

be assigned to the said church of Saint Clement, situate in Lancaster-road West as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Archibald Campbell, Bishop of the said diocese of London, as such bishop, and also as the patron in right of his See, both of the perpetual curacy of the said district parish of Saint James, Norlands, and of the perpetual curacy of the said district parish of Saint Stephen, Hammersmith, and with the consent of Eleanor Franklin Kaye, now or late of Tonbridge Wells, Spinster, the patron of the perpetual curacy of the said new parish of Saint Mark, Notting-hill (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we humbly represent that it would in our opinion be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said district parish of Saint James, Norlands, of the said district parish of Saint Stephen, Hammersmith, and of the said new parish of Saint Mark, Notting-hill, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Clement, situate in Lancaster-road West, as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Clement, Kensington,' and that the right of presentation and appointment to the church of such consolidated chapelry should belong to and be exercised by the said Archibald Campbell, Bishop of the said diocese of London, and by his successors bishops of the same diocese for ever.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Clement, Kensington, being :—

"All that portion of the district parish of Saint James Norlands, in the county of Middlesex, and in the diocese of London, which is situate to the north of an imaginary line, commencing upon the boundary which divides the district parish of Saint Stephen, Hammersmith, in the county and diocese aforesaid, from the said district parish of Saint James, Norlands, at the junction of Kenilworth-street with Saint Ann's-road; and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the said Kenilworth-street to its extremity; and continuing thence in exactly the same direction, and in a straight line to a point upon the boundary in Pottery-lane which divides the said district parish of Saint James, Norlands, from the district parish of Saint John, Notting-hill, in the county and diocese aforesaid.

"And also all that portion of the said district parish of Saint Stephen, Hammersmith, which is situate to the east of an imaginary line, commencing upon the boundary which divides the said district parish from the parish of Hammersmith, in the county and diocese aforesaid, at a point in the centre of the bridge which carries the Uxbridge-road over the line of the West London Railway; and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the said line of railway, thereby crossing the lines of the Hammersmith and City Railway, and of the Great Western Railway to the point where the said West London Railway crosses Scrubb's-lane and

the Grand Junction Canal, which said point is situate upon the boundary which divides the said district parish of Saint Stephen, Hammersmith, from the consolidated chapelry of Saint John, Kensal-green, in the county and diocese aforesaid.

"And also all that portion of the new parish of Saint Mark, Notting-hill, in the county and diocese aforesaid, which forms part of the plot of ground known as the Saint Andrew's Church-yard, and which is bounded on the west, by the district parish of Saint James, Norlands aforesaid, and on the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the south-east and upon the north-east by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish from the said district parish, at a point in the middle of Lancaster-road; and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of such road for a distance of sixteen yards, or thereabouts, to a point opposite to the middle of the south-eastern end of the wall which divides the said church-yard from the premises occupied by the West London Iron Foundry; and extending thence north-westward to and along the said division wall for a distance of twenty-five yards, or thereabouts, to the boundary which divides the said new parish from the said district parish as aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twenty-eighth day of November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Augustine, situate in the parish of South Hackney,
