WHEREAS by the "Diseases Prevention Act, 1855," it is, amongst other things, enacted that whenever any part of England appears

to be threatened with, or is affected by, any formidable epidemic, endemic, or contagious disease, the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, or any three or more of them (the Lord President of the Council, or one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State being one), may, by Order or Orders, to be by them from time to time made, direct that the provisions therein contained for the prevention of diseases be put in force in England, or in such parts thereof as in such Order or Orders respectively may be expressed, and may from time to time, as to all or any of the parts to which any such Order or Orders extend, and in like manner revoke or renew any such Order; and that, subject to revocation and renewal as aforesaid, every such Order shall be in force for six calendar months, or for such shorter period as in such Order shall be expressed; and that every such Order of Her Majesty's Privy Council, or of any members thereof as aforesaid, shall be certified under the hand of the Clerk in Ordinary of Her Majesty's Privy Council, and shall be published in the London Gazette; and such publication shall be conclusive evidence of such Order, to all intents and purposes:

And whereas by an Act passed in the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her Majesty's reign, chapter seventy-seven, it is, amongst other things, enacted, that the Board of Guardians for every union, or parish not within an union, in England, shall be the Local Authority for executing the said Diseases Prevention Act in every place within their respective unions and parishes:

And whereas it is deemed expedient to put in force the provisions of the above-recited Acts within the Birkenhead Union, in the county of Chester:

Now, therefore, the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council do hereby, in exercise of the powers given by the said Acts, order and direct that the provisions contained in the said Act for the prevention of diseases shall, from and after the date of this present Order, be put in force within the whole and every part of the said Birkenhead Union, in the county of Chester, and that the Board of Guardians for the said Union shall be the Local Authority for executing the said Act within every part of the said union.

accordance with the Local Government Act, 1858, the said portions of the hereinbefore recited Acts will, from the date of the said notice of the adoption thereof, have the force of law within the Bingley Improvement Commissioners' District, under the Bingley Improvement Act aforesaid.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT ACT, 1858.

NOTICE OF ADOPTION OF ACT BY HORFIELD, IN THE COUNTY OF GLOUCESTER.

WHEREAS the Local Government Act, 1858, was adopted by the parish of Horfield, in the county of Gloucester, on the 1st day of February, 1866, and notice of such adoption has been duly given, in writing, to me, as one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, as required by such Act; and copies of such notice have been advertised and also affixed to the principal doors of each church and chapel in such parish to which notices are usually affixed; and appeal against the resolution for the adoption of the said Act has been presented to me from owners and ratepayers, in the upper part of such parish, praying for the exclusion of such part from the operation of such Act; and whereas inquiry has been duly directed into the circumstances of the case, and such inquiry has been duly made therein by Arnold Taylor, Esquire, the inspector appointed by me for such purpose, and the result thereof reported to me.

Now, therefore, I, as one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State as aforesaid, do issue the following Order, and do determine the questions arising on such appeal as follows:—

That it has not been proved to my satisfaction that it is expedient that the whole of the said parish of Horfield, in the county of Gloucester, should adopt the Local Government Act, 1858; and I do hereby further order, that from and after the 31st day of May, 1866, the said Local Government Act do come into force within the hereinafter described boundaries of the district of Horfield, forming a portion only of the aforesaid parish of Horfield. The boundaries of the said district shall commence at the point A (on the plan accompanying the Inspector's report to me, dated the 14th day of May, 1866), at the southern extremity of the parish of Horfield, and at the point of junction between the latter and that part of the parish of Westbury which is within the boundary of the city and county of Bristol; from this point the boundary line proceeds in a north-westerly direction, following the dividing line between the parish of Westbury and the parish of Horfield to the point B; thence northerly along the west boundary fences of the properties numbered 27, 26, 25, and 24 on the title map of the parish of Horfield, to the point C at the south-westerly corner of the property numbered 41 on such title map; thence northerly along the western boundary fences of the properties numbered 41 and 42 on such title map to the point D; thence in a straight line to the point E, at the south-west corner of the People's Pleasure Gardens; thence following and including the boundary wall of such property to the point F; thence northerly, along the west boundary fences of the properties numbered 46, 47, and 48 on the said title map, and westerly along and including Gipseys-lane to the point G; thence

northerly along the westerly fences of the properties numbered 94, 96, and 97 on the said tithe map, to the point H on the east side of the turnpike road leading from Bristol to Filton; thence in a southerly direction along and including such turnpike road to the point I, at the north-west corner of the property numbered 273 on the said tithe map; thence easterly along the north boundary fence of such last-named property to the point K; thence northerly to the point L, at the north-west corner of the property numbered 269 on the tithe map; thence easterly along the north boundary fences of the last-named property, and of that numbered 267, and along the south boundary fence of that numbered 264, to the point M, where the parish of Horfield joins the parish of Stapleton, in the county of Gloucester; thence following the boundary line which divides the two above-named parishes to the point N, and from thence following the boundary line which divides the parish of Horfield from the district of the united parishes of St. James and St. Paul, in the city and county of Bristol, to the starting point at A, so completing the boundary of the district of Horfield aforesaid.

2. That Mr. Richard Bennett, Accountant, of Egerston-road, Horfield, be appointed Summoning Officer to act in the election of the nine members to constitute the Local Board in and for the said district of Horfield.
