Medway Union.—Parish of Gillingham.

To the Churchwardens and Overseers of the Poor of the Parish of Gillingham, in the county of Kent;—

To the Clerk or Clerks to the Justices of the Petty Sessions held for the division or divisions in which the said parish is situate;—

And to all others whom it may concern.

WHEREAS the Poor Law Board did, on application of the Churchwardens of the parish of Gillingham, in the county of Kent, made in pursuance of a resolution of the vestry of the said parish, duly passed on Monday, the twentieth day of January; one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, by an Order bearing date the twenty-first day of May in the same year, order and direct that so much of the Act passed in the fourteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, cap. 57, as related to the appointment of a vestry clerk, should forthwith be applied to and put in force within the said parish of Gillingham.

And whereas, at another meeting of the vestry of the said parish held in the vestry room of the parish church, and adjourned to and held at the national school-room in the said parish, after public notice in that behalf, on Thursday, the eleventh day of May, 1865, it was resolved,—

“That the Poor Law Board be requested to
“issue an order under their seal of office,
“directing that the Act passed on the 5th
“August, 1850 (13 and 14 Vict., c. 57),
“entitled ‘An Act to prevent the holding
“of vestry or other meetings in churches,
“and for regulating the appointment of
“vestry clerks,’ shall be applied to and
“put in force within this parish, as re-
“gards that portion of it only which relates
“to the providing of accommodation for
“holding vestry meetings.”

And whereas the Churchwardens of the said parish have made their application in writing to the Poor Law Board, pursuant to the last before-recited resolution.

Now, therefore, we, the Poor Law Board, under the authority of the several Statutes in that behalf made and provided, hereby order and direct as follows:—

ARTICLE I.—That so much of the said Act passed in the fourteenth year of the reign of Her Majesty, intituled “An Act to prevent the holding of vestry or other meetings in churches, and for regulating the appointment of vestry clerks,” as relates to the providing of a room or suitable buildings for the purpose of holding vestry or other meetings for the transaction of any business of, or relating to, the said parish of Gillingham, shall forthwith be applied to, and be put in force within, the said parish.
