#### *By Her Majesty's Command.*

The Ladies, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Drawing Rooms, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to The Princess.

#### PRESENTATIONS.

Any Lady who proposes to be presented must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Drawing Room, a card with her name written thereon, and with the name of the Lady by whom she is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation, that no presentation can be made at a Drawing Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary that a letter from the Lady who is to make the presentation, stating it to be her intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen, for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's Command, that no presentations shall be made at the Drawing Room, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Princess.

It is not expected that Gentlemen will present themselves at the Drawing Room, except in attendance upon the Ladies of their families.

**A**T the Court at Windsor, the 12th day of March, 1866.

PRESENT,

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS by an Act of Parliament made and passed in the 25th year of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to enable Her Majesty to issue Commissions to the Officers of Her Majesty's Land Forces and Royal Marines; and to Adjutants and Quartermasters of the Militia and Volunteer Forces without affixing Her Royal sign-manual thereto," after setting forth therein that every officer appointed or promoted by Her Majesty in Her Land Forces or Marines, and every Adjutant or Quartermaster in Her Militia or Volunteer Forces, receives a Commission from Her Majesty with Her Royal sign-manual thereon, and that it was expedient to regulate from time to time the mode of authenticating the said Commissions granted by Her Majesty, it was enacted, that it should be lawful for Her Majesty, by Order in Council, from time to time, as occasion might require, to direct that all or any Commissions for officers prepared or to be prepared under the authority of Her Majesty's Royal sign-manual might be afterwards issued without Her Royal sign-manual, but having thereon, in the case of Her Majesty's Land Forces, except as thereafter mentioned, the signatures of the Commander-in-Chief or the General Commanding-in-Chief, and of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and in the case of the Royal Marines, of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and in the case of Military Chaplains, Commissariat and Store Officers, and of Adjutants and Quartermasters in the Militia and Volunteer Forces, of one of Her Majesty's said Principal Secretaries; and that every such Commission issued and signed in pursuance of such Order in Council should be conclusive evidence that the officer named in any such Commission had been appointed or promoted by Her Majesty to the rank or office named therein:

And whereas by an Order in Council, bearing date the seventh day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, directions were given as to the issuing and signing of certain Commissions

being other Commissions than such as are mentioned and referred to in this present Order :

And whereas Her Majesty hath declared Her will and pleasure that any first Commissions which at the date of this Order have been authorized under Her Majesty's Royal sign-manual, but have not been signed by Her Majesty, shall be issued and signed under the provisions of this Order :

Now, therefore, in further pursuance of the above-recited Act, and in execution of the power thereby in Her Majesty in Council vested, Her Majesty is pleased, with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and doth hereby order—

1. That where, prior to the date of this Order, any person has been first appointed to an office in Her Majesty's Land Forces or Marines under Her Majesty's Royal sign-manual, but no Commission has been issued to him signed by Her Majesty, then that a Commission shall be issued to every such person so appointed as aforesaid signed in manner following, that is to say :—in any case of first appointment to Her Majesty's Land Forces (except as in this clause after mentioned) by the Commander-in-Chief, or the Field-Marshal, or General Commanding-in-Chief, and by one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and in any case of first appointment to the Royal Marines by the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Admiralty, and in any case of first appointment as Military Chaplain, or Commissariat, or Store Officer by one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

2. That this Order shall not prejudice or affect the said recited Order, nor shall this Order, or anything contained therein, be construed to prevent Her Majesty from signing any Commission, or to prevent any Commission so signed from having the same validity and effect as if this Order had not been made.

And the Right Honourable the Marquis of Hartington, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament passed in the session of Parliament holden in the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to remove doubts as to the exercise of power and jurisdiction by Her Majesty within divers countries and places out of Her Majesty's dominions, and to render the same more effectual," it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty to hold, exercise, and enjoy any power or jurisdiction which Her Majesty now hath, or may at any time hereafter have, within any country or place out of Her Majesty's dominions, in the same and as ample a manner as if Her Majesty had acquired such power or jurisdiction by the cession or conquest of territory :

And whereas Her Majesty hath power and jurisdiction in the islands included between the different branches of the River Danube, at its

mouth, and forming, and commonly designated as the Delta of the Danube, which by the Treaty between Her Majesty, His Imperial Majesty the Emperor of Austria, His Imperial Majesty the Emperor of the French, His late Majesty the King of Prussia, His Imperial Majesty the Emperor of all the Russias, His Majesty the King of Sardinia, and His Imperial Majesty the Sultan, signed at Paris, on the nineteenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, were replaced under the immediate sovereignty of the Sublime Ottoman Porte :

And whereas it is expedient to provide for the efficient exercise of the said power and jurisdiction, for the purposes hereinafter mentioned, in like manner as the same have been customarily and of right exercised on behalf of Her Majesty by Her Majesty's Ambassadors, Ministers, Consuls, and other officers within the dominions of the Sublime Ottoman Porte :

And whereas by the fifteenth Article of the General Treaty of Peace between Her Majesty, His Imperial Majesty the Emperor of Austria, His Imperial Majesty the Emperor of the French, His late Majesty the King of Prussia, His Imperial Majesty the Emperor of all the Russias, His Majesty the King of Sardinia, and His Imperial Majesty the Sultan, signed at Paris, on the thirtieth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, it was provided as follows : "The Act of the Congress of Vienna having established the principles intended to regulate the navigation of rivers which separate or traverse different States, the Contracting Powers stipulate among themselves that those principles shall in future be equally applied to the Danube and its mouths. They declare that this arrangement henceforth forms a part of the public law of Europe, and take it under their guarantee :"

"The navigation of the Danube cannot be subjected to any impediment or charge not expressly provided for by the stipulations contained in the following Articles : in consequence, there shall not be levied any toll founded solely upon the fact of the navigation of the river, nor any duty upon the goods which may be on board of vessels. The regulations of police and of quarantine to be established for the safety of the States separated or traversed by that river shall be so framed as to facilitate as much as possible the passage of vessels. With the exception of such regulations, no obstacle whatever shall be opposed to free navigation :"

And whereas by the sixteenth Article of the said last-mentioned Treaty, it was further provided as follows :—"With the view of carrying out the arrangements of the preceding Article, a Commission, in which Great Britain, Austria, France, Prussia, Russia, Sardinia, and Turkey shall each be represented by one Delegate, shall be charged to designate, and to cause to be executed the works necessary below Isatcha to clear the mouths of the Danube, as well as the neighbouring parts of the sea, from the sands and other impediments which obstruct them, in order to put that part of the river and the said parts of the sea in the best possible state for navigation :"

"In order to cover the expenses of such works, as well as of the establishments intended to secure and to facilitate the navigation at the mouths of the Danube, fixed duties of a suitable rate settled by the Commission by a majority of votes may be levied, on the express condition that in this respect, as in every other, the flags of all nations shall be treated on the footing of perfect equality :"

And whereas, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, by virtue of the said Articles of the said last-mentioned Treaty, a Commission was accordingly established for the purposes therein mentioned :

And whereas the said Commission has from time to time made and promulgated certain Rules, Orders, and Regulations, as well concerning the navigation of the said River Danube, and the conduct and government of masters, seamen, and others navigating the same, as concerning the payment of duties to be levied and taken in respect of the navigation of the said river, and the enforcing of penalties for the breach of such Rules, Orders, and Regulations respectively, or any of them :

And whereas by two several Orders in Council, bearing date respectively the sixth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, and the twenty-first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, was pleased to order that all Rules, Orders, and Regulations, so made, and to be made, as therein respectively mentioned, by the said Commission, should be binding and in force, and should have the force and effect of law, upon and against all British subjects and other persons subject to the jurisdiction of Her Majesty's Consuls, Vice-Consuls, and Consular Agents, within the dominions of the Ottoman Porte ; and such Orders were afterwards amended by a subsequent Order, bearing date the thirtieth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four :

And whereas under and by virtue of further and special powers and authorities for that purpose granted by Her Majesty, and by His Imperial Majesty the Emperor of Austria, His Imperial Majesty the Emperor of the French, His Majesty the King of Italy, His Majesty the King of Prussia, His Imperial Majesty the Emperor of all the Russias, and His Imperial Majesty the Sultan, the several persons constituting the said Commission being duly nominated Plenipotentiaries for the purpose, by a Public Instrument bearing date at Galatz the second day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, entitled "Public Act relative to the Navigation of the mouths of the Danube," did amend, consolidate, and of new promulgate and confirm (as so amended and consolidated) the several Regulations and Tariffs previously promulgated by the said Commission, the same being set forth and contained or referred to in the said Public Act, and in certain Annexes thereto.

And whereas at a meeting of the several Ministers, Plenipotentiaries of the several Powers aforesaid, in Conference assembled, at Paris, on the 28th day of March, 1866, a Protocol in writing was duly signed and agreed to, whereby the assent and sanction of all the said several Powers to the said Public Act, and the Annexes thereto, were expressed and recorded, subject to certain amendments of some of the Regulations contained in the said Annexes, which amendments are in the said Protocol at large set forth :

And whereas it is expedient that power should be given to Her Majesty's Consuls-General, Consuls, Vice-Consuls, and Consular Agents, exercising jurisdiction over British subjects within the dominions of the Sublime Ottoman Porte, to enforce the provisions of the aforesaid Public Act, relative to the navigation of the mouths of the Danube, and of its Annexes, as the same are amended by the said Protocol.

Now, therefore, in pursuance of the above-recited Act of Parliament, and in execution of

the powers thereby vested in Her Majesty in Council, Her Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order and declare, and it is hereby ordered and declared as follows :—

1. The said Orders of the sixth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, twenty-first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, and thirtieth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, shall from henceforth be repealed. This repeal shall not affect the past operation of these Orders or anything done under them, neither shall it affect a certain other Order of the thirtieth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, for the regulation of Consular jurisdiction in the dominions of the Sublime Ottoman Porte.

2. All Rules, Orders, and Regulations contained in the aforesaid instrument, entitled "Public Act for the navigation of the mouths of the Danube," and its Annexes, as amended, and (subject to such amendment thereof), confirmed by the said Protocol of the 28th day of March, 1866, and all the several amendments thereof set forth in the said Protocol, shall from and after the date of these presents be binding and in force, and shall have the force of law upon and against all British subjects and other persons subject to the jurisdiction of Her Majesty's Consuls-General, Consuls, Vice-Consuls, and Consular Agents within the dominions of the Sublime Ottoman Porte.

3. For all the purposes mentioned in the said Public Act and its Annexes, as so amended as aforesaid, and in the said Protocol respectively, and for the purpose of enforcing, so far as Her Majesty's subjects and such other persons as aforesaid are concerned, the provisions of the said Public Act and its Annexes, as so amended as aforesaid, and of the said Protocol, the said Consuls-General, Consuls, Vice-Consuls, and Consular Agents of Her Majesty within the dominions of the Sublime Ottoman Porte, shall, from and after the date of these presents, have, possess, and enjoy all and every the powers, jurisdiction, authorities, rights, privileges, and immunities which, in and by a certain Order in Council, bearing date the thirtieth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, are vested in or belong to, or are exerciseable by, the Judge of the Supreme Consular Court of Constantinople, within the dominions of the Sublime Ottoman Porte. And all the clauses, articles, and provisions of the said Order in Council, so far as the same respectively are now in force and unrepealed, and so far as the same, or any of them, are applicable to the purposes mentioned in the said Public Act and its Annexes, as so amended as aforesaid, and in the said Protocol respectively, or any of them, shall apply and extend to the said Consuls-General, Consuls, Vice-Consuls, and Consular Agents of Her Majesty, and to all acts, matters, and things whatsoever done by, to, or in respect of them the said Consuls-General, Consuls, Vice-Consuls, and Consular Agents respectively, under or by virtue of these presents.

And the Right Honourable the Earl of Clarendon, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy, of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the first day of March, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy, of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of your Majesty, chapter ninety-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Paul, situate within the limits of the new parish of Christ Church, Bolton, in the county of Lancaster, and in the diocese of Manchester.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said new parish of Christ Church, Bolton, and of the parish of Saint Peter, Bolton-le-Moors, in the county and diocese aforesaid, which lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such new parish and parish respectively.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said new parish of Christ Church, Bolton, and of the said parish of Saint Peter, Bolton-le-Moors, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Paul, situate within the limits of the same new parish as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend James Prince, Bishop of the said diocese of Manchester, as such Bishop, and as the patron in right of his see of the vicarage of the said parish of Saint Peter, Bolton-le-Moors, and also as the alternate patron in the same right of the perpetual curacy of the said new parish of Christ Church, Bolton, and with the consent of the Right Honorable John Earl Russell, the First Lord of your Majesty's Treasury, acting on behalf of your Majesty, as the other alternate patron in right of the Crown of the same perpetual curacy (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said new parish of Christ Church, Bolton, and of the said parish of Saint Peter, Bolton-le-Moors, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Paul, situate within the limits of the same new parish as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Paul, Bolton-le-Moors,' and that the right of

presentation and appointment to the church of such consolidated chapelry should belong to and be exercised jointly by the Reverend Henry Powell, Vicar of the said vicarage of the parish of Saint Peter, Bolton-le-Moors aforesaid; by William Haslam, of Bolton-le-Moors, Manufacturing Chemist; by William Ryder, of the same place, Machine Maker; by Thomas Lever Rushton, of the same place, Gentleman; and by Nathaniel Greenhalgh, of the same place, Cotton Spinner, and by their successors, being the trustees in whom the same right of presentation and appointment is now and hereafter to be vested under and according to the provisions of a certain deed or articles of agreement, bearing date the thirtieth day of November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, made pursuant to the hereinbefore mentioned Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy, and to the Act of the eleventh and twelfth years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, and deposited in the registry of the said diocese of Manchester.

"We, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Paul, Bolton-le-Moors, being:—

"All that portion of the new parish of Christ Church, Bolton, in the county of Lancaster, and in the diocese of Manchester, which is situate to the north of an imaginary line commencing on the boundary which divides the said new parish from the new parish of Emmanuel, Bolton-le-Moors, in the county and diocese aforesaid, at the intersection of Mayor-street by the line of the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway; and extending thence eastward along the middle of the said line of railway as far as a point in the centre of the bridge which carries such railway over Pump-lane; and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the said lane to its junction with Gas-street; and extending thence eastward along the middle of the last-named street to the boundary in the middle of Moor-lane which divides the said new parish of Christ Church, Bolton, from the parish of Saint Peter, Bolton-le-Moors, in the same county and diocese; and also all that portion of the said parish of Saint Peter, Bolton-le-Moors, wherein the present incumbent of such parish now possesses the exclusive cure of souls, which is situate to the west of an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish from the new parish of Saint George, Bolton-le-Moors, at a point in the middle of the northern end of Water-street-bridge; and extending thence south-eastward to and along the middle of Water-street to its junction with Deansgate; and continuing thence still south-eastward across Deansgate to and along the middle of Howell Croft to the boundary in the middle of Great Moor-street which divides the said parish of Saint Peter, Bolton-le-Moors, from the new parish of the Holy Trinity, Bolton-le-Moors, in the county and diocese aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law

written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Paul, situate at Tongham aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Paul, Tongham,' and that the right of presentation and appointment to the church of such consolidated chapelry should belong to and be exercised by the said John Sutton Utterton, Archdeacon of Surrey, and by his successors, Archdeacons of Surrey, for ever.

"And whereas certain lands, tithes, or other hereditaments, situate or arising within the limits of the several parishes are or have been vested in us under and for the purposes of the hereinbefore mentioned acts, and it appears to us to be expedient that some provision should be made for the residence of the incumbents of such benefices

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intitled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England, beyond the limits of the Metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," it is enacted that, in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-ground or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require), that after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time, as circumstances may require; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered; provided also that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish;

And whereas the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned, ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein with the modifications hereinafter specified:

WHEREAS it has been represented to Her Majesty, that certain contagious or infectious disorders are now prevalent among cattle, in the dominions and territories situated in Europe, belonging to His Majesty the King of the Netherlands, and that there is danger of the said disorders being introduced into this country by means of cattle from such countries or places: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that on and after the twenty-eighth day of *March* instant, no cattle shall be imported or introduced into the United Kingdom, which shall come from, or shall have been at, any place within the aforesaid territories and dominions, situate in Europe, belonging to His Majesty the King of the Netherlands; and also that on and after the said twenty-eighth day of *March* instant, no cattle shall be imported or introduced into the United Kingdom which shall be, or shall have been, on board any vessels at the same time with any cattle which shall have come from, or shall have been within, the aforesaid territories and dominions.

And Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, doth hereby further order, that, in the event of any cattle being landed in any portion of the United Kingdom; contrary to the provisions of this Order, all such cattle, the importation or introduction whereof is so hereby prohibited as aforesaid, shall, upon their arrival in this country, be destroyed or otherwise disposed of, as the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Customs may direct.

This Order shall continue in force until revoked by any further Order.

The word "cattle" shall include sheep as well as bulls, cows, oxen, heifers, and calves.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

And whereas it is provided in the eleventh section of the said Act, which section is in the first part thereof, that Part I of the said Act shall continue in force until the fifteenth day of

April, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, and no longer, unless continued or renewed by Order of Her Majesty in Council.

And whereas it is provided in the twelfth, thirteenth, fourteenth, fifteenth, and sixteenth sections of the first part of the said Act as follows:—

*Slaughter of Diseased Animals.*

“12. Every Local Authority shall cause all animals affected with the cattle plague within its district to be slaughtered, and shall, by way of compensation for every animal so slaughtered, pay to the owner thereof such sum not exceeding twenty pounds, and not exceeding one half of the value of the animal immediately before it was affected with the cattle plague, as to such Local Authority may seem fit.

“13. Every Local Authority shall cause every animal that has died of cattle plague, or has been slaughtered in consequence of being affected with cattle plague within its district, to be buried as soon as possible in its skin in some proper place and to be covered with a sufficient quantity of quicklime or other disinfectant, and with not less than six feet of earth.

“14. Every Local Authority shall, within its district, cause the yard, shed, stable, field, or other premises in which any animal affected with cattle plague has been kept while affected by the disease, or has died or been slaughtered, to be thoroughly cleansed and disinfected, and all hay, straw, litter, dung, or other articles that have been used in or about any such animal to be burnt or otherwise destroyed; and no fresh animal shall be admitted into any yard, shed, stable, field, or other premises in which any animal affected with cattle plague has been kept while affected by the disease, or has died or been slaughtered, until the expiration of thirty days after the cleansing and disinfecting of such premises in pursuance of this Act; and every Local Authority shall direct the disinfecting the clothes of, and the use of due precautions by Inspectors, Cattle Overseers, and others in contact with animals affected by the cattle plague, with a view to prevent the spreading of contagion.

“15. A Local Authority may, if it thinks fit, cause to be slaughtered any animal that has been in the same shed or stable, or in the same herd or flock, or in contact with any animal affected with cattle plague within its district; and the owner of any animal so slaughtered may either dispose of the carcase on his own account, with a licence from some officer appointed in that behalf by a Local Authority, or may require the Local Authority to dispose of the same, in which case such Local Authority shall pay to the owner thereof, by way of compensation, such sum, not exceeding twenty-five pounds, as may equal three-fourths of the value of the animal slaughtered: Provided always, that the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, or any two or more of them, may reserve animals (ordered to be slaughtered as aforesaid) for the purpose of experimental treatment.

“16. The Local Authority may require the value of any animal slaughtered under this Act, to be ascertained by Officers of the Local Authority or by arbitration, and generally may impose conditions as to evidence of the slaughter and value of the animals slaughtered: Provided that no

compensation shall in any case be paid in respect of any animal found affected with cattle plague in a market or on a highway, or in respect of any animal which has been moved or otherwise dealt with in contravention of this Act, or any Order of a Local Authority made in pursuance thereof.

And whereas it is expedient that the provisions of the above recited sections of the first part of the said Act should be continued in force beyond the said fifteenth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in exercise of the power vested in Her by the said Act, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the said recited provisions contained in the twelfth, thirteenth, fourteenth, fifteenth, and sixteenth sections of the first part of the said Act shall continue in force on and after the said fifteenth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, until the tenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the eleventh and twelfth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled “An Act to prevent until the first day of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty, and to the end of the then session of Parliament, the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders among Sheep, Cattle, and other Animals” (which Act has since been extended and continued in force until the first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, and to the end of the then next session of Parliament), after reciting that “a contagious or infectious disorder known or described as the Sheep Pox or Variola Ovina, now prevails among the sheep in some parts of the United Kingdom, and it is necessary to take measures to prevent such disorder from spreading,” it was and is enacted (amongst other things) as follows, namely:—“In case any Sheep or Lambs infected with or labouring under the said Disorder, or any Disorder of the like Nature, be exposed or offered for Sale, or be brought or attempted to be brought for the purpose of being so exposed or offered for Sale, in any market, fair, or other open or public Place, where other animals are commonly exposed for Sale, then and in any such case it shall be lawful for any Clerk or Inspector or other Officer of such Fair or Market, or for any Constable or Policeman, or for any other person authorized by the Mayor, or by any Two Justices of the Peace having Jurisdiction in the Place, or for

“any person authorized or appointed by Her Majesty in Council, to seize the same, and to report such Seizure to the Mayor or any Justice of the Peace having Jurisdiction in the Place; and it shall be lawful for such Mayor or Justice either to restore the same, or to cause the same, together with any Pens, Hurdles, Troughs, Litter, Hay, Straw, or other Articles which he may judge likely to have been infected thereby, to be forthwith destroyed or otherwise disposed of in such manner as he shall deem proper, or as may be directed in manner hereinafter provided; and any person bringing or attempting to bring any Sheep, Lambs, Oxen, Bulls, Cows, Calves, or other horned Cattle, into any such Market, Fair, or open or public Place as aforesaid, knowing such Sheep, Lambs, or Cattle to be infected with or labouring under either of such Disorders as aforesaid, shall, upon Conviction thereof, forfeit and pay for each and every such Offence a Sum not exceeding Twenty Pounds.”

And whereas in and by the said Act, it was and is further enacted as follows, that is to say:—

“If any Person turn out, keep, or depasture any Sheep or Lambs infected with or labouring under the said disorder, in or upon any Forest, Chase, Wood, Moor, Marsh, Heath, Common, waste Land, open Field, Road Side, or other undivided or uninclosed Land, such Person shall, on conviction thereof, forfeit and pay any Sum not exceeding Twenty Pounds.”

And whereas in and by the said Act it was and is further enacted (for the more effectually preventing the spreading of contagious or infectious disease) as follows, that is to say:—

“It shall be lawful for the Lords and others of Her Majesty’s Privy Council, or any two or more of them, from time to time to make such Orders and Regulations as to them may seem necessary for the purpose of prohibiting or regulating the removal to or from such parts or places as they may designate in such Order or Orders, of Sheep, Cattle, Horses, Swine, or other Animals, or of Meat, Skins, Hides, Horns, Hoofs, or other parts of any Animals, or of Hay, Straw, Fodder, or other articles likely to propagate Infection; and also for the purpose of purifying any Yard, Stable, Outhouse, or other place, or any Waggon, Carts, Carriages, or other vehicles; and also for the purpose of directing how any Animals dying in a diseased state, or any Animals, Parts of Animals, or other Things, seized under the Provisions of this Act, are to be disposed of; and also for the Purpose of causing Notices to be given of the Appearance of any Disorder among Sheep, Cattle, or other Animals, and to make any other Orders or Regulations for the purpose of giving effect to the Provisions of this Act, and again to revoke, alter, or vary any such Orders or Regulations; and all Provisions for any of the Purposes aforesaid, in any such Order or Orders contained, shall have the like Force and Effect as if the same had been inserted in this Act: and all Persons offending against the same shall for each and every offence forfeit and pay any Sum not exceeding Twenty Pounds, or such smaller Sum as the said Lords or others of Her Majesty’s Privy Council may in any case by such Order direct;”

And whereas a Contagious or Infectious Disorder, known or described as the Sheep Pox, or

Variola Ovina, now prevails among the Sheep, in a certain part of the United Kingdom, and it is expedient to take measures for preventing such Disorder from spreading;

Now, therefore, the Lords of Her Majesty’s Privy Council, do hereby, in pursuance and exercise of the powers so vested in them as aforesaid, make and ordain the several Orders and Regulations following; that is to say:—

#### I.

It shall not be lawful for any person to remove any Sheep or Lambs to or from the parishes of Black Notley and Fairstead, in the county of Essex, or to drive or conduct any Sheep or Lambs through or by way of such parishes.

#### II.

No skin, wool, horns, or hoofs of any sheep or lambs shall be moved out of the aforesaid parishes without a certificate in writing, signed by some person who may have been authorised by two or more Justices of the said county of Essex to seize sheep or lambs infected with or labouring under the said disorder, under the first section of the said Act, to the effect that such skin, wool, horns, or hoofs, did not belong to any sheep or lambs forming part of a flock affected by the said disorder, or to any sheep or lambs on the farm or premises in which such disorder prevails.

#### III.

All Sheep and Lambs dying in any of the stages of the said disease, wheresoever such death or deaths shall or may occur, shall forthwith be buried by the person or persons in whose possession such Sheep or Lambs may be at the time of death, with their skins and wool on, in pits of not less than five feet in depth, and the carcasses so buried shall be covered with quicklime.

#### IV.

All sheds and places whatsoever, and all railway trucks and other vehicles which may or shall have been used or occupied by Sheep or Lambs affected by the said disease, shall forthwith, after having been so used, be thoroughly cleansed with water, and immediately afterwards purified with chloride of lime by the person or persons in possession of such sheds, places, trucks, and vehicles respectively.

#### V.

Every person in possession of any Sheep or Lambs in or amongst which the said disease shall manifest itself, shall forthwith give notice, in writing, of the fact to the Chief Constable or Superintendent of Police of the county or borough in which such Sheep or Lambs may be.

#### VI.

And it is further ordered that this Order shall continue in force until revoked.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Session of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and seven, intituled "An Act to prevent until the first day of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty, and to the end of the then session of Parliament, the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders among sheep, cattle, and other animals," and from time to time continued by divers subsequent Acts, and lastly by an Act passed in the session of the twenty-eighth and twenty-ninth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, chapter one hundred and nineteen, it is (amongst other things) enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Privy Council, or any two or more of them, from time to time, to make such Orders and Regulations as to them may seem necessary for the purpose of prohibiting or regulating the removal to or from such parts or places as they may designate in such Order or Orders of sheep, cattle, horses, swine, or other animals, or of meat, skins, hides, horns, hoofs, or other parts of any animals, or of hay, straw, fodder, or other articles, likely to propagate infection, and to make any other Orders or Regulations for the purpose of giving effect to the provisions of the said Act, and again to revoke, alter, or vary any such Orders or Regulations; and that all provisions for any of the purposes aforesaid in any such Order or Orders contained shall have the like force and effect as if the same had been inserted in the said Act:

And whereas a contagious or infectious disorder, generally designated as the "Cattle Plague," has lately appeared, and now prevails, amongst cattle in Scotland:

And whereas divers Orders have been made by the Lords of the said Council in relation to the cattle plague, and it is expedient to consolidate, amend, and add to the said Orders:

Now, therefore, the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council do hereby, in exercise of the powers given under the said Act so continued as aforesaid, order as follows:

#### *Preliminary.*

1. This Order shall come into force on the 16th of April, 1866, and shall remain in force until it is revoked or altered.

2. This Order shall apply to Scotland only, subject to the limitation hereinafter expressed.

#### PART I.

##### *Definitions.*

3. In the construction of this Order the following terms shall have the meanings hereinafter assigned to them; that is to say,

"Person" shall include a body of persons, corporate or unincorporate:

"Cattle" shall mean bull, bullock, cow, ox, heifer, or calf:

"Animal" shall mean cattle as above defined, sheep, lambs, goats, and swine:

"Disease" shall mean the cattle plague:

"Diseased" shall mean affected by the cattle plague:

"Privy Council" shall mean the Lords and others of Her Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council, or any two of them:

"Burgh" shall mean any town which returns or contributes to return a member or members to Parliament:

"County" shall not include a county of a city or county of a town:

Detached parts of counties shall be considered as forming part of the county by which they are surrounded, or if partly surrounded by two or more counties, then as forming part of that county with which they have the longest common boundary:

Every place that is not, according to the foregoing definitions, a burgh or county, shall be deemed to form part of the county, as hereinbefore defined, to the county rate of which it is assessed, or, if not so assessed, of the county within which it is situate.

#### *Local Authority.*

4. For the purposes of this Order, "District," "Local Authority," "Local Rate," and "Clerk of Local Authority" shall respectively mean the places, bodies of persons, rate, and officer in the first schedule hereto annexed in that behalf mentioned.

5. Any Local Authority may from time to time form one or more Committee or Committees consisting wholly of its own members, or partly of its own members and partly of such other persons, being rated occupiers in the district and qualified in such other manner as the Local Authority may determine, and may delegate, with or without conditions or restrictions, to any Committee so formed, all or any powers conferred on the Local Authority by this Order, and may from time to time revoke, add to, or alter any powers so given to a Committee.

A Committee may elect a chairman of its meetings. If no chairman is elected, or if the chairman elected is not present at the time appointed for holding a meeting, the members present shall choose one of their number to be chairman of such meeting. A Committee may meet and adjourn as it thinks proper. The quorum of a Committee shall consist of such number of members as may be prescribed by the Local Authority that appointed it, or, if no number be prescribed, of three members. Every question at a meeting shall be determined by a majority of votes of the members present, and voting on that question; and in case of an equal division of votes the chairman shall have a second or casting vote.

The proceedings of a Committee shall not be invalidated by any vacancy or vacancies amongst its members.

A Local Authority may from time to time add to or diminish the number of the members or otherwise alter the constitution of any Committee formed by it under this Order, and may dissolve any such Committee and form a new one in its place.

Any Committee formed under the provisions of the Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866, shall be deemed to be a Committee of a Local Authority for the purposes of this Order, within the district of such Local Authority as defined by this Order.

6. The Local Authority of any burgh which is assessed to the police rate of any county may, with the consent of the Local Authority of such county, such consent being testified in writing, by a letter signed by the clerk of such last-mentioned authority, declare, by notice published in any newspaper circulating within such county, that such burgh is annexed to such county for the purposes of this Order, and from the date of the publication of such notice such burgh shall, for the purposes of this Order, form part of the district of the Local Authority of such county.

7. Every Local Authority shall perform all such duties as are imposed upon it by this Order, and shall make such reports to the Privy Council as the Council may from time to time require.

#### *Appointment of Officers, &c.*

8. Every Local Authority shall from time to time appoint such inspectors or other officers as it thinks necessary to carry into effect the provisions of this Order within its district; it shall assign them such duties and award them such salaries and allowances as it thinks expedient, and may revoke any appointment so made.

9. Every inspector or other officer appointed by a Local Authority previously to the date of this Order, for any purpose relating to the cattle plague, and holding office at such date, shall be deemed an inspector or officer for the purposes of this Order within the district of such Local Authority as defined by this Order, and be subject to the provisions thereof, in the same manner as if he had been appointed thereunder.

10. Every inspector shall furnish the Privy Council with such information in regard to the cattle plague as they may from time to time require.

11. Every Local Authority may provide and supply, without charge, printed copies of any documents or forms requisite for the purposes of this Order.

12. All expenses incurred by a Local Authority in carrying into effect this Order shall be defrayed out of the local rate.

13. Any person appointed or to be appointed by the Privy Council an inspector for the purposes of this Order shall, throughout the whole of Scotland, have all the powers which an inspector appointed by a Local Authority has within his district, and any direction of the Privy Council shall, as respects such inspector, be of the same validity as a direction of a Local Authority in the case of an inspector appointed by it.

#### PART II.

##### *Diseased Animals.*

14. Every person having in his possession or under his charge any diseased animal shall forthwith give notice thereof to such officer as may

have been appointed by the Local Authority of the district to receive such notices; or, if no such officer has been appointed, to a police constable, whose duty it shall be to report without delay to the Local Authority the fact of such notice having been given to him. Any person failing to comply with this regulation as to giving notice shall be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

15. Every person having in his possession or under his charge any diseased animal shall, as far as practicable, keep such animal separate from animals not diseased. Any person failing to comply with this regulation shall be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

16. No diseased animal, and no animal which has, within the preceding twenty-eight days, been in the same shed or stable, or in the same herd or flock, or in contact with a diseased animal, shall be removed alive from the premises where such animal may be, except with a licence from the Local Authority of the district, which licence shall only permit the removal of such animal to some place within the district of such Local Authority where it can be conveniently slaughtered, or kept apart from all other animals until such Local Authority is satisfied that there is no reasonable probability of such animal propagating disease; provided that no such licence shall authorize such animal to be removed in contravention of the 17th regulation of this Order.

If any animal is removed in contravention of this regulation, the person causing, directing, or permitting the removal of such animal, and also the person removing the same, shall respectively be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

17. No diseased animal, and no animal that has within the preceding twenty-eight days been in the same shed or stable, or in the same herd or flock, or in contact with a diseased animal, shall—

1. Be placed or kept in any common or unenclosed land, or in any field or other place insufficiently fenced;
2. Be sent or brought to any fair or market, or exposed for public sale;
3. Be driven along or allowed to stray upon any highway or the sides thereof;
4. Be sent or carried by any railway, canal, river, or other inland navigation, or by any coasting or sea-going vessel.

If any animal is dealt with in contravention of this regulation, the owner of such animal, and also the company or person other than the owner dealing with the same in contravention of this regulation, shall be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

18. Where any offence is committed with respect to any animal under the 14th, 15th, 16th, and 17th regulations of this Order, or any of them, the Local Authority of the district, and any authority of a fair or market in which such animal may be, may, by themselves or their officers, cause such animal to be slaughtered and buried, and recover from the owner in a summary manner all expenses so incurred.

19. All diseased animals, whether they have been slaughtered or have died of the disease, shall be buried by the owner as soon as practicable in some proper place, with their skins slashed

in such a manner as to prevent their being made of any use, and with a sufficient quantity of quick-lime or other disinfectant, and shall be covered with at least five feet of earth, or shall be otherwise disposed of in such manner as may be directed by any regulations made by the Local Authority, and approved by the Privy Council.

If any diseased animal is not buried or otherwise disposed of in pursuance of this Regulation, the owner of such diseased animal shall be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order, and it shall be lawful for the Local Authority to bury or otherwise dispose of any such animal, and to use any convenient place on the premises of the owner for that purpose.

The Local Authority may recover from the owner in a summary manner any expenses incurred by it under this regulation.

20. No person shall dig up any diseased animal, or part of a diseased animal. Any person acting in contravention of this regulation shall be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

21. Every Local Authority shall within its district, at its own expense, cause the premises in which diseased animals have been to be thoroughly cleansed and disinfected; and the occupier of such premises shall give all facilities for such cleansing and disinfecting. Any occupier of premises failing to give such facilities shall be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

22. No fresh animal shall be admitted into any yard, shed, stable, field, or other premises in which a diseased animal has been kept while affected by disease, or has died, or been slaughtered, until the expiration of thirty days after the cleansing and disinfecting of such premises. If any fresh animal is admitted into any yard, shed, stable, field, or other premises in contravention of this regulation, the occupier of such yard, shed, stable, field, or other premises shall be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

23. The dung of a diseased animal, and all hay, straw, or litter, or any other article that has been in contact with or used about a diseased animal, shall be destroyed, or, with the sanction of the Local Authority, shall be disinfected and dealt with to the satisfaction of the inspector. If such dung, hay, straw, litter, or any other article is not destroyed or disinfected and dealt with in pursuance of this regulation, the Local Authority may cause the same to be destroyed or disinfected, and recover in a summary manner all expenses incurred by it from the occupier of the premises on which such articles were found, and in addition thereto such occupier shall be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

24. The dung of a diseased animal, and all hay, straw, or litter, or any other article that has been in contact with or used about a diseased animal, shall not be removed from the premises where such animal has been, except for the purpose of being destroyed or disinfected and dealt with in compliance with this Order and with a licence of an inspector specifying the place at which it is to be destroyed or disinfected and dealt with, and shall not be removed beyond the limits of the district of the Local Authority in which the said premises are situated without the consent in writing of the Local Authority into whose district it is moved. If such dung, hay, straw, litter, or other article is removed in contravention of this regulation, the occupier of the premises from which it is removed, and also the person removing the same,

shall be respectively deemed guilty of an offence against this Order; and it shall be lawful for the Local Authority to destroy or disinfect any such article, and to recover the expenses of such destruction or disinfection from the said occupier.

25. Every Local Authority shall direct the disinfecting of clothes of, and the use of due precautions by, inspectors and other officers brought into contact with diseased animals, with a view to prevent such inspectors or officers spreading contagion. Any inspector or officer disobeying the directions of any Local Authority as to such disinfection and use of due precautions shall be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

#### *Infected Places.*

26. The authorities hereinafter mentioned, that is to say, any Local Authority as to any place within its district shall, and the Privy Council as to any place in Scotland may, by Order made at any time after the passing of this Order, and published in manner hereinafter mentioned, declare any place in which disease amongst animals at that time exists, together with such an area, including such place, as to such authority may seem to be required, to be an "infected place," from and after a date to be specified in such Order; and the authority declaring the place to be infected may, at the expiration of one month after the disappearance of disease in that place, by Order published in like manner, declare such place to be free from disease, and after the publication of such last-mentioned Order such place shall cease to be an "infected place" within the meaning of this Order, unless again declared in manner aforesaid to be an "infected place."

Any Local Authority may include in the area of an "infected place" any adjoining part of the district of another Local Authority, with the consent of such last-mentioned authority, testified in writing by a letter signed by the clerk of such authority.

The area of an "infected place" may be described by reference to a map deposited at some specified place, or by reference to parishes, townships, farms, or otherwise, as the authority may think expedient.

An Order declaring a place to be an "infected place" shall be published by notice being posted up in or near the "infected place," and, so far as is possible, in all places where notices are usually posted up, within five miles of such "infected place," or in such other manner as the authority declaring the place to be infected may think expedient.

The Local Authority, on declaring any place infected, shall forthwith report by post to the Privy Council the fact of such declaration having been made.

No objection shall be taken in any legal proceeding in respect of an "infected place" on the ground that due notice has not been given of such place having been declared to be an "infected place."

Any Order made by the Privy Council under this regulation shall supercede any Order inconsistent with it that may have been made by a Local Authority.

27. The following rules shall be observed with respect to "infected places," in addition to the other regulations of this Order with respect to diseased animals; that is to say:—

1. No animal shall be moved out of an "infected place:—"

2. No hides, skins, horns, hoofs, or offal of animals shall be moved out of an "infected place," without the licence of some officer of the Local Authority appointed to issue such licences certifying that such articles have not formed part of a diseased animal, and, if necessary, have been properly disinfected :
3. No carcase of, or undressed meat that has formed part of, any bull, bullock, cow, ox, heifer, or calf, shall be moved out of an "infected place," without the licence of some officer of the Local Authority appointed to issue such licences certifying that such carcase is not that of a diseased animal, or that such meat has not formed part of a diseased animal :
4. No dung of animals, and no hay, straw, litter, or other articles forming food of animals, or used for or about animals, shall be removed out of an infected place without the licence of some officer of the Local Authority appointed to issue such licences certifying that such articles have not been in contact with or used about a diseased animal :
5. A licence for the purpose of this regulation must be in writing, and shall not authorize the removal of any articles beyond the district of the Local Authority in which the infected place is situate without the licence of the Local Authority into whose district it is proposed to move such articles.

If any animal, dung of animals, hide, skin, horn, hoof, offal, meat, hay, straw, litter, or other articles, is or are moved in contravention of this regulation, the owner of such animal or articles, and also the person moving the same, or causing, directing, or permitting the same to be moved, shall respectively be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

All constables and police officers shall enforce the provisions of this regulation, to the utmost of their power, and may apprehend all persons committing any offence against this regulation, and may require all animals and articles being moved out of such place in contravention of this regulation to be forthwith taken back within the limits of such place.

This regulation shall not apply to any animal or article carried by railway through an infected place.

#### *Markets and Fairs.*

28. No market, fair, auction, exhibition, or sale of cattle shall be held until the 1st day of June, 1866, except as hereinafter mentioned ; that is to say :

First. Cattle belonging to the owner or occupier of premises that are not situate within the limits of an infected place, if the cattle are free from disease, and have been in the possession of the owner or occupier not less than twenty-eight days immediately previous to the sale, may be sold on such premises ;

Secondly. Markets may be held, with the licence of the Privy Council, for the sale of cattle intended for immediate slaughter ; Provided that no cattle shall be removed from such market, until they have been marked in the manner, in which cattle are ordinarily marked for slaughter according to the custom of such market, or, if there is no such custom, by clipping the hair off the end of the tail ; and all cattle required to be

marked by this regulation shall be slaughtered within four days from the date of the holding of such market (if sold) by or by the order of the purchaser, or (if not sold) by or by the order of the owner, and shall in no instance be taken beyond the limits described in the licence of the Privy Council allowing such market, and under such conditions with respect to their movement within such limits as may be imposed by such licence.

If any cattle are sold in contravention of this regulation, both the seller and the purchaser of such cattle shall be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

If any cattle required to be marked by this regulation are not so marked, the persons for the time being in charge of such cattle shall be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

If any cattle required to be slaughtered by this regulation are not so slaughtered, the purchaser or owner of such cattle or his agent (as the case may be) shall be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

If any cattle are removed in contravention of this regulation, the person removing such cattle, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the removal of such cattle, shall respectively be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

29. No sheep, lambs, goats, or swine shall be brought into or exposed for sale in any market licensed for the sale of cattle under the last preceding regulation, except for the purpose of immediate slaughter, and all such sheep, lambs, goats, and swine, when brought into or exposed for sale in any such market, shall be subject to the last preceding regulation, in the same manner as if they were cattle, except that they shall be marked in such manner as the market authority may direct, instead of in the manner prescribed by the said regulation.

#### *Foreign Cattle.*

30. Until the first of June One thousand eight hundred and sixty-six all cattle brought by sea from any place out of the United Kingdom into any town or place in Scotland shall be marked by clipping the hair off the end of the tail, and no such cattle shall be removed alive from such town or place except by sea.

"Town or place" in this regulation shall, according to circumstances, mean as follows :

1. The area of any burgh or such other limits as may be defined by the Privy Council in respect of such burgh :
2. In the case of any other town or place, such area as may be defined by the Privy Council to constitute such town or place.

#### *Cattle brought by sea from any part of the United Kingdom into Scotland.*

31. No cattle brought by sea from any place in the United Kingdom into any town or place in Scotland shall be removed from such town or place alive, without a certificate from the Local Authority having jurisdiction in such town or place that such cattle have been examined by some officer appointed for that purpose by such authority, and that such cattle are free from disease ; but such certificate shall not exempt such cattle from any other regulation of this Order with respect to the movement of cattle

or otherwise, provided, nevertheless, that, in the case of cattle landed in any place in Scotland from Ireland, the certificate of the Local Authority, that such cattle are free from disease, shall be accepted, in the case of a fat-stock licence, by the person authorized to grant the same as sufficient for the purpose of granting such licence, and in the case of a store-stock licence, such certificate shall be accepted by the Local Authority as equivalent to the declaration of the owner or his agent, and to the certificate of the occupiers required by the form of the said store-stock licence.

"Town or place," shall in this regulation have the same meaning as in the preceding regulation.

#### GENERAL REGULATIONS.

##### *Movement of Cattle.*

32. No cattle shall be moved on any highway between sunset and sunrise, except within the limits of a burgh.

No cattle, except as hereinafter provided, shall be moved by or upon any railway, canal, navigation, river, or highway, or by any vessels coastwise, without a licence, save for a distance not exceeding five hundred yards from one part of the same farm to another.

Licences shall be of two descriptions—

1. A licence for cattle intended for immediate slaughter, hereinafter called a fat-stock licence;
2. A licence for other cattle, hereinafter called a store stock-licence.

A fat-stock licence shall be in the form, and contain the particulars, and be signed in the manner appearing in the form marked A. in the second schedule annexed hereto, or as near thereto as circumstances admit.

A store-stock licence shall be in the form, and contain the particulars, and be signed in the manner appearing in the form marked B. in the said second schedule, or as near thereto as circumstances admit.

No cattle shall be moved as aforesaid out of the district of the Local Authority in which they are, without a licence in one of the forms aforesaid, such form being applicable to the class of cattle moved; but where cattle are moved only within the district of a Local Authority, or from one part of a farm beyond such district to another part within it, that Local Authority may make such regulations for their removal with or without licence as it thinks fit, so that the conditions of such licences when granted be not more stringent than the conditions of the licences in the said second schedule.

If any cattle are moved in contravention of this regulation, the owner of such cattle, and the person directing or permitting the removal of the same, and the company or person conveying the same shall respectively be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

Cattle brought by land from England into Scotland may be moved in Scotland with the same licences that in England authorize their removal from the district of one Local authority to another, in pursuance of any Order of the Privy Council in force for the time being.

33. No person shall drive or allow any cattle under his charge to be driven or to stray into any enclosed field, without the consent of the owner or occupier thereof, and any person acting in contravention of this regulation shall be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

##### *Movement of Hides, and Skins, &c.*

34. No hide, skin, horn, or hoof of animals shall be moved by highway, railway, canal, river, or other mode of conveyance unless effectually covered.

If any hides, skins, horns, or hoofs are moved in contravention of this regulation, the person sending the same, and the person moving the same, shall be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

35. No regulation of this Order shall apply to the following hides, skins, horns, and hoofs (that is to say):—

- (1.) Hides, skins, horns, or hoofs imported into the United Kingdom from India, Australia, South Africa, or America;
- (2.) Hides, skins, horns, hoofs, or glue pieces that have been effectually limed for manufacturing purposes.

But the burden of proving that any hides, skins, horns, or hoofs, are such as are authorized by this regulation to be removed, shall lie upon the person charged with moving the same in contravention of this Order.

##### *Regulations as to Dogs.*

36. A Local Authority may make such orders as it thinks expedient for preventing the propagation of disease by means of dogs, and may order any stray dogs to be destroyed or otherwise disposed of as it thinks fit.

##### *Cleansing of Pens and Trucks.*

37. Every railway or other Company or person carrying animals for hire shall, on every occasion after any animal has been taken out of any pen, carriage, truck, or boat used by such Company or person, and before any other animal or article is placed therein, thoroughly cleanse and disinfect every such pen, carriage, truck, or boat in such manner as the Board of Trade may from time to time direct.

The expression "truck" shall include any horsebox or other vehicle used in the carrying of animals.

If any pen, carriage, truck, or boat is at any time used in contravention of this regulation, the Company or person by whom it is used shall, every time that such pen, truck or boat is used, be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five Pounds.

##### *Powers of Officers employed under this Order.*

38. Any inspector or other officer empowered to carry this Order into effect, may, if authorized so to do by any General or Special Order in writing of the Local Authority, enter any field, stable, cow shed, or other premises within his district, where he has reasonable grounds for supposing that cattle affected by disease are to be found, or have been, or have been buried, or otherwise disposed of, for the purpose of carrying into effect the provisions of this Order, or enter into the station or premises of any railway or other Company or person carrying animals for hire, for the purpose of ascertaining whether the pens, carriages, trucks, boats, or other vehicles used by such Company or person have been duly cleansed and disinfected; and if any person refuses admission to, or obstructs or impedes, or aids in obstructing or impeding any such inspector or other officer, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

39. It shall be lawful for any officer authorized by a Local Authority so to do, or for any constable or police officer, to inspect any railway truck, cart, boat, or other vehicle by land or by water, in which animals, hay, manure, litter, straw, and other articles used for or about animals, are carried, and to examine the person in charge of the same, with a view to ascertain whether any animals or articles are being moved in contravention of this Order; and such officer may, if he has reasonable grounds for suspecting that such animals or articles are being moved in contravention of this Order, apprehend without warrant the person in charge of the same, and bring him before a Justice, who shall inquire into the case in a summary manner, and such Justice, if satisfied that there are good grounds for suspecting that such animals or articles were moved in contravention of this Order, may direct, by writing under his hand, such animals or articles to be detained, and the person in charge thereof to be brought before two Justices as soon as practicable, and such animals or articles may be detained and the person brought before the Justices accordingly.

Upon such person being brought before the two Justices they shall adjudicate on the case in a summary manner, and if satisfied that the animals or articles were moved in contravention of this Order, may direct the same to be destroyed or otherwise disposed of, as they think most expedient for the prevention of the spreading of disease amongst animals.

The constable or other police officer detaining any animals in pursuance of this regulation shall cause them to be supplied with requisite food and water during their detention; and any expenses incurred by such officer in respect of such animals may be recovered in a summary manner from the person in charge, or from the owner of the animals.

40. It shall be lawful for any constable or police officer, or for any officer authorized by a Local Authority so to do, to stop and detain any animal moved, or which he has reasonable grounds for suspecting is being moved in contravention of this Order, and to apprehend without warrant the person in charge of such animal, and bring him before a Justice, who shall inquire into the case in a summary manner; and such Justice, if satisfied that such animal was being moved in contravention of this Order, may direct, by writing under his hand, the animal so moved to be detained, and the person in charge thereof to be brought before two Justices as soon as practicable, and such animal may be detained and person brought before the Justices accordingly.

Upon such person being brought before the two Justices they shall adjudicate on the case in a summary manner, and, if satisfied that the animal was being moved in contravention of this Order, may direct the same to be slaughtered and buried, or to be otherwise disposed of, as they think most expedient for the prevention of the spreading of disease amongst animals.

Any constable, police, or other officer detaining any animal shall cause it to be supplied with requisite food and water during its detention; and any expenses incurred by such officer in respect of any animal may be recovered in a summary manner from the person in charge, or from the owner of the animal.

41. If any person having charge of any animal or thing being moved on a highway, railway, canal, navigation, or river, for the moving whereof a licence is requisite under this Order, being required by any constable, police officer,

or officer authorized by a Local Authority, to produce the licence (if any) for the moving of that animal or thing, fails so to do, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

42. Every person guilty of an offence against this Order shall for each such offence incur a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds; and where any such offence is committed with respect to more than four animals, a penalty not exceeding five pounds for each animal may be imposed instead of the penalty of twenty pounds. And where any such offence is committed with reference to any dung, offal, hay, litter, straw, or other thing, a further penalty not exceeding ten pounds may be imposed for every half ton in weight of such dung or other thing after the first half ton.

43. Any Local Authority may appear before any Justices, or in any legal proceedings, by its clerk, or by any agent authorized by it in writing under the hands of two of its members, and any railway company or other body corporate may appear before any Justices or in any legal proceedings by their secretary, or by any member of their board of management, or by any agent authorized in writing under the hands of any two members of such board.

### PART III.

#### Repeal of Orders.

44. On and after the sixteenth of April one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six there shall be revoked, so far as respects Scotland, the following Orders, or so much thereof as may be in force; that is to say,

The Order of July 24th, 1865,  
of November 23rd, 1865,  
of December 16th, 1865,  
of January 20th, 1866,  
of February 6th, 1866,  
of February 23rd, 1866.

And all notices published by any Local Authority in pursuance of such Orders shall cease to have any effect, without prejudice nevertheless to the prosecution of any offence that may have been committed against the said Order or Notices, or to any of them, or to the recovery of any penalty in respect of such offence.

45. The foregoing regulations shall not apply to the "North Western District of Scotland," as defined and described in an Order in Council, dated 3rd November, 1865, and in another Order in Council, dated 14th March, 1866; and the said North Western District of Scotland shall remain subject to the provisions of the said Orders which, except to the extent hereinafter modified, shall continue in force until revoked or altered.

46. Section 3 of the Order of 14th March, 1866, is hereby revoked.

47. Every licence for moving sheep into the North Western District of Scotland, or from one district or county to another, shall contain a statement of the place in which such sheep have been wintering, and of the route by which they are to be moved, and no Local Authority shall sign, or authorise to be signed, any such licence, until a certificate, signed by an inspector or other officer appointed for the purpose by the Local Authority of the county in which such sheep have been wintering, has been produced, certifying that such sheep are free from disease, and that the farm upon which such sheep have been wintering has been free from cattle plague for twenty-eight days, and is not within ten miles of an infected place, as defined by this Order; and no Local

Authority shall sign, or authorise to be signed, any such licence, if the route by which such sheep are to be moved passes through an "infected place" or within ten miles thereof.

48. A Local Authority may make such orders as it thinks expedient for preventing the propagation of disease by means of dogs, or by the introduction of bones or artificial manures, dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, or any other articles which, in the opinion of such Local Authority, are likely to propagate disease; and may order any stray dogs, and such of the said articles as are introduced in contravention of the said orders,

to be destroyed, or otherwise disposed of as it thinks fit.

49. No animal shall be removed into any county or district without the licence in writing of the Local Authority of such county or district, or of a person appointed by the Local Authority to grant such licence, and any person obtaining a licence shall fulfil all the conditions contained therein.

50. It shall be competent for any Local Authority within the said North-Western District of Scotland to adopt and enforce all or any of the foregoing regulations not at present made applicable to the said North-Western District.

In the case of cattle landed in any place in Scotland from Ireland the certificate of the local authority to the effect that the cattle are free from disease shall be accepted as equivalent to the declaration of the owner or his agent and the certificate of the two occupiers.

(b) If the cattle are being removed on change of tenancy or on change of pasture, or from premises in one place to premises in another in the occupation of the same person, insert instead of the words [which I have sold] the words [which I desire to move from to ].

If the cattle are required to be moved for the purpose of breeding, insert instead of the words [which I have sold] the words [which I desire to send for breeding purposes to ].

And I further declare, that the said cattle have all of them been on the said premises for twenty-eight days immediately preceding my making this declaration, and have not during that time been in contact with any newly purchased animals.

(c) The occupiers must, if possible, be persons living within two miles distance from the premises of A. B.; if they live at a greater distance than two miles from those premises, the local authority, or person appointed by them for that purpose, must satisfy himself that they have reasonable means of knowing the truth of the facts which they certify.

**CATTLE PLAGUE.***County of Dumfries.*

NOTICE is hereby given, that the County Board of the county of Dumfries, constituting the local authority of the said county, under and for the purposes of "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," and as such invested with the powers conferred by the Orders of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council—deeming it to be

expedient, with a view to prevent the further spreading of the disorder generally designated "The Cattle Plague," further to consolidate, alter, and amend the resolutions previously declared and published by Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the said county, and by the said Board, have resolved and declared, and hereby declare, that, subject to the exceptions and conditions after-mentioned, it is expedient, with the said view, on and after the 7th day of April current, and until the 1st day of May next, or until the present notice shall be revoked,—

I. That no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, and no raw or untanned hides or skins, horns, hoofs, or offal, of any such animals, and no dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, likely to propagate infection, shall be brought or sent from any place in Great

Britain beyond the jurisdiction of the said County Board, into any place within such jurisdiction.

Excepting and providing always, that sheep, lambs, goats, and swine, and such articles as aforesaid, may be brought or sent by any person with the licence of any two Justices of the Peace, acting in and for such jurisdiction, from any land or premises in his own occupation beyond, to any other land or premises in his own occupation within, such jurisdiction, during a time to be specified in such licence—the licence in the case of sheep, being accompanied by a certificate by an Inspector acting in the jurisdiction from which they are to be moved, that the sheep are free from disease of any kind; that the farm from which they are to be removed is not infected with rinderpest or cattle plague, or within a radius of three miles from the nearest point of any infected farm, premises, or place; and that the route by which it is intended to drive the said sheep is not within one mile of any part of any infected farm, premises, or place;

And further excepting and providing that dung may be removed from the burgh of Dumfries into the jurisdiction of the said Board, on the conditions following, viz. :—

1. That the local authority of the said burgh shall first have prohibited the importation of dung into the said burgh;
2. That before any dung is removed from the said burgh into any part of the jurisdiction of the said Board, the same shall have been disinfected, at the expense of the said burgh, and at the sight and to the satisfaction of the Inspector appointed by the said Board; and
3. That such dung shall not be so removed without the certificate of the said Inspector, to the effect that the same has not been imported into the said burgh from another jurisdiction,—has been disinfected as aforesaid, and is not likely to propagate infection;

II. That no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, and no raw or untanned hides or skins, horns or hoofs, or offal of any such animals, and no dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, shall be removed from any infected farm, premises, or place within the said jurisdiction, or from any point within a radius of two miles from the nearest part of any infected farm, premises, or place;

III. Uninfected cattle may be moved from place to place, within the jurisdiction of the said Board, subject to the exceptions and conditions following, viz. :—

1. No such animal shall be moved from, or to, any infected farm, premises, or place, or from, or to, any point within a radius of two miles from the nearest part of any infected farm, premises, or place;
2. Before any such animal shall be moved from place to place, as aforesaid,—excepting in the case of animals moved from place to place on the same farm,—a licence, accompanied by a declaration by the owner of the cattle, in the form prescribed by the Board, shall be obtained from a member of the Divisional Committee resident in the parish from, and a member of the Divisional Committee resident in the parish to, which the animal is to be moved.

The resolutions previously declared and published are revoked so far as to give effect to the foregoing declaration.

Forms of licences and certificates may be obtained on application to the Clerk to the Board, or the Chairmen or Clerks of the Divisional Committees.

## CATTLE PLAGUE.

*County of Ayr.*

“CATTLE DISEASES PREVENTION ACT, 1866.”

THE County Cattle Plague Board, being the local authority under the above Act, hereby give notice that they have made the following orders and regulations, which shall be in force from and after the date hereof, until further notice.

*First,—Sheep.*

1. No sheep whatever shall be moved within the county, or permitted to be upon or pass along any public road or highway, unless under the rules and regulations as to certificates and otherwise provided by the order of the local authority, dated 27th February, 1866; with this exception only, that it shall not any longer be necessary that they be marked or branded with the letter A; and no sheep that have been on a farm where cattle plague has appeared, or within a radius of one mile of the steading or field where the disease existed, shall be moved within the county, unless such steading or field shall have been at least thirty days free from cattle plague, and unless such sheep shall have, immediately before removal, been dipped in Biggs or M'Dougall's composition; provided always that a certificate of a Justice of Peace for their removal, in the prescribed form, shall have been obtained.

2. Sheep may be brought from other counties into the county of Ayr, provided that a licence for their removal be first obtained from two Justices of the Peace of said county, upon a certificate from an Inspector of the county or place from which the sheep are to come, that they are free from disease, that the farm from which they come has been for at least thirty days free of cattle plague, and that the disease has not existed for the same period within a radius of one mile from such farm. Immediately previous to removal, the sheep shall be dipped in one of the foresaid compositions, which dipping shall be certified by two neighbouring tenant farmers. The route by which the sheep are to be removed is to be specified, and the person in charge of them shall be in possession of such licence and certificates, and shall be bound to exhibit them to any one calling for production thereof.

*Second,—Swine and Calves.*

Swine and calves may be removed within the county of Ayr upon the certificate of any Justice of Peace of the county, Member of the County Cattle Plague Board, or Member of the District Committees thereof, and the report by two neighbouring farmers, provided by the order of 27th February last, shall not in future be required in regard to such animals.

*Third,—Hay, Straw, or Fodder.*

No hay, straw, or fodder shall be moved within the county of Ayr from any farm or place at which the cattle plague has appeared, until the expiry of at least forty days from the disappearance of the disease.

The order dated 27th February, 1866, is revoked in so far as inconsistent with this order, but otherwise is declared to remain in full force and effect.

Persons infringing any of the orders incur a penalty of £20 for each offence; and in the case of more than four animals, of £5 for each animal.

### CATTLE PLAGUE.

*Borough of Oswestry, 9th April, 1866.*

In pursuance of the Orders of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, and of the Statutes in that case made and provided, the Town Council of the borough of Oswestry, with a view to prevent the spreading of the disease designated as the "Cattle Plague," do hereby make the following order, namely:—

1. That the orders and notices heretofore made for this borough on the subject of the cattle plague, except with reference to the appointment of Inspectors, are hereby respectively revoked.
2. That in construction of this order, the word "cattle" shall mean and include any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf.
3. That no cattle, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine shall be brought from any other part of Great Britain into any place within the said borough of Oswestry, except as allowed by the provisions of this order.
4. That any cattle may be brought into the borough of Oswestry with a certificate, signed by a Justice of the Peace of the district out of which such cattle are brought, stating that such cattle are brought from premises where there shall not have been on such premises, or within two miles thereof, any case of cattle plague during thirty days immediately preceding, and that such cattle have been in the possession of the person removing the same for thirty days, and also provided that such cattle shall not be brought through any infected district.
5. That any sheep, lamb, goat, or swine may be brought into the said borough of Oswestry, with a certificate signed by a Justice as aforesaid, stating that such sheep, lamb, goat, or swine are or is brought from premises where there shall not have been on such premises, or within two miles thereof, any case of cattle plague or sheep pox during thirty days immediately preceding; and that such sheep, lamb, goat, or swine have or has been in the possession of the person removing the same for thirty days, and also provided that they shall not be brought through any infected district.
6. That any cattle, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine within the borough of Oswestry may be removed within the said borough at any time except within the hours of seven p.m. and six a.m.
7. That no dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter shall be brought from any place into the said borough without a certificate from a Justice as aforesaid, stating that the same is brought from premises where there shall not have been any case of cattle plague.

8. That no raw or untanned hides shall be brought into the said borough without a certificate from a Justice as aforesaid, that such hides are the hides of healthy animals, and from premises where there has been no case of cattle plague.

Any person guilty of any offence against any of the foregoing regulations will be liable to a penalty not exceeding £20.

### CATTLE PLAGUE.

*County of Warwick. Easter Sessions, 1866.*

The Local Authority orders and declares,

1. That the several orders heretofore made, and now in force within the jurisdiction of the Local Authority, shall continue in full force and effect until the 16th day of April instant.
2. That Order No. 3, of the Orders of 17th March be amended by the insertion of the words "for a month last past" after the words "there has been no Cattle Plague in or within two miles of the place from whence they are to be removed."

That, whereas Nos. 26 and 27 of the said Orders in Council, relating to districts infected with cattle plague are required to be put in force without delay, it is ordered, that it be delegated to the respective Local Committees of the Petty Sessional Divisions, and they are hereby authorised, to carry out and put in force to the fullest extent the powers given by the said 26th and 27th Orders, for defining the limit of, and declaring any district in which the cattle plague shall break out within their respective Divisions, to be an "infected place."
5. That the Clerk of the Peace shall ascertain through the several Local Committees the number and situation of any places in which cattle plague exists within their jurisdiction, and the steps proposed to be taken in order to declare them "infected places," and report thereupon to the Privy Council, on or before 9th April instant, by letter addressed to Colonel Harness, R.E., Council Office, Whitehall.
6. That Mr. Edward Stanley, of Stephenson-place, Birmingham, be appointed Inspector for that part of the Henley Division which lies on the west side of the Stratford and Birmingham Turnpike Road, and for the parishes of Tanworth, Packwood, and Lapworth, in the same Division.
7. That the half of the penalty awarded under 11 and 12 Vict., c. 107, to the informer, shall in all cases in which a Police Constable is the informer, be divided into two equal portions, the one portion thereof to be paid over by the Constable to the Police Superannuation Fund, and the other portion to be retained by the Constable for his own use.
8. That these Sessions on the rising of the Court at Coventry, be adjourned to Saturday, 14th of April, at half-past twelve o'clock, at Warwick.
