LOCAL GOVERNMENT ACT, 1858.

NOTICE OF ADOPTION OF ACT BY DWYGYFYLCHI, CARNARVONSHIRE.

WHEREAS a resolution for the adoption of the Local Government Act, 1858, has been passed by the parish of Dwygyfylchi, in the county of Carnarvon, the said parish being a place with a population of less than 3,000 by the last census; and whereas it has appeared to me, that, by reason of special circumstances, it is expedient that such parish shall be allowed to adopt the said Act, I do hereby approve of such adoption, and I hereby further order that the Local Government Act, 1858, do come into force within such parish from and after the 30th day of April, 1866: and that Mr. Owen Williams, Postmaster of Penmaenmawr, act as Summoning Officer and take all such steps as may be necessary for the election of nine persons to constitute the Local Board for the said district.

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

At the Government House, at Wellington, the 11th day of January, 1866.

Present:

His Excellency the Governor in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act of the General Assembly, intitled "The Customs Regulation Act, 1858," it is amongst other things enacted that if any goods enumerated or described in the Table of Prohibitions, contained in the 32nd section of the said Act, shall be imported or brought into New Zealand, then, and in every such case, such goods shall be forfeited, and shall be destroyed or disposed of as the Commissioner of Customs may direct.

And whereas in the said Table of Prohibitions of Goods absolutely prohibited to be imported, are included infected cattle, sheep, or other animals, and hides, skins, horns, hoofs, or any other part of cattle or other animals, which the Governor in

Council may prohibit in order to prevent any infectious or contagious distemper or disease :

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth, in pursuance of the hereinbefore recited provisions of the said Act, by this present Order, absolutely prohibit the importation from the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or from any part of the Continent of Europe, into New Zealand, of any cattle, sheep, goats, horses, pigs, or poultry, and of hides, skins, horns, hoofs, and all other parts of such animals, in order to prevent the infectious or contagious distemper or disease now prevalent in the said United Kingdom, and in divers parts of the Continent of Europe, among animals of the several kinds aforesaid, from spreading in New Zealand.

Certificate of the Board of Trade for the raising of Additional Capital.

WHEREAS the Bishops Castle Railway Company have complied with the requirements of "The Railway Companies Powers Act, 1864."

Now, therefore, the Board of Trade do, by this their Certificate, in pursuance of "The Railway Companies Powers Act, 1864," and by virtue and in exercise of the powers thereby in them vested, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, certify as follows :—

Company authorised to raise Additional Capital.

1. The Bishops Castle Railway Company (hereinafter called "the Company") may from

time to time raise, for the purposes of their undertaking, in addition to the capital which they are already authorised to raise, any further sums not exceeding in the whole ninety thousand pounds, by the creation of new ordinary or new preference shares or stock, or (at the option of the Company) by both of those modes: Provided that, until the Company's railway from Montgomery to Bishops Castle is completed and open for public traffic, the Company shall apply the moneys to be raised under the powers of this Certificate by the issue of preference shares or stock to purposes authorised by "The Bishops Castle Railway Act, 1861," and "The Bishops Castle Railway (Deviations) Act, 1865," or by one of those Acts, and to no other purposes.

Preference Shareholders not entitled to vote, except with consent of Company.

2. No person shall be entitled to vote in respect of any share created under this Certificate to which a preferential dividend shall be assigned, unless the Company shall at the time of the creation and issue of such preference shares have determined otherwise.

Privileges, &c., of the Holders of New Capital.

3. Save as herein, or in the Acts incorporated herewith, otherwise provided, the holders of shares or stock in the additional capital hereby authorised to be raised shall be entitled to the like rights and privileges, and be subject to the like liabilities, as the holders of shares or stock in the existing ordinary capital of the Company.

Power to Borrow.

4. The Company may from time to time borrow on mortgage for the purposes of their undertaking, beyond the sum now authorised to be borrowed by them, any additional sum of money not exceeding in the whole thirty thousand pounds.

Existing Mortgages to have Priority.

5. All mortgages granted by the Company in pursuance of the powers of any Act of Parliament, and which shall be subsisting when this Certificate comes into operation, shall, during the continuance of such mortgages, have priority over any mortgages to be granted by virtue of this Certificate.

Short Title.

6. This Certificate may be cited as "The Bishops Castle Railway (Additional Capital) Certificate, 1866."
