

hamlet of Dogsthorpe, which under the provisions of an Order of Her Majesty in Council, bearing date the eleventh day of March, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three, would upon the next avoidance of the rectory of the parish of Paston, in the said county and diocese, have become annexed to such last-named parish), all which portions of the said new parish of Saint Mark, Peterborough, and of the parish of Saint John the Baptist, Peterborough aforesaid, are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish from the last-named parish, at a point in the centre of Westwood Bridge, which carries Westwood-road over the line of the Great Northern Railway; and extending thence eastward along the middle of the said road to its junction with the Lincoln-road; and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the last-named road to its junction with Garton End-road; and extending thence north-eastward for a distance of forty-five and a half chains or thereabouts, along the middle of the last-named road to the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Mark, Peterborough, from the parish of Saint John the Baptist, Peterborough aforesaid; and extending thence north-westward, for a distance of twenty-eight chains or thereabouts, along the last-described boundary, thereby following in part the course of the Garton End Drain to the point where it joins the Westwood Drain; and extending thence north-eastward, for a distance of twenty-three chains or thereabouts, along the middle of the last-named drain to the point where it strikes the southern side of the Walton-road, which leads from Dogsthorpe to New England; and extending thence, first northward to and then westward for a distance of four and a half chains or thereabouts, along the middle of the last-described road to its junction with the Paston-road, which leads from Dogsthorpe aforesaid to Paston Church; and extending thence north-westward for a distance of twenty-five chains, or thereabouts, along the middle of the last-described road to the boundary, which divides the said parish of Saint John the Baptist, Peterborough, from the parish of Paston aforesaid; and extending thence generally westward along the last-described boundary to its junction in the middle of the Lincoln-road aforesaid with the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Mark, Peterborough, from the parish of Paston aforesaid; and extending thence alternately north-westward and south-westward along the last-described boundary to its junction, in the middle of the line of the Great Northern Railway aforesaid, with the boundary which divides the said parish of Saint John the Baptist, Peterborough, from the new parish of Saint Mark, Peterborough aforesaid; and extending thence south-eastward for a distance of rather more than a mile along the last-described boundary, thereby following the middle of the said line of railway to the first-described point in the centre of Westwood Bridge, which carries Westwood-road over the same line of railway as aforesaid, at which point the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the

London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Peterborough.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twenty-second day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church situate at Wincle, in the parish of Prestbury, in the county of Chester, and in the diocese of Chester.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church situate at Wincle, as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend William, Bishop of the said diocese of Chester (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those portions of the said parish of Prestbury, which are comprised within, and are co-extensive with, the limits of the township and parochial chapelry of Wincle, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church situate at Wincle as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Wincle.'

"And with the like consent of the said William, Bishop of the said diocese of Chester (testified as aforesaid) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns, and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices, should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that so long as the Reverend Stephen Lea Wilson, the present vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the said parish of Prestbury, shall continue to be such vicar or incumbent, all the fees which may be received in respect
