

the said diocese of Peterborough, have respectively signified to us their desire that the patronage of the said three benefices respectively, may be re-arranged, by way of exchange, in manner hereinafter recommended and proposed.

“And whereas we have made due enquiry and calculation as to the circumstances and relative values of the said benefices and patronage, and we do hereby certify to your Majesty that the circumstances and present values of the said three benefices respectively are as set forth in the schedule hereunto annexed.

“Now, therefore, with the consent of the said William Henry Bateson, the Master, and the Fellows and Scholars of the said College of Saint John the Evangelist, in the University of Cambridge, and with the consent of the said William Connor, Bishop of the said diocese of Peterborough (in testimony of which consent to this scheme the said Master, Fellows, and Scholars have affixed their common or corporate seal, and the said Bishop hath affixed his signature and episcopal seal), we humbly recommend and propose that, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and to the said benefice of Saint Bartholomew, Quorndon, and the church thereof, and also the whole advowson or perpetual right of patron-

age of and to the said benefice of Saint Peter, Mountsorrel, and the church thereof, shall, and each of them shall, be assigned and transferred from the said Master, Fellows, and Scholars of the said College of Saint John the Evangelist, in the University of Cambridge; and their successors; in whom as aforesaid the same are now vested, and shall, and each of the same two advowsons shall, become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may be exercised by the said William Connor, Bishop of the said diocese of Peterborough, and his successors Bishops of the same diocese for ever; and that in exchange for the same two advowsons or perpetual rights of patronage of and to the said two lastly-named benefices and the churches thereof, the advowson or perpetual patronage of the said benefice of Fulbourn All Saints shall be assigned and transferred from the said William Connor, Bishop of the said diocese of Peterborough, and from his successors; and shall become and be absolutely vested in, and shall and may be exercised by, the said Master, Fellows, and Scholars of the said College of Saint John the Evangelist, in the University of Cambridge, and their successors for ever.

“And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them; in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King

George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the eighth day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

“We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church situate at Millbrook, in the parish of Maker, which said parish is situate partly in the county of Devon, and partly in the county of Cornwall, and wholly in the diocese of Exeter.
