Canal) to the junction of the said boundary with the boundary dividing a certain portion of the said parish of Saint Mary-de-Lode from the parish of Hempstead aforesaid, and extending thence first southward and then north-westward along the last-mentioned boundary, thereby following the middle of the fences dividing the closes numbered respectively 305 and 306 upon the Tithe Commutation Map of the said parish of Saint Mary-de-Lode, and upon the map hereunto annexed from the said close numbered 228, and from the close numbered 227 upon the Tithe Commutation Map of the parish of Hempstead and the South Hamlet, and upon the map hereunto annexed as aforesaid, to the junction of the fence dividing the close numbered 306 from the close numbered 227 as aforesaid, with the fence dividing the close numbered 144 upon the lastmentioned maps from the close numbered 227 as aforesaid, and extending thence first southward and then westward along the middle of the last-mentioned fence (thereby following the boundary dividing the South Hamlet from the parish of Hempstead as aforesaid) to the junction of the same fence with the fence dividing the said close numbered 144 from the close numbered 143 upon the same maps, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-described fence to a boundary-stone inscribed 'G. St. L. C. C. 1868, No. 4," and placed at the north-western end of the same fence on the south-eastern side of Lanthony Road, and extending thence first west-ward to a point in the middle of the said road, and then southward along the middle of the same road for a distance of eleven chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to a boundary-stone inscribed 'G. St. L. C. C. 1868, No. 5,' and placed on the western side of the same road at the eastern end of the fence forming the southern boundary of the close numbered 146 upon the last-mentioned maps; and extending thence, first westward to such boundary-stone, and continuing thence first westward, then northward, and then generally westward, along the middle of the last-described fence (thereby following, for the most part, the boundary dividing the South Hamlet from the parish of Hempstead as aforesaid; and passing to the east and north of Newark House) to the junction of the said fence with the fence forming the western boundary of the close, numbered 146, as aforesaid; and extending thence, first north-eastward then north-westward, and then again north-eastward along the middle of the last-mentioned fence to its junction with the fence forming the western boundary of the close numbered 145 upon the said last-mentioned maps; and continuing thence, still north-eastward, along the middle of the last-described fence to a boundary-stone inscribed 'G. St. L. C. C. 1868, No. 6,' and placed at the northeastern end of the same fence on the southern side of Sudmeadow-road, and near to the bridge which carries the last-named road over Still Brook; and extending thence, first northward to a point in the middle of the said road, and then north-westward for a distance of eighteen chains or thereabouts along the middle of the same road to a point opposite to a boundary-stone inscribed 'G. St. L. C. C. 1868, No. 7,' and placed on the northern side of the said road at the south-western end of the fence forming the north-western boundary of the Lanthony Brickworks, and extending thence north-eastward to such boundary-stone and along the middle of the last-described fence to its northeastern extremity upon the southern bank of the River Severn; and continuing thence still northeastward, and in a straight line to a point in the middle of the said river and upon the boundary

dividing the South Hamlet aforesaid from the parish of Saint Nicholas, situate partly in the said county of Gloucester and partly in the said city and county of the city of Gloucester, and wholly in the diocese of Gloucester and Bristol aforesaid; and extending thence, first south-eastward and then north-eastward along the middle of the said river, thereby following in part the last-described boundary and in part the boundary dividing the said extra-parochial place called North Hamlet from the parish of Saint Nicholas aforesaid, to a point opposite to the northern end of the locks forming the entrance to the basin of the Gloucester and Berkeley Canal aforesaid, and extending thence, first eastward to, and then southward along, the middle of the said locks to a point upon the boundary dividing the said North Hamlet from the parish of Saint Owen, in the said city and county of the city of Gloucester, and in the diocese aforesaid; and extending thence south-westward along the said boundary to its junction, in the middle of the graving dock of the said Gloucester and Berkeley Canal, with the boundary dividing the said parish of Saint Owen from the South Hamlet aforesaid; and extending thence eastward along the last-mentioned boundary as far as a point in the middle of East Quay; and extending thence southward along the middle of the said quay to a point upon the southern side of the road leading from the said East Quay to the street called or known as Littleworth; and extending thence eastward for a distance of six chains or thereabouts along the southern side of the said road to a point upon the boundary dividing the extra-parochial place called or known as Littleworth, in the lastmentioned county and diocese, from the South Hamlet aforesaid; and extending thence alternately southward and eastward along the lastdescribed boundary as far as a point in the middle of the street called Littleworth, as aforesaid, near to the Nelson Inn; and extending thence southward along the middle of the said street to its junction with Great Norfolk-street; and extending thence eastward along the middle of the last-named street to a point at its eastern extremity in the middle of the wall or fence which divides the house and premises called or known as 'Belle Vue House' from the 'Spa Gardens;' and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the said wall or fence to its south-eastern extremity; and extending thence eastward and in a straight line for a distance of ten chains or thereabouts to the first-described point where Barton-lane is intersected by the line of the Dock Branch of the Midland Railway as aforesaid where the said imaginary line commenced.'

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council : now, therefore Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the respective Registrars of the two several registries of the said diocesse of Gloucester and Bristol, at Gloucester and at Bristol.
