ON Tuesday last this Address was presented to His Majesty by the Honourable Bernard Howard of Norfolk, and signed by several Persons of Quality and others in and about Whitchester, which His Majesty received very Graciously, and Commanded the said Mr. Howard to give them His Thanks for it.

WE, whose Names are hereunto subscribed, being satisfied that the late Corporation of this City is dissolved; by the late Inrollment in His Majesties High Court of Chancery, of a Deed under the Common Seal of this City of *Winton*, made unto our Sovereign Lord King Charles the Second of glorious Memory, His Heirs and Successors, in the Year 1684. By which is granted, surrendered, and yielded up, unto him and them, all and sing lar the Powers, franchises, Liberties, Priviledges and Authoritie wherover, and howe ver granted, or to be used, or exercised by the Mayor, Baillifs, and Commonalty of the said City, or by any Elect Number of them, or by virtue of any Right, Title, or Interest vested in them, by Letters Patents, Custom, or Prescription. And that not only the Election for the future, but the very being now of all the Magistrates of this City, and Members of this Corporation, were (by the Deed lately enrolled, and now in force) given up and surrendered as aforesaid: And that since it was shewn unto Mr. Thomas Novell, the late Mayor, with the Inrollment Endorsed upon it, and the Copy thereof last set up in the Publick Market-place, attested by two of His Majesties Justices of the Peace for this County, We have not found that the said former Mayor, or any Officer of the former Corporation, will act, either as Magistrates, Justices of the Peace, or other ways wherover, or howe ver, as being of the said Corporation: And that for want of Magistrates, and other Officers, many Inconveniences and Tumults may arise from the Rabbble, and such poor People, as will soon be brought to extremity for want of being relieved weekly out of the City Estate, which we are informed by able and learned Council, if the Law, is destroyed, and will return to the first Donors. If the Surrender unto the late King and His Heirs is validly Recorded now in the Life of His present Majesty; We hereby Address our selves to the Honourable Mr. Bernard Howard of Norfolk, a former Member of the late Corporation, and Person, whoe frequent Endeavours and Requests unto His late Majesty, as well as to His present Majesty, for the Good and Welfare of the Corporation, and of the Inhabitants of this City of *Winton*, hath shewn, that he is never weary of, but ever willing to promote, we most instantly desire, that he will (in our behalfe) humbly beg of his Majesty to grant a new Charter unto this City of *Winton*, in such manner as in His Prince, Wisdom, He shall think most fitting, and to nominate how such Officers in it, and such Powers of electing others for the Future, as he shall think most proper for the good Government of it. And in case it is not too late (now that the said former Surrender is Recorded) His Majesty will, from his known Piety and Charitie towards His Poor Subjects in Distress, do all that in him lyeth to preserve, or retreve, the Estate which belonged unto this City, and was applied chiefly to relieve the Poor, and for other God and Charitable Uses, till such time as that the former Magistrates thereof had notice of the said Inrollment; and we shall not only be bound to give His Majesty humble Thanks for such His Pious Care, but continue to Pray, as we now do, That amongst other Blessings, God will not only Crown His Virtue, and the Exemplary Piety of His Royal Consort, by sending them and us a Prince of *Wales* (according to our former Prayers in our *Winchester* Address and with) but that he may likewise send them a Duke of *York*; and that both their Majesties may live to see them Men, and by being bred up under their Care, we may not doubt but they will inherit their unparallelled Virtues and Clemency, and that our unalterable Loyalty, Duty and Respect to their present Majesties, may yet make them have Pity on this Ancient City, which is now again weathering by their Adversaries which began to flourish and be envied, from being blessed with their Presence, And if the mistakes or faults of a very few in it, have occasioned either of their Majesties displeasure; We hope their Justice as well as eminent Goodness will not let all the Inhabitants of it suffer thereby. And we both Hope and Pray, That a Parliament will so entirely comply with His Majesty's just Desires and Deligns, as that He may the better be enabled to do what

will be most for the Good of all His People. And as He hath most plentifully spent great Summs out of His Income, in fitting thos Naval Stores and Land Magazines, which were much ex hausted when He came to the Crown; in fortifying our Ports, and maintaining an Army for our Safety, and to make this Nation as great at home, and Renowned and formidable abroad as we doubt not but we shall be, under the happy Reign of a King, whose Metis, when He was a Subject, was Crowned, not only with Universal Applause, but exceeding well by a publick Gift, by Act of Parliament, to His Majesties and the dust in Barre, against the then Enemies of *England*. We hope, we say, and Pray, That the next Parliament will recompence and fill His Exchequer, as that we may then be entirely secure, by His being Master of the Navy or War, and that thereby we may enjoy both Plenty and Peace, according to the hearty Prayers of the following Subscribers, whoe most earnestly desire again, That the said Mr. Howard will make known unto their Sacred Majesties, That we yet hope to see His Majesty's Coffers rung over with Plenty, that some may be spared to furnish His Royal Palace here, and that we may there have the Honour to kiss the Hands of their present Majesties, a Prince of *Wales*, and such another Duke of *York*, as that those Royal Princes may perpetuate their Majesties lasting known Fame, and Virtue, as long as the Sun shall照耀.

At the same time Mr. Howard Read and Presented to His Majesty the following Subscription, signed by himself and several Persons of Quality, and others in and about Winchester, which His Majesty gave them also His Thanks for, and accepted it very Graciously, as being pursuant to His Decisions, and the Method He hath thereby furnished that he intendeth to take, in order to Liberty of Conscience.

WE whose Names are hereunto Subscribed, do promise that whenever His Majesty shall think fitting to call a Parliament, we will use our utmost Endeavours, That such Members may be chosen to serve in it, as may endeavour, and as much as in them lieth, farther to secure the Protestant Religion as now established by Law, and not contribute to the repealing of any Constitution thereof. And in like manner, we will endeavour to have the Tests and Declaration repealed, and all such Penal Laws as are any way against the free Liberty of the exercise of the Consciences of any Christians, or Godfearing, or that shall impose Oaths or Penalties upon them for recusation of Religion, or for using or omitting any kind of Christian worship of serving the King or Queen, their Heirs, or Successors, in any Office or Employment, or otherwise whatsoever or howe ver; And where Laws are partly Constitutive as to Religion, and partly Penal for not Conforming thereto; we promise to endeavour that such Members may be chosen as we believe will preserve all the Clauses of the Constitution of the Protestant Religion, and repeat all Penalties therof Enacted against all such as are not of, and do not Conform in the Church of England, as now Established by Law, and to Preserve both in Church and State, the Rights, Dignities, Priviledges, and Prerogatives of our Sovereign Lord King James the second, and of His Lawful Heirs and Successors.
