

the railway from Hartlepool to West Hartlepool, thence northward along the eastern side of the same railway for a distance of about five hundred yards, thence eastward along the southern side of the said railway to the point where the railway crosses the road from the Gas Works to the north end of the West Harbour, thence continuing in an easterly direction along the southern side of buildings abutting on the said road, to the sea at the northern end of the West Harbour at West Hartlepool, all which space is edged with green on the plan of part of the town of West Hartlepool, deposited at the Privy Council Office, a copy of which is deposited at the office of the Clerk of the Peace for the county of Durham; and do prescribe as follows:—

1. All foreign cattle landed within the said defined part of the port shall be slaughtered within four days after the landing thereof, exclusive of the day of landing, unless they are taken to a licensed market or sale within that defined part within such four days, and they shall be so taken if a market or sale is held there within the said period of four days, but if there is no such licensed market or sale within that defined part, or if no such market or sale is held there within the said period of four days, then all such foreign cattle shall be slaughtered within that defined part within the said period of four days.

2. Cattle other than foreign cattle within the said defined part shall not be removed therefrom alive.

**T**HE Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, and under and in pursuance of The Consolidated Cattle Plague Order of August, 1867, do hereby define the part of the Port of Newcastle-upon-Tyne, in the borough and county of that name, within which foreign cattle may be landed, as follows:—

All that space situate in Sandgate, within the borough of Newcastle-upon-Tyne, lying between the River Tyne and a line drawn due north from a point on the north bank of the River Tyne, at the eastern end of the Rotterdam Wharf, across the north shore to the wall forming the southern boundary of the property of the North-Eastern Railway Company, thence westward along the said boundary wall to the road called "Wide Open," thence northward for a distance of twenty yards along the wall forming the western boundary of the said Railway Company's property, thence eastward for a distance of twenty-five yards along the northern boundary of the property of the said Railway Company, thence in a straight line in a northerly direction, passing the west end of the row of houses near the railway terminus, to the northern side of St. Ann's-street, thence westward along the northern side of St. Ann's-street to the northern end of the Swirle Tenements, thence in a southerly direction in a

straight line along the east side of the Swirle Tenements, and, by a continuation of the same straight line, across the Corporation Warehouses and the Public Quay to the River Tyne, which space is edged brown on the plan of part of the town of Newcastle-upon-Tyne deposited at the Privy Council Office, a copy of which is deposited at the office of the Town Clerk of the borough of Newcastle-upon-Tyne; and do prescribe as follows:—

1. All foreign cattle landed within the said defined part of the port shall be slaughtered within four days after the landing thereof, exclusive of the day of landing, unless they are taken to a licensed market or sale within that defined part within such four days, and they shall be so taken if a market or sale is held there within the said period of four days, but if there is no such licensed market or sale within that defined part, or if no such market or sale is held there within the said period of four days, then all such foreign cattle shall be slaughtered within that defined part within the said period of four days.

2. Cattle other than foreign cattle within the said defined part shall not be removed therefrom alive.

**T**HE Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, and under and in pursuance of The Consolidated Cattle Plague Order of August, 1867, do hereby define the part of the Port of Hull, in the East Riding of the county of York, within which foreign cattle may be landed, as follows:—

All that space forming part of the town of Kingston-upon-Hull, lying between the River Humber, and a line commencing at a point on the north bank of the said river, one hundred and fifty yards west of Limekiln Creek, and running northward along the west side of Cogan-street as far as Woods-lane, thence eastward along the northern side of Woods-lane to Castle-row, thence northward along the north-west side of Castle-row to Myton-place, thence in an easterly direction along the centre of Myton-place, and along the north side of Castle-street, to the point where Castle-street is joined by Railway-street, thence northward and eastward, along the western and northern side of the Quays of the Prince's Dock, to the eastern end of St. John-street, thence across St. John-street, northward and eastward, along the western and northern boundaries of the Quays of the Queen's Dock, to the water called Old Harbour, at a point twenty-five yards to the north of the centre of the entrance to the Queen's Dock Basin, thence in a southerly direction along the centre of the water called Old Harbour, to the point where the Old Harbour joins the aforesaid River Humber, which space is coloured green on the plan of Kingston-upon-Hull deposited at the Privy Council Office, a copy of which is deposited at the office of
