now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church known as Highhead or Ivegill Chapel, situate in the chapelry of Ivegill, in the parish of Dalston, in the county of Cumberland, and in the diocese of Carlisle.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said parish of Dalston, of the parish of Hesket-in-the-Forest, in the county and diocese aforesaid, and of the parish of Saint Mary, Carlisle, in the same county and diocese, which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such respective parishes.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said parishes of Dalston, Hesket-in-the-Forest, and Saint Mary, Carlisle, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry, for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church

known as Highhead or Ivegill Chapel.

"Now, therefore, with the consents of the Honourable and Right Reverend Samuel, Bishop of the said diocese of Carlisle, as such bishop, and also as patron, in right of his see, of the vicarage of the said parish of Dalston, and of the Reverend Edmund Carr, vicar or incumbent of the same parish, and as such vicar or incumbent, the patron of the said chapelry of Ivegill, and of the dean and chapter of the cathedral church of Carlisle, as patrons both of the per-petual curacy of the said parish of Hesket-in-the-Forest, and of the perpetual curacy of the said parish of Saint Mary, Carlisle (in testimony whereof the said Samuel, Bishop of Carlisle, and the said Edmund Carr have respectively signed and sealed this representation, and the said dean and chapter have affixed their common or corporate seal to the same), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parishes of Dalston, Hesket-in-the-Forest, and Saint Mary, Carlisle, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church known as Highhead or Ivegill Chapel, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Ivegill,' and that the right of presentation and appointment to the church of such consolidated chapelry should belong to and be exercised by the said Samuel, Bishop of the said diocese of Carlisle, and by his successors, bishops of the same diocese, for ever.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Ivegill, being:—

"All that portion of the parish of Dalston, in the county of Cumberland, and in the diocese of Carlisle, which is comprised within, and is coextensive with, the limits of the township and chapelry of Ivegill, otherwise called Highhead.

"And also all that portion of the parish of

Hesket-in-the-Forest, in the county and diocese aforesaid, which is comprised within, and is co-extensive with, the limits of the township of Itonfield

"And also all that detached portion of the parish of Saint Mary, Carlisle, in the county and diocese aforesaid, which is comprised within, and is co-extensive with, the limits of the hamlet of Middlesceugh-with-Braithwaite."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore Her Majesty by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Carlisle.
