WE, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in consideration of a benefaction of two hundred and twenty-five pounds, thirteen shillings, and four pence, which we have received in favour of the perpetual curacy of Christ Church, Har-wood, in the county of Lancaster, and in the diocese of Manchester, and in respect whereof we have agreed to pay to the Incumbent of the same benefice, and to his successors, a yearly sum of seven pounds, ten shillings, and sixpence, and in consideration also of a further benefaction, consisting of one thousand seven hundred and eightyfour square yards of land, which have been permanently secured to the same benefice, do hereby, in pursuance of the Act of the twentyninth and thirtieth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and eleven, section five, grant to the Incumbent of the said perpetual curacy of Christ Church, Harwood, and to his successors, to meet such benefaction, one other yearly sum or stipend of ten pounds, such yearly sum or stipend to be payable out of the common fund under our control, and to be calculated as from the nineteenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, and to be receivable half-yearly on the first day of May and on the first day of November in each and every year: Provided always, that if at any time lands, tithes, or other hereditaments sufficient to produce the yearly sum or stipend so payable out of our common fund as lastly herein mentioned, or any part thereof, shall be annexed by us to the said benefice in substitution for such yearly sum or stipend, or for such part thereof, our liability for the payment of such yearly sum or stipend, or of such part thereof, as the case may be, shall thereupon and thereafter cease and determine.
