Ratisbome，Febr．5．The Elector of Baturia，though he was invited to pass the Carneval at Vienna，is gone for Venice； the Eleetrefs accompanied him as far as Inforuch，where fhe will continue with the Qeeen of Poland expecting his return． The delign of this Journey is faid to be，that the Elector may have an opportunity to confer Perfonally with the Prince of Tufcany about the Marriage of his Sifter．It is faid，That the Princess of Oest Frize is fending a Minifter hither，to take care of the Intereft of that Dutchy，upon the Elector of Branden－ burgh＇s late Demand of tt，by his Memorial，for Satisfaction； and it is expected that the Siew Puifendort（who lately netired from the Service of the Sucdes，in which he had been 30 Yeart employed，upon a Ditafte he took at a Determination made in Favour of Baron Welleng to his Prejudice，）is coming to refide here for the King of Denmark．It is advifed from Berlin， That the Preliminary Treaty begun there between Denmurk and Holima，（which was thought concluded，）is now like to break off．
