**A** DECREE, of which the following is a translation, issued by the Brazilian Government, has been received at the Foreign Office, embodying the Customs and Police Regulations to be observed on the opening of the River Amazon to Foreign Shipping, from the 7th instant:—

DECREE of 31st July, 1867.

*Orders for observance of Regulations for the Navigation of the River Amazonas and its confluent, and of the River San Francisco.*

IN consideration of Article 5 of the Decree of 7th December, 1866, and having before me the Article 172 of the Regulation of 19th September, 1860,

It is my will to command that, in the navigation of the River Amazonas and its confluent, and of the River San Francisco, the regulation below be observed, signed by Zacharias de Goés e Vasconcellos, of my Council, Senator of the Empire, President of the Council of Ministers, Minister and Secretary of State for Finance, and President of the Tribunal of the Treasury. Let him so have understood it and cause it to be executed.

*Regulations for the Navigation of the River Amazonas and its confluent, and of the River San Francisco.*

ART. 1. The navigation from 7th September, 1867, forward, shall be open to merchant vessels of all nations:—

- 1st. Of the River Amazonas, as far as the village of Tabatinga (Art. 3, sole §).
- 2nd. Of the River Tocantins, as far as the city of Cameté.
- 3rd. Of the River Tapajoz, as far as the city of Santarem.
- 4th. Of the River Madeira, as far as the town of Borba.
- 5th. Of the River Negro, as far as the city of Manaós.
- 6th. Of the River San Francisco, as far as the city of Penedo. (Decree of 7th December, 1866).

ART. 2. The merchant vessels of any nation, or wheresoever they may come from, and which may be seeking a port of the Empire in the Amazonas and its confluent, may either enter by the bar of Pará or by the principal mouth of said river, following either of the two channels between Macapá and Caviana Island, and between that of Mexiana and of Marajó (Arts. 31 and 36).

ART. 3. For the navigation and commerce of the River Amazonas and others, to which Art. 1 refers, the collectories of revenue of Manaós in the River Negro, and of Penedo in the River San Francisco, become raised to the category of custom-houses, and the following custom-houses established:—

- 1st. Of Cameté, in the River Tocantins.
- 2nd. Of Santarém, in the River Tapajoz.
- 3rd. Of Borba, in the River Madeira.
- 4th. Of San Paulo de Olivença, in the River Amazonas (Solimões).

§ The custom-house of San Paulo de Olivença shall be transferred to Tabatinga, the collectory of revenues established by Art. 5 of Decree No. 3216, of 31st December, 1863, being extinct as soon as, in conformity with Art. 3 of the Decree of 7th December, 1866, the convention on the fiscal and police regulations in the waters of the Amazonas (Solimões), from the mouth of the Javary as far as the place called Santo Antonio, on the frontier of the empire bounding Perú, shall be celebrated.

ART. 4. The Custom-houses now established shall have the same attributions as the others of the Empire as to the commerce of importation and exportation of foreign merchandize, and of that of produce of the country, and of national industry and manufacture, the dispositions of this Decree being preserved.

ART. 5. In virtue of the disposition of the preceding Article, the dispatch may be made in the said custom-houses,—

- 1st. Of importation of foreign goods, and of national produce, industry, or manufacture.
- 2nd. Of re-exportation, or shifting from one vessel to another, of foreign goods.
- 3rd. Of exportation of foreign goods which have already paid duties; and
- 4th. Of the exportation of goods, the produce, industry, or manufacture of the country.

Sec. 1. The re-exportation and shifting from one vessel to the other of foreign goods, from one port to the other of the Empire, in the Amazonas

and its confluent, is not permitted, except to those ports in which there is a custom-house (Law of 18th September, 1845, Art. 25; Regulation of the Customs of 19th September, 1860, Art. 621).

Sec. 2. The merchandize already dispatched for consumption, in said Custom-houses, and which has, for any motive whatever, to go on to the Custom-house of Pará, or to any other port not in the Amazonas, shall previously satisfy the amount of the abatement which, at the time of their shipment or the delivery of their permit takes place, in conformity with Art. 40, this item of payment being entered on the respective dispatch. In the case of the want of a declaration in the custom-house or collectory of inward revenue, the difference shall be collected in a double ratio.

ART. 6. Depôts (warehouses for deposits) shall be established in the Custom-houses of Manãos, Borba, and Tabatinga (Art. 3, sole §), as soon as the conventions on limits and fiscal and police regulations to which Art. 3 of Decree of 7th December, 1866, refers, shall be celebrated.

The entry of goods in the custom-house warehouses may take place in the following cases;—

1st. Of direct importation by sea, or by the inward waters of the Provinces of Amazonas or Pará, in conformity with the treaties and conventions, and the fiscal regulations expedited for their being put in execution (Reg. cit. Art. 164).

2nd. Of transference from one Custom-house warehouse to another (Reg. cit. Art. 216).

3rd. Of importation of national goods dispatched in any of the fluvial Custom-houses; this disposition extending to the Custom-house warehouses of Pará.

Sec. 1. The Custom-house warehouses shall, as far as receiving import duties, be like to foreign territory; consequently the merchandize may, during the allotted time, be freely, either all or part of them:—

1st. Re-exported, in transit to ports in boundary States, or transported to other Custom-house depôts, the national Custom-house, or foreign port, without paying duties.

2nd. Dispatched for consumption, paying the respective duties.

Sec. 2. The merchandize, for the favour of the preceding Article, does not depend on the declaration in the manifest of the vessel, in order to be consigned to the depôt; the declaration of the owners or consignees of the goods is sufficient, on their entering the depôt.

Sec. 3. The President of the Province of Amazonas, upon the representation of the Inspectors of Customs, and instruction from the Treasury, shall designate the warehouses for the deposit of merchandize, and shall name the administrators of said depôts.

Sec. 4. The said President of the Province of Amázonas, consulting the Inspector of the Treasury and the Inspectors of the Customs, may, if necessary, authorize, besides the public depôt, private depôts; the concession depending, but without suspension of effect, on the approval of the Government.

Sec. 5. In all else which has reference to the concession of depôts, the entry, deposit, and going out of merchandize, their administration and responsibility, the dispositions of the regulations of the Customs, and of the Decree No. 3,217, of 31st December, 1863, shall be observed.

ART. 7. The Collectory of Revenue of Villa Nova, on the right bank of the River San Fran-

cisco, Province of Sergipe, besides the dispatch of imported goods, the product, industry, or manufacture both of the country and foreign, which have already paid duties, becomes qualified for exportation of national produce, either within or from out of the empire.

Sec. 1. The same station may equally admit the dispatching, national, or foreign vessels which may arrive loaded with foreign merchandize, free of duty.

Sec. 2. When vessels carry besides the merchandize mentioned in the preceding Article, others also of foreign origin, these shall be first dispatched in the Custom-house of Penedo, and shall go on afterwards with those whose dispatch can be made in the said collectory of revenues, each vessel receiving on board a guard of the said Custom-house, who shall accompany it to the port of Villa Nova.

Sec. 3. The collectory of revenue shall be considered of the second order; its administrator and the clerk shall receive the percentage which the President of the Province, the Treasury being consulted, shall award to them, being subject to the approval of the Government; and the two guards, who may be employed in that service, the daily pay fixed by the regulations of the Customs.

ART. 8. The importation of foreign goods for consumption, deposit, or transit, and the exportation of the produce, industry, and manufacture of the country to foreign ports, or of foreign merchandize already dispatched for consumption, or in deposit or transit, cannot be effected in the River Amazonas and its confluent, or in the River San Francisco, save in ports qualified by the present decree (Reg. cit., Art. 315).

Sec. 1. Under extraordinary circumstances and in the interest of public health and safety, the Presidents of the Provinces of Amazonas, Pará, and Alagoas, upon immediately informing the Government, may temporarily prohibit the importation, deposit, or transit, and the exportation or going out of certain foreign merchandize, or produce, manufacture, or industry of the country, in one or more of the ports or places mentioned, and their circulation within a certain and determined zone of the frontiers of the empire (Reg. cit., Art. 315, Sec. 2).

Sec. 2. The infraction of any of the dispositions aforesaid shall be punished by the seizure of the merchandize, loss of the vessels which may have directly served for its fraudulent importation, exportation, or transference from one vessel to another, and fine equal to two-thirds of the value of the merchandize (Reg. cit., Art. 315, Sec. 3).

Sec. 3. The penalties mentioned in the preceding paragraph extend to every attempt of fraudulent importation, exportation, or transshipment from one vessel to another, which may have been shewn by outward acts or commencement of execution, frustrated by fortuitous circumstances, or independent of the will of the party.

ART. 9. To the penal dispositions of Secs. 2 and 3 of the preceding Article are subject:—

Sec. 1. Foreign vessels of every description, tonnage, flag, or from whatever port soever.

1st. Which may be found anchored or alongside, in the act of discharging or transhipping, or receiving cargo, or after having discharged or transhipped part or the whole of the cargo, or received cargo in any port not qualified, or merely so for the coasting trade, or practising such acts clandestinely, in small bays, or in other territorial waters of the empire.

2nd. Which may navigate or be found loaded, or without cargo, in rivers, lakes, and inland waters of the empire, in contravention of this decree.

Sec. 2. The national vessels of any description, tonnage, or from whatever port soever.

1st. Which may be found in the act of discharging or transhipping foreign merchandize receiving or transhipping merchandize of any country for foreign ports, in ports not qualified or merely so for coasting trade, or practising such acts clandestinely in small bays and territorial waters of the empire.

2nd. Which may carry merchandize by the rivers, lakes, and internal waters of the Empire, in contravention of this Decree (Reg. cit. Art. 316, Secs. 1st and 2nd.)

ART. 10. From the dispositions of the preceding Article are excepted :

1st. Cases in which vessels are forced to put in, their becoming stranded, or the act of God.

2nd. In case of permission from competent authority.

3rd. The foreign vessels belonging to boundary States, who have special conventions and treaties, in virtue of their stipulations, navigate or be found in the rivers, lakes, and interior waters of the Empire, in the terms and conditions established and regulated therein : and

4th. The foreign vessels (Art. 9th, Sec. 1, No. 2) which are destined to some fluvial port, in the form prescribed by the present Decree (Reg. cit. Art. 317).

ART. 11. The permission referred to in No. 2 of the preceding Article, may be granted equally to foreign as to national vessels :

Sec. 1. In extraordinary cases of famine, plague, and others, in which some of the people in the interior may want succour.

Sec. 2. For the loading and discharging of things belonging to the public administration.

Sec. 3. For the disembarkation of colonists or of passengers, and their baggage.

Sec. 4. For the loading and discharging foreign merchandize, which shall have already paid duties of consumption.

Sec. 5. For loading, to go out of the Empire, produce, the industry or manufacture of the country, or of the boundary states (Reg. cit. Art. 318, 512, Secs. 27 and 625, Sec. 4th).

ART. 12. The concession of permission of Art. 10, No. 2, belongs to the Inspectors of Customs, who should immediately give notice of the same (being granted) to the Inspectors of Treasuries, and these to the Presidents.

Sole Sec. The Inspectors of the Customs, having a suspicion of fraud, and according to the place in the fluvial waters to which the vessel is bound, may, in case of 5th Sec. of Art. 11, demand of the owners or consignees of the vessel a proper guarantee for the probable amount of duties of exportation of the produce of the country.

ART. 13. The permission for the acts mentioned in Art. 11 may be granted to vessels which, having given entry in the ports of the Empire, intend proceeding to any port, not only of the River Amazonas and its confluent, as far as Tabatinga (Art. 3, sole Sec.), in which there is no Custom-house, but also :

1st. Of the River Tocantins, beyond Cameté ;

2nd. Of Hingú to Porto do Moz and beyond it ;

3rd. Of Tapajoz, beyond Santarém ;

4th. Of Madeira and its confluent, as far as the Falls of Santo Antonio ;

5th. Of the Purús and its confluent, as far as Hyapuá ;

6th. Of the River Negro and its confluent, as far as Santa Isabel,—in the River Branco, as far as the first waterfall ;

7th. Of Japurá, as far as Santo Antonio de Maripi ;

8th. Of San Francisco, beyond Penedo.

ART. 14. The vessels which shall have obtained permission, mentioned in Art. 11, Sec. 5, ought to legalize their manifests of exportation of the produce and manufacture of the country in the fluvial Custom-house which is most convenient to them ; although it may not be the one which granted the permit aforesaid.

Sec. 1. The Chief of the Fiscal Department who shall legalize the manifest, not belonging to the Custom-house which shall have granted the permit, shall notify the same to whom it may concern.

Sec. 2. The duties shall be paid on sight of the permits and documents expedited by the stations, agencies, and places of fiscalization, or general or provincial registries ; or, should there be none in the place, according to the declaration of the owner or consignee of the merchandize, the Custom-house, however, in this case, will be free, should there be any suspicion of fraud, to verify the correctness of the said declarations.

Sec. 3. In the absence of stations, agencies, and posts of fiscalization or registries, the vessels shall receive one or more guards on board, to take note of the goods shipped, their quantity and quality, and everything else necessary for the collecting the duties exactly in the port at which the manifest has to be legalized.

Sec. 4. It shall be permitted at the ports where there may be a Custom-house, preceding despatch for exportation, and in the presence of an officer, tranship the national merchandize, or that of boundary states from coasting craft, which bring it from ports in the interior to the vessels which have to carry it out of the Empire.

ART. 15. The carrying of merchandize of whatever country soever, from one to another fluvial port, from these to that of Pará, and vice versa, or from the fluvial to other ports of the Empire, can only be done in national vessels, except :

Sec. 1. Of goods belonging to the cargo of a foreign vessel :

1st. Which having given entry in "franquia" in a qualified port, goes on to another before the time of "franquia" expires.

2nd. Which having given full entry in one port goes on to another different one, with all or part of her cargo despatched for consumption or re-exportation ; and

3rd. Which carries colonists or passengers with which she may have come in with all their baggage.

Sec. 2. Of any merchandize whatever :

1st. In case of internal or external war, and of the ART. 43 of the law of 17th September, 1851.

2nd. In the cases of famine or plague, or of prompt succour to some settlers of the inters.

3rd. Of the cargoes or salvage of wrecked vessels.

Sec. 3. Of baggage of the passengers of the vessel which brings them.

Sec. 4. Of foreign merchandize dispatched for consumption or for re-exportation, and the produce, industry, and manufacture of the country in vessels, which having carried colonists or goods to some fluvial point after obtaining clearance, are bound to another to receive cargo to be carried out of the Empire.

Sec. 5. Of merchandise mentioned in the preceding Sec., their being no Brazilian vessel to carry it from one to the other port in which are customs, and of national merchandize in return for the same ports, or out of the Empire.

ART. 16. The carriage of the merchandize in the case of Sec. 2, No. 1, of the foregoing Article depends on the permission of the President of the province, and in the other cases of the same paragraph, and following ones, of the inspectors of customs, who will notify the same to the inspectors of the treasuries, and these to the presidents.

ART. 17. The merchandize, which in convention to Arts. 15 and 16 be transported from one to another fluvial port in a foreign vessel, shall be treated as though they came from foreign ports, even though they be national, and, not being such, even though they have paid duties of consumption.

Sole Sec. Respecting vessels which may receive such goods in ports not qualified, the disposition in Art. 8, Secs. 2 and 3, shall be observed.

ART. 18. The places, besides the qualified ports, for direct traffic, with which vessels may communicate with the land directly, or by means of small vessels, to

1st. Repair, in consequence of damage sustained during the voyage, or to avoid loss or any injury from the act of God.

2nd. Provide themselves with provisions or receive fuel, shall be, besides Chaves and Macapa :

1st. Breves.	} In the Province of Pará.
2nd. Gurupá.	
3rd. Almeirim.	
4th. Prainha.	
5th. Monte Alegre.	
6th. Obidos.	

7th. Villa Bella	} In the Province of Amazonas.
8th. Serpa	
9th. Codajoz	
10th. Coary	
11th. Fonte-Boa	
12th. Teffé	
13th. Tocanting	

14th. S. Paulo de Olivença, after the Custom-house, shall be transferred therefrom to Tabatinga, in conformity with Art. 3rd, sole sec.

Sec. 1. The Government not having a treaty or convention to the contrary, may augment or suppress the ports, of which this Article treats, as it may judge convenient.

Sec. 2. The authorities, agencies, posts of fiscalization, or registries in the ports of call (escala), have the right to demand of vessels the exhibition of their ships papers, and ought to "visé" gratis the manifest, list of passengers, and the pass of the Custom-house or registry (Art. 36) at which they had previously touched.

Sec. 3. The touching at the ports (scala) shall not delay the vessel longer than necessary for the object which gave motive to it.

Sec. 4. The vessels may, in the said ports, with permission to do so, and through giving necessary sureties —

1st. Discharge the baggage of colonists or passengers ;

2nd. Discharge or transfer to another vessel a part or all the cargo, for repairs or deposit, or which they are obliged to dispose of in case of necessity ;

3rd. Provision themselves with any kind of thing, or receive combustible ;

4th. Complete their cargo for foreign market, in conformity with Arts. 11 and 14.

Sec. 5. Besides the necessary provisions (Reg. cit., Art. 475), the wood and other merchandize of the country for the construction and repairs of vessels, and their disbursements shall not pay duty, observing, nevertheless, the indispensable fiscal caution in the embarkation of the same.

This disposition remains dependent on the approval of the legislative power.

Sec. 6. In the places of call (escala) in which there may be no collectories of general revenue, there shall be agencies, posts of fiscalization, or registries, according as it may be most convenient, in conformity with Art. 32.

Sec. 7. In the ports where there are collectories of general revenue, these shall observe in the part which concerns them, the present Decree and the regulations of the Customs for the prevention of smuggling.

ART. 19. The manifests and certificates in the ports of call (escala) of which Art. 18 treats, shall be substituted by declarations of the commanders of the vessels "visés" by the authorities mentioned in Art. 24 (Reg. cit., Art. 402).

ART. 20. The term allowed for the presenting of the document justifying the destination of the merchandize re-exported, transhipped, or despatched for transit by the River Amazonas, shall be fixed by the chief of the fiscal department, according to the situation and distance of the port of departure and the ports of destination (Reg. cit., Art. 614, and following).

ART. 21. The produce of the States which bound the Province of Amazonas brought through the interior of said province, and of those of Pará and Mato Grosso, shall be considered national (Reg. cit., Art. 512, Sec. 27 ; Art. 625, Secs. 1 and 4).

Sole Sec. The disposition of Art. 514 of the regulations of the Customs, which authorizes the Government, in case it think fit, there being no treaty or convention to the contrary, to subject said merchandize to the payment of duties of consumption, remains in force.

ART. 22. Whatever destination foreign merchandize already dispatched for consumption may have, it should be accompanied by a duplicate note of the despatch given by the export department of the Customs, which shall serve as a permit to the fiscal department of the port from whence it came, in conformity with Art. 33, sole sec. of Decree, No. 3,217, of 31st December, 1863.

Sec. 1. There being a Custom-house or Collectory of Revenue at the port of destination, the Art. 628, Sec. 3, 629 and 633 of the Regulations of the Customs shall be followed in conformity.

Sec. 2. There being no Custom-house or Collectory of Revenue, the said permits shall be given up to the receiving-house agency, post of fiscalization, or registry general or provincial which may exist there, in order to proceed in conformity with the preceding paragraph.

ART. 23. Produce of the country carried from fluvial ports, where there is a Custom-house or Collectory of Revenue, to others of the same or a different province, shall be accompanied by a permit passed by the fiscal department of the

port from whence it came, the disposition of Art. 628, Sec. 1, of the Regulations of the Customs should be observed, and the permit delivered to the authorities designated in Sec. 2 of the preceding Article.

Sole Sec. The disposition of Art. 615 of the regulations cited, remains without prejudice, the which shall be applied to the vessels which may be destined to ports of the Empire out of the River Amazonas; the Inspectors of the Customs may also apply it, in case of suspicion of fraud, to those who are destined to ports within the Amazonas and its confluent.

ART. 24. National merchandize carried from fluvial ports, where there are no Custom-houses or Collectory of Revenue, to others of the same or different province, shall be accompanied by a permit, with the declarations of the quantity, quality, port of procedure, and destination of the merchandize, passed and signed by the owner, or consignee, administrator of the factory, establishment, or estate, "viséd" by the collectory, agency, post of fiscalization, registry, or any other authority, general or provincial, or in the absence of this, by the same in the first port at which it touches.

ART. 25. Vessels which cannot continue on their voyage, on account of damage or other fortuitous and extraordinary accident, may discharge all or part of their cargo away from fluvial qualified ports.

Sec. 1. The Captains of vessels shall previously direct themselves—save in case of imminence of danger—to the fiscal authority, whatever be his category; in his absence, to the police authority, or to any other local (authority); in their absence, to those of the nearest place, even though it be of a different district, subjecting himself to the measures and precautions which may, to prevent any clandestine importations, be taken by the said authorities in conformity with the laws of the Empire.

Sec. 2. In every case, the jurisdiction of the Commercial Judge of the district, for the acts committed under them, is preserved to him.

Sec. 3. The imminent danger, foreseen in Sec. 1 of this Article, only exempts from previous personal presentation to the local authorities of whom the said Article treats; the Commanders of vessels, in every case, being obliged to prove by a declaration the motive of the necessity of putting in, or of the measures they may have taken, according to their judgment, for the salvation of the ship and cargo, and to exhibit the papers of the ship, proceeding in respect to these documents in conformity with Art. 18, Sec. 2.

Sec. 4. The goods and merchandize, which in the case of fortuitous and extraordinary accidents mentioned, may be discharged, shall not pay any duty, whether they be carried in the same ship or in small vessels, save when sold for consumption, in conformity with the dispositions in vigor (Reg. cit. Arts. 327 and 328); but all discharge, or attempt at discharge, of goods and merchandize without previous authorization, or without the formalities prescribed, shall be subject, in conformity with circumstances, to a fine of 10,000 to 100,000 per package, or to those of smuggling, proceeding for that purpose to seizure, in conformity with Chapters 1 and 2, of Tit. 8th of the Regulations of the Customs.

ART. 26. The ordinary transshipments on account of damage, or which may be temporarily necessary by reason of any other unforeseen event, shall not be accounted either an act of discharge or of loading, provided they are effected without touching the

banks of the rivers, and be made under the strict vigilance of the authorities to which Sec. 1 of the preceding Article.

Sec. 1. If the hatches or places of deposit of the cargo shall have been sealed up, the commander of the ship, in the cases aforesaid, should previously, if possible, address himself to the said authorities to cause the seals to be broken, and submit to the measures which they may judge necessary in order to prevent smuggling.

Sec. 2. The merchandize so transhipped should be re-embarked on board the same ship.

ART. 27. In the case of shipwreck or other disaster, all and every person in authority, whether civil or military, political or fiscal, general, provincial, or municipal, in the place, or in that nearest thereto, should give all the assistance in their power, as much for the salvation of the lives, ship, and cargo as the gathering together and depositing the goods saved, endeavouring to prevent plunder and malversation, and proceeding in conformity with the laws in force, especially with those of the Commercial Code and of the regulations of the Customs, Art. 331.

Sec. 1. The jurisdiction of the commercial judge, in every case, is reserved to him in those acts which belong to him.

Sec. 2. The goods and merchandize discharged or saved shall not pay any duty, except when sold for consumption, in conformity with the Commercial Code and Regulations of the Customs, Art. 336, secs. 3 and 9, 10, 11; and Art. 338.

ART. 28. The Custom-houses established by the present Decree shall have the employés, and these the salaries, as per annexed table.

ART. 29. Each one of the said Custom-houses shall have at its disposal, for out-door service and fluvial police, a watch boat or boats, launches, or small vessels, according as the President of the Province may judge necessary, the treasury being consulted in the matter, manned and armed with the same number of men, like wages and duties as the vessels of the Customs as per respective regulation.

Art. 30. The Presidents of the Provinces of Amazonas, Pará, and Alagoás, the treasury as well as the Inspectors of Customs, having been consulted, shall point out the boundaries of the jurisdiction of the fluvial Custom-houses.

Sole Sec. Notwithstanding the boundaries being pointed out, the jurisdiction of the Customs of the Empire being cumulative (Reg. Cit., Art. 363), the authorities charged with the fiscal police, with the force which aids it in its duties, as likewise the watch-boats, may enter another district to repress smuggling; but the seizure being made, it shall be delivered to the Custom-house which may be nearest to the place for the ulterior steps of the process.

ART. 31. There shall be a register of armed vessels, furnished with small boats necessary for the service, not only in the ports of Pará and Tabatingá (Art. 3; Sole Sec.), as also on the great shoal above Gurupá, in the channel of Macapá, wherever most convenient, and facing the town of Chaves, in the island of Marajó.

ART. 32. Besides the Register of Art. 31, the Presidents of the provinces of Amazona, Pará, and Alagoás, the treasuries being consulted, shall establish other registers, guards, posts, and preventive stations, charged with the fiscal police, subject to the jurisdiction of the respective Custom-houses in the places where they may deem it necessary.

Sec. 1. The said presidents, the treasuries being consulted, as also the inspectors of customs, shall give the necessary instructions to the posts and registers, communicating the same to the Government for final approval.

Sec. 2. These registers, guards, posts, and fiscal watchmen, as well as those to which Art. 18, sec. 2, refers, not having stations where the general revenue is collected, should be intrusted to the stations, registers, guards, and posts of the fiscal police of the provinces, commanders of detachments, post office agencies, or any other general or provincial authorities existing in the places mentioned.

ART. 33. In the registers of Macapá, Chaves, and Tabatinga there shall be a force of troops of the line, or of the police corps, composed of the number of officers and privates which may be designated by the Presidents of Pará and Amazonas, which force shall make it their duty to assist the said registers in the execution of their fiscal regulations.

ART. 34. The civil, judicial, military, and other authorities of whom Art. 263 of the Customs' Regulations treats, are especially charged with the fiscal police in the waters and on the banks of the River Amazonas and its confluents, and of the River St. Francisco, in the words of 349 assisting the fiscal departments in the execution of its duties, and carrying out and causing to be carried out the present decree and the regulation cited, in the part which concerns them.

Sole Sec. The same obligations are incumbent on pilots and experienced seamen of the country, who from the moment they get on board the vessels shall be considered as employés of the customs, and as such subject to the duties and penalties which the law imposes on them.

ART. 35. The employés charged with the fiscal police, in conformity with Art. 57 of the regulation, may, to prevent or verify fraud, of which there is well grounded suspicion, demand not only of the commanders of the vessels, as also of the masters of the small barks, covered launches, canoes, and other vessels of small dimensions, of the former the ship's papers and manifests, and of the latter the dockets of the cargo which they carry, verifying their nationality from whence they came, and their destination and what more be required. This act, however, ought to be done in such a manner as not to cause the slightest vexation or hindrance to lawful commerce.

ART. 36. The vessels which have to navigate to the ports of the empire in the River Amazonas and its confluents, or which have to leave them for the ocean, are obliged to (go to) the register:—

First. In the port of Pará or in Macapá, or in Chaves (Arts 2 and 31), according to the destination they may have entering or going to the ocean.

Second. In Tabatinga (Art 31) entering from the ports of Peru, or going to them.

Sec. 1. The vessels should lay to on approaching the aforementioned registers, being lawful to do so without anchoring; and those which refuse to stop at the register shall be compelled to do so by the guard boats, which shall use force, if necessary, the respective commanders being subject to a fine of 100\$000 to 1,000\$000 according to the burden of the vessel and nature of the cargo.

Sec. 2. The registers of which this Article treats, fulfilling the obligations of the fiscal regulations, shall advise the Custom-houses, under whose orders they serve, of the entry and depar-

ture of ships, of the examinations and searches which they had made in cases of well-founded suspicion of the correctness of the manifests, of the seizures they may have made, and of all the movements which shall have taken place.

Sec. 3. The said registers, besides the obligations marked in the regulation of the Customs, Arts. 56 and 348, shall verify the nationality, from whence coming, and destination of the ship by the papers from on board, putting the visé gratis on the manifest and list of passengers, and giving to the vessel the competent pass.

Sec. 4. The pass which the preceding paragraph refers to, shall be delivered in the first Custom-house at which the vessel may touch, or to the register on going out, the respective chief should make the communications which may be necessary to whom it may concern.

Sec. 5. The said registers, according to circumstances, and it being necessary to prevent the embezzlement of duties of importation or exportation, may shut and seal up the hatches of vessels, or the places in which are deposited the merchandise, or place one or two guards on board to go on as far as is required, and also make use of both formalities conjointly.

Sec. 6. The guards to which the preceding section refers, besides what the regulation of the Customs makes incumbent on them, shall not consent to the vessels communicating with the land, load or discharge, save in cases provided for in this decree, or commit any infraction of the fiscal regulations.

Sec. 7. The commanders of the vessels shall be obliged to give lodging and food, from his own mess, to said guards, without these being allowed to demand retribution or accept any offer whatever (Reg. cit., Art. 159).

ART. 37. The dispositions of Secs. 5, 8, and 7 of the preceding Article, extend to all fluvial Custom-houses of which this decree treats.

ART. 38. The doubts which may arise, on the occasion of executing this decree and the fiscal regulations in the fluvial Custom-houses, shall be solved by the respective inspectors, by the treasuries of finance department, and by the presidents of the provinces, taking into consideration the misunderstanding of the said regulations as long as there is good faith, and the favour of the trade and navigation of the River Amazonas and others to which the decree of 7th December, 1866, refers.

Sole Sec. The decisions of the inspectors of Customs, as well as treasuries, and of presidents (Reg. cit., Arts. 8 and 13) shall be executed provisionally, immediately giving an account to the superior authority for his government and final deliberations.

ART. 39. Besides the dispositions of the preceding Articles, those of the regulation of 19th September, 1860, other fiscal regulations in the part which does not contravene, shall be observed in the Custom-houses established by this decree, and in the fluvial navigation.

ART. 40. In the Custom-houses of the Rio Amazonas and its confluents, the abatement of 20 per cent. of the amount of duties of consumption, and additional duties, shall be made, as long as they exist, of all merchandise which the Government shall not think proper to except.

This disposition shall take effect from the date of the execution of this decree until the end of the financial year 1872, 1873, and thenceforward in each financial space of time which shall follow,

5 per cent. shall be deducted in abatement, until this shall cease.

This Article depends on the legislature for approval.

ART. 41. The dispositions of this decree shall be applied immediately to Peruvian vessels, in the part in which they are more favourable than those of the Decree, No. 3216, of 31st December, 1863.

ART. 42. The conventions being celebrated with the boundary states on the fluvial police, the government, besides the regulations which may be necessary, shall expedite without delay, that of direct transit of any vessels coming from the sea to those states, and vice versâ, without opening the hatches, or transhipping the merchandize along all the extent of the Amazonas and its confluents, in the part belonging to Brazil.

The direct transit shall not be subject to any formality whatever, in relation to the Brazilian Custom-houses, save experience should shew the insufficiency of the means adopted to prevent smuggling.

These measures shall be the summary examination of the manifest and cargo in the registers of entry and departure, the police exercised on land along the margins and on the river, by means of vessels appropriated for that duty, the placing of guards on board, or sealing the hatches; these last measures may be employed singly or conjointly.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a translation of an Official Notification of certain modifications of the Harbour Dues and Bridge Tolls in the Port of Memel, a copy of which is enclosed:—

(Translation.)

In consequence of your Report of the 15th July of this year, I decree as follows:—

1st. That the port dues levied in the Harbour of Memel according to the Tariff of the 19th

April, 1844 (Code of Laws, section 120), shall be raised, from the 1st August next, per last, upon all sea-going ships and vessels entering and departing:—

When laden—On entry	...	...	4 sgr.
On departure	...	...	4 sgr.
When in ballast or empty—On entry	...	...	2 sgr.
On departure	...	...	2 sgr.

2nd. In such cases in which, in accordance with my Decree of the 13th April, 1863 (Code of Laws, page 168), under 1a and b, the reduction of the port dues in Memel to one-third of that collected in accordance with Tariff arrangements shall come into force, a reduction of only one-half of the existing port dues shall take place from the 1st of August next.

3rd. In accordance with Annex II. to the Tariff mentioned under heading I bridge tolls shall be lowered from the 1st of August next, by one-half of the hitherto prescribed rates.

Furthermore, these matters will be regulated by the stipulations in the Tariff of the 19th April, 1844, which Tariff is subject to a revision every five years.

This Decree is to be made public in the collection of laws.
