of the 26th day of February last:

— And whereas this Court hath determined further to vary and partly add to the said order and notice of the 27th day of January last:

Now this Court doth order and declare, by this notice to be published on the 19th day of March instant, in newspapers circulating in the counties of Cornwall and Devon, and that on and from the said 19th day of March instant, till this Order shall be altered or revoked by any further Order of Her Majesty's Privy Council or by this Court, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, and no raw or untanned hides and

skins, horns or hoofs, except and provided as in the said Orders of Her Majesty's Privy Council is mentioned, and no offal of any such animals, and no dung, straw, fodder, or litter, likely to propagate infection, shall be removed from place to place in the said county of Cornwall within the jurisdiction and authority of this Court, except as follows:—

1. Fat cattle, calves, sheep, lambs, goats, and swine sold for slaughter, may be removed on a certificate signed in manner and to the effect hereafter mentioned, being first marked with the letter X in the hind quarter, cut in the hair or wool; or in the case of swine painted on the hind quarter, and the animals must be killed within five days from the date of the certificate.
2. Store cattle, calves, sheep, lambs, goats, and swine may also be removed on the like certificate.
3. Every certificate for the removal of any such animal or animals as aforesaid shall be signed by one Justice of the Peace acting for the Petty Sessional Division from or within which the same shall be removed, or by the Magistrate residing nearest to the land occupied by the owner of such animal or animals, and shall state the name and residence of the seller or owner, the destination of the animal or animals, the route by which the same is or are to be removed, the name of the purchaser or person to whom the same shall be sent, and the fact that the Justice has been satisfied, by the evidence of the Inspector or otherwise, of the healthiness of such animal or animals, and that the same hath or have been in the possession of the seller or owner for at least thirty days previously, and that no case of cattle plague has occurred within two months within three miles of the place from which any such animal shall come.

The certificate for fat animals shall be in force for five days, and the certificate for store animals shall be in force for three days from the granting thereof.

4. The said certificates are to be executed in duplicate, one part to be retained by the seller or owner, and one to be delivered to the person taking charge of the animals, to be by him shewn to any one requiring to see the same; and on the arrival of the animals at their destination, to be forthwith delivered to the officer in charge of the nearest police station.
5. The horns, hides, and hoofs of cattle, and skins of sheep, slaughtered on a farm, or otherwise, may be removed, on being subjected to some disinfecting process before removal.
6. On the certificate of one Magistrate any animal may be driven for breeding purposes any distance not exceeding three miles each way in going and returning; such certificate to state the place to which the animal is to be driven, and to be countersigned by its owner, and sent by him to the Clerk of the Magistrates of the Division or place; but no such certificate shall be granted for driving any such animal from or to a place within two miles of an infected farm or laud.
7. This order is not to prevent an occupier of land, not infected with cattle disease, from using a public highway, not infected with such disease, for removing any such animals as aforesaid from such land to any other land in his occupation not distant more than

a quarter of a mile, and not infected with such disease.

3. No part of a highway shall be considered to be uninfected which on either side adjoins land which is part of an infected place.

9. No animal as aforesaid shall be removed except between the hours of six in the morning and six in the evening.

And this Court doth further order, that, except as hereby altered, the order and notice of this Court, made on the 27th day of January last, and this present order and notice, shall extend to the whole of the county of Cornwall, including such boroughs as aforesaid, and excepting only such places as are not subject to the jurisdiction of this Court as such Local Authority as aforesaid, and shall continue in force until the same shall respectively be altered or revoked by any further Order of Her Majesty's Privy Council, or by this Court; and subject to the provisions contained in "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," and to the provisions and exceptions contained in any of the said Orders in Council.

And the said Justices hereby give notice, that every person offending against the terms of this order and notice, and against so much of the said orders and notices of this Court, dated respectively the 27th day of January last, and the 26th day of February last, as is not hereby altered, will for every offence be liable to a penalty not exceeding £20.

N.B.—By "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," it is enacted:—

1. That all cattle brought by sea from any place in Great Britain, or from any place out of the United Kingdom, into any town or place in Great Britain, shall be marked by clipping the hair off the end of the tail, and no such cattle shall be moved alive from such town except by sea.

2. That no cattle shall be moved on any railway before the 25th day of March, 1866.

and that the Right Honourable John Robert Viscount Sydney, the Right Honourable Charles Earl of Romney, Sir Brook William Bridges, Baronet, M.P., and Gathorne Hardy, Esq., M.P., be members of the Committees for the respective Petty Sessional Divisions for which they respectively act, and that all the powers conferred on this Court as the local authority by the said Act, except that of making a rate, be delegated to such Committees, in respect of such Petty Sessional Divisions respectively, provided nevertheless that such powers be exercised by the Divisional Committees subject to the directions of the aforesaid Committee for the whole county.

3rd.—And it is further ordered that every parish, liberty, and place in this county, as defined by the said Act, which is not a borough, or part of the Metropolis as defined by the said Act, shall for the purposes of this order be deemed to form part of and be attached to the Petty Sessional Division of the said county in which the said parish, liberty, or place

is situate, or which it adjoins, or to which it is annexed by any order of this Court.

And whereas it is expedient that the former orders of this Court, so far as the same relate to the removal of animals, hides and other substances, under the Orders of the Lords of the Privy Council respecting the cattle plague should be amended, and further Orders made, and the whole, but so far only as the same relate to such removal, should be consolidated, and set forth in one notice for the convenience of the public.

4th.—It is ordered pursuant to such Orders of the Privy Council, that the previous orders of this Court, but so far only as the same relate to such removal, shall cease to have force or effect after the 17th day of March, 1866, and that the following orders numbered from 5 to 20 respectively, be made, and that the same extend in effect over the whole district, subject to the jurisdiction of this Court as the local authority under the said Orders of Council, and that the said Orders, with the exception of such of them as specify the time during which they are to have effect, shall be in operation from and after the 17th day of March, 1866, to the 15th day of April, 1866.

5th.—It is ordered that no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat or swine, nor any raw or untanned hide or skin, nor any horn or hoof of any such animal, excepting such hide, skin, horn, or hoof of any such animal as is directly imported into the United Kingdom from India, Australia, South Africa, or America, nor any offal of any such animal, nor any dung, shall be removed from any farm or premises within the jurisdiction of this Court during the existence of the cattle plague thereon, nor until 30 days shall have elapsed after the cattle plague shall have ceased on the said farm or premises, and the said farm or premises and all buildings, yards, and fields, on the same shall have been effectually cleansed and disinfected; nor shall any such hide, skin, horn or hoof, except as aforesaid, nor any offal as aforesaid, nor any dung be sent or brought to any place within the jurisdiction of this Court from the Metropolis, as defined in the said Act, or from any place without such jurisdiction in which the cattle plague is existing, or has existed for six months previously: provided that nothing in this Order contained shall make it unlawful for any person to send or carry any such hide or other article as aforesaid by railway from the Metropolis, or from such other place as aforesaid through such jurisdiction, nor for any person to bring or send with the licence of any two Justices acting in and for the said county, any such hide or other article as aforesaid, from any land or premises in his occupation in the Metropolis, or such other place as aforesaid, beyond such jurisdiction to any other land or premises in his own occupation within such jurisdiction, during the time to be specified in such licence.

6th.—It is ordered that from and after the 17th day of March, 1866, to the 25th day of the same month, no sheep or lamb within the jurisdiction shall be put on any railway within the same and conveyed thereon; provided that nothing in this Order contained shall make it unlawful to send or carry any such animal if brought by sea from any place out of Great Britain into such jurisdiction to the nearest convenient railway station for the purpose of carrying it out of such jurisdiction.

7th.—It is ordered that no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine be removed from any place or premises within the jurisdiction of this Court, through any part of the

said jurisdiction to any market or fair, or to any parish or place whatsoever within or without such jurisdiction, for the purpose of exhibition or sale; provided nevertheless that sheep and lambs may be removed from any such place or premises to any market within or without the jurisdiction, until the County Committee appointed under the said Act, shall by notice made public or inserted in a newspaper circulating in the county prohibit the removing of sheep or lambs within the jurisdiction to such market; provided also that nothing in this order contained shall make it unlawful to send or carry any such animal, if brought by sea, from any place out of Great Britain into such jurisdiction to the nearest convenient railway station,* for the purpose of carrying it through or out of such jurisdiction.

8th.—It is ordered that no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox or calf shall be brought or removed from any place without the jurisdiction to any place within the jurisdiction of this Court; provided that nothing in this Order contained shall make it unlawful for any person to make such removal under the licence of two Justices of this county, from premises without to premises within the jurisdiction in the same occupation, when such removal can be effected without the cattle being on, or passing across, or along any public highway within the jurisdiction; nor shall any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox or calf be on, nor pass over, along, or across any public highway within the said jurisdiction, except as is permitted by the following orders of Court of this date, numbered respectively from 9 to 20 inclusive: provided that nothing in this Order contained shall make it unlawful for any person to send or carry any such animal by railway* through such jurisdiction, or to send or carry any such animal, if brought by sea, from any place out of Great Britain into such jurisdiction, to the nearest convenient railway station* for the purpose of carrying it through or out of such jurisdiction.

9th.—It is ordered that this last mentioned Order shall not be deemed to prohibit the occupier of any field or enclosed land from allowing any such cattle depasturing in such field or enclosed land, and in the possession of such occupier from being on, or passing along, or across, any foot-path or bridleway in such field or enclosed land, except in the case provided for by the order of this Court numbered 12.

10th.—It is ordered that any person may move any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf in his possession, if sound, from any farm or land in his occupation, within the jurisdiction, across any highway, or along any highway, for a distance not exceeding 200 yards, to any other farm or land in his occupation without any licence, and for a distance not exceeding two miles under the licence of an authorized person, provided that if the removal be from one Petty Sessional Division to another the licence shall be granted by an authorized person in each Petty Sessional Division.

11th.—It is ordered to make due provision for the breeding of stock, that a cow or heifer, if sound, may be moved on any public highway within the jurisdiction for any distance not exceeding five miles to and from any place where a bull is kept, under the licence of an authorized person.

12th.—It is ordered that any of the aforesaid orders numbered 9, 10, 11, which embody exceptions from the effect of the order numbered 8, is to cease to have any effect in any parish or place, on the publication in some newspaper circulating in or near such parish or place of a

notice by the Divisional Committee having jurisdiction over such parish or place that it has deemed it expedient that such order ought to cease to be in force in consequence of any outbreak or threatened outbreak of the cattle plague within its jurisdiction.

13th.—It is ordered that any calf, if sound, and under three months old, may be moved in a cart or waggon from the premises within the jurisdiction where the said calf has been bred, any distance not exceeding five miles along any highway in the said county to the premises of any purchaser of the said calf, under the licence of an authorized person.

14th.—It is ordered that the owner of any cow, if sound, may move the same from his premises within the jurisdiction, any distance not exceeding 15 miles, for the purpose of supplying milk at any lambing place of the said owner, in Romney Marsh, the Isle of Thanet, the Isle of Sheppey, or the Isle of Grain, under the licence of two authorized persons.

15th.—It is ordered that any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf which has been the property and on the premises of the same person for 30 days immediately preceding its sale, if sound, and if *bonâ fide* sold, may, if there be no cattle plague in the Petty Sessional Division in which such premises are situate, be removed from the said premises any distance not exceeding 10 miles along any highway, but not by railway, to any premises within the jurisdiction belonging to the purchaser, under the licence of two authorized persons, but if the removal be from one Petty Sessional Division to another, then under the licence of two authorized persons in each Division.

16th.—It is ordered that the owner of any cow or heifer, out for winter keep, may move the same, if sound, with its calf, or calves, if any, along a highway for any distance not exceeding five miles to any premises in his occupation within the jurisdiction under the licence of an authorized person.

17th.—It is ordered that the owner of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf may move the same, if sound, on and from the 25th day of March instant, to the 12th day of April next, from any premises on which it has been kept during the winter, to any premises in his occupation, or from any premises within the jurisdiction which he has ceased, or is about to cease to occupy, to any other premises within the jurisdiction, which he has begun or is about to begin to occupy, under the licence in either case of two authorized persons.

18th.—It is ordered that no animal shall be deemed to be sound within the meaning of the orders of Court of this date which is affected with the cattle plague, or has within 30 days been in contact with any animal so affected, or has within 30 days been in or on any building, or yard, or field, where any animal so affected had been kept, unless that building, or yard, or field had been effectually cleansed and disinfected at least 30 days previously to such first-mentioned animal being placed in or on the same.

19th.—It is ordered that the members of the County and Divisional Committees be persons authorized to grant breeding and removal licences, in respect of animals in the respective Divisions, in which the said members respectively act, and where the order of Court requires such a licence, also in respect of animals to be moved into their respective Divisions, and that the following Justices be persons authorized to grant such licences in respect of animals in the following

parishes, and where any order of Court requires such licence, also in respect of animals to be moved into such parishes respectively, namely:

20th.—It is ordered that notice of the aforesaid orders of Court be published in the several newspapers circulating within the jurisdiction of the said Court, in which the county advertisements are usually inserted, and in the newspapers circulating in the counties bordering on the county of Kent, in which the previous orders of this Court relative to the cattle plague have been inserted.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN,

THAT the local authority for the county of Linlithgow, appointed by virtue of the "Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," at a meeting, held at Linlithgow, on the date hereof, and in terms of the powers conferred upon them by the Order of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, of date the 23rd day of February, 1866, resolved and declared, that the resolution and the notice following thereon, issued by the Justices of the Peace for the said county, dated the 9th February, 1866, shall, on and after the 20th day of March current, be, and the same are hereby revoked; and in lieu thereof, they resolved and declared that, on and after said last-mentioned date, and until further notice:—

I. No cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, shall be sent or brought to any fair, or market, or to any place within the county of Linlithgow, under the jurisdiction of the local authority of the same, for the purposes of exhibition or sale. But nevertheless,

That any person may exhibit or sell, on his own land or premises, any of such animals belonging to him which have been on such land or premises for not less than fourteen days prior to such sale.

II. That no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, or sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, nor any raw or untanned hides or skins, or horns or hoofs of any of said animals, nor any dung, fodder, or litter, or hay or straw, which has been used as litter, shall be brought from any other part of Great Britain, into the county of Linlithgow, within the jurisdiction of the said local authority, except upon the following conditions, viz.:—

That any of the said animals and articles may be brought into said jurisdiction, on a written and signed certificate being obtained from a Justice of the Peace residing near the place from which the same are brought, to the effect that said cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, or sheep, lamb, goat, or swine is not at the time labouring under or affected with the said cattle plague, and that they are not from an infected herd or flock, or byre, shed, or court, where infected animals are or have been, and has not been in contact with any animal affected with said disease, nor upon any farm or premises where the cattle plague exists, or has existed within the period of thirty days immediately preceding the date of said certificate; or that said dung, fodder, or litter, or hay or straw, which has been used as litter, is not from a

farm, or from premises where the said cattle plague exists, or has existed for the last four months; or from the seller or owner, or superintendent of a slaughter-house, that said hides or skins, hoofs or horns, are not from an infected animal, and have not been in contact with other hides, skins, hoofs, or horns, from any such animal or animals—said certificate to be exhibited, on demand, to any Magistrate, Constable, or any member of the local authority, or any Inspector or other officer appointed by the local authority or by any committee thereof.

III. That no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, and no raw or untanned hides or skins, or hoofs, or horns of such animals, and no dung, fodder or litter, or hay or straw which has been used as litter, shall be removed from place to place, within said county of Linlithgow, within the jurisdiction of said local authority, or to the borders of the same, except as follows, viz.:—

1. That any of said animals and articles may be removed from place to place upon and within the same farm or premises, or within the immediately adjoining farm or premises held under the same tenant or possessor.

2. That any of said animals and articles may be removed, between sunrise and sunset, from place to place within said county of Linlithgow and said jurisdiction, provided that a signed licence to remove the same be obtained from a neighbouring Justice of the Peace, proceeding upon a solemn declaration by the sender or owner, or his manager, in terms of the Act 5 and 6 William 4, cap. 62, having the force of an oath, emitted before him, to the effect that none of said cows, heifers, bulls, bullocks, oxen, calves, sheep, lambs, goats, or swine, so required to be removed, are at the time labouring under, or affected with, said cattle plague, and that they are not from an infected herd or flock, or byre, shed, or court, where infected animals are, or have been, and have not been in contact with any animal affected with said disease, nor upon any farm or premises where the cattle plague exists, or has existed within the period of thirty days immediately preceding the date of said licence (provided always, that cows for breeding purposes may be removed for such purposes and brought back again at any time before sunrise or after sunset, the purpose of removal being specified in the licence); Or that said dung, fodder or litter, or hay or straw which has been used as litter, is not from a farm or premises on which said disease exists at the time, or has existed at any time within the last four months; or that said hides or skins, horns and hoofs, are not from animals which were infected, or which have died, or been slaughtered, on account of said disease. Said licence to be in duplicate, and to contain the number, if more than one, and description of such animal or animals, and such articles so to be removed, the place to which they are to be sent, and the purpose of removal; and said declaration, together with one of said licences, to be thereafter transmitted by the said Justice of Peace to the Clerk of Supply at Linlithgow, for the information of the local authority, and the other of the said licences shall be carried by the person in charge of any animal, or other article moved under the authority of the same, and shall be produced, on demand, to any Magistrate,

Constable, or any member of the local authority, or any Inspector or other Officer appointed by the local authority, or by any Committee thereof.

IV. That any of said animals taken or sent to a butcher within the said county and jurisdiction for slaughter, or out of the same for the like purpose, shall not be allowed again to leave the premises of said butcher alive, or to be brought back again alive, to said county and jurisdiction.

Every person offending against this notice is liable to be prosecuted for a penalty in terms of the Act.

The foregoing rules and regulations are independent of, and in addition to, the special Orders issued by the said Privy Council, in regard to places and parties, where and when, the cattle plague has actually broken out.

CATTLE PLAGUE.

County of Elgin.

NOTICE is hereby given, that the local authority for the county of Elgin, appointed by virtue of the "Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," at a meeting held at Elgin on the 16th day of March, 1866, in terms of the powers conferred upon them by the Order of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, of date the 23rd day of February, 1866, resolved as follows, viz.: that the orders by the Justices of the Peace for the county of Elgin, of date 1st December, 1865, 22nd December, 1865, 5th January, 1866, 30th January, 1866, 9th February, 1866, and 20th February, 1866, shall be altered to the following effect, viz.:—It shall for six weeks from and after the 20th day of March current, be lawful for any person who occupies land within the county of Elgin, to remove to such land any sheep of which he is the owner, and which are presently wintering on farms in the county of Banff, or in the counties of Inverness, Nairn, Ross, Cromarty, Sutherland, and Caithness, and also for any person who occupies lands within those parts of the county of Elgin, lying on the north and west of the River Spey, to remove to such lands any sheep of which he is the owner, and which are presently wintering in those parts of the said county of Elgin lying on the south and east of the said River Spey, on obtaining a license signed by any two members of the local authority for the county of Elgin, and subject to the conditions contained in such license.

Every license for removing sheep into the county of Elgin, in terms of this Order, shall contain a statement of the place in which such sheep have been wintering, and of the route by which they are to be removed; and no member of the local authority shall sign any such license, until a certificate signed by an Inspector for the county of Elgin has been produced to him certifying that such sheep are free from disease, and that the county in which such sheep have been wintering is free from the cattle plague: and no member of the local authority shall sign any such license, if the route by which such sheep are to be moved passes through a county which such member has reason to believe is infected with cattle plague.

The local authority further resolved that parties residing in the village of Fochabers, and occupying lands on the west side of the Spey, shall for fourteen days from and after the said 20th day of March current, be entitled to take hay, straw,

and dung, and to drive their own horses, cattle, and sheep, from the premises in their own occupation on the east side of the River Spey to the lands in their own occupation on the west side of the said river, and to take them back again.

The local authority further resolved and declared, that all the Orders hereinbefore mentioned, issued by the said Justices of the Peace relative to the cattle plague, shall continue in full force and effect, except as modified and altered by this Order.

Every person removing sheep into the county of Elgin, or into those parts of the county of Elgin lying north and west of the River Spey, contrary to the provisions contained in the orders by the Justices of the Peace for the county of Elgin hereinbefore enumerated, except as altered by this order, shall for each offence forfeit a sum not exceeding twenty pounds, and where any such offence is committed with respect to more than four animals, shall forfeit a sum not exceeding five pounds for each animal which the Justices before whom he or she shall be convicted, shall think fit to impose.

CATTLE PLAGUE.

County of Renfrew.

NOTICE is hereby given, by the County Board, being the local authority under "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," for the county of Renfrew, that the resolutions and orders published by direction of the Board of date the 5th day of March current, are continued, and remain in full force within the said county, subject to the following modifications and resolutions, made and agreed to by the Board at its meeting, held on 15th March, 1866, viz.:—

1st. That sheep or lambs may be brought into the said county of Renfrew, if they have not been recently in a public market; and, if conveyed by railway, that they have been carried in trucks which have been disinfected since cattle or sheep were last conveyed in them, and are certified to have been so by the traffic manager, at the station where the sheep are trucked, and by a member of the local authority, or District Committee, or a Justice of the Peace resident in the immediate neighbourhood of said station.

2nd. That it shall not be lawful for any person to remove any hides, skins, or offal, or any hay, straw, fodder, or litter, from any place within the said county of Renfrew, in which the cattle plague at the time exists, to any other place within or beyond the said county; nor to remove any of the said articles from any place where the cattle plague has existed, unless they are accompanied by a certificate from two members of the local authority, or of the District Committee of the place from where the articles are to be removed, or from two Justices of the Peace resident in the neighbourhood thereof, that the cattle plague has not existed at the place, within the immediately preceding thirty days, and that the articles have been disinfected. But it shall not be unlawful for any persons to send or carry the articles above specified through the said county by railway, or to bring or send the said articles from any land and premises in a person's own occupation and beyond the said county, to any other lands or premises also in his own occupation within the said county, during such time as may be fixed in the license of any two members

of the District Committee of the place to which the said articles are to be brought, or of two Justices acting in and for the county of Renfrew.

3rd. It shall not be unlawful for any person to remove from any place within the county of Renfrew and burghs therein, or from any other county or burgh therein, to any place within the said county of Renfrew, horse or cow dung, or other manure, provided that it is accompanied by a certificate from the seller and purchaser, and two members of the local authority, or of the District Committee of the place from where the dung is to be removed, or from two Justices of the Peace resident near the place, that it is from premises in which the cattle plague does not exist, and has not existed within thirty days preceding the date of the certificate, or where the disease has existed, that the place has been disinfected at least thirty days preceding the date of certificate, and is the produce of cattle that have not been affected with the cattle plague.
