THE Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs has received, from Her Majesty's Consul at Trieste, the following translations of a Letter and Government Circular, issued at Trieste, regarding sanitary measures in that port:

THE Local I. R. Lieutenancy, authorized by the I. R. Ministry of the Interior, having declared that epidemic cholera has ceased at Trieste and its vicinity, the Central Maritime Government in obedience to the orders received from the I. R. Ministry of Commerce in despatch of 20th instant, has resolved that vessels on their departure shall for the future be provided with clean bills of health.

The I. R. Central Maritime Government begs to inform the Consulate of this determination with the request that it be brought to the knowledge of its Government, in order that the restrictive measures established on account of cholera against arrivals from this port and its dependencies may be removed.

CIRCULAR of the I. R. Central Maritime Government to all the Port and Health Office organs of the Empire.

With reference to the Decrees 15 June, 12 and 29 July, 2 and 20 August, and 3rd September of this year, Nos. 4772, 5540, 6213, 6365, 6934, and 7545, the Central Maritime Government orders that the arrivals from the ports of Leghorn, Genoa, from the Port and Gulf of Naples, from the coast between Lesina and Peschiri, from that between Manfredonia and Otranto, the Gulf of Tarante, the latter included, from the ports and provinces of Palermo, Messina, and Trapani, and from the coast between Catania and Augusta, shall be admitted to free pratique, if provided with clean bills of health.

THE Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs has received, from Her Majesty's Chargé d'Affaires at Madrid, a Royal Decree, of which the following is a translation:—

## ROYAL DECREE.

In consideration of the reasons set before me by the Council of Ministers,

I decree the following:

Sole Article—The authorization granted by my Royal Decree of the 22nd August last, for the introduction of foreign wheat, and flour made from the same, is hereby prolonged until the 30th of June next, and this concession is extended to all the coasts and frontiers of the Kingdom, with the fiscal duty established by Article 2 of the said Royal Decree.
