The humble and thankful Address of Your Majesties Dutiful and Loyal Subjects the Mayor, Aldermen, Capital Burgeffes and Free Burgeffes of Your Majesties Corporation in your Ancient Burrough of Dewizes in the County of Wilts, as the same is Regulated by Your Majesties Royal Mandates.

Most Dread Sovereign!

**S**ince we enjoy the Benign Influence of your Majesties Gracious Declaration of the Fourth of April, 1687. in the free Exercise of our Religion and uninterrupted Peace in our Rights and Properties: And having farther Assurance of your Majesties Ready Resolution of adhering therunto by your Majesties Second Gracious Declaration of the 27th of April now last past: As we cannot be sufficiently Thankful to Almighty God for so great a mercy by his inclining your Royal Hearts to assert the Divine Prerogative over Conscience (wherein your Majesty hath exceeded your Royal Ancestors) so likewise do we with all Humility Tender to your Majesties Acceptance our most Humble and Grateful Acknowledgment for the happy Fruits and Effects we receive thereby, assuring your Majesty, that when you shall think fit to convene your Great Council in Parliament, we shall do our utmost Endeavours to choose such Representatives as shall join with your Majesty in a Magna Charta, whereby the Peace of all your Majesties Subjects in matters of Religion may be secured to Posterity.

*Now that your Majesties Kingdoms may be established in Righteousness and Peace, and a Crown of Glory be your Portion in the life to come, we, and shall be our incessant Prayers. In Testimony whereof we have hereunto affixed our Common Seal of your said Corporation, in the Guild-Hall of the said Burrough, the 11th Day of May, in the Fourth Year of your Majesties Reign over us, &c.*

*May it please Your Most Excellent Majesty,*

**W**E your most Faithful and truly Loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, Common Council and Burgeffes of your ancient Corporation of Cambridge, do humbly call at the Feet of your Most Sacred Majesty, our unfeigned Thanks for your most Gracious Declaration of Indulgence, which your Majesty hath been pleased with much Consideration to repeat: giving it a double strength by your Royal Word, so that none that are truly Loyal can doubt of the performance of your Majesties most Gracious Promise, or refuse to make their thankful Addresses for it. When therefore your Royal Wisdom shall think fit to call a Parliament, we your most Loyal Subjects intirely engage our selves and the utmost of our endeavours for the Election of such Members as will heartily concur with that Divine Principle of your Majesty, that Mens Consciences should not be forced in matters of Religion, nor they distinguished in the service of their Country, by other Tests than that of Loyalty. Wherefore the many Blessings we enjoy under your most Sacred Majesty engage us in daily Prayers to Almighty God, That as your Royal Virtues exceed all example, so your Reign above comparison may be the longest: Nor may we omit a Prince of Wales born of your Royal Consort our most Gracious Queen hath learned by a long experience the most Hearty Gratefulness of your Royal mind: In Testimony whereof we have unanimously caused our Common Seal to be affixed hereunto this 8th Day of May, in the Fourth Year of your Majesties Reign, Auno; Domini, 1688.

The humble Address of the Mayor, Recorder, Deputy Recorder, Aldermen, Bayliffs, Burgeffes, and Commonalty of Your ancient Corporation of Bedford, in Council Assembled.

May it please Your Majesty,

**W**E, Your most Loyal and Obedient Subjects, thankfully acknowledging the Goodness of God Almighty in placing

*You on the Throne of Your Royal Ancestors, do humbly offer our hearty Thanks to Your Majesty, for Your Gracious Declaration to all Your Loving Subjects for Liberty of Conscience, and for Your most Gracious Intention and Royal Resolution to have the same established by a Law; whereby the Church of England will be secured, and all Differences protected in the free Exercise of their Religion, and enjoyment of their Civil Rights. For the effecting so good and great a Work, we are resolved to endeavour in our several Capacities the Election of two such Burgesses to represent this Corporation in the next Parliament, as will concur with Your Majesty's Gracious Purposes, signified in Your said Gracious Declaration. And we shall ever pray for Your long Life and happy Reign over us.*

In Testimony whereof we have hereunto affixed our Common Seal of this Your Corporation, the Eighth Day of May, in the Fourth Year of Your Majesty's Reign.

*Venice, May 21.* The Convoy designed for the Levant failed on Sunday last with a fair Wind; and another is preparing; with which will go the Prince of Brunswick and the Prince of Turenne, with the 1400 Swissers that are now at the Lido. The Proveditor General of Dalmatia has written to the Senate for more Troops, proposing, in case they be sent him, to attack D. I. cigno. We have no fresh Advices from the Levant.

*Vienna, May 23.* On Friday last arrived here an Express from Alba Regalis, with an account, That the two Aga's being returned thither the 17th Instant, with the Capitulation signed by the Emperor, the Basha immediately assembled the Divan, where the Imperial Satisfaction being read, it was resolved to deliver up the Place pursuant to the Articles. That the 18th they were employed the whole Day in Lading their Baggage upon the Waggons provided by the Treaty; That on the 19th they marched out of the Forticks, but went no farther than the Suburbs, where they passed that Night under a good Guard, being in all about 4000 Souls, among which there were but 700 bearing Arms; And that the next Day they were Conducted towards the Danube, being to Embark 4 Leagues below Buda on the Vessels that are to carry them to B-grade. The Imperialists having taken possession of the Town and Castle, found there 84 pieces of Cannon, with a great number of small Arms, and almost an incredible Quantity of all sorts of Ammunition, but no Provisions.

This Day Te Deum was Sung here in the Great Church for the Reduction of this Important Place; The Emperor coming purposely from Luxemburg to assist at it, which was concluded with 3 Royal Salvo's of all the Artillery of this City. The 21th Instant two Expresses were dispatched from hence, one to General Caraffa, and the other to General Caprara; with orders, to hasten the march of the Troops that are appointed to Rendezvous at Esseeke; From whence we have Advice, That General Caprara going with 600 Horse and 200 Dragoons to observe the Fortifications of Illocke; the Turks put some Men into a Mosque that stands before the principal Gate, from whence they made a continual Fire upon the Imperialists to hinder their approach: Whereupon General Caprara caused the Dragoons and some of the Horsemen to alight and attack the Mosque, which they performed with that vigor that the Enemy were forced to abandon it and to retire into the Town; Our Men pursued them as far as the Gate, and might have entered the Town with them; had the number of the Dragoons been sufficient for such an attempt; Ge-

neral *Carrara* received in this occasion two very favourable Shot, the one only piercing his Coat, and the other taking away a piece of his Glove without doing him any other harm; but a Corfiet of Horse and some others were killed and several wounded. The Emperor returned this Evening to *Luxemburg*, whither the Duke of *Lorraine* is likewise gone to take his leave of their Imperial Majesties in order to his Departure for *Hungary*. The Elector of *Bavaria* is expected here the beginning of the next month; He will Command an Army apart, which will be composed of his own Forces and 8 Imperial Regiments that are to join with them. They write from *Upper Hungary* that Colonel *Corbelli* has blocked up *Great Waradin* with the Troops he has under his Command. It is reported that the Imperialists have abandoned *Peter Waradin*; And that the Turks have put a Garrison into that place. Divers Christians who obtained their Liberty at the Surrender of *Alba Regalis*, are arrived here. Several Vessels pass daily down the *Danube* with Recruits for the Imperial Regiments.

*Cologne, May 31.* The Elector of *Cologne* is now so well, that he begins to rise and walk about his Chamber. The Cardinal Coadjutor is gone to *Liege*. The Recruits that have been raised in the Country of *Liege*, are arrived at *Bonne*; and others are expected to reinforce that Garrison with 1200 Men. Three Companies that have been raised at *Hildesheim*, are come to *Keyserwaert*: And there is a discourse of raising some new Regiments, to be Commanded by the Count *Ferdinand de Furstenberg*, the Count of *Salme*, &c. Our Magistrates understanding that the Elector of *Saxony* intends to pass through this City in his journey to *Frankfort*, are making great preparations for his Reception.

*Brussels, June 5.* The 30th past began our Great Feast, which was originally instituted on the occasion of a Great Victory obtained at *Woering* by *John* the First Duke of *Brabant*, and has been continued by the Magistrates of this City above these 400 years. There was a Great Entertainment at the Stadthouse, after a Procession of the several Companies of Trades, and a Splendid Cavalcade representing the King of *Spain* and the 15 Dukes of *Brabant*, attended with Triumphant Chariots and other Machines that were provided with great Cost and Ingenuity to adorn this Festival. It was expected the Elector of *Saxony* would have come from *Aix*, where he now is, to have seen this Solemnity, and our Governor General had ordered Coaches to be laid for him; But his Elector's Highness sent the Master of his Horse to make his Excuse. The Prince and Princess of *Friesland* came hither incognito at the beginning of the Feast with many other Persons of Quality; And we are assured that there are now above 80000 Strangers in this City. All this Week will be spent in Feasting and Diversions. Our Spanish Letters of the 17th past inform us, That the King has given the Government of the Province of *Haynault*, vacant by the Death of the Prince de *Rache* to the Count de *Risberg*. And that the Succors that were sent to *Oran* were entered into the place, so that they were not now in any fear of the Moors.

*Hague, June 4.* The Prince and Princess of *Orange* went from hence on *Monday* last with their whole Court to *Honslaerdike* to pass there part of the Summer. The Heer *Bodessiryn*, the *Brandenburgh* Minister, having performed the Commission he was sent hither upon, will part from hence to morrow on his return to *Berlin*. Admiral *Euerse* is gone to Command the Squadron of this State. They write from *Vienna* that the Garrison of *Alba Regalis* marched out but 700 strong.

*Plimouth, May 25.* His Majesty's Ship the *Charles* Galley, Commanded by the Right Honourable the Lord *Berkeley*, arrived in this Port on *Wednesday* last from the *Streights*, and having taken in some Provisions, Sailed again this Morning for the *Dawns*.

*Portsmouth, May 29.* On *Thursday* last His Majesty's Ships the *Jarvis* and the *Castans Warwick*, Sailed out of

this Harbour to *Spirhead*, and were followed the next Day by the *Reserve*. And on *Sunday* in the Afternoon they all Sailed for the *Dawns*.

*Whitehall, May 30.* This Day the *Sieur de Lente*, Counsellor of State, and Envoy Extraordinary of the King of *Denmark*, had his Audience of Leave of His Majesty, being Conducted by Sir *Charles Carter* Master of the Ceremonies.
