HER Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs has received from the Italian Chargé d'Affaires at this Court, the accompanying translation of an Official Memorandum from the "Direction Générale des Finances," in regard to facilities to be accorded to travellers passing through Italy, in the matter of their luggage :—

(Traduction).

Direction Générale des Finances,

CONSIDÉRANT le grave désagrément auquel seraient soumis les voyageurs qui traversent par chemin de fer tout le Royaume sans s'arrêter, dans le cas où ils seraient obligés à faire visiter leurs bagages à l'entrée et à la sortie ;

Reconnaissant la nécessité d'adopter à ce sujet des mesures, qui tout en assurant les intérêts du Trésor, ne puissent empêcher la rapidité des communications qui est indispensable à ceux qui font de longs voyages ;

Ayant pris par conséquent les arrangements nécessaires avec la Compagnie des Chemins de Fer de la Haute Italie, qui s'est entendue à cet égard avec les autres Compagnies de Chemin de fer ;

Il est arrêté :—

1°. Les bagages des voyageurs qui traversent sans s'arrêter, par chemin de fer, le Royaume pourront être expédiés *en exemption de visite* soit à l'entrée soit à la sortie ;

La visite douanière se bornera par conséquent aux menus-effets que les dits voyageurs porteront à la main, ou qu'ils voudraient garder à leur libre disposition.

2°. Les employés du chemin de fer présenteront à la douane d'entrée les bagages à expédier par transit et en exemption de visite. La Douane, après les avoir plombés simplement, afin que l'identité en soit maintenue, leur donnera un bulletin d'assurance, dans lequel seront inscrits le nombre et la nature des colis, leur poids, et les étiquettes de service sous lesquelles ils sont indiqués dans la feuille de route.

Il sera donné autant de bulletins d'assurance qu'il y aura de Douanes par lesquelles les bagages devront sortir.

3°. Le bulletin d'assurance sera fait au nom de l'Administration des Chemins de Fer, qui assume

la responsabilité de le présenter à la Douane de sortie. Le terme accordé pour arriver à la Douane de sortie sera fixé en raison de la distance kilométrique du chemin de fer et du temps nécessaire pour la parcourir, en égard aux règlements et aux heures de départ et d'arrivée du chemin de fer même.

4°. L'assurance sera taxée en raison d'un franc par chaque kilogramme de poids brut.

5°. Le bureau de sortie, après avoir vérifié que les plombs sont intacts, et avoir collationné les bagages avec les indications portées sur le bulletin, permettra, si rien ne s'y oppose, la sortie, et délivrera le certificat de service.

6°. Si des colis arrivent sans leurs plombs, ou altérés extérieurement, dans le cas où l'on puisse constater qu'il n'y a eu ni fraude ni tentative d'en commettre, on appliquera les dispositions de l'Art. 78c du Règlement des Douanes.

Si, au contraire, la fraude est constatée, ou qu'il y ait un colis manquant, le certificat se bornera à la partie des colis qui a été trouvée en règle, afin que la Douane d'entrée procède sur la base de l'assurance dont il est parlé au No. 4, aux termes de l'Art. 69 du Règlement Douanier.

OFFICIAL NOTICE:

Art. No. 102.

TAKING into consideration the serious inconvenience to which travellers would be exposed who cross the Kingdom by railway, without stopping; in the event of their being obliged to have their luggage examined on entering and leaving ;

Recognizing the necessity of taking some measures on this head, which, whilst maintaining the interests of the Treasury, should not hinder the rapidity of communication which is so essential to those travelling long distances ;

And having, in consequence, made the necessary arrangements with the Railway Company of Upper Italy, which is acting in concert with the other Railway Companies in this matter ;

It has been decided :—

1st. Baggage belonging to through railway passengers can be forwarded without examination, either on entering or leaving.

Consequently, the Custom-house search will be limited to such personal articles as the said travellers carry by hand, or to those which they wish to take charge of themselves.

2nd. The railway officials will hand over the baggage to be sent by transit and without examination, to the Frontier Custom-house officers, who, after having simply sealed it, so that its identity may be established, will give them a certificate on which will be written the number and nature of the packages, their weight, and the service labels by which they are entered in the way-bill.

The same number of certificates will be given as there are Custom-houses through which the luggage has to pass.

3rd. The certificate will be made out in the name of the Railway Company, which is charged with the responsibility of presenting it at the Custom-house at the place of departure. The time allowed for arrival at this Custom-house will be fixed in relation to the mileage of the railway, and the time it takes to traverse it having reference to the railway regulations and the hours of departure and arrival of the trains.

4th. The certificate will be taxed at the rate of one franc for each kilogram of gross weight.

5th. The Bureau, at the place of departure after having ascertained that the seals are unbroken and after having compared the luggage with the descriptions set forth in the certificate will allow it to pass, if there is nothing to prevent it and will deliver up the service ticket.

6th. If any articles arrive without their seals, or externally disfigured, and it can be proved that there has been neither fraud, nor attempt at fraud, the dispositions of the Article 78 c., of the Custom-house regulations shall be put in force.

If, on the contrary, a fraud is proved, or if a package is missing, the certificate shall only apply to such portion of the luggage as has been found to be in order, so that the Frontier Custom-house may proceed on the basis of the certificate which is spoken of in Article 4, in the terms of Article 69 of the "Custom-house Regulations."

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a Despatch from Her Majesty's Ambassador at Paris, enclosing an extract from the "Moniteur" of

the 9th instant, which contains an Imperial Decree, dated the 4th July, 1868, which authorizes the establishment of special tonnage dues at Dunkerque, in connection with the improvement of the port.

The following is a translation of the Articles of this Decree:—

ART. 1. A tonnage due of 12 centimes per ton burthen will be levied at the port of Dunkerque, on and after the 1st January following the publication of the present Decree, upon all vessels, French or foreign, entering laden into the port, and which shall come from long voyages or from foreign countries.

This due is not applicable to Imperial men-of-war.

The levying of this due has been granted to the town. The receipts will be applied exclusively to cover the difference between the rate of interest paid by the Government to the town and that paid by the town to the subscribers to the loan authorized by the Law of the 20th May, 1868.

The due will cease to be levied immediately upon the entire reimbursement of the sum which forms the above-mentioned difference.

ART. 2. The Decree of the 6th June, 1868, is and remains repealed.

*Fixed Light at Cheribon.*

THE Indian Netherlands Government has given notice, that since the 1st July, 1867, a light has been exhibited at Cheribon, north coast of Java.

The light is a *fixed* white light, elevated 26 feet above the high-water level of the sea, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 8 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses.

## NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(No. 63.)—AFRICA—SOUTH COAST.

*Rocky Bank near Cape of Good Hope.*

HEAVY breakers, during bad weather, having been reported by the keepers of the Cape of Good Hope lighthouse, in a north-westerly direction, the following is the result of an examination made by the direction of the Commodore at Simons Bay.

The breakers are on a rocky ledge, about a mile in extent, and from  $1\frac{1}{2}$  to 2 miles from the shore, having  $10\frac{1}{2}$  fathoms on its shoalest part (near a depth of 11 fathoms already marked on the chart), with soundings gradually increasing to 20 fathoms on its outer edge, and with 18 fathoms between the ledge and the coast.

From it the following bearings were observed:—

Cape of Good Hope lighthouse, S.E.  $\frac{1}{2}$  S.,  $6\frac{1}{2}$  miles.

Polesberg, E. by S.

Slangkop Point, N. by E.  $\frac{1}{4}$  E., 10 miles.

This rocky bank lies somewhat in the fairway for vessels passing round the coast to and from Table Bay; and as, in heavy southerly gales, a continuous line of breakers has been observed to extend between this ledge and the shore, vessels are accordingly cautioned not to approach this part of the coast in bad weather.

[All bearings are magnetic. Variation  $30^\circ$  Westerly in 1868.]

Chertsey Union.—Parish of Chertsey.

To the Churchwardens and Overseers of the Poor of the Parish of Chertsey, in the County of Surrey;—

To the Clerk or Clerks to the Justices of the Petty Sessions held for the Division or Divisions in which the said Parish is situate;—

And to all others whom it may concern.

WHEREAS the Poor Law Board, on application of the Churchwardens of the Poor of the parish of Chertsey, in the county of Surrey, made in pursuance of a resolution of the vestry of the said parish, held, after public notice in that behalf, on Thursday, the 10th day of February, 1853, by an order bearing date the 15th day of September in that year, directed that so much of the Act passed in the 14th year of the reign of Her Majesty, as related to the providing of a room or suitable buildings for the purpose of holding any vestry or other meeting for the transaction of any business of or relating to the said parish, should be applied to and put in force within the said parish.

And whereas at another meeting of the Vestry of the said parish, held at the Town Hall, Chertsey, after public notice in that behalf, on Thursday, the 4th day of June last, it was resolved—

“That the Poor Law Board be requested to issue an Order under their seal of office, directing that the Act passed on the 5th August, 1850 (13 and 14 Vict., c. 57), entitled ‘An Act to prevent the holding of Vestry or other Meetings in Churches, and for regulating the appointment of Vestry Clerks,’ shall be applied to and put in force within this parish, as regards that portion of it only which relates to the appointment of a Vestry Clerk: and that the Vestry Clerk to be appointed under such Order be required to perform all the duties enumerated in Section 7 of the said Act, and that the salary of the Vestry Clerk shall be Sixty Pounds per annum.”

And whereas the Churchwardens of the said parish have made their application in writing to the Poor Law Board, pursuant to the above resolution.

Now, therefore, we, the Poor Law Board, under the authority of the several Statutes in that behalf made and provided, hereby order and direct:—

ARTICLE I.—That so much of the said Act passed in the fourteenth year of the reign of Her Majesty as relates to the appointment of a Vestry Clerk shall forthwith be applied to and be put in force within the said parish of Chertsey.
