

should be discontinued, with the following modifications; viz.:

LONG MARSTON, TRING. — Forthwith in the church, and from and after the thirty-first of December next, in the churchyard.

FEATHERSTONE. — Forthwith in the parish church, and also in the churchyard, except in vaults and walled graves, in which each coffin shall be separately enclosed by stone or brickwork properly cemented, and except in earthen graves which can be opened not less than five feet deep without digging up entire bones or exposing coffins.

LEVENSHULME, MANCHESTER. — Forthwith in the Wesleyan Chapel and in the chapelyard thereof.

RHUDDLAN. — Forthwith in the church and in the old part of the churchyard, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, every coffin buried in which shall be enclosed in stone or brickwork properly cemented or in concrete, and except in earthen graves which have not been buried in for the preceding fourteen years, every coffin in which shall be enclosed by concrete; also burials in such graves to be limited to the dead of the Ecclesiastical District of Rhuddlan, and the widows or widowers of those already buried in the old part of the churchyard.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the twenty-third day of July next:

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette; and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before the said twenty-third day of July.

WHEREAS by an Order bearing date the 2nd day of April last, reciting certain provisions of the statute of the session held in the eleventh and twelfth years of Her Majesty's reign, chapter 107, and that a contagious or infectious disorder, known or described as the Sheep Pox, or Variola Ovina, then prevailed among the sheep, in a certain part of the United Kingdom, and it was expedient to take measures for preventing such disorder from spreading; the Lords of the Council did make certain Orders and Regulations respecting the removal of sheep or lambs to and from the parish of Earl's Colne, in the county of Essex, and respecting other matters relating to such sheep and lambs:

And whereas by an Order, bearing date the 5th day of April last, reciting in like manner as

aforsaid, the said Lords did make the like Orders and Regulations respecting sheep and lambs in the parish of Great Yeldham, in the said county of Essex:

And whereas by an Order, bearing date the 6th day of April last, reciting in like manner as aforsaid, the said Lords did make the like Orders and Regulations respecting sheep and lambs in the parishes of Black Notley and Fairstead, in the said county of Essex:

And whereas these several Orders were to continue in force until revoked, and it is no longer necessary that they should continue in force:

Now, therefore, the Lords of the Council do hereby, from and after the ninth day of this present June, revoke all the Orders above mentioned and described.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and seven, intituled "An Act to prevent until the first day of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty, and to the end of the then session of Parliament, the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders among sheep, cattle, and other animals," and from time to time continued by divers subsequent Acts, and lastly by an Act passed in the session of the twenty-eighth and twenty-ninth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, chapter one hundred and nineteen, it is (amongst other things) enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Privy Council, or any two or more of them, from time to time to make such orders and regulations as to them may seem necessary for the purpose of prohibiting or regulating the removal to or from such parts or places as they may designate in such Order or Orders, of sheep, cattle, horses, swine or other animals, or of meat, skins, hides, horns, hoofs, or other parts of any animals, or of hay, straw, fodder, or other articles likely to propagate infection, and to make any other Orders or Regulations for the purpose of giving effect to the provisions of the said Act, and again to revoke, alter, or vary any such Orders or Regulations; and that all provisions for any of the purposes aforsaid in any such Order or Orders contained shall have the like force and effect as if the same had been inserted in the said Act:

And whereas the said Act has been amended and explained by an Act passed in the 29th year of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the Act of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty, chapter one hundred and seven, to prevent the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders among sheep, cattle, and other animals:"
