Any Lady who proposes to be presented must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Drawing Room, a card with her name written thereon, and with the name of the Lady by whom she is to be presented. WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Session of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and seven, intituled "An Act to prevent until the first day of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty, and to the end of the then session of Parliament, the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders among sheep, cattle, and other animals," and from time to time continued by divers subsequent Acts, and lastly by an Act passed in the Session of the twenty-eighth and twenty-ninth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, chapter one hundred and nineteen, it is (amongst other things) enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Privy Council, or any two or more of them, from time to time, to make such Orders and Regulations as to them may seem necessary for the purpose of prohibiting or regulating the removal to or from such parts or places as they may designate in such Order or Orders, of sheep, cattle, horses, swine, or other animals, or of meat, skins, hides, horns, hoofs, or other parts of any animals, or of hay, straw, fodder, or other articles, likely to propagate infection, and to make any other Orders or Regulations for the purpose of giving effect to the provisions of the said Act, and again to revoke, alter, or vary any such Orders or Regulations; and that all provisions for any of the purposes aforesaid in any such Order or Orders contained shall have the like force and effect as if the same had been inserted in the said Act.

And whereas a contagious or infectious disorder, generally designated as the "Cattle Plague," has lately appeared, and now prevails, amongst cattle in England and Wales:

And whereas divers Orders have been made by the Lords of the said Council in relation to the cattle plague, which were consolidated and amended, by an Order bearing date the 24th day of March last:

And whereas it is expedient to make a further Order applicable to certain parts of the Kingdom.

Now, therefore, the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council do hereby, in exercise of the powers given under the said Act so continued as aforesaid, order as follows:

1. The word "cattle," in this Order, shall mean bull, bullock, cow, ox, heifer, or calf.
2. No cattle shall be brought by land into the district bounded by the outer boundary of the counties of South Wales and Monmouth, by which that district is separated from the rest of Wales and England.
3. No cattle brought by sea into any part of that district shall leave the place at which they are landed alive, but all such cattle shall be slaughtered within forty-eight hours from the time that they are placed on shore.

4. South Wales, in this Order, shall signify the counties of Pembroke, Carmarthen, Glamorgan, Brecon, Radnor, and Cardigan.

5. Nothing herein contained shall affect any of the provisions, conditions, and regulations, which are contained in the said Order of the 24th ultimo, except so far as the same are inconsistent herewith.

6. This Order shall come into operation immediately, and shall remain in force until it is revoked or altered.

7. Every person guilty of an offence against this Order shall, for each such offence, incur a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds; and where any such offence is committed with respect to more than four animals, a penalty not exceeding five pounds, for each animal, may be imposed, instead of the penalty of twenty pounds.

PURSUANT to Orders of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, made the 24th day of March and the 11th day of April, 1866, under the Act eleventh and twelfth Victoria, chapter one hundred and seven, and other Acts, the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade are pleased to direct, that every Railway or other Company or person carrying animals for hire within any part of Great Britain, and using any pen, carriage, truck, or boat for holding or carrying animals, shall on every occasion after any animal has been taken out of such pen, carriage, truck, or boat, and before any other animal or article is placed therein, thoroughly cleanse and disinfect every such pen, carriage, truck, or boat in manner following, that is to say:—

Pens.

All the wood-work and metal-work to be scraped and swept, then washed with some one of the solutions following, viz., water, containing in each gallon four ounces of fresh dry chloride of lime, or hot water, containing in each gallon not less than—

either one-fifth of a pint of carbolic acid,
or one-fifth of a pint of cresylic acid,
or two ounces of chloride of zinc.

The floor to be thoroughly cleansed and swept out, then sprinkled freely with undiluted carbolic acid, or cresylic acid, or chloride of lime in powder.

Brick or stone walls to be lime-washed with good freshly-burnt lime, adding to each gallon of lime-wash one-fifth of a pint of carbolic acid, or of cresylic acid, or four ounces of chloride of lime, or two ounces of chloride of zinc.

Carriages and Trucks.

The floor and every part above the floor to be thoroughly scraped and swept out, then to be washed with hot water containing, to each gallon, not less than three ounces of soda ash or of soap, and, lastly, to be sprinkled freely with some one of the solutions above mentioned.

Boats.

The hold and every other part used for holding or carrying animals, or with which animals or their droppings come in contact, to be thoroughly scraped and swept out, then to be washed with hot water containing, to each gallon, not less than three ounces of soda ash or of soap, and, lastly, to be sprinkled freely with some one of the solutions above mentioned.

In every case the scrapings and sweepings to be burnt or buried forthwith.

In the above-mentioned Orders, "animal" means bull, bullock, cow, ox, heifer, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, and swine: "truck" includes horse-box or other vehicle used in the carrying of animals.

THE following Notice has been received by the Clerk of the Council from the Local Authorities appointed under the Orders of the Lords of the Council relating to the "Cattle Plague," and is published in the London Gazette in conformity with the requirements of their Lordships' Orders:—

CATTLE PLAGUE.

Burgh of Paisley.

NOTICE is hereby given, that the local authority for the burgh of Paisley, under "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," has resolved and declared, and hereby, in virtue of the provisions of the said Act, and of the relative Orders of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, resolves and declares:—

First.—That it is expedient that from the date of the publication of this notice, no animal (meaning thereby any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine) shall be brought from any other part of Great Britain into the burgh or town of Paisley; provided always, that sheep or lambs may be brought into the said burgh if they have not been recently in a public market; and, if conveyed by railway, that they have been carried in trucks which have been disinfected since cattle or sheep were last conveyed in them, and are certified to have been so by the traffic manager at the station where the sheep are trucked, and by a member of the local authority, or a Justice of the Peace resident in the immediate neighbourhood of said station; and providing also, that it shall not be unlawful to remove any animal (meaning as aforesaid) from any place within the said burgh to any other place therein nor to bring any such animal into said burgh provided that the animal is free of disease, and that the cattle plague does not exist and has not existed on the premises from which the animal is to be removed for at least thirty days preceding the date of removal, and where the disease has existed that the premises have been disinfected at said period. And further, that the animal when removed shall, in the case of animals brought into the burgh, be accompanied by a declaration signed by the owner, and a certificate signed by two members of the committee of the district from which such animals are brought, and in the case of animals removed from one part of the burgh to another by a certificate signed by any one of the magistrates of the burgh, which declaration and certificates shall be to the effect above stated, and the owner shall be bound immediately to exhibit

and if necessary to deliver the same to the cattle constable of the district; and provided also, that the animal shall be removed within forty-eight hours after the date of the certificate.

Second.—That it shall not be lawful for any person to bring or send any raw or untanned hides or skins, or any horns, or hoofs of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf (except such as are directly imported from India, Australia, South Africa, or America), or any offal of such animals, or any dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter likely to propagate infection from any other parts of Great Britain into any place within the said burgh or town of Paisley.

Third.—That it shall not be lawful for any person to remove any such hides, skins, offal, or dung, from any premises within the said burgh or town of Paisley in which the cattle plague at the time exists, to any other premises within or beyond the said burgh; nor to remove any of the said articles from any premises where the cattle plague has existed, unless they are accompanied by a certificate from any of the magistrates of said burgh, that the cattle plague has not existed at the premises within the immediately preceding thirty days, and that the articles have been disinfected. But it shall not be unlawful for any person to bring or send the said articles from any land or premises in a person's own occupation and beyond the said burgh, to any other lands or premises also in his own occupation within the said burgh, during such time as may be fixed in the licence of any of the magistrates of said burgh.

Fourth.—It shall not be unlawful to remove the sweepings of streets or the cleanings of ash pits and privies within the said burgh. Further, it shall not be unlawful to remove from any premises within the said burgh, horse or cow dung, or other manure, provided in this last case that it is accompanied by certificate from the seller and purchaser, and any one of the magistrates of said burgh, that it is from premises where the cattle plague does not exist, and has not existed within thirty days preceding the date of certificate; and with regard to the cow dung, that it is the produce of cattle that have not been affected with the plague. And also, that it shall not be unlawful to bring from any place beyond said burgh to any place within the same, horse dung, provided the same is accompanied by a certificate from the seller and purchaser, and two Members of the Committee of the district from which such dung has been removed, that it contains no admixture of cow dung, and that it is from premises in which the cattle plague does not exist and never has existed.

Lastly.—It is hereby provided and declared, that the notice issued by the Local Authority of the burgh of date 15th January last, shall continue in full force and authority, except in so far as altered or modified by the present Order.

Notice is further hereby given, that any person contravening the above resolutions and declarations, or either of them, shall thereby act unlawfully; and shall, for every offence, forfeit a sum not exceeding twenty pounds sterling.
