They went in a Body to the Herbodrome, from Whence they deputed fome of their Number to the Visier and Caimadan, to demaid their Number to the Visier and Caimadan, or demand their Pay and Donative, and in cafe of Delay, or Refutal, to threaten them with being Depoled, if not the requiring their Heads. The Vifier employ'd all his Rhetorick, to perfuade them that he was using his utmont endeavors, even to the engaging his own, and the Credit of all his Friends, to give them infinediate Satisfaction. To which they infolently reply'd. That as he began very early to follow the pernicious Example of this Predecelfors, fo he ought to fear their unhappy Exit; And that if he did not do them Juffice, they would have no more Confideration for him ( whatever Efteem they had hitherto fhewn ) than they had for those who fell under the weight of their Dipleature. And thus they went to the Square of the Serar, clamoroully crying out for the Head of the Vilier, and of Kuperli the Calmacan. The Vilier discovering that the Aga, whom he depended on to ap-peake the Tumult, under hand fomented its in hopes that it should turn to his advancement to fuceted him; moved the Grand Signior to put him out of his Command; it was not thought adviteable to take away his Life, for fear of the Confequences of fuch an Exampleration; to he was only confined to his Country Houle, and the Selictar Aga was put into his place; but this being a Perfor of no Credit of Authority among the Janifaries, they defpited him, and chole to themfelves other Leaders, and fell to committing Diforders which are not yet put an end b, pillaging the Houfes and Warehoufes of Merchants, rubbing People as they pass'd, and killing luch as made any kind of Reliftance; they spared neither Christian or Turk, and some of them got into Boars, and offer d the fame Violence to all they met with in the Chanel.
