IN THE MATTER OF THE FACTORY ACTS
EXTENSION ACT, 1867.

WHEREAS due proof has been made to the satisfaction of me, the undersigned, Henry Austin Bruce, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that the customs of the Trades carried on in the Factories specified in the Schedule hereto, require that the children, young persons, and women working in such Factories should be employed in the manner hereinafter mentioned: Now I, the said Henry Austin Bruce, in pursuance of the powers vested in me by the twenty-fifth Article of the Schedule annexed to the Factory Acts Extension Act, 1867, do by this my Order give permission to the occupiers of the said Factories to employ the children, young persons, and women working in such Factories on Saturday afternoon, provided a half-holiday be given on some other day instead thereof, of which due notice shall be given.

IN THE MATTER OF THE FACTORY ACTS
EXTENSION ACT, 1867.

WHEREAS due proof has been made to the satisfaction of me, the undersigned, Henry Austin Bruce, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that the customs of the Trades carried on in the Factories specified in the Schedule hereto, require that the children, young persons, and women working in such Factories should be employed between the hours hereinafter mentioned: Now I, the said Henry Austin Bruce, in pursuance of the powers vested in me by the twelfth Article of the Schedule annexed to the Factory Acts Extension Act, 1867; do by this my Order, give permission to the occupiers of the said Factories to employ the children, young persons, and women working in such Factories between the hours of seven o'clock in the morning and seven o'clock in the evening, or between eight

o'clock in the morning and eight o'clock in the evening, instead of between the hours of six o'clock in the morning and six o'clock in the evening, subject to the conditions in the said Act contained.

WE, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and eleven, sections five and eleven, do hereby grant and appropriate out of our common fund to the rectory of South Milford, in the county of York, and in the diocese of York, one capital sum of six hundred and forty-five pounds sterling, to be applicable towards defraying the cost of certain improvements and additions proposed to be made in and to the parsonage-house of the said rectory, according to plans and a specification approved by us, such capital sum, or the balance thereof unapplied to such purpose, to remain in the meantime in our hands at interest after the rate of three pounds per centum per annum, and such interest to be paid to the Incumbent for the time being of the said rectory of South Milford.

In witness whereof, we have hereunto set our common seal, this twenty-eighth day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine.

WE, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and eleven, section five, do hereby grant to the Incumbent of the benefice of Saint Peter, Hunslet Moor, in the county of York, and in the diocese of Ripon, and to his successors Incumbents of the same benefice, one yearly sum or stipend of two hundred pounds, such yearly sum or stipend to be payable out of the common fund under our control, and to be calculated as from the eleventh day of December, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, and to be receivable in equal half-yearly portions on the first day of May and on the first day of November in each and every year: Provided always, that if at any time lands, tithes, or other hereditaments sufficient to produce the said yearly sum or stipend, or any part thereof, shall be annexed by us to the said benefice, in substitution for such yearly sum or stipend, or for such part thereof, our liability for the payment of such yearly sum or stipend, or of such part thereof, as the case may be, shall thereupon and thereafter cease and determine.
