Venice, May 21. The Convoy defigned for the Les vant failed on Sunday last with a fair Wind; and ano ther is preparing; with which will go the Prince of Brunfloick said the Prince of Turenne, with the 1400 Suiflers that are now at the Lido. The Provedito e General of Dalmatia has written to the Senate for more Troops, proposing, in case they be sent him, to attack D. is cigno. We have no fresh Advices f. om the Levant.

Vienna, My 23. On Friday laft arrived here an Express from Alba Regalis, with an account, That the two Aga's being returned thither the 17th Instant, with the Capitulation figued by the Emperor, the Balla in media ately affembled the Divan, where the Imperial Ratification being read, it was refolved to deliver up the Place pursuant to the Articles. That the 18th they were imployed the whole Day in Lading their Baggage upon the Waggons provided by the Treaty; That on the 19th they marched out of the Fortres, but went no faither. than the Suburbs, where they passed that Night under a good Guard, being in all about 4000 Souls, among a good Guard, being in an about 4000 sours, among which there were but 700 bearing Arms; And that the fiext Day they were Conducted towards the Date nube, being to Embark 4 Leagues below Buda on the Veffels that are to carry them to Begrade. The Imperialists having taken possession of the Town and Caitle, found there 84 pieces of Cannon, with a great num ber of small Arms, and almost an incredible Quantity of all forts of Ammunition, but no Provisions.

This Day Te Denm was Sung here in the Great Church for the Reduction of this Important Place; The Emperor coming purposely from Laxemburg to affir at it, which was concluded with 3 Baral Salvo's of all the artiflery of this City. The 21th affirm two Expresses, were dispatched from hence, one to General Carassa. and the other to General Caprara; with orders, to haften the march of the Troops that are appointed to Rendezvous at Effecke; From whence we have Advice; That General Caprara going with 600 Horie and 200 Dragoons to observe the Fortifications of Mockey the Turks put some Men into a Mosque that stands before the principal Gate, from whence they made a continual fire upon the imperialists to hinder their approach Wilereupon General Capeara cauled the Dragoons and forme of the Horsemen to alight and attack the Mosque; which they performed with that vigor that the Enemy were forced to abandon it and to retire into the Town Our Men purfued them as far as the Gates and might have entred the Town with them, had the number of the Dragons been fufficient for fuch an attempt; Ge-

neral Caprara received in this occasion two very fa-Vourable Shot, the one only piersing his Coat, and the other taking away a piece of his Glove without doing him any other harm; but a Cornet of Horse and some others were killed and several wounded. The Emperor returned this Evening to Laxemburg, whither the Duke of Lorrain is likewise gone to take his leave of their Imperial Maiesties in order to his Departure for Hungary. The Elector of Bavaria is expected here the beginning of the next month; He will Command an Army apart, which will be composed of his own Forces and 8 Imperial Regiments that are to join with them. write from Upper Hungary that Colonel Corhelli has blocked up Great Waradin with the Troops he has unother his Command. It is reported that the Imperialifts have abandoned Peter Waradin; And that the Turks have put a Garison into that place. Divers Christians who obtained their Liberty at the Surrender of Alba Regalis, are arrived here. Several Vessels pass daily down

the Danube with Recruits for the Imperial Regiments, Cologue, May 31. The Elector of Cologue is now so well, that he begins to rife and walk about his Chamber. The Cardinal Coadjutor is gone to Liege. The Recruits that have been raised in the Country of Liege, are arrived at Bonne; and others are expected to reinforce that Garison with 1200 Man. There Countries that have been raised. Three Companies that have been railed at Hildelbeim, are come to Keyserwaert: And there is a discourse of raising some new Regiments, to be Commanded by the Count Ferdinand de Furstemberg, the Count de Salme, & C. Our Magintates understanding that the Elector of Saxiny intends to raise the superior to the same than the superior of Saxiny intends to pass through this City in his journey to Francfort, are making great preparations for his Reception.

Bruffels, June 5. The 30th past began our Great Feaft, which was originally instituted on the occasion of a Great Victory obtained at Woering by John the First Duke of Brabant, and has been continued by the Magittrates of this City above these 400 years. There was a Great Entertainment at the Stadthouse, after a Procession of the several Companies of Trades, and a Splendid Cavalcade representing the King of Spain and the 15 Dukes of Brabant, attended with Triumphal Chariots and other Machines that were provided with greatCost and Ingenuity to adorn this Festival.. It was expected the Elector of Saxony would have come from Aix, where he now is, to have feen this Solemnity, and our Governor General had ordered Coaches to be laid for him; But his Electortl Highness sent the Master of his Horse to make his Excuse. The Prince and Princess of Friezland came hither incognito at the beginning of the Feast with many other Persons of Quality; And we are affured that there are now above 80000 Strangers in this City. All this Week will be spent in Feasting and Divertisements. Our Spanish Letters of the 17th past inform us, That the King has given the Government of the Province of Haynault, vacant by the Death of the Prince de Rache to the Count de Risberg. And that the Succors that were fent to Oran were entered into the place, so that they were not now in any fear of the Moors.
