By the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

PRESENT,

Lord President. Lord Robert Montagu.

HEREAS by Orders of the Lords of Her WW Majesty's Privy Council, bearing date the twenty-fourth day of March and the eleventh day of April, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six respectively, reciting certain provisions of the Act of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and seven, which has been continued by divers Acts, and lastly by an Act of the last session of Parliament, until the first day of August next, and the end of the then next session of Parliament, and the appearance and prevalence of a contagious and infectious disorder, generally designated the "Cattle Plague," amongst cattle in England and Wales, and sundry other matters, the said Lords did, in exercise of the powers given by the said Act so continued as aforesaid, make divers rules and regulations, and did, among other things, order that until the first day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixtysix, all cattle brought by sea from any place out of the United Kingdom into any town or place in England and Scotland should be marked, by clipping the hair off the end of the tail; and that no such cattle should be removed alive from such town or place, except by sea:

And whereas by a subsequent Order bearing date the twenty-sixth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, the time so limited was extended until the Lords of the said Council should otherwise order, and certain other provisions were made in respect of cattle brought by sea from any place out of the United Kingdom and landed at any place therein:

And whereas the disease commonly termed the "Cattle Plague" still exists in certain parts of England:

And whereas it is expedient that further regulations should be made in regard to the marking of such cattle so brought by sea and landed at any place in Great Britain:

Now therefore the Lords of the Council do hereby further order as follows:—

- 1. All cattle brought by sea from any place out of the United Kingdom, except the Channel Islands and the Isle of Man, and landed at any place in Great Britain, shall, within twelve hours of such landing, in addition to being so marked as aforesaid, be branded by the owner or person landing the same in such manner as the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Customs shall from time to time direct.
- 2. This Order shall be construed in like manner as the said Orders of the twenty-fourth day of March and the eleventh day of April, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six; and any person who shall have in his or her possession, or on whose premises there may be found any such cattle so branded, in contravention of the provisions of any Order of the Lords of the said Council, shall be deemed to be guilty of an offence against the said Orders of the twenty-fourth day of March and the eleventh day of April, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six respectively, and be punishable as therein provided.
- 3. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.
- 4. This Order shall take effect on and after the first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven.
