Fixed Lights at Pilot Stations.

The Superintendent of Pilots, Lights, and Harbours of New South Wales has given notice, that from the 1st day of December, 1866, fixed lights would be exhibited from the Pilot stations at the following ports on the coast of New South Wales :

- 1st. A *fixed white* light at Richmond river.
- 2nd. A *fixed red* light at Clarence river.
- 3rd. A *fixed white* light at Manning river.

These lights are placed in the vicinity of the stations in positions to give the greatest range to seaward,

They are visible from a distance of 6 to 8 miles.

[All bearings are magnetic. Variation 8° 30' East in 1867.]

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(No. 6.)—AUSTRALIA—EAST COAST.

Light Vessel in Fitzroy River, Queensland.

THE Port Master of the Colony of Queensland has given notice, that from the 31st day of October, 1866, a light would be exhibited from a light vessel placed within and near the entrance of Fitzroy river, port of Rockhampton, Keppel Bay.

The light is a *fixed white* light, elevated 44 feet above the level of the sea, and in clear weather should be visible from a distance of 8 miles.

The vessel is moored in 7 fathoms water, and from her the Elbow buoy bears N.N.E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E., distant 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ cables.

Directions.—Vessels entering the port at night, should bring this light to bear to the southward of S.S.W. before getting the two red lights at the pilot station in one (the light being visible from the Timandra bank), which done, haul up to round the Timandra bank buoy. After passing Sea Hill point, steer to pass within a cable to the eastward of the light vessel; haul up close round to the southward of her and steer west (northerly), thus leaving the black boy and the black beacon off Raglan point on the port hand, and passing about a cable to the southward of the large Mangrove island.

By passing to the southward of the light vessel as above directed, not less than 15 feet depth of water will be found in the channel at low water springs.

Fixed Light on Lady Elliot Island.

Also, that from the 10th day of November, 1866, a temporary light would be exhibited on Lady Elliot island, in Curtis Channel.

The light is a *fixed white* light, elevated 67 feet above the level of the sea, and in clear weather should be visible from a distance of 9 or 10 miles.

WE, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and eleven, section five, do hereby, subject as hereinafter mentioned, grant and convey to the Incumbent of the perpetual curacy of Saint James, Lathom, in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Chester, and to his successors incumbents of the same benefice, all that piece or parcel of land, with its appurtenances, which is particularly described in the schedule hereunto annexed, and is now vested in us, to have and to hold the said piece or parcel of land, with its appurtenances, to the use of the said Incumbent and his successors for ever: Provided always, that the said piece or parcel of land, with its appurtenances, shall be and be held to be in full substitution for and discharge of the annual sum or stipend of sixteen pounds thirteen shillings and four pence, which was made payable by us to the Incumbent for the time being of the said perpetual curacy, under the provisions of an Order of Her Majesty in Council, bearing date the twentieth day of March, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three; and provided also, that the Incumbent for the time being of the same benefice shall be entitled to receive from us, or on our account, the net amount of the rents, profits, and proceeds of the said piece or parcel of land, with its appurtenances, as from the fifteenth day of September, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six.

In witness whereof, we have hereunto set our common seal, this twenty-fourth day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven.
