

accept such leases or easements, and to enable the Corporation and such Companies or persons, or any of them, to receive rents, remunerations, tolls, and rates, for the use of such tramways, and to make bye-laws, rules, and regulations for the management and use thereof, and to confer upon the Corporation such exclusive or other rights and privileges and other powers in relation to such tramways and the sites thereof, as may be deemed expedient, and to exercise, in regard to the construction and maintenance of such tramways, all such compulsory powers of taking or using lands, streets, roads, and other property, and all such other powers as in the notices aforesaid it is stated will be applied for by the Company.

And it is intended (if need be) by such Bill No. 2, or by such clauses aforesaid, to enable the Trustees, Commissioners, Vestry, Local Board, or other authority having the control of any street or road, beyond the limits of the borough over or along which any such tramways are proposed to be laid to exercise the like powers in regard to any such tramways within their jurisdiction as are hereinbefore proposed to be conferred upon the Corporation, and to enable them to apply their funds and income and other property for such purposes and to raise money by mortgage thereof.
