Her Majesty has also been pleased to appoint Nicholas Kendall, Esq., to be Police Magistrate of the City and Garrison of Gibraltar.

The Queen has been pleased to appoint John Scott, Esq., to be Governor and Commander in-Chief of the Colony of British Guiana.

Her Majesty has also been pleased to appoint Sanford Freeling, Esq., to be Lieutenant-Governor of the Island of Dominica.

Her Majesty has further been pleased to appoint Arthur Peel, Esq., to be Chief Justice of the Islands of Antigua and Montserrat; and to appoint Colonel Robert Stuart Baynes to be Colonial Secretary of the City and Garrison of Gibraltar.

The Queen has been pleased to appoint the Right Honourable Sir James Fergusson, Bart., to be Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of South Australia and its Dependencies.

Board of Trade, Whitehall, December 31, 1868.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, from Her Majesty's Minister at Buenos Ayres, copy of a Decree issued by the Government of the Argentine Confederation on the 2nd November last, to the following effect:—

In pursuance of the authority given to the Executive by the law of the National Congress of the 7th September, to apply the sum of 8,000 hard dollars (£1,600) to a prize to be given to the inventor or introducer of the system for preserving fresh meat best adapted, in the judgment of the Executive, to its working on a large scale, the President of the Republic decrees, that a term of six months is fixed, reckoned from this date, in order that those who shall consider themselves in a position to compete for this prize, may present their proposals within that time to the Ministry, to be examined in the way the Government may think fit.
