WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the eighteenth and nineteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act further to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England," it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time, to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit;

And whereas by an Order in Council of the twenty-fourth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, it was directed that burials be discontinued in the burial-ground hereinafter mentioned from the time specified in such Order, which time has since been postponed by various Orders in Council:

And whereas it seems fit that the said Order be varied:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that interments be allowed in now existing family graves in the Methodist New Connexion Chapel Burial-ground, Dukinfield, on condition that each coffin be embedded in charcoal and separately enclosed by brickwork or stonework properly cemented.

WHEREAS the Right Honourable Gathorne Hardy, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned, ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation,

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has, under the provisions of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the Metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, burials should be discontinued in the under-mentioned parishes, with the following modifications; viz.:

CIRENCESTER.—In that part of the churchyard which was in use before the year one thousand eight hundred and forty, except in now existing vaults and walled graves in which each coffin shall be separately enclosed in stone or brickwork properly cemented.

BATLEY.—Forthwith wholly in the churchyard, except in vaults and walled graves completed before the twenty-fifth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the thirty-first day of December next:

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette; and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before the said thirty-first day of December.

By the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

THE Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do hereby order as follows:—

Cattle being at any time within that part of the city of Edinburgh which forms the route between the Lothian-road Station of the Caledonian Railway and the Edinburgh Public Slaughter House, as described in two Orders of the Privy Council relative to Granton and to Leith respectively, dated the eleventh day of October, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven (along which route the removal of foreign cattle, landed at the ports of Granton and Leith respectively, is allowed by the said Orders), shall not be removed therefrom alive except into the Edinburgh Public Slaughter House, and cattle being at any time within that Slaughter House, shall not be removed therefrom alive.
