

provinces of Friesland, Groningen, Zealand, Overysse, and that part of the province of North Holland, which is situate to the north of the River Y, parts of the said dominions belonging to His said Majesty the King of the Netherlands, and did thereby authorize any such cattle to be imported into any port or place in Great Britain, from certain ports within such provinces, as in such Orders mentioned:

And whereas Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, did, by an Order bearing date the third day of August, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, revoke, except as therein excepted, so much of the said recited Order of the twenty-seventh day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, as applied to the horns, hoofs, or raw or wet hides and skins of cattle imported from the provinces of Zealand, Overysse, and that part of the province of North Holland which is situate north of the River Y:

And whereas by an Order, bearing even date herewith, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, hath revoked, from and after the eighteenth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, so much of the said recited Order of the twenty-fourth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six as shall be then in force, except as regards the province of South Holland:

And whereas it has been represented to Her Majesty, that it is advisable that so much of the said recited Order of the twenty-seventh day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, as is now in force, should be revoked, except as aforesaid:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, doth hereby revoke, from and after the eighteenth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, so much of the said recited Order of the twenty-seventh day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, as shall be then in force, except as far as the same applies or relates to importation or introduction into the United Kingdom of such articles and things as in the said Order mentioned, from the province of South Holland

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the eleventh day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth

years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church situate at Long Marston, in the parish of Tring, in the county of Hertford, and in the diocese of Rochester.

"Whereas, at certain extremities of the said parish of Tring, and of the parish of Marsworth, in the county of Buckingham, and in the diocese of Oxford, and of the parish of Drayton Beauchamp, in the said county of Buckingham and diocese of Oxford, which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such respective parishes.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said parish of Tring, of the said parish of Marsworth, and of the said parish of Drayton Beauchamp, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church situate at Long Marston as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Thomas Legh, Bishop of the said diocese of Rochester, with the consent of the Right Reverend Samuel, Bishop of the said diocese of Oxford, and also with the consent of Stewart William Jenney, of Drayton Lodge, Drayton Beauchamp aforesaid, Esquire, and of Arthur Henry Jenney, of Great Yarmouth, in the county of Norfolk, Esquire, the patrons of the rectory of the said parish of Drayton Beauchamp (in testimony whereof the said parties have respectively signed and sealed this representation), with the consents of the dean and chapter of the cathedral church of Christ, Oxford, the patrons of the perpetual curacy of the said parish of Tring, and with the consents of the master, fellows, and scholars of the college of the Holy and Undivided Trinity, within the town and university of Cambridge, of King Henry the Eighth's foundation, the patrons of the vicarage of the said parish of Marsworth (in testimony whereof the said dean and chapter and the said master, fellows, and scholars have respectively affixed their common or corporate seals to this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Tring, of the said parish of Marsworth, and of the said parish of Drayton Beauchamp, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church situate at Long Marston aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Long Marston,' and that the right of presentation and appointment to the church of such consolidated chapelry should belong to and be exercised by the Reverend Henry Auber Harvey, the present incumbent of the said perpetual curacy of the parish of Tring aforesaid, and by his successors, incumbents of the same benefice, for ever.

We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.
