**W**HEREAS by an Order, bearing date the 8th day of August, 1866, the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council did, amongst other things, make certain provisions applicable only to the counties enumerated in a schedule thereunto annexed, and to the counties of cities or towns, cities, and boroughs therein contained; and by an Order dated the 31st day of August, 1866, the county of Oxford, which had not been included in the said schedule, was made subject to the said provisions:

And whereas by a further Order, bearing date the 18th day of September, 1866, the said Lords did make certain other provisions applicable only to the counties enumerated in the above-mentioned schedule, and to the county of Oxford:

And whereas the counties of Buckingham, Cambridge, Suffolk, and Lincoln were included in the said schedule, and it is expedient that the said provisions of the above-mentioned Orders of the 8th day of August and the 18th day of September, 1866, should no longer apply to the said counties, or to the county of Oxford:

Now, therefore, the Lords of Her Majesty's Council do hereby order that from and after the sixth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, the counties of Buckingham, Cambridge, Suffolk, and Oxford, and the Parts of Lindsey and the Parts of Holland, in the county of Lincoln, and the counties of cities or towns, cities, and boroughs therein contained, shall no longer be subject to such provisions of the Orders of the 8th day of August and the 18th day of September, 1866, as are applicable only to the counties enumerated in the above-mentioned schedule, and to the county of Oxford.

The Order of the 31st day of August, 1866, above-mentioned, is hereby revoked.

**W**HEREAS by an Act passed in the session of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and seven, intituled "An Act to prevent" until the first day of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty, and to the end of the then session of Parliament, the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders "among sheep, cattle, and other animals," and from time to time continued by divers subsequent Acts, and lastly by an Act passed in the session of the twenty-eighth and twenty-ninth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, chapter one hundred and nineteen, it is (amongst other things) enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Privy Council, or any two or more of them, from time to time, to make such Orders and Regulations as to them may seem necessary for the purpose of prohibiting or regulating the removal to or from such parts or places as they might designate in such Order or Orders, of sheep, cattle, horses, swine, or other animals, or of meat, skins, hides, horns, hoofs, or other parts of any animals, or of hay, straw, fodder, or other articles likely to propagate infection, and to make any other Orders or Regulations for the purpose of giving effect to the provisions of the said Act, and again to revoke, alter, or vary any such Orders or Regulations; and that all provisions for any of the purposes aforesaid in any such Order or Orders contained shall have the like force and effect as if the same had been inserted in the said Act:

And whereas the said Act has been amended and explained by an Act passed in the twenty-ninth year of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the Act of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty, chapter one hundred and seven, to prevent the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders "among sheep, cattle, and other animals:"

And whereas a contagious or infectious disorder generally designated as the "Cattle Plague," has lately appeared, and now prevails, amongst cattle in England, and has also prevailed among sheep in many parts of England :

And whereas divers Orders have been made by the Lords of the said Council in relation to the cattle plague, which were consolidated and amended by an Order bearing date the twenty-fourth day of March last, which Order has been altered and extended by subsequent Orders :

And whereas by the said Order of the Privy Council, it is ordered that no market for cattle shall be held in England and Wales, except with the licence of the Privy Council, for the sale of cattle intended for immediate slaughter ; and it is further ordered that no sheep, lambs, goats, or swine shall be brought into or exposed for sale in any market licensed for the sale of cattle except for the purpose of immediate slaughter :

And whereas by another Order, bearing date the eighth day of August last, the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council did prescribe certain forms of licence to be used for the removal of various animals ; and it is expedient that provisions should be made for the sale of animals in certain markets not intended for immediate slaughter.

Now, therefore, the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council do hereby order as follows :—

1. From and after the eighth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, markets may be held, with the licence of the Lords of the said Council, for the sale of animals, whether intended for immediate slaughter or otherwise,

in any county in England and Wales, provided that no such licence shall be granted unless their Lordships shall be satisfied that no case of cattle plague has occurred in the county where such market is to be held within one calendar month prior to the date of such licence, nor unless the market is situated at a distance exceeding ten miles from any place declared to be infected according to the provisions of the said Order of the twenty-fourth day of March last.

2. No licence shall be granted under this Order permitting any market to be held in any port or other place into which animals are imported from any country not part of the United Kingdom.

3. When the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council shall license any market for the sale of any animals, such animals may be moved to such market from any place, whether in or out of the county in which the market is to be held, with a licence in the form called a Store Stock Licence in the above-mentioned Order of the eighth day of August last, but not without it ; and the person bringing such animals shall deliver the said licence to an officer of the said market, or to some other person appointed by the persons authorized to hold the market for the purpose of receiving the same, and the said licence shall be numbered and carefully retained and preserved by him.

4. No animal exposed to sale or sold in such market shall be moved therefrom to any place, either in the same or a different county, except with a pass or licence to be given by the person who shall have received the Store Stock Licence, as aforesaid, to the owner or purchaser desirous of moving the same, in the following form :—

[No animal can be moved under this licence upon any highway between sunset and sunrise.]

Appointed to receive licences and grant passes in the above-named Market:

NOTE.—Any person who forges or alters any licence, or offers or utters the same knowing it to be forged or altered, will be liable to a penalty of £20, or to be imprisoned, with hard labour, for the term of three months. See 29 and 30 Victoria, cap. 110, sec. 10.

5. Provided that nothing herein contained shall affect any licence already granted by the Privy Council for any market for the sale of animals for immediate slaughter, or for any market for the sale of sheep or lambs, nor affect the provisions of any Order of the Privy Council under which the Local Authority of any county is empowered to license the holding of fairs, or to make regulations as to the admission of animals into such county.

6. The words herein contained shall be con-

strued as in the said Order of the twenty-fourth day of March last, and all the provisions therein contained relative to the offences for the contravention thereof, and the penalty for the same, and otherwise, now in force, and the provisions of the said Order in regard to the powers of officers employed under that Order, shall apply to the regulations contained in this Order, and the enforcing of the same, and to the officers employed under it.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Acting Chargé d'Affaires at San José, inclosing a translation of a Law modifying the Customs and Port Dues at Honduras, and containing the following Articles:—

ARTICLE I. The duty of 40 per cent., established by Article 11 of the latest Law of 10th February of the present year, shall be recovered in the same terms expressed by said Article, on the value of the original invoices of merchandize imported into the ports of Honduras.

ART. 2. Merchants introducing goods are obliged to bring and present in each Custom-house the original invoice, certified at foot by the Consuls, Vice-Consuls, or Agents of the Government of Honduras in foreign countries. Said merchants will also present an exact copy of such invoices to the Collector of Customs. After comparing the copy with the original, and finding them exact, said original will be returned to the merchant, and the Collector will retain the copy signed by the merchant, which will serve as a voucher for the entry of the duties; and on said copy ought to appear the amount of duties charged to the merchant.

ART. 3. It is the duty of the Ministers, Consuls, and Vice-Consuls of Honduras, in foreign nations, to keep a book of registry, in which they will enter the names of the merchants whose invoices they certify, the amount of such invoices, and the port to which the goods are destined; and to remit an extract, every three months, to the Government, through the Minister of Foreign Relations. Of this extract, the Minister of Finance will remit

authorized copies to the Collectors of the different Custom-houses, so that they may compare them with the certified invoices, and if it should appear that there has been fraud on the part of any merchant, he shall forfeit the half of the value of his invoice.

ART. 4. The duties on spirituous liquors shall be collected in terms of the Law of 23rd February of the present year 1866.

ART. 5. Tonnage dues will be collected in the ports of the Republic in the following manner:— All vessels, national or foreign, steam or sailing vessels, which touch in the ports of Honduras with goods, or for business purposes, shall pay four reals per ton for each ton measurement, from ten to one hundred tons; from one hundred to one hundred and fifty, three reals; and from one hundred and fifty, upwards, two reals. This due, properly collected, shall be in money.

ART. 6. Vessels touching in distress, as, for instance, want of water or provisions, or on account of damage at sea, or to avoid storms, will pay no tonnage dues, but only pilotage, in case of requiring such, and lighthouse dues, if such should exist in the port; and this will not exceed five dollars on vessels of the larger tonnage, and twelve reals on those of the lesser; but this concession is granted on the understanding that the vessel should not remain beyond twenty-four hours, and should not do any business, such as discharging or shipping goods or passengers.

ART. 7. Transshipment duties shall be two per cent., in cash, and that of storage is suppressed.

ART. 8. All the ports of Honduras are of entry for consumption or deposit, and for this latter the merchant shall pay one per cent., when said deposit shall not exceed three months, and passing that term he shall pay import duty as per Article 1 of this Decree, as it is then supposed that the goods are for introduction.

ART. 9. The entry of the cargo, of whatever nature it be, shall be made by the Collector of each Custom-house, in presence of the owner or consignee.

ART. 10. Agricultural implements or machinery which may come for any undertaking, and not for commercial purposes, are free of all duty. Export duty will be the same expressed in the laws, memoranda, and dispositions that treat of this particular, and on such articles as these refer to.

ART. 11. Vessels belonging to the lines of steam packets which touch in the ports of Honduras are exempt from tonnage dues, and from all other port dues, for the term of ten years. After this term, the Government will be at liberty to continue the concession, or suppress it, as may be most convenient for the national interest, unless the Companies for said undertakings make contracts with the Government direct.

ART. 12. All other merchant-vessels, steam or sailing, shall pay the dues established by Article 4.

ART. 13. Vessels under ten tons are free from dues, but not the cargoes which they may contain.

ART. 14. No duties will be levied on deposits of coals which the lines of steamers may establish in the ports of Honduras.

ART. 15. Duties on goods in deposit shall be paid at the time of entry, or, at furthest, within three days. The necessary regulations respecting other duties of which this Law makes mention are already made.

ART. 16. This Decree will commence to be in force six months after its date, and will be submitted to the Legislative Congress at its next meeting.

The tariff of duties of the Government of Salvador is annulled, as regards Honduras, said

tariff having been decreed on 19th May, 1849, and adopted by the Government of this Republic by Decree of 11th June, 1852, and the Federal Custom-house Regulations of 27th February, 1837, are in force in all respects not opposed to the present Decree.
