## PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twenty-third day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of All Saints, situate in the parish of Saint Heliers, in the Island of Jersey, and in the diocese of Winchester.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of All Saints, situate in the parish of Saint Heliers aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Charles Richard, Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Saint Heliers which is described in the Schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of All Saints, situate in the parish of Saint Heliers as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of All Saints, Jersey.'

"And, with the like consent of the said Charles Richard, Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials, should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns, and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices, should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that so long as the Reverend Philip Filleul, the present rector or incumbent of the rectory of the said parish of Saint Heliers, shall continue to be such rector or incumbent, all the fees which may be received in respect of the sylemnization or performance of the said offices in the church of All Saints as aforesaid, shall be paid by the said minister thereof to the said Philip Filleul; And provided also, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us, the said Commissioners, to concur in or

approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism, or for the registration thereof

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of All Saints, Jersey, being:-

"All that part of the parish of Saint Heliers, in the Island of Jersey, and in the diocese of Winchester, wherein the present incumbent of such parish now possesses the exclusive cure of souls, which is bounded on the south-west by the sea, on the west and part of the north-west by the parish of Saint Lawrence, on the remaining part of the north-west and on the north by the parish of Saint John, on part of the east by the parish of Trinity, and on all other sides, that is to say, on the remaining part of the east, and on the south, by an imaginary line commencing at the point on the castern side of Saint John's-road, where the boundary dividing the said parish of Trinity from the parish of Saint Heliers aforesaid, diverges eastward from the same road, such point being distant ninety five yards, or thereabouts, to the south of the eastern end of Maupatruis; and extending thence, first southward, then eastward, and then again southward, for a distance of one and a half miles, or thereabouts, to and along the middle of the said Saint John's-road, to its junction with Roussel-street; and extending thence, south-eastward, along the middle of the lastnamed street, and along the middle of Great Union-road, to the junction of the last-named road with Aquila-road; and extending thence, southward, along the middle of the last-named road and along the middle of Hue-street, to the junction of the last named street, with Dumaresqstreet; and extending thence, westward along the middle of the last-named street, to its junction with York-street; and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-named street, and along the middle of the streets called or known as Parade-place West and Cheapside respectively, to the junction of the last-named street, with the street called or known as Rue du Parc; and extending thence, south-westward, along the middle of the last-named street, to its junction with the road called or known as the Esplanade; and continuing thence still south-westward and in a straight line across the said Esplanade to and along the middle of a certain slip, situate at the north-western end of the same Esplanade, to the sea aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Winchester.
