WHEREAS by an Order of Her Majesty's Privy Council, bearing date the twenty-fourth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, duly issued under the authority of the Act passed in the session of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to prevent, until the first day of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty, and to the end of the then session of Parliament, the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders among sheep, cattle, and other animals," which Act has been continued until the first day of August next, and the end of the then next session of Parliament, - by divers statutes, and lastly by an Act of the last session of Parliament, it was among other things ordered, that until the first day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, all cattle brought by sea from any place out of the United Kingdom into the Metropolis should be marked as therein mentioned, and that no such cattle should be removed therefrom alive except by sea:

And whereas by a subsequent Order, bearing date the twenty-sixth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, the time so limited was extended until the Lords of the said Council should otherwise order, and certain other provisions were made in respect of cattle brought by sea from any place out of the United Kingdom and landed at any place therein:

And whereas by another Order, bearing date the twenty-seventh day of May last, it was, among other things, ordered that cattle brought from sea from any place out of the United Kingdom, except the Channel Islands and the Isle of Man, and landed at any place in England, should not be moved from the landing place where landed for the period of twelve hours from the time of landing, but should remain for such period in some lair or other proper place adjacent to such landing place to be provided for their reception, for the purpose of being in-

spected by a competent inspector, and no cattle should be landed from any vessel until such lair or other proper place should have been provided; and further that when by any Order or Orders of the Privy Council cattle brought by sea from any place out of the United Kingdom, except the Channel Islands and the Isle of Man, should be permitted to be moved to the Metropolitan Cattle Market, no such cattle should be moved to such market except by railway, and that all cattle brought by railway to such market should be discharged from the trucks in which they should have been conveyed within one thousand yards of the said Metropolitan Cattle Market, at Islington, and should be driven immediately upon being so discharged, to such market or to the lairs belonging thereto, or to such other lairs as might have been licensed by the Privy Council for the reception of such cattle:

And whereas the disease commonly termed the "Cattle Plague" still exists in certain parts of England:

And whereas it is expedient that certain other regulations should be made in regard to foreign cattle moved to the Metropolitan Cattle Market:

Now, therefore, the Lords of the Council do hereby further order as follows:—

1. When any cattle intended for sale in the said market shall be brought by sea as aforesaid into the port of London, and shall be landed at any wharf or other landing-place within the said port, and shall have remained in the lair or other proper place as aforesaid for the period above mentioned, and shall have been duly inspected as aforesaid, and shall have been pronounced by the Inspector to be free from disease, the same may, by a licence to be granted by the Lords of Her Majesty's Council, upon such terms or conditions as the said Lords shall deem satisfactory, be moved by water, but not otherwise, to some other wharf or landing-place within the said port of London, and removed therefrom to the said market, in accordance with the provisions contained in the said Order of the twenty-seventh day of May last.

2. No cattle shall be moved to the said market after being so landed at such last-mentioned wharf or landing place, except in conformity with this Order.

3. The words herein contained shall be construed as in the said Order of the twenty-fourth

day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, and all the provisions therein contained, relative to the offences for the contravention thereof, and the penalty for the same, and in respect of the powers of officers employed under it, and all other provisions of that Order, and the subsequent Orders altering it, now in force, and not inconsistent with anything herein contained, shall in respect of every matter and thing to which they shall be applicable, apply to the Regulations contained in this Order, and the enforcing the same, and the officers employed under it.

4. The Local Authority for the Metropolis shall forthwith cause this Order to be published in some newspaper circulating in the Metropolis, and also cause a copy thereof to be affixed at some conspicuous place in the said Metropolitan Cattle Market at Islington; and the Commissioners of Police for the Metropolis and the City of London shall cause a copy thereof to be affixed at some conspicuous place at each police station in their respective districts.

six, markets may be held, with the licence of the Lords of the said Council, for the sale of animals, whether intended for immediate slaughter or otherwise, in any county in England and Wales, provided that no such licence shall be granted unless their Lordships shall be satisfied that no case of cattle plague has occurred in the county where such market is to be held, within one calendar month prior to the date of such licence nor unless the market is situated at a distance exceeding ten miles from any place declared to be infected according to the provisions of the said Order of the twenty-fourth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six; and in such recited Order of the seventh day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, it is provided that no licence shall be granted under that Order permitting any market to be held in any port or other place into which animals are imported from any country not part of the United Kingdom:

Now, therefore, the Lords of the Council do, by this their Order, set forth and define the part of the said port at which cattle brought by sea from any place out of the United Kingdom, may be landed, in manner following, that is to say:

All that yard situate between Cumberland Basin and the River Avon, bounded on the south side by a road and towing-path adjoining the River Avon, and on the north, east, and west sides by land, the property of the Dock Estate of the city of Bristol:

And the said Lords do hereby further order that all cattle brought by sea from any place out of the United Kingdom, so landed at the port of Bristol, shall be slaughtered within such part of the said port as defined as aforesaid, and not elsewhere; and that no cattle brought within such part of the said port shall be removed therefrom alive:

And further, that all the regulations of the said Order of the twenty-fourth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, now in force, and not inconsistent herewith, shall apply to this Order; and that any contravention of any provision herein contained shall be deemed to be an offence within the operation of the said Order of the twenty-fourth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, and be punishable as therein provided:

And further, that the said Mayor, Aldermen and Burgesses of the city of Bristol, shall publish this Order by causing a copy thereof to be advertised in some newspaper circulating in the said city, and by causing a copy thereof to be affixed in some conspicuous place of the port aforesaid.

And the said Lords do hereby further order, that all cattle brought by sea from any place out of the United Kingdom, so landed at the port of Sunderland, shall be slaughtered within such part of the said port as defined as aforesaid, and not elsewhere; and that no cattle brought within such part of the said port shall be removed therefrom alive:

And further, that all the regulations of the said Order of the twenty-fourth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, now in

THE Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs has received, from Her Majesty's Minister at Florence, a Decree, of which the following is a translation:—

“The Minister of the Interior, in consequence of several cases of cholera which have happened in the town of Palermo and in its suburbs, decrees that vessels which, from to-day, leave the ports and landing-places of the Gulf of Palermo, will be considered as having foul bills of health for cholera, and will be subjected to the quarantine of fifteen days established by the Royal Decree of the 29th of April last, although their passage should not have been marked by the appearance of any case.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(No. 39.)—UNITED STATES—COAST OF TEXAS.

Fixed Light at Aransas Pass.

THE United States Government has given notice, that on and after the 15th day of June 1867, a light would be exhibited from the lighthouse on Low island, inside of Aransas Pass, coast of Texas.

The light is a *fixed* white light, at an elevation of 64 feet above the mean level of the sea, and should be seen in clear weather at a distance of 12 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses, of the fourth order.

The tower is brick. The light when bearing N.W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. will be seen between the two points of the Pass; but as the bar frequently shifts, no directions can be given for crossing without a Pilot.

NEW JERSEY.

Light near the Entrance to Little Egg Harbour.

Also, that on and after the 20th day of June 1867, the light at Tuckers beach, near the entrance to Little Egg harbour, coast of New Jersey, will be re-established.

The light is a *fixed* light varied by a *flash* every *minute*, and should be seen in clear weather at a distance of 12 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is of the fourth order.

The tower is white, and stands in lat. $39^{\circ}30'18''$ N. and long. $74^{\circ}16'48''$ West of Greenwich.

Fixed Light on East Point.

The light will be a *fixed* white light, at an elevation of 130 feet above the level of high water, and in clear weather should be seen at the distance of 18 miles.

The tower is octagonal, white, 60 feet high from base to vane, and stands 200 yards in shore from

the south side of the point and in lat. $46^{\circ}27'9''$ N., long. $61^{\circ}58'15''$ West of Greenwich.
