WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the first and second years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and seven; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the sixteenth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the first and second years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and seven; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following representation, as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Philip, situate near the Wells-road, in the district parish of Saint Bartholomew, Sydenham, in the county of Kent, and in the diocese of Rochester.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Philip, situate near the Wells-road as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Thomas Legh, Bishop of the said diocese of Rochester, and with the consent of the Honourable and Reverend Augustus Legge, the incumbent of the perpetual curacy of the said district parish of Saint Bartholomew, Sydenham (testified by their having respectively signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said district parish of Saint Bartholomew, Sydenham, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Philip, situate near the Wells-road as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Philip, Sydenham.'

"And with the like consents of the said Thomas Legh, Bishop of the said diocese of Rochester, and of the said Augustus Legge (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns, and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time

being: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us, the said Commissioners, to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism, or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The **SCHEDULE** to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

The District Chapelry of Saint Philip, Sydenham, being:

"All that part of the district parish of Saint Bartholomew, Sydenham, in the county of Kent and in the diocese of Rochester, which is bounded on the north and on the west by the parish of Saint Giles, Camberwell, in the county of Surrey and in the diocese of Winchester, on the south partly by the parish of Beckenham, in the said county of Kent and in the diocese of Canterbury, and on all other sides, that is to say, on the remaining part of the south, on the east, and on the north-east, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary on the northern side of the grounds of the Crystal Palace, which divides the said parish of Beckenham from the district parish of Saint Bartholomew, Sydenham aforesaid, at the point on West Hill where Penge New-road joins the Sydenham-road; and extending thence, eastward, along the middle of the last-named road, to its junction with the road called or known as Longton-grove; and extending thence, generally north-eastward, for a distance of ten chains or thereabouts, along the middle of the last-named road, to a point opposite to a boundary stone inscribed 'S. St. P. D. C., 1868, No. 1,' and placed on the northern side of the same road, at the southern end of the wall or fence forming the eastern boundary of the house and grounds known as Longton Lodge; and extending thence, first northward to such boundary stone, and continuing thence, still northward and in a direct line, for a distance of twelve and a-half chains or thereabouts (thereby following in part the eastern side of Prospect-road), to a boundary stone inscribed 'S. St. P. D. C., 1868, No. 2,' and placed on the southern side of Wells-road, at the northern end of the wall or fence forming the eastern extremity of Prospect-road aforesaid; and extending thence, first northward to, and then eastward along, the middle of the said Wells-road, to its junction with the road called or known as Rowland-grove; and extending thence, northward, for a distance of seven chains or thereabouts, along the middle of the last-named road, to a point opposite to a boundary stone inscribed 'S. St. P. D. C., 1868, No. 3,' and placed on the western side of the same road, at its northern extremity, and extending north-westward to such boundary stone; and continuing thence, still north-westward and in a direct line, for a distance of seventeen chains and a-half, or thereabouts, to a boundary stone inscribed 'S. St. P. D. C., 1868, No. 4,' and placed at the north-western end of the wall or fence dividing the house and grounds known as Saint Mary's Oratory from the house and grounds known as Belle Vue, on the south-eastern side of the road called or known as Sydenham-hill; and continuing thence, still north-westward and in a direct line, across the last-named road, to the county boundary, on the north-western side of the same road, which divides the said district parish of Saint Bartholo-

mew, Sydenham, from the parish of Saint Giles, Camberwell aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Rochester.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of your Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Mary, situate at Wreay, in the parish of Saint Mary, Carlisle, in the county of Cumberland, and in the diocese of Carlisle.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said parish of Saint Mary, Carlisle, and of the parish of Hesketh-in-the-Forest, in the county and diocese aforesaid, and of the new parish of Saint John, Uppery, in the same county and diocese, which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such parishes and new parish respectively.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said parish of Saint Mary, Carlisle, and of the said parish of Hesketh-in-the-Forest, and of the said new parish of Saint John, Uppery, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Mary, situate at Wreay as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Honourable and Right Reverend Samuel, Bishop of the said diocese of Carlisle (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this representation), and with the consents of the dean and chapter of the cathedral church of the Holy and Undivided

Trinity of Carlisle, the patrons of the perpetual curacies of the said parish of Saint Mary, Carlisle, of the said parish of Hesketh-in-the-Forest, and of the said new parish of Saint John, Uppery (in testimony whereof, they, the said dean and chapter, have set their common or capitular seal to this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent that it would in our opinion be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Saint Mary Carlisle, of the said parish of Hesketh-in-the-Forest, and of the said new parish of Saint John, Uppery, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan, hereunto annexed; should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Mary, situate at Wreay as aforesaid, and the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Mary, Wreay;' and that the right of presentation and appointment to the church of such consolidated chapelry should belong to and be exercised by the said dean and chapter of the cathedral church of the Holy and Undivided Trinity of Carlisle aforesaid, for ever.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises in your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Mary, Wreay, being:—

"All that detached portion of the parish of Saint Mary, Carlisle, in the county of Cumberland and in the diocese of Carlisle, which is comprised within and is co-extensive with the limits of the chapelry of Wreay; and also all that other detached portion of the said parish of Saint Mary, Carlisle, which is situate to the east of the said chapelry of Wreay, together with all those contiguous portions of the parish of Hesketh-in-the-Forest, and of the new parish of Saint John, Uppery, both in the county and diocese aforesaid; all which said portions of the parishes and new parish aforesaid are comprised within and are externally bounded by an imaginary line commencing at a point in the middle of the Carlisle and Penrith-road where the boundary dividing the said chapelry of Wreay from the new parish of Saint John, Uppery aforesaid, meets, the boundary which divides the said parish of Hesketh-in-the-Forest from the consolidated chapelry of Ivegill, in the county and diocese aforesaid; and extending thence, south-eastward, for a distance of two miles and a-half, or thereabouts, along the middle of the said Carlisle and Penrith-road (thereby following the last-mentioned boundary), to the point near Broadfield House where the same road is joined by the road leading from Broadfield House aforesaid to Moor House Hill; and extending thence, north eastward, along the middle of the last-described road, as far as the point where it is crossed by the line of the Lancaster and Carlisle Railway; and extending thence, north-westward, for a distance of one mile and three-quarters, or thereabouts, along the middle of the said line of railway, to a point on the southern side of Bottom House, opposite to the southern end of the watercourse which flows past the eastern side of Bottom House aforesaid into the River Petterill; and extending thence, northward, to and along the middle of the said water-

scheme for compensating certain spiritual persons, whose emoluments have been diminished by reason of proceedings under the said Act.

“Whereas it has been made to appear to us that the fees, dues, or other emoluments of the several spiritual persons hereinafter mentioned, have been diminished by reason of the constitution under the provisions of the said Act of certain districts, which districts have since become new parishes under the same Act; and that the payment to the said spiritual persons of the several annual sums specified in the schedule to this scheme annexed, would provide a just and reasonable compensation for such diminution.

“Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, that in respect of the new parishes mentioned in the first column of the said schedule hereunto annexed, there shall be paid by us to the several spiritual persons or incumbents mentioned and described in the second column of the same schedule, so long as they shall respectively continue to be incumbents of the cures which they now hold respectively, and no longer, the annual sums mentioned and set opposite to their respective names in the third column of the same schedule, payment of such annual sums being in each case made half-yearly, upon the first day of May and the first day of November in each year, but with the right also, in each case, to a proportionate payment in respect of any period being less than half a year, which may elapse between the first day of May or the first day of November (as the case may be), and the determination from whatever cause of the incumbency during his tenure, of which the spiritual person is entitled to an annual sum under the provisions of this scheme.

“And we further recommend and propose that the right of the said spiritual persons, as such incumbents as aforesaid to receive the said annual sums respectively, shall in each case be held to have accrued, and that payment thereof shall accordingly be made as from the day on which the church of the new parish in respect of which such compensation is made was consecrated, that being the day upon which in each case the incumbent of the new parish became empowered to perform in the church thereof those offices, and became entitled to retain for his own benefit these fees, in consideration of the loss of which to the mother parish or cure the several amounts of the compensation grants in this scheme recommended and proposed have been fixed by us.

“And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament.
