west partly by the parish of Saint John the Evangelist, Westminster, in the county of Middlesex, and in the diocese of London, and partly by the new parish of Saint George, Battersea, in the said county of Surrey, and in the diocese of Winchester aforesaid, on the south partly by the new parish of Saint Barnabas, South Kennington, and partly by the new parish of Saint Stephen, South Lambeth, both in the last-named county and diocese, and on the remaining side, that is to say, on the east, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the last-named new parish from the district parish of Saint Mark, Kennington aforesaid, at a point in the middle of Meadow-road near its south-western end ; and extending thence, first north-eastward and then eastward, for a distance of nineteen and a-half chains or thereabouts, along the middle of the said road, to a boundary stone inscribed 'S. L. St. A. D. C., 1869, No. 1,' and placed in the middle of the south-western end of the wall or fence forming the north-western boundary of the garden attached to the house, situate on the south-western side of Kennington Oval, and called or known as No. 1, Exeter-villas, at the junction of the said Meadow-road with Trigon-road; and extending thence, north-eastward, along the middle of the said wall or fence, to a boundary stone inscribed 'S. L. St. A. D. C. 1869, No. 2,' and placed at the north-eastern end of the same wall or fence on the south-western side of the road which passes along the south-western side of Kennington Oval aforesaid; and continuing thence, still north-eastward, and in a direct line, to a point in the middle of the last described road; and extending thence, north-westward, for a distance of five and a-half chains, or thereabouts, along the middle of the same road, to its junction with Harleyfordroad ; and continuing thence, still north-westward, along the middle of the last-named road, to its junction with Durham-street; and extending thence, northward, along the middle of the lastnamed street, to the boundary at the junction of the same street with Upper Kennington-lane, which divides the said district parish of Saint Mark, Kennington, from the new parish of Saint Peter, Vauxhall aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Winchester.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven; of the Act of the nineteenth

and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and four; and of the Act of the twentythird and twenty-fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the tenth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixtynine, in the words following; that is to say:

nine, in the words following; that is to say: "We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen; of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirtyseven; of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and four; and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes out of the parish or parochial chapelry of Saint John, Newcastleupon-Tyne, in the county of the town of Newcastle-upon-Tyne, and in the diocese of Durham.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular part of the said parish or parochial chapelry of Saint John, Newcastle-upon-Tyne, which is hereinafter mentioned and described (such part not at present containing within its limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of divine worship), should be constituted a separate district in manner hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas certain tithe rent charges arising within the said parish or parochial chapelry of Saint John, Newcastle-upon-Tyne, have become vested in us, under the provisions of and for the purposes of the herein mentioned Acts, or of some of them, and we have; in respect of such tithe rent charges, agreed to make and pay out of the common fund created by the firstly herein mentioned Act, to the incumbent of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted, so soon as an incumbent thereof shall have been appointed and licensed in accordance with the provisions of the secondly herein mentioned Act, and to his successors, a grant of two hundred pounds per annum; and also a further grant of one hundred pounds per annum, so soon as a church shall have been erected within and for such district, and shall have been approved by us and shall have been consecrated as the church of such district.

"And whereas such grants as aforesaid will be secured by an instrument or instruments to be executed by us under our common seal, in accordance with the provisions of the Act of the twentyninth and thirtieth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and eleven.

Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Charles, Bishop of the said diocese of Durham (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme), we humbly recommend and propose, that all that part of the said parish or parochial chapelry of Saint John, Newcastle-upon-Tyne, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, and which is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed, shall, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint Matthew, Newcastle-upon-Tyne.'

And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them,
