within such four days, and they shall be so taken if a market or sale is held there within the said period of four days, but if there is no such licensed market or sale within that defined part, or if no such market or sale is held there within the said period of four days, then all such foreign cattle shall be slaughtered within that defined part within the said period of four days.

2. Cattle other than foreign cattle within the said defined part shall not be removed therefrom alive.

THE Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable. Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, and under and in pursuance of The Consolidated Cattle Plague. Order of August, 1867, do hereby define the part of the Port of Dartmouth, in the county of Devon, within which foreign cattle may be landed, as föllows:

All that space occupied as a quay, wharf, or landing-place, including a shed erected for the reception and slaughter of foreign Cattle, situate on the River Dart, in the southern part of the parish of Totnes, and bounded on the north by a timber yard in the occupation of George Caunter, on the east by the River Dart, on the south by Tooley's Marsh, and on the west by a private road belonging to the said quay and marsh; all which space is coloured pink on the plan of part of the parish of Totnes deposited at the Privy Council Office, copies of which are deposited at the offices.

of the Town Clerk of the borough of Dartmouth and the Town Clerk of the borough of Totnes;

And do hereby prescribe as follows:-

- 1. All foreign cattle landed within the said defined part of the port shall be slaughtered within four days after the landing thereof, exclusive of the day of landing, unless they are taken to a licensed market or sale within that defined part within such four days, and they shall be so taken if a market or sale is held there within the said period of four days, but if there is no such licensed market or sale within that defined part, or if no such market or sale is held there within the said period of four days, then all such foreign cattle shall be slaughtered within that defined part within the said period of four days.
- 2. Cattle other than foreign cattle within the said defined part shall not be removed therefrom alive.
