I. That the Turks shall deliver up the Town and Caof Alba Regalis, with all the Cannon, Mortars, ... mmunition, and other viengs thereunto belonging, without Fraud or Deceit.

II. That all those who being formerly Christians have become Turks within these 20 Years, shall remain in the place with their Families and Goeds; but those that were so before that time shall have leave to march out.

III. That the Prisoners or Christian Slaves, whether Soldiers or others, shall be restored to their Liberty, with

whatever belongs to them.

IV. That the Turks may take with them all their Children, even those they have had by Christian Wannen; This is to be understood of such Turks whose Fathers pere Mahometans.

V. That the Garison Shall march out with their Arms and as much Baggage as they can carry with them

on 300 Waggons.

VI. And that being come to the Danube they shall be furnished with 70 Barks to carry them with their

Baggago under a good Convoy to Belgrade.

This is a happy beginning of the Campagne, and gives the Imperial Arms opportunity of making greater Progresses. For now Sigeth, and Canifa which have been blocked up for some time, will be pressed yet closer, and it's hoped with the same Success the Blockade of Alba Regalis has had; And the Siege of Belgrade will in all appearance be refolved on, the taking of which place will facilitate the Conquest of the other Towns and Fortreffes the Turks remain possessed of

Hamburg, May 14, The Plenipotentiaries of Den-mark at the Treaty of Altena, having in their Answer to the late Overture made by the Mediators declared, (as you have been already told). That the King their Master did consent that the Duke of Holstein Ploen might be treated with for the Lands he has in Holftein, in order to transfer them to the Duke of Holftein, upon condition he would accept in the Counties of Oldenburg and Delmenhorst any farther fatisfaction he pretends to; The Holftein Minister has replied thereunto, That the Duke cannot agree to the Condition annext to this Proposition, in case the Negotiation with the Duke of Holftein Plobn should succeed, for that the Reasons which made him refuse those Counties when offered by way of Exchange or Equivalent, will much less suffer him to accept of any thing there, when divided among several Princes; and that therefore he is necessitated to infift on his intire Restitution, and to desire for the gaining of time, and the avoiding more trouble to the Mediators, that no farther mention may be made of the Counties, which his Highness can never consent to. We have an account from Berlin, That the present Elector had named the Baron Swerin to go for England in the Quality of his Envoy Extraordinary to notifie the Death of the late Elector his Father, and to deliver into his Majesties Hands his George and Garter, he having been one of the Knights Companions of that most Noble Order. . That there was a Discourse that fo ne of the Principal Officers of that Court, who had ferved the late Elector, would be removed from their Employments. And that the Body of the Deceased Prince had been brought to Berlin where it lay in state. They write from Copenhagen that the Fleet of that Crown composed of about 25 men of War was

ready to put to Sea.

Higue, May 25. The States of Holland are adjourned to the 16th of the next month. The West-India Company of these Countries have given in a second Answer to the Memorial of the Brandenburg Minister, on the subject of the Differences depending between them and the Subjects of that Elector Tracking on the Coasts of Africa.
