The Queen, taking into Her Royal consideration that, upon the decease of Archibald John, Earl of Rosebery, Knight of the Most Ancient and Most Noble Order of the Thistle, which happened on the fourth day of March last, the title and dignity of Earl of Rosebery devolved upon Archibald Philip, now Earl of Rosebery, as the eldest son and heir of Archibald Primrose, commonly called Lord Dalmeay, whilst living the eldest son and heir apparent of the said Archibald John, late Earl of Rosebery, and that according to the ordinary rules of honour the brother and sisters of the said Archibald Philip, now Earl of Rosebery, cannot enjoy that place and precedence which would have been due to them in case their said late father had survived his father, the said Archibald John, Earl of Rosebery, and had thereby succeeded to the title and dignity of Earl of Rosebery, Her Majesty hath been graciously pleased to ordain and declare that Everard Henry Primrose, Esq., Mary Catherine Constance Primrose, Spinster, and Constance Evelyn, the wife of Henry Wyndham, Esq., commonly called the Honourable Henry Wyndham, the brother and sisters of the said Archibald Philip, now Earl of Rosebery, shall henceforth have, hold, and enjoy the same titles, place, pre-eminence and precedence, as if their late father the said Archibald Primrose, commonly called Lord Dalmeay, had survived his father, the said Archibald John, late Earl of Rosebery, and had thereby succeeded to the said title and dignity of Earl of Rosebery.

And Her Majesty hath been further pleased to command that the said Royal order and declaration be registered in Her College of Arms.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a despatch, from Her Majesty's Chargé d'Affaires at Guatemala, enclosing the following translation of a Decree of the President of Honduras, dated 24th February, 1868, by which Amapala, on the Pacific, is constituted a free port :—

ART. 1. The port of Amapala shall be free for the importation of foreign merchandize for the term of twenty years, capable of being extended to a longer period. Vessels that touch at it, from ten tons burden and upwards, shall only pay passport dues, and two dollars (8s.) anchorage, which shall be devoted to the establishment of a lighthouse, and to the payment of other expenses incurred for the benefit of the locality.

ART. 2. Merchandize that is imported to the said port shall be stored in the warehouses established by the Government, with the cognizance of the Comptroller of the Custom House, and on previous presentation of the invoices. In this case the Government will be responsible for the security of the goods.

ART. 3. Goods that are taken out of the port for consumption in the interior of the Republic, shall be subject to the already established import duties.

ART. 4. All who may wish to take goods out of port, for the purpose of transmitting them to the interior of the Republic, shall be obliged to pass them into the Government warehouses, if not
