## REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S COURTS AT BUCKINGHAM PALACE.

*By Her Majesty's Command.*

The number of Ladies and Gentlemen attending each Court will be limited to two hundred and sixty, including those who will be presented to Her Majesty.

It is expected that Gentlemen will present themselves at Her Majesty's Court only when in attendance upon the Ladies of their families.

Those Gentlemen who have not been presented to The Queen will, under such circumstances, be eligible for presentation to Her Majesty at these Courts.

The presentation of Ladies and Gentlemen will be limited to one hundred at each Court.

Ladies and Gentlemen wishing to attend Her Majesty's Courts must send in their names and addresses to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, S.W., on or after Thursday, the 21st instant, and these names will be submitted for Her Majesty's approval in the order of their receipt at the Office.

All applications must be made in writing, and no names will be received previous to the 21st instant.

Ladies and Gentlemen who desire to be presented to Her Majesty must, in like manner, send in their names and addresses to the Lord Chamberlain's Office on or after the 21st instant. A letter from the Lady or Gentleman by whom each presentation is to be made must in all cases be forwarded.

The Queen has been graciously pleased, with regard to these Courts, to dispense with the regulation that the Lady or Gentleman must attend

the Court at which they propose to make presentations to Her Majesty.

The Lord Chamberlain will forward to all persons who can be received under the above regulations, cards for their admission to Buckingham Palace at the Court which Her Majesty shall be pleased to appoint for their reception.

In sending in their names Ladies and Gentlemen are requested to mention the Court which they would prefer to attend.

All those Ladies and Gentlemen who receive cards of admission to Buckingham Palace are requested to bring with them two large cards with their names clearly written thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in attendance and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to Her Majesty. In the case of presentation the name of the presenter must be inserted on the card.

## REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEES TO BE HELD BY HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, ON BEHALF OF HER MAJESTY, AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE.

*By Her Majesty's command.*

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levees, at St. James's.

Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

#### PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented, must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levees, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that a letter from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, stating it to be his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentations shall be made at Levees, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

WHEREAS it is expedient to make further and better provisions for appeals from Her Majesty's Supreme Court of the settlement of Sierra Leone to Her Majesty in Council. It is therefore ordered by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, as follows:

It shall and may be lawful for any person or persons being a party or parties to any civil suit or action depending in the said Supreme Court of the settlement of Sierra Leone to appeal to Her Majesty, her heirs and successors, in her or their Privy Council, against any final judgment, decree or sentence of the said court, or against any rule or order made in any such civil suit or action having the effect of a final or definitive sentence, and which appeals shall be made, subject to the rules, regulations, and limitations following, that is to say:

First. Such judgment, decree, order, or sentence shall be given or pronounced for or in respect of a sum or matter at issue above the amount of three hundred pounds sterling, or shall involve directly or indirectly the title to property or to some civil right amounting to or of the value of three hundred pounds sterling.

Secondly. The person or persons feeling aggrieved by such judgment, decree, order or sentence, shall, within fourteen days next after the same shall have been pronounced, made, or given, apply to the said Supreme Court for leave to appeal, therefrom to Her Majesty, her heirs and successors, in her or their Privy Council.

Thirdly. If such leave to appeal shall be prayed by the party or parties who is or are adjudged to pay any sum of money or to perform any duty, the court shall direct that the judgment, decree, or sentence appealed from shall be carried into execution, if the party or parties respondent shall give security for the immediate performance of any judgment or sentence which may be pronounced or made by Her Majesty, her heirs and successors, in her or their Privy Council, upon any appeal, and until such security be given, the execution of the judgment, decree, order, or sentence appealed from shall be stayed.

Fourthly. Provided nevertheless, that if the party or parties appellant shall establish to the satisfaction of the said supreme court that real and substantial justice requires that pending such appeal execution should be stayed, it shall be lawful for such Supreme Court to order the execution of such judgment, decree, order, or sentence to be suspended pending such appeal, if the party or parties appellant shall give security for the immediate performance of any judgment or sentence which may be pronounced or made by Her Majesty, her heirs and successors, in her or their Privy Council, upon any such appeal.

Fifthly. In all cases security shall also be given by the party or parties appellant for the prosecution of the appeal, and for the payment of all such costs as may be awarded by Her Majesty, her heirs and successors, to the party or parties respondent.

Sixthly. The said Supreme Court shall, subject to the conditions hereinafter mentioned determine the nature, amount and sufficiency of the several securities so to be taken as aforesaid.

Seventhly. Provided nevertheless, that in any case where the subject of litigation shall consist of immovable property, and the judgment, decree, order, or sentence appealed from shall not change, affect, or relate to the actual occupation thereof, no security shall be demanded either from the party or parties respondent or from the party or parties appellant for the performance of the judgment or sentence to be pronounced or made upon such appeal; but if such judgment, decree, order, or sentence shall change, affect, or relate to the occupation of any such property, then such security shall not be of greater amount than may be necessary to secure the restitution free from all damage or loss of such property, or of the intermediate profit which, pending any such appeal, may probably accrue from the intermediate occupation thereof.

Eighthly. In any case where the subject of litigation shall consist of money or other chattels, or of any personal debt or demand, the security to be demanded either from the party or parties respondent or from the party or parties appellant for the performance of the judgment or sentence to be pronounced or made upon such appeal, shall be either a bond to be entered into in the amount or value of such subject of litigation by one or more sufficient surety or sureties, or such security shall be given by way of mortgage or voluntary condemnation of or upon some immovable property situate and being within such settlement, and being of the full value of such subject of litigation over and above the amount of all mortgages and charges of whatever nature upon or affecting the same.

Ninthly. The security to be given by the party or parties appellant for the prosecution of the appeal and for the payment of costs shall in no case exceed the sum of three hundred pounds sterling; and shall be given either by such surety or sureties, or by such mortgage or voluntary condemnation as aforesaid.

Tenthly. If the security to be given by the party or parties appellant for the prosecution of the appeal and for the payment of such costs as may be awarded, shall in manner aforesaid be completed within three months from the date of the petition for leave to appeal, then, and not otherwise, the said Supreme Court shall make an order allowing such appeal, and the party or parties appellant shall be at liberty to prefer and prosecute his, her, or their appeal to Her Majesty, her heirs and successors, in her or their Privy Council, in such manner and under such rules as are observed in appeals made to Her Majesty in Council from the plantations or colonies.

Eleventhly. Provided nevertheless, that any person or persons feeling aggrieved by any order which may be made by, or by any proceedings of the said Supreme Court respecting the security to be taken upon any such appeal as aforesaid, shall be and is hereby authorized by petition to Her Majesty, her heirs and successors, in Council, to apply for redress in the premises.

Provided always, and it is hereby further ordered, that nothing herein contained doth or shall extend, or be construed to extend, to take away or abridge the undoubted right or authority of Her Majesty, her heirs and successors, to admit and receive any appeal from any judgment, decree, sentence, or order of the said Supreme Court on the humble petition of any person or persons aggrieved thereby, in any case in which, and subject to any conditions or restrictions upon and under which it may seem meet to Her Majesty, her heirs and successors, so to admit and receive any such appeal.

In all cases of appeal allowed by the said Supreme Court, or by Her Majesty, her heirs and successors, such court shall, on the application and at the costs of the party or parties appellant, certify and transmit to Her Majesty, her heirs and successors, in her or their Privy Council, a true and exact copy of all proceedings, evidence, judge's notes of evidence, and judge's reasons, judgments, decrees, and orders had or made in such causes so appealed, so far as the same have relation to the matter of appeal, such copies to be certified under the seal of the said court.

The said Supreme Court shall in all cases of appeal to Her Majesty, her heirs and successors, execute and carry into immediate effect such judgments and orders as Her Majesty, her heirs and successors, shall make thereupon in such manner as any original judgment or decree of the said court can or may be executed.

All orders heretofore made by Her Majesty or by any of her royal predecessors in her or their Privy Council, and all laws, customs, and usages now or at any time heretofore established or in force in any of the said settlements, so far as such orders, laws, or usages are in anywise repugnant to or at variance with this present Order, shall be and the same are hereby revoked, abrogated, rescinded, and annulled.

And the Right Honorable the Earl of Carnarvon, one of Her Majesty's principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the 6th year of Her Majesty, intituled "An Act to enable Her Majesty to provide for the Government of Her settlements on the coast of Africa and in the Falkland Islands," it was enacted that it should be lawful for Her Majesty by any Order or Orders, to be by Her made, with the advice of her Privy Council, to establish all such laws, institutions, and ordinances, and to constitute such courts and officers, and to make such provisions and regulations for the proceedings in such courts, and for the administration of justice as might be necessary for the peace, order, and good government of Her Majesty's subjects, and others within the said settlements; and whereas courts of civil and criminal justice have been established by Ordinances in Her Majesty's settlements on the Gambia, the Gold Coast, and of Lagos in Western Africa, and it is expedient to provide a court of appellate jurisdiction to hear and determine appeals from the said courts respectively. It is therefore ordered by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice of the Privy Council, as follows:—

1. That the judges for the time being of Her Majesty's Supreme Court of the settlement of Sierra Leone shall be, and they are hereby constituted, a court of record to receive, hear, and determine appeals from the court of civil and criminal justice of the settlement on the Gambia, the court of civil and criminal justice of the settlement on the Gold Coast, and the court of civil and criminal justice of the settlement of Lagos in Western Africa, and such court of appeal shall be styled and called "The West Africa Court of Appeal."

2. That it shall be lawful for the plaintiff or plaintiffs, defendant or defendants, against whom any sentence, judgement, or decree or order of any of the said courts of civil and criminal justice shall be given, for or in respect of any sum or matter at issue above or exceeding the value of £50. sterling, to appeal therefrom to the said court of appeal; and the party or parties appealing from such sentence, judgment, decree, or order shall, within fourteen days from the passing thereof, give notice to the adverse party or parties of such appeal, and within fourteen days from and after such sentence, judgment, decree, or order, enter into sufficient security to be approved by the chief or other presiding magistrate of the court in which such sentence, judgment, decree, or order shall be given or made, to satisfy and perform the said sentence, judgment, decree, or order, in case the same shall be affirmed or the appeal dismissed, together with such further costs as shall be awarded thereon, and in all cases of appeal where notice shall be given and security perfected as aforesaid, execution shall be stayed, and not otherwise; and the said court of appeal shall and may inquire into, hear, and decide all questions whether of law or fact arising upon any such appeal, but shall not admit or receive any evidence which was not tendered to the court from which such appeal may be brought on the

hearing or trial of any such suit or action therein : provided always, that whenever at the hearing of any such appeal the judges of the said court of appeal shall be equally divided in opinion, the judgment of the court of civil and criminal justice from which such appeal shall be brought shall stand confirmed, and be deemed and taken to be the judgment of the said court of appeal.

3. That it shall and may be lawful for the judges of the said court of appeal, and they are hereby authorized and required to make and establish such rules, orders, and regulations as to them shall seem meet, touching and concerning the forms and manner of proceeding to be observed in the said courts of civil and criminal justice respectively, the practice and pleadings in all informations, actions, suits, and other matters civil or criminal to be therein brought, the process of the said courts, and the mode of executing the same, the admission of barristers, attorneys, solicitors, and notaries in the said courts respectively, the proceedings of the sheriffs and other ministerial officers, the fees and poundage to be paid to any officer, costs of suits and the taxing thereof in the said courts respectively, and touching and concerning all such other matters and things necessary for the proper conduct and despatch of business in the said courts respectively, and in the said court of appeal, and all such rules, orders, and regulations from time to time to revoke, alter, amend, or renew as occasion may require: provided always, that all such rules, orders, and regulations shall forthwith be transmitted by the judges of the said court to the Governor-in-chief of the said West Africa settlements, to be by him transmitted to Her Majesty, her heirs and successors, for her or their approbation or disallowance.

4. That it shall be lawful for any person who shall think himself aggrieved by any final judgment, sentence, decree, or order of the said West Africa Court of Appeal, to appeal to Her Majesty, her heirs and successors, in her or their Privy Council, against any such final judgment, sentence, decree, or order of the said court, and such appeals shall be made subject to the rules, regulations, limitations, and conditions which for the time being shall be in force respecting appeals to Her Majesty, her heirs and successors, in council, from any judgment, sentence, decree, or order of the said Supreme Court of the settlement of Sierra Leone, and subject to such other regulations and conditions as Her Majesty, her heirs and successors, shall be pleased to direct.

That the said courts of civil and criminal justice shall in all cases of appeal to Her Majesty, her heirs and successors, in council, execute and carry into immediate effect such judgments and orders as Her Majesty, her heirs and successors, shall make thereupon in such manner as any original judgment of the said courts respectively can or may be executed.

5. That for the purpose of this Order in Council any person lawfully appointed to act for the time being as Chief Justice of the said Supreme Court of the settlement of Sierra Leone shall be deemed and taken to be a judge of the said court of appeal.

And the Right Honourable the Earl of Carnarvon, one of Her Majesty's principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the nineteenth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, in the words following, viz. :—

"Whereas, we have had under our consideration the regulations established by your Majesty's Orders in Council of the 1st August, 1860, and 16th February, 1866, relating to the periods of service necessary to qualify Captains, Commanders, and Lieutenants for the Naval and Greenwich Hospital Pensions; we most humbly submit that your Majesty will be graciously pleased, by your Order in Council, to authorise time served as Mate or as Sub-Lieutenant to count towards the periods of service required to qualify those Officers respectively for the before-mentioned Pensions."

Her Majesty having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions therein accordingly.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act for rendering more easy the taking the poll at county elections," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, from time to time, on petition from the Justices of any county, riding, parts, or division in England or Wales in Quarter Sessions assembled, representing that the number of polling places for such county, riding, parts, or division is insufficient, and praying that the place or places mentioned in the said petition may be a polling place or polling places for the county, riding, parts, or division of the county within which such place or places is or are situate, to declare that any place or places mentioned in the said petition shall be a polling place or polling places for that county, riding, parts, or division, and that the Justices of the Peace for the county, riding, parts, or division, in Quarter Sessions or some Special Sessions assembled, as mentioned in the Act passed in the second and third years of His said late Majesty, intituled "An Act to settle and describe the divisions of counties and the limits of cities and boroughs in England and Wales, in so far as respects the election of members to serve in Parliament," shall, conformably to the said last-mentioned Act, divide such county, riding, parts, or division into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such districts to each polling place :

And whereas the Justices of the Peace for the county of Merioneth, in Quarter Sessions assembled, on the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, have presented a petition to Her Majesty, representing that the number of polling places for the said county is insufficient, and praying that Festiniog, in the parish of Festiniog, in the said county, may be declared an additional polling place for the said county :

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, having taken the petition into consideration, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to declare, order, and direct, and it is hereby declared, ordered, and directed, that Festiniog, in the said parish of Festiniog, shall be a polling place for the said county ; and that the Justices of the Peace for the said county, in Quarter Sessions, or some Special Sessions assembled, as mentioned in the said Act, passed in the second and third years of the reign of His said late Majesty, shall, conformably to the said Act, divide such county into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such districts to each polling place.

**W**HEREAS by an Act passed in the last session of Parliament, intituled "An Act to amend the law relating to contagious or infectious diseases in cattle and other animals," it is, amongst other things, enacted, that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by Order in Council, from time to time to continue, or to renew, if expired, all or any of the provisions in the first part of that Act contained, for such time as shall be specified in such Order :

And whereas it is provided in the eleventh section of the said Act, which section is in the first part thereof, that Part I. of the said Act shall continue in force until the fifteenth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, and no longer, unless continued or renewed by Order of Her Majesty in Council :

And whereas it is provided in the twelfth, thirteenth, fourteenth, fifteenth, and sixteenth sections of the first part of the said Act, as follows :—

*Slaughter of Diseased Animals.*

"12. Every local authority shall cause all animals affected with the cattle plague within its district to be slaughtered, and shall, by way of compensation for every animal so slaughtered, pay to the owner thereof such sum not exceeding twenty pounds, and not exceeding one half of the value of the animal immediately before it was affected with the cattle plague, as to such local authority may seem fit.

"13. Every local authority shall cause every animal that has died of cattle plague, or has been slaughtered in consequence of being affected with cattle plague within its district, to be buried as soon as possible in its skin in some proper place, and to be covered with a sufficient quantity of quicklime or other disinfectant, and with not less than six feet of earth.

"14. Every local authority shall, within its district, cause the yard, shed, stable, field, or other premises in which any animal affected with cattle plague has been kept while affected by the disease, or has died or been slaughtered, to be thoroughly cleansed and disinfected, and all hay, straw, litter, dung, or other articles that have been used in or about any such animal to be burnt or otherwise destroyed; and no fresh animal shall be admitted into any yard, shed, stable, field, or other premises in which any animal affected with cattle plague has been kept while affected by the disease, or has died or been slaughtered, until the expiration of thirty days after the cleansing and disinfecting of such premises in pursuance of this Act; and every local authority shall direct the disinfecting the clothes of, and the use of due precautions by inspectors, cattle overseers, and others in contact with animals affected by the cattle plague, with a view to prevent the spreading of contagion.

"15. A local authority may, if it thinks fit, cause to be slaughtered any animal that has been in the same shed or stable, or in the same herd or flock, or in contact with any animal affected with cattle plague within its district; and the owner of any animal so slaughtered may either dispose of the carcase on his own account, with a licence from some officer appointed in that behalf by a local authority, or may require the local authority to dispose of the same, in which case such local authority shall pay to the owner thereof, by way of compensation, such sum, not exceeding twenty-five pounds, as may equal three-fourths of the value of the animal slaughtered: Provided always, that the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, or any two or more of them, may reserve animals (ordered to be slaughtered as aforesaid) for the purpose of experimental treatment.

"16. The local authority may require the value of any animal slaughtered under this Act to be ascertained by officers of the local authority or by arbitration, and generally may impose conditions as to evidence of the slaughter and value of the animals slaughtered: Provided that no compensation shall in any case be paid in respect of any animal found affected with cattle plague in a market or on a highway, or in respect of any animal which has been moved or otherwise dealt with in contravention of this Act, or any Order of a local authority made in pursuance thereof."

And whereas by Orders of Her Majesty in Council, the last bearing date the tenth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, the provisions of the above recited sections of the first part of the said Act were continued in force beyond the said fifteenth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, until the twenty-eighth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven; and whereas it is considered expedient that the same be further continued :

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in exercise of the power vested in her by the said Act, and by and with the advice of her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the said recited provisions contained in the twelfth, thirteenth, fourteenth, fifteenth, and sixteenth sections of the first part of the said Act shall continue in force on and after the said twenty-eighth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, until the thirty-first day of May, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the first and second years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and seven; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twenty-ninth day of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the first and second years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and seven; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Saviour, situate at Brockley Hill in the District Parish of Christ Church, Forest Hill, in the county of Kent, and in the diocese of London.

"Now, therefore, with the consents of the Right Reverend Samuel, Bishop of the said diocese of Oxford, and of the Right Reverend Charles John, Bishop of the said diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, and of the said John Thomas, Baron Redesdale, and of the Reverend Boscawen Thomas George Henry Somerset, the Incumbent of the said benefice of Widford with Swinbrook, and of the Reverend James William Clarke, the present Incumbent of the said benefice of Lower Lemington (in testimony whereof, they have respectively signed and sealed this scheme), we humbly recommend and propose that the lands and hereditaments situate within the parish of Easington, in the county of Warwick, and in the diocese of Worcester, and now forming part of the endowments of the said benefice of Widford with Swinbrook, which are set forth and described in the schedule hereunto annexed, shall, without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette, be disannexed and transferred from the said benefice of Widford with Swinbrook, and from the incumbent thereof and his successors, and shall become and be absolutely vested in the said James William Clarke, the incumbent as aforesaid of the said benefice of Lower Lemington, and in his successors, the incumbents of the same benefice, for ever, and shall become and be and form part of the endowments of such last-named benefice; and, with the like consents of the said Samuel, Bishop of the said diocese of Oxford, of the said Charles John, Bishop of the said diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, of the said John Thomas, Baron Redesdale, of the said Boscawen Thomas George Henry Somerset, and of the said James William Clarke (testified us aforesaid), we further recommend and propose that the sum of four hundred and fifty pounds sterling, being an endowment held by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne for the augmentation of the maintenance of the Poor Clergy, in trust, for the incumbent for the time being of the said benefice of Lower Lemington, shall, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, as aforesaid, be held by the said Governors, in trust for and for the benefit of the said Boscawen Thomas George Henry Somerset, or other the then incumbent of the said benefice of Widford with Swinbrook, and his successors incumbents of the same benefice for ever, and shall become and be and form part of the endowments of such last-named benefice.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The lands and hereditaments to be disannexed and transferred from the benefice of Widford with Swinbrook, and to be annexed to the benefice of Lower Lemington, being:—

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Mary, Scholing, being:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act passed in the session of Parliament now last past, intituled 'An Act to further amend the Acts relating to us,' have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for effecting an exchange of certain lands and hereditaments belonging to the Bishop of Durham for certain other lands and hereditaments belonging to us.

"Whereas by the said Act it is enacted that if after we have effected the endowment of any archbishoprick or bishoprick, or of any chapter with lands or hereditaments, it shall appear to us that it would be beneficial to such archbishoprick or bishoprick, or to such chapter that any part or parts of such lands or hereditaments should be exchanged for any lands or hereditaments belonging to any other archbishop, or bishop, or chapter, or to us, it shall be lawful to effect such exchange with the consent, in writing, of every archbishop, or bishop, or chapter, thereby affected, and by the authority of a scheme passed by us, and an Order of your Majesty ratifying the same, provided always that no such exchange shall be made unless we shall be satisfied of the reasonable equality in value of the lands and hereditaments so to be exchanged, and shall in such last-mentioned scheme make a statement to that effect.

"And whereas the endowment of the bishoprick of Durham, with lands and hereditaments, was effected by means of an Order of your Majesty in Council, ratifying a scheme prepared by us, which Order bore date the twenty-fifth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, and was duly published in the *London Gazette* on the twenty-sixth day of the same month.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, with the consent of the Right Reverend Charles, Lord Bishop of Durham, testified by his having signed this scheme, that from and after the day of the publication in the *London Gazette* of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly published Order, the lands and hereditaments particularly described in the schedule hereunto annexed and marked A, with their appurtenances, and all the right, title, estate and interest therein of the said Bishop of Durham, and his successors, and all his and their right, title, and interest in any tithes, or rent charges in lieu of tithes, arising thereout or charged thereupon, and in the benefit of the perpetual land tax (if any) charged upon the same premises, shall be transferred to and vested in us and our successors, and that we shall thereupon become and be absolutely seized and possessed of the same in fee, and shall be entitled to the rents, profits, and proceeds thereof as from the thirteenth day of May next, and that in exchange for the lands and hereditaments so to be transferred and conveyed to us as aforesaid, the lands and hereditaments particularly described in the schedule hereunto annexed, and marked B, with their appurtenances, and all our right, title, estate, and interest therein (save and except and always reserved unto us and our successors, and our and their lessees, tenants, and assigns, all and singular the mines, quarries, and beds of coal, stone, clay, sand, minerals, and metalliferous substances of all descriptions therein or thereunder, with full and exclusive authority to sink, win, work, get up, and carry away the same, in, under, out of, and from the said lands and hereditaments, or any other lands and hereditaments, according to the course and practice at present or hereafter to be used or adopted in the county of Durham, or according to the most approved mode which may from time to time be used or invented, and to enter upon, take, use, and occupy from time to time, and for such time and in such manner as we, our successors, lessees, tenants, and assigns shall think fit, so much of the said lands and hereditaments as we shall deem necessary, proper, or convenient, for all or any of the aforesaid purposes, making full compensation for any injury thereby occasioned, and save and except and always reserved, full and exclusive authority for us, our successors, lessees, tenants, and assigns, or persons acting under our authority, and whether in reference or respect to lands held by or under us, or any other property, to make, grant, and use any way or ways upon, across, under, or through the said lands and hereditaments, for the purposes aforesaid), together with all tithes, or rent-charges in lieu of tithes, arising thereout or charged thereupon, and the benefit of the perpetual land tax (if any) charged upon the same premises, shall, from and after the date of such gazetting as aforesaid, become and be absolutely vested in the said bishop and his successors, in as full and ample a manner (saving the minerals and mineral rights aforesaid), as if the same had formed part of the ancient possessions of the said see, and that the said bishop shall become entitled to the rents, profits, and proceeds thereof, as from the said thirteenth day of May next.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, in conformity with the provisions of the said recited Act or of any other Act of Parliament.

**W**HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a Scheme, bearing date the thirty-first day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, in the words following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, sections six and eight, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following Scheme for authorizing the sale and disposal of certain property formerly belonging to the Dean and Chapter of Wells and now vested in us.

"Whereas under an Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and another Act of the fourth and fifth years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, and another Act of the fifth year of your Majesty, chapter twenty-six; and by virtue of an Order of your Majesty in Council, made under the provisions of the said Acts, bearing

date the twenty-sixth day of July last past, and duly published in the London Gazette on the twenty-seventh of the same month, all the manors, lands, tithes, tenements, and hereditaments then belonging to the said Dean and Chapter of Wells (excepting certain portions thereof in such Order particularly excepted, and excepting also any rights of ecclesiastical patronage) became absolutely vested in us for the purposes and subject to the provisions applicable to other hereditaments vested in us.

"And whereas the manors, lands, tithes, tenements, and hereditaments, aforesaid, consist to a considerable extent of reversions expectant upon grants and leases for lives and years, and produce during the subsistence of such grants and leases only small annual revenues, and on that account, and in some instances on account of the character or situation of the property are unsuitable or inconvenient to be assigned as an endowment for the said Dean and Chapter, or to be held or applied for the other purposes, for which estates vested in us are applicable, under the Acts by which our proceedings are governed.

"And whereas by an Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, power is given to lessees, holding under us, in the event of our declining to enter into a treaty for the sale of our reversions, or the purchase of the leasehold interests, to require us to purchase such leasehold interests at a valuation.

"And whereas with a view to the appropriation of such portions of the aforesaid manors, lands, tithes, tenements, and hereditaments lately belonging to the said Dean and Chapter of Wells (either with or without other property vested in us, as the case may require) as in the judgment of our Estates Committee, and subject to the approbation of the said Dean and Chapter, shall be deemed convenient to be held as an endowment for the said Dean and Chapter, and as will secure a net annual income of five thousand four hundred and twenty-five pounds (being the income contemplated by the above mentioned Order of your Majesty in Council of the twenty-sixth day of July last), and for that purpose, as well as with a view to the more advantageous appropriation of the remainder of the said manors, lands, tithes, tenements, hereditaments, and endowments, or of the proceeds thereof, for the ultimate improvement of our common fund, it is expedient that the said manors, lands, tithes, tenements, and hereditaments, or such part or parts thereof, as we shall at any time and from time to time think fit, should be sold or disposed of, and accordingly that we should be empowered to dispose of our interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof in such manner as shall appear to us advisable.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose that we may be authorized and empowered by instrument or instruments in writing duly executed according to law from time to time to sell or dispose of, and duly to convey according to the provisions of the said Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's reign, with the consent of the respective holders (if any), to be testified by their being made parties to such instruments, all or any of the said manors, lands, tithes, tenements, and hereditaments heretofore belonging to the said Dean and Chapter of Wells, and so vested in us as aforesaid, with their appurtenances, and all our estate, right, title, and interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the

same, and his, her, or their heirs, executors, administrators, or assigns, or otherwise, as he, she, or they shall direct or appoint, and for such consideration as shall upon due calculation and inquiry appear to us to be just and reasonable.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas, the said Scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Bath and Wells.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her Majesty's reign, chapter thirty-nine, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-first day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, in the words following, that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the fourth and fifth years of your Majesty's reign, chapter thirty-nine, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for substituting a money payment to the precentor or chief chaunter of the cathedral church of Saint Paul, London, for certain property belonging to his precentorship.

"Whereas by and under the provisions of the said Acts the whole of the separate estates and endowments belonging to the said precentorship (excepting any right of ecclesiastical patronage), will upon the first avoidance of the said precentorship become absolutely vested in us for the purposes of the said Acts, and the chief of such purposes is that of making better provision for the cure of souls in parishes where such assistance is most required.

"And whereas it was by the same Acts enacted that by the authority therein provided, and for the purpose of fully carrying into effect any of the provisions thereof any arrangement might from time to time be made with the consent in writing, under the hand of any dignitary or officer of any cathedral church for the sale, transfer, or exchange of any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments belonging to such dignitary or officer or for the purchase of other lands,

tithes, or other hereditaments in lieu thereof, or for substituting in any case any lands, tithes or other hereditaments for any money payment, or any money payment for any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments.

"And whereas it has been agreed between us and the Reverend Charles Almeric Belli, clerk, the present precentor of the said cathedral church of Saint Paul, that with a view to sooner carrying into effect the purpose of the said recited Acts hereinbefore particularly mentioned, the following arrangement should be recommended by us to your Majesty in Council.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Charles Almeric Belli (testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme) we humbly recommend and propose that immediately upon the Gazetting of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly Gazetted Order, all the lands, tithes and other hereditaments comprised in the schedule to this scheme, shall together with all the estate, right, title, and interest therein, of the said Charles Almeric Belli, be and be held to be for the consideration hereinafter mentioned transferred and conveyed by and from the said Charles Almeric Belli to us, and shall then and thereupon become and be absolutely vested in us for the purposes of the said Acts, subject only to any legally subsisting lease or leases thereof, or of any part or parts thereof; and that we shall upon such Gazetting as aforesaid, be entitled to the rents, profits and proceeds of the said lands, tithes, and hereditaments as from the first day of April now last past, and that in consideration of and for such transfer and conveyance there shall be paid by us to the said Charles Almeric Belli, the sum of one thousand and two hundred pounds. Provided that no renewal of any lease, nor any new lease of the said lands, tithes or hereditaments, or of any part or parts thereof, shall since the said first day of April now last past, have been or shall be granted or made by the said Charles Almeric Belli.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in conformity with the provisions of the said recited Acts or either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

#### "SCHEDULE.

"All that the parsonage and rectory of Stortford, otherwise called Bishop Stortford, in the county of Hertford, and the lands, tithes, and hereditaments, comprised in or belonging to the said parsonage or rectory, with their appurtenances, and all other the hereditaments comprised in a lease for lives dated the twenty-first day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, and granted by the Reverend Charles Almeric Belli, precentor or chief chaunter of the cathedral church of Saint Paul, in London, to Thomas Bosville Bosville, except such portions of the said lands and hereditaments as have been sold and conveyed to the Great Eastern Railway Company, and also except such portions thereof as have been agreed to be sold and conveyed to the Bishop Stortford, Dunmow, and Braintree Railway Company, and the stock or funds arising or to arise from such sale or sales.

"And also all that the manor of the rectory of Stortford or Bishop Stortford, in the said county of Hertford; and the lands, hereditaments and emoluments belonging thereto.

"And all other the lands, hereditaments, and emolments if any, belonging to the said Charles Almeric Belli, as precentor of the said church, and situate or arising in the parish of Stortford, in the said county of Hertford."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of London.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England, beyond the limits of the Metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," it is enacted that, in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-ground or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require), that after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time, as circumstances may require; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered; provided also, that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish:

And whereas the Right Honourable Spencer Horatio Walpole, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned, ten days' previous notice of his

intention to make such representations, did make representations stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that interments in the same should be discontinued with the modifications hereinafter specified:

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the twenty-eighth day of December last, to give notice of such representations, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the thirteenth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order and it is hereby ordered, that burials in the undermentioned parishes shall be discontinued (except as is herein otherwise directed), as follows; viz:

GELLYGARE, CARDIFF. — Forthwith in the burial-ground of Zoar and Bethlehem Chapels, Pontlottyn, except in walled graves, in which each coffin shall be separately entombed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented; and in earthen graves not less than five feet deep, which can be opened without exposure of coffins or the disturbance of bones, and also that the surface be covered with fresh mould, on which a living vegetation shall be maintained.

BARNET, HERTS. — Forthwith in the Church and in Wood-street Chapel; and from the thirty-first of October, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, in the Churchyard and Wood-street Chapel-yard, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, in which each coffin shall be embedded in charcoal and separately enclosed by brickwork or stonework properly cemented.

LLANBADARNVAWR. — Forthwith wholly in Aberystwith Church; and in the Churchyard and in the Baptist Burial-ground of Aberystwith, except in vaults and graves completely walled existing on the first of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six; and that every coffin buried therein be embedded in charcoal and separately entombed in an air-tight manner, that is, enclosed by brickwork or stonework properly cemented.
