THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, from Her Majesty's Ambassador at Paris, an extract from the Moniteur, containing an Imperial Decree, dated the 11th instant, of which the following are the Articles:—

## IMPORTATION.

ART. 1.—The Customs Import Tariff has been settled as below for the following articles, the "décimes" included :--

The percussion caps, upon their entry into French territory, must be accompanied by an "acquita-caution," the certificate of discharge for which will be provided by the Municipal Authorities at the place of abode of the person to whom they are addressed.

## (New Arrangement.)

Art. 2.—The differential dues established by the law of the 15th June, 1861, upon grain and flour imported in foreign ships, are and remain suppressed.

ARRANGEMENT RELATIVE TO THE COLONIES.—SAINT LOUIS (SENEGAL), AND ISLAND OF GORÉE.

Art. 3.—Merchandise of every description, and from every quarter, can be imported under any flag into Saint Louis (Senegal), and into the Island of Gorée. All differential duties upon the flag have been abolished.

Produce taken on board in the harbours of Saint Louis and of Gorée, can be exported in any direction and under any flag.

Produce thus taken on board foreign vessels is subject, on its importation into France, to a differential duty upon the flag of 20 francs per ton of the freight.
