THE following Address has been Presented to the King, which His Majesty received very Graciously.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty
The humble Address of the Mayor, Aldermen, Bailiffs and Burgeses of Your Majesty's Corporation of Northampton.

May it please Your most Sacred Majesty,

THE dear and precious Blessings of Peace, Plenty and just Liberties, which we, amongst the rest of Your Majesty's happy Subjects, have enjoyed since the beginning of Your Gracious Reign; with the uncorrupt and easie course of Justice, to have been attain'd by every one, as there has been Occasion; are things never to be considered, without producing in grateful Hearts, the greatest and most sincere Acknowledgments to Your most Sacred Majesty; but above all, Your Majesty's late most Gracious Declaration for Liberty of Conscience; whereby those things which are more considerable and dear to us than our Persons or Estates, are manumisd and freed from Bondage and Slavery, even our Beliefs and our Opinions; thereby every Man being left to the practice of such Christian Religion, as he shall think most proper to bring him to eternal Peace and Salvation; and all this from the Bounty and Compassion of Your own Royal Nature, in opposition to every cruel Reason of State, or World's Interest whatsoever.

For this Proceeding, SIR, which is sufficient to fill our Hearts with Joy and Rest, and our Houses with Peace and Plenty, What is there enough for us to retribute? It is not in our Power, SIR, to return what they deserve, but for our Lives and Fortunes, as far as they can extend, they shall ever be at Your Majesty's Command: And our uttermost Concurrence and Assistance towards bringing Your Royal Intentions into such a Law, as for the present may give Peace to all Your Subjects, and for the future such Glory to Your Majesty, as may last while there is a remembrance of a King in England: And that Your Majesty's Reign may be long and prosperous, and there be never wanting a King descended from Your Loyns to sit upon this Throne, shall be our constant Prayers. In Testimony whereof, we have hereunto set our Common Seal, and Subscribed our Hands, this 20th day of April, 1688. In the Fourth Year of Your Majesty's Reign; &c.

Lephorne, April 21. The Recruits that are raising for the Companies our Great Duke intends to send to the assistance of the Venetians are almost compleated; the greatest part of them will be embarked on two Merchant Ships that have been hired for that purpose; and the rest on the four Gallies that are fitting here. Several French Officers, who accompanied the Marquis de Lavardin to Rome, are returned to Marsailles and Tholon, to serve in the Expedition against the Algerines.

Milan, April 27. Our Governor took, the 22d Instant, a review at Pavia of the Cavalry in the Service of this State; and afterwards held a Council with the principal Officers, about recruiting the Troops. It was proposed likewise to raise some new Regiments, but nothing

was resolved on. His Excellency has been since at *Voghera* and *Alexandria*, to visit the Fortifications, and take a review of the Garrisons of those places. We have an account from *Turin*, That the Duke of *Savoy* has ordered his Troops to encamp towards the end of the next month.

Venice, April 30. The last Letters from the *Mores* gave an account, that the Doge *Moresini* was gone back to *Athens*, near which place he had appointed the General Rendezvous. And that Signior *Venier*, who commands the Ships of the Republick, was returned from gathering the Contributions in the Archipelago. The Gallies of *Malta* will be at Sea in a Week or Ten days: And those of his Holiness, and of the Great Duke of *Tuscany*, are likewise preparing to return to the *Levant*. We have advice from *Dalmatia*, that the new raised Troops that went lately from hence were arrived there. That the Proveditor-General *Corgaro* was gone from *Sebenico* to *Zara*. And that the Son of the Chevalier *Janco*, with the Morlaques under his Command, had made an Incurfion into the Enemies Country, from whence they brought back a great many Slaves, and other Booty.

Warsaw, April 16. The Queen arrived here the 10th of this month from *Lithuania*; and the King is expected in a fortnight or 3 Weeks. His Majesty, before his departure from *Grodno*, caused a scandalous Libel, concerning the Proceedings of the late Diet, to be publickly burnt, and a considerable reward offered to those that should discover the Author of it. Orders are given for the assembling the Forces of this Crown; but in the condition they are in, through the breaking up of the Diet, without establishing the Impositions that were necessary to recruit them, they will, it's believ'd, be only able to act defensively this Summer. We have had no News of the motions of the Tartars, since that we have already given you an account of. But there is a report, that the Cham had received Orders from the *Port* to conduct in Person his Forces to *Hungary* this Campagne; and that he was preparing to comply with them.

Vienna, May 2. The Elector of *Bavaria* is expected here about the 20th of this month: And, in the mean time, 4000 Men, which he has lately raised to recruit his Troops in *Hungary*, are on their march thither. General *Capra* is arrived at *Esseck*, to command the Imperial Forces that are encamped near that place: And, it's said, Orders have been sent him, to endeavour, before the main Army takes the Field, to make himself Master of *Ilocke*, and some other places the Turks are possessed of on that side, from whence they may hinder the Navigation of the *Danube* between *Esseck* and *Belgrade*, which confirms people in their belief, that the Siege of this last place is designed to open the Campagne. The Letters from *Esseck* of the 15th past told us, that besides the other new Works that had been made there, they had begun a Bastion at the Head of the Bridge of Boats; and several Forts on the side of the *Drave*; and that they had built a great many Boats with Ovens, for the baking of Ammunition Bread. We understand by the same advices, that the Turks, who lately passed the *Save*, were retired to *Gradisca* and *Belgrade*: And that the People of *Bosnia* had sent to General

neral *Catara* to assure him, that, upon the approach of the Christian Army, they will take up Arms against the Turks. An Officer of the Regiment of *Strenberg*, who was taken Prisoner the last year, having lately made his escape from *Belgrade*, has given an account to General *Asserment*, that the News of the Imperialists forming a Camp of 20000 Men near *Esseck*, had greatly augmented the Confirmation the People at *Belgrade*, and the neighbouring places, were in; and that a great many Families had thereupon retired farther into the Country. That when he came from *Belgrade*, which was on the 6th of the last month, there were not arrived any new Troops from *Constantinople*; and that those which the Seraskier had drawn together on the Frontiers, were too weak to give the Imperialists any considerable opposition.

Potsdam, May 12. On Sunday the 9th Instant died here *Frederick William* Marquis of *Brandenburg*, Great Chamberlain and Elector of the Roman Empire, &c. in the 68th Year of his Age, and the 49th of his Government. He was first married with the Princess *Louisa Henrietta*, Daughter of *Frederick-Henry* Prince of *Orange*; by whom he had *Charles-Ernst*, born in the year 1655, who died at *Strasbourg* in 1674. *Frederick-William*, born in 1657, and married in 1679 to *Elizabeth-Henrietta*, Daughter of *William* Landgrave of *Hesse-Cassel*; and after her death, to the Princess of *Hanover*, in 1684. And *Louis-Leopold*, born in 1664, who married in 1681 with the Princess *Louisa*, only Daughter of Prince *Boguslaw-Radzevil* of *Lithuania*, and died in 1687. And by his second Marriage with the Princess *Dorothea* of *Holftein*, Widow of *Christian-Louis* Duke of *Lunenburgh-Zell*, had *Philip-William* born in 1669; *Mary-Amelie* born in 1670; *Albert-Frederick* in 1672; *Charles-Philp* in 1673; *Elizabeth-Sophia* in 1674; and *Dorothea* born in 1675. On Sunday in the Evening our present Elector, *Frederick-William II.* went to *Berlin*, where the next day he received the Compliments of Condolence; and confirmed the Officers that had served his Father in their several places. The Body of the deceased Elector will be carried to *Coningberg* in *Prussia* to be there interred.

Hague, May 18. On Friday last the Elector of *Saxony* was entertained by the Prince of *Orange* at *Honflaerdyke*. The next day his Highness accompanied him to *Schevelinge*, where they went into a small Vessel that was prepared to carry them to the Squadron of 17 Men of War, which was come from *Schonevelt*, under the Command of Vice-Admiral *Allemonde*, and was then about a mile and half from *Schevelinge*: The Vice-Admiral sent two light Frigats, and several Shalops, to meet them; and, at their approach, saluted them with the Cannon of all the Ships: They dined on Board the Vice-Admiral, and, about 5 in the Afternoon, returned to *Schevelinge*, being again saluted as before, and reconducted by the two Frigats. And this morning his Electoral Highness parted from hence for *Delft*, accompanied by divers Persons of Quality, intending to go to *Rotterdam* and *Doit*, and from thence to *Maastricht*, *Liege*, *Aix* and *Cologne*, and so to return home by the way of *Frankfort*. The Heer *Van Dieft*, the *Brandenburgh* Minister, having acquainted the States-General, and the Prince of *Orange*, with the Death of the late Elector his Master, his Highness has named the Heer *Benting* to go to *Berlin* with his Complement of Condolence.

Brussels, May 18. The Letters from *Vienna*, of the 6th Instant, confirm what our former told us of General *Caraffi's* being returned to his quarters in *Transylvania*; and add, that the Imperial Forces commanded by the Baron *d'Arceyaga* arrived the first of this month before *Alba Regalis*, and had raised several Batteries and other Works to cover the Troops; that they had summoned the Garrison, but had received for answer, That the Musselmens knew how to defend their Places as long as they had a drop of blood to sacrifice to the service of their Sultan. That the Turks had afterwards made a Sally on the side

of the *Beograd* Gate, and had done the Imperialists some damage, but were at last beaten back with the loss of 29 men; and that the Baron *d'Arceyaga* had dashed some more Troops, those he had with him not being sufficient to attack a place so well fortified, and provided with so good a Garrison.

Paris, May 19. The King intends to go the 22d of this month to *Marmignon*, to pass 5 or 6 days there. His Majesty has named the Sieur *d'Iberville* to be his Resident at *Genova*, in the place of the Sieur *du Pri*, who is gone to reside in the same Quality at *Florence*. The Count *de Lobkowitz*, the Imperial Minister, is taking his Leave, in order to his return home. The Archbishop of *Lyon* is very ill. According to our last Advices from *Thoulen*, the Marechal *d'Estree* intended to set sail the 15th Instant with the Squadron under his Command.
