

tion, one month before such representation is so considered; provided also, that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish:

And whereas the Right Honourable Gathorne Hardy, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes herein-after mentioned, ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representations, has made representations stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that interments in the same should be discontinued with the modifications hereinafter specified:

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the fourth day of November last, to give notice of such representations, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the eighteenth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any of the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials in the said parishes shall be discontinued (except as is herein otherwise directed), as follows; viz.:

EAST DEREHAM.—Forthwith wholly in the parish church and Baptist and Independent Chapels, and after the thirtieth of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, in the churchyard, except in such vaults and walled graves as may be constructed in now unoccupied ground, and in now existing vaults and walled graves which are free from water, and in which each coffin shall be entombed, that is, enclosed in stonework or brickwork properly cemented, and that in the meantime burial shall be discontinued in vaults and graves which are not free from water. Also interment in the Baptist and Independent burial-grounds to be forthwith discontinued, except in now existing vaults and walled graves in which each coffin shall be entombed, and except in earthen graves not less than five feet deep, which can be opened without the disturbance of remains or exposure of coffins.

MELTON MOWBRAY.—Forthwith wholly in the parish church; and that in the new burial-ground, and in the Independent and Wesleyan Burial-grounds, the Regulations for New Burial-grounds be observed, with the exception of No. 3.

LIVERPOOL.—Forthwith wholly in the church and churchyard of St. Thomas, except in the vaults belonging to Miss Leathers and to Mr. Edward Parry, in which each coffin shall be embedded in charcoal and separately entombed, that is, enclosed by brickwork or masonry properly cemented.

LLANGUICK, NEATH.—Forthwith wholly in the Panteg, Caer Salem, and Zoar Chapels, at Ystalyfera, and after the thirtieth of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, in the burial-grounds of those chapels, except in now existing walled graves which are free from water, each coffin buried in which shall be separately enclosed by stonework properly cemented.

PENDLETON, ECCLES.—Forthwith wholly in the church of St. Thomas, and in St. Thomas' Churchyard, and in Brindleheath-lane Burial-ground, Pendleton (except in vaults and walled graves in which each coffin shall be embedded in charcoal and separately entombed in an air-tight manner, and in family graves which can be opened to the depth of five feet without the exposure of remains), one body only to be buried in a grave at a time, and no grave to be opened within fourteen years, unless to bury another member of the same family.
