

give to the Guardians of the Poor of the Abergavenny Union, in the counties of Monmouth and Hereford, a bond, in the penal sum of one hundred pounds, in the names of himself and one sufficient surety, conditioned for the due and faithful performance of the duties of the office; and every such officer shall give immediate notice to the said Guardians of the death, insolvency, or bankruptcy of such surety, and shall, when required by the said Guardians, produce a certificate, signed by two householders, that his surety is alive and believed by them to be solvent, and shall supply a fresh surety in the place of such surety who may die or become bankrupt or insolvent:—

Provided that the Guardians may, if they think fit, take the security of any Society or Company expressly authorized by Statute to guarantee or secure the faithful discharge of the duties of any Poor Law Officer.

ARTICLE V.—That the Auditor of the District comprising the said Union shall, in the statement which he may be required by any General Order of the Poor Law Commissioners, or this Board to transmit to the Poor Law Board, of the securities of the officers of the said Union, include the name of the Vestry Clerk for the said parish for the time being appointed under the authority hereof, together with the particulars in such General Order required, and shall report thereon to the Board of Guardians of the said Union, in like manner as therein set forth with reference to the securities of other officers.

ARTICLE VI.—That a copy of this Order shall be published in the London Gazette.

Great Northern Railway (Potter's Bar, Barnet, and Hendon) Bill.

IT is intended to apply to Parliament to insert in the Bill now pending in the House of Commons under the above name provisions to enable the Great Northern Railway Company to make in the parish of South Mimms, in Middlesex, an alteration of the line shown on the plans deposited with respect to the said Bill, in the month of November, 1865, with the Clerks of the Peace for Hertfordshire and Middlesex respectively, and also with the parish clerk of South Mimms. The alteration of the line will commence at or about the field numbered on the said deposited plans 65, and will terminate in the field numbered thereon 106, both in the said parish of South Mimms.

The powers sought by the Bill for making the railway originally contemplated will be made to apply to the proposed alteration.

Duplicate plans and sections, describing the lines, situation, and levels of the proposed alteration, and the lands, houses, and other property in or through which they will be made, together with a book of reference to such plans containing the names of the owners and lessees, or reputed owners and lessees, and of the occupiers of such lands, houses, and other property; also a published map with the alteration delineated thereon, so as to show its general course and direction; and a copy of this notice have been deposited for public inspection with the Clerk of the Peace for the county of Middlesex, at his office at Clerkenwell-green; with the Clerk of the Peace for the county of Hertford, at his office at St. Albans; and with the parish clerk of South Mimms, at his residence.
