

numbered respectively 290 and 291 upon the Tithe Commutation map of the township of Pitington, in the said parish of Pitington, and upon the map hereunto annexed, and extending thence north-westward to such boundary stone, and along the middle of the said wall or fence, to a point at its north-western extremity, on the boundary which divides the parish of Pitington from the parish of Hetton-le-Hole as aforesaid."

And whereas a draft of the said scheme has, in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore secondly mentioned Act, been transmitted to the patrons and to the incumbents of the two parishes, out of which it is intended that the district therein recommended to be constituted shall be taken, and such patrons and incumbents have respectively signified their assent to the said scheme.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Durham.

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the seventh day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following representation, as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Philip and Saint James, situate at Neston, in the parish of Corsham, in the county of Wilts, and in the diocese of Gloucester and Bristol.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Philip and Saint James, situate at Neston as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Charles John, Bishop of the said diocese of Gloucester and Bristol (testified by his having signed and sealed this representa-

tion), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Corsham, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Philip and Saint James, situate at Neston as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Philip and Saint James, Neston.'

"And with the like consent of the said Charles John, Bishop of the said diocese of Gloucester and Bristol (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns, and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us, the said Commissioners, to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism, or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Philip, and Saint James, Neston, being:

"All that part of the parish of Corsham, in the county of Wilts, and in the diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, wherein the present incumbent of such parish now possesses the exclusive cure of souls, which is bounded on the south by the 'parish of Atworth with South Wraxall annexed,' in the said county of Wilts, and in the diocese of Salisbury, on the west by the parish of Box, in the said county of Wilts, and in the diocese of Gloucester and Bristol aforesaid; and on all other sides, that is to say, on the north and on the east by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the last-named parish from the parish of Corsham aforesaid, at a point in the middle of the lane leading from Wadswick, past West-park Barn, to Corsham, near to which said point a boundary stone inscribed 'N. St. P. and St. J. D. C., 1869, No. 1,' has been placed; and extending thence north-eastward, for a distance of eleven chains or thereabouts along the middle of the said lane to its junction with Potley-lane; and extending thence first south-eastward along the middle of the last-named lane (thereby crossing over the Box Tunnel of the Great Western Railway), and then alternately north-eastward and northward, along the middle of the same lane, to the centre of the bridge which carries the same lane over the line of the Great Western Railway aforesaid; and extending thence north-eastward for a distance of thirty-one chains or thereabouts, along the middle of the said line of railway (thereby passing the Corsham Railway Station), to the centre of the bridge which carries the same line of railway over the lane leading from Pound Pill to Lipiat Farm, and extending thence south-westward, for a distance
