Leker to the Archbishop of Gnefne, amongst other things of moment, informed him of his Majefties resolution to retire.himself from publick Affairs, and by quitting the Gowernment, to pais the rest of his dayes in devotion and retirement; to which the Chancellor seemed much averse, it being a business, which in the present juncture of affairs, might involve the Kingdome in much trouble.

The people are with greedinels expeding the illue of the enluing Diet, and this hid that all the Provincial and Leffer Diets, have unanimously reloved to petition his Majefly for the difinition of the French Amballadour, before they make any progress into other affairs of the Kingdome.

Vienna, Jan. 21. The Levies upon the account of the Spanish Ambasiadour being compleated, and most of the new railed men already upon their way for Milan, care is now taken for the speedy raising of 10000 men, to recruit the Emperors old Regiments.

A Conrrier lent lately to this Court from the Governor of Infpruck, to acquaint the Emperour of fome apprehensions be had leaft the French might make a fudden attempt upon the Neighbouring Countries, is again returned with Orders from the Emperour for the necessary defence of that Countrey, and the reinforcement of the Garrisons in the Frontier Towns upon Alfatia.

No time nor place is as yet prefixt for the Diet, which is to be held in Hungary, but 'tis supposed the Deputies from those Estates will in little time be difinish with a Resolution in that point. 'The Turks reinforce their Garisons about Offen, and draw some Forces together, which administers matter of jealousse to gar Governours upon the Frontiers, though to divert our apprehensions the Bassa gives out, that his intention is only to take care to have some succours in readiness to be sent to the Grand Visier to reinforce his Army against Spring for the better pursuing of his design for the taking in of Candia.

defign for the taking in of Candia. Genoua, Jan. 25. Yesterday arrived here the Submiffion from Tarmouth, who left the Happy Return of London about 4 days fince coming in for this Port, and is hourly expected. The Durch Convoy from Spain may also fuddenly arrive in this Port.

From Milan we are told, that notwithstanding the great preparations for War, they have fome, leifuze, for divertifements, having there began the Carneval with a Malcarade on horleback, competed of 12 Squadrons, all of them excellently mounted and habited, and at the head of them Seignior Montalto Lieutenant of the Company of Launces, preceded by a great number of Trumpets, Drums, and kettle Drums.

The feveral Provinces of Milan, have lately by their Syndics and Orators, applied themselves to the Governor Don Luis Pons de Leon, complaining of the great butthens laid on them for the maintenance of the fouldiery; to whom the Governor has returned fair promifes, with fome hopes of redrefs; in the mean time taking care to reform fome abufes which are crept in amongft the Officers of the Army, particularly that of giving liberty to the Souldiers to abfent themselves from their Quarters, and in the mean while themselves receiving their pay.

Paris, Feb. 8. The Prince Maximilian of Bavaria is here arrived incognito, whole intended matriage with Madamoifelle de Bouillon is reported to be fully agreed and concluded on, and that the Prince is preparing to appear publickly with a Train of above fixty perions, with Liveries and Equipage fuitable to his dignity.

This day Monfieur de Beaufort leaves this place, intending for Breft, to take care of the Matitime Affairs committed to his Charge, and to be able to let out his Fleet by the first of March.

The King is farr advanced on his journey, and 'tis believed may this day enter into Franche Comte, where the Prince de Conde is already in the Field, and 'tis said has taken in forme fmall Caltles and Forts, and that their defign is in little time to lay fiege to Befançon and Salins,

Monsieur de Lionne intends suddenly to marty his Daugh-

ter to the Duke de Vantadour, with whom he will give a protion of 100000 Crowns, and the King the fumme of 200000

Adonfieur the Prefident Pelletier has lately received a Brief from his Majefly, conferring on him the Honourable Charge of Provoft des Merchands in Paris.

ble Charge of Provest des Merchands in Paris. Tarmenth, Feb. 3. This morning 20 fail of light Colliers passed through this Road to the Northwards, and upon the Flood, 3 or 4 laden sing came in from the Northward, a greater Fleet being suddenly expected to follow them. This day arrived a vellel of this Town from *Bourdeaux*, much complaining of the rudenels of some Ottenders, who boar ing her took away some barrels of Herrings; with some Wine, Aripping her men, and beating the Masser: about 50 fail of thips are here fitting, ow, and may in few days fail to Fish in the North seas: Leveral others are intended for Ireland.

Bristol, Feb. 3. The Master of a Galliot newly arrived here from the River of Charante informs us, that during his flay in the River, the Magazine of Naval Provisions belonging to the French King, by fome accident took Fire, and in his fight blew up; in which were faid to be many thouland barrels of Powder, with all other Provisions for the Fleet, and that the Fire took hold of four of their beft men of War of Sixty and Seventy Guns apiece and upwards, and utterly deftroy'd them, and had not a company belonging to a Provincial flip then in the Road, flourly adventured in their Boats with great danger to prevent it, most part of the French Fleet might in probability have been deftroyed.

Whitehall, Vcb. 5. His Majefty continuing to purlue, what he hath to happily begun, for the better regulating his affairs for the future; and having amongft other important parts thereof, taken into his Princely confideration, the wayes and methods of managing matters at the Council Board, was pleafed on Friday, Fan. 31. to declare his pleafure to the Board, that certain flanding Committees of the Council for feveral bufinefies, should be henceforth eftabliftied, together with regular dayes for their atfembling. Viq.

1. A Committee for Forreign affairs, to which is to be also referred the corresponding with the Justices of the Peace, and other his Majetties Officers and Ministers in the feveral Counties concerning the affairs of the Kingdom, &c. to meet alwayes on Mondayes. 2. A Committee for Just matters as concern the Admiral-

2. A Committee for luch matters as concern the Admiralty and Navy, as also alb Military affairs, Fortifications, &c. fo far as they are fit to be brought to the Council board, without intermedling in what concerns the proper Officers, unless it shall by them be fo defired, to meet on Wednel's dayes.

In purfuance whereof, that Committee did this day meet, and his Royal Highnels (according to his indefatigable Jabour and industry in what ever concerns his Majesties lervice and the Publick) was pleased to be prefent, and to prefide in it.

3 A Committee for the business of Trade, under whole confideration is to fall whatboever concerns his Majeflies Foreign Plantations, as allo what relates to his Kingdontes of Scotland and Ireland, with the Isles of Jerfey and Guernfey, to fit on Thuridayes.

4. A Committee, to whom are to be referred all Pertitions of Complaints and Grievances, to whom His Mayely bath thought fit particularly to prefcibe, that they meddle not with Property, or what relates to Acum or Thum, to which Committee His Majely is pleased that all matters which concern Acts of State or of the Council, be referred; to fit on Fridays.

For the rendring which Conflicution the more effectual, His Marefty was pleased to declare, that for the future, as nothing is to be reloved in Council till the matter hath been first examined, and have received the Opinion as fome Committee or other, so on the other fide states nothing be referred to any Committee, until it have been first read at the Board; with other whol ome Rules, which are for the future to be frictly observed.
