(No. 66.)—West Indies.—Trinidad Island.

Rock off East Coast.

NOTICE is hereby given, that the sunken rock (now called Darien Rock) noted in the Admiralty Charts, as lying about 17 miles E. ½ N. from Manzanilla Point, East Coast of Trinidad Island, has beed seen, and its position approximately ascertained.

The steamer *Darien*, Captain Gilbert Pierre, on her voyage from Demerara to Trinidad, on the morning of the 6th June, 1868, distinctly saw from the deck, at a distance of about 30 yards, a rock about 15 or 20 feet in extent, with from 2 to 3 feet water over it, and showing occasionally, in the hollow of the swell, two pinnacles. The *Darien* remained some time near the rock.

The position of the rock is said to be in lat. 10° 35′ N., long. 60° 38′ W., but as H.M.S. Cannet has lately discovered a bank having as little as 11 fathoms water, about four miles to the southward of the assumed position of the rock, it is deemed possible that the rock may be a portion of
