IS Majesty minding to secure all His Loving Subjects, in Travelling, and going about their Lawful Occasions. Is this day in Council pleased to Order, and it is beneby Ordered. That all His Majesties Officers of Justice, and others His Loving Subjects, do use their usual Diligence and Endeavour, for the Apprehending all Robbers, and Highway-men, to the end they may be proceeded against according to Law; And fon the Encouragement of such as shall Apprehend any such Offenders, or Offenders. It is sinther Ordered by His Majesty, That such Person or Persons, who shall at any Time from the Day of the Date leavest, till the 20th of March, which shall be in the Fear of our Lord God 1685, and after that day till His Majesty shall please to recal this Order, either by Proclamation or His Order in Council, Apprehend any Robber, we Highway-man, and cause him to be brought into Custody, shall within Fifteen Days after his Conviction, have a Reward of Ten pounds for every such Offender, so Apprehended, and Convicted, and all and every Sheriff and Sheriff wicks, where such Conviction shall be had, are and is hereby required upon the Certificate of the Judge, or Two, or more Justice of the Peace, before IS Majesty minding to secure all His Loving Subrigs, and sheriff of the respective Counties, and Sheriff wicks, where fuch Conviction shall be had, are and is hereby required upon the Certificate of the Judge, or Two, or more Justices of the Peace, before whom such Person, or Persons, shall be Convicted, of such Apprehension and Conviction, to pay unto the Person, or Persons, who shall spot prehend such Offender, or Offenders, the Reward aforesaid, within the Time aforesaid, for each and every Offender, so Apprehended and Convicted as aforesaid; Out of his Majesties Mongy's, received by such Sheriff; or Sheriffs in that County where such Conviction shall be, which shall be allowed unto him, or them, upon his or their Accounts in the Exchequer; and the Right Honourable the Lord High Treasure of England, is hereby Authorized, and Empowered to give such Warrants, is the Officers, and others concerned in the Exchequer, to give allowance thereof accordingly. And it is all further Ordered, that all Lieutenants, Deputy-Lieutenants, Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Sheriffs, Bayliffs, and other Officers, and Persons what loever, do take Notice thereof, and give suc Obedience accordingly. And also be aiding and assisting in all things, tending to the Execution thereof, as they tender his Majestics Displeasure, and upon sain of being proceeded against as Contourners of His Majestic Royal Authority.

Person or Persons shalk in England, or mithin any of the Plantations, or other His Majesties Dominions, Discover to Sin Robert Holmes or his Agents, and shall cause to be Apprehended any Pirats or Accomplices of Pirats, their Estates or Goods, so that they may be brought to Justice, or their Estate or Goods or any part thereof Seized: Such Difcoverer Shall, for his Encouragement, receive Twenty per Cent. or one full Fifth part of all their Estate or Goods that shall be recovered by the apprehension or projecution of any such Briat or Accomplise of Ricars, or by the Discovery of all or any start of their Estate or Goods; and if such Discoveres or orber Person or Persons, canning any Piatat or Pirats to be apprehended, shall, any or all of them, have beretaking committed Biras. His March will be have heretofone committed Pirasy. His Majesty mill be Graciously pleased to grant him or them a full Pardon for all Piracies, pursuant to His Mujesties late Proclamation in that behalf; and he or they shall further receive and enjoy Twenty per Cent. or one full Fifth part of any Estate or Goods to be recovered as aforesaid. And whosever, within or near the City of London, shall be able to make any Juch Discovery, or be helpful therein, they may repair to Mr. James Kinvin in Bow-lane, from whom they may receive such further Directions and Satisfaction as spall be necessary concerning the same.

All that we hear from Achens is, That the Inhabitants of Achaia have offered themselves to undeatake the attacking of Negrepont, provided they may be assisted take the attacking of Negrepont, provided they may be allisted with 1000 Men, which, it is believed, will be accepted. It is confirmed from all Parts, that the Turks apply themselves with the utmest industry to get rogether a numerous Army for the next Campagne: That Messengers have been sent to all the Governments in that Empire, to give an Account of the new Sultan's Establishment on the Throne; and to carry his Orders to the Passes Requiring them. tan's Establishment on the Throne; and to carry his Orders to the Basia's and Begs, Requiring them, upon pain of the highest Displeasure, to take an exact account of such as are able to serve the State within their district; and to begin to make Levies that they may have them in a readiness to match upon the sirst Symmons. We hear they begin to be better quieted at Constant nople; since the Spahi's have been gratified with a Permission to visit their own Homes for some short time; though they are not without some fresh Remembrances of the ill Estects of the late licentiousness. Vienna, 1-ebr, 19. The States of Stiria affembled at Gratz, have granted to his Imperial Majesty the ordinary Subfidy of 300000 Florins, besides 160000 which they furnish towards the Entertainment of the Troops now cellary for the Security of their Frontiers. By an Express from Vienna of the 22d of February, we have advice, That an Officer was then newly arrived from General Heaster, to give his Imperial Majesty an account, that Teckeley's Retreat under the Cannon of Waradin, had proved but an unfafe Shelter to him and his Party; General Heister, as has been faid, having affembled 4 or 5 Regiments to oppose Teckere's Excursions, after he had lodg'd him, he was resolved not to let him part without an Engagement, whatever feeming Disadvantage there was in the Attempt; and accordingly he attacked him in his Camp, with the Succels that has usually attended this General: The Rebel Party being totally routed, 600 of them were kill'd on the place, 280 made Prioners (of which number 29 were Officers,) befides 300 Hories and 4 Standards taken; Teckelcy himself found the means to escape, but being thus totally abandoned, it is scarce to be avoided but he must either fall into the hands of those that are abroad in pursuit of him, or pass his time as ill amongst those with whom he shall seek a Refuge.

And we do hereby
