

church of Saint Gabriel, Hulme, situate within the limits of the new parish of Saint George, Hulme, as aforesaid, and shall become and be a district for spiritual purposes, and shall be named 'The District of Saint Gabriel, Hulme.'

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or to any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the herein named Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of Saint Gabriel, Hulme, being:—

"All that part of the new parish of Saint George, Hulme (within the original limits of the parish of Manchester), in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Manchester, which is bounded on the south-west by the territory (also within the original limits of the parish of Manchester aforesaid), which, by the terms of an Order of Her Majesty in Council, dated the thirty-first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, and published in the London Gazette on the thirteenth day of August in the same year, was annexed, or was purported to be annexed, to the church of Saint Thomas, at Old Trafford, and which was in the same Order named 'The District of Saint Thomas, Old Trafford;' on the south-east by the new parish of Saint Mary, Hulme; on the north-east by the new parish of Saint Michael, Hulme (both within the original limits of the parish of Manchester as aforesaid), and on the remaining side, that is to say, on the north-west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the last-named new parish from the new parish of Saint George, Hulme aforesaid, at the point where Moss-lane is intersected by City-road; and extending thence, south-westward, along the middle of the said road to its junction with Lord-street; and extending thence, north-westward, along the middle of the last-named street to its junction with Wall-street; and extending thence, south-westward along the middle of the last-named street to a point at the north-eastern end of the wall forming the south-eastern boundary of the buildings and premises called or known as the Cavalry Barracks, and continuing thence still south-westward along the said wall to its south-western end upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint George, Hulme, from the territory designed for 'The District of Saint Thomas, Old Trafford aforesaid.'

And whereas a draft of the said scheme has, in accordance with the provisions of the said firstly-mentioned Act, been transmitted to the patrons and to the Incumbent of the rectory of the said new parish of Saint George, Hulme, out of which it is intended that the district therein recommended to be constituted shall be taken, and such patrons and Incumbent have respectively signified their assent to the said scheme.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is

pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Manchester.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Right Honourable Henry Austin Bruce, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned, ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has, under the provisions of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intitled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the Metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous consent of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued in them, with the following modifications, viz.:—

COLEY, HALIFAX.—Forthwith wholly in the church of Coley, in the parish of Halifax; and also in the churchyard, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, in which each coffin shall be embedded in charcoal, and separately enclosed by brickwork or stonework properly cemented, and except in family earthen graves which can be opened without the exposure of coffins, or the disturbance of remains.

ST. MICHAEL'S, LIVERPOOL.—Forthwith wholly in the church of Saint Michael, Toxteth Park, in the parish of Walton-on-the-Hill; and also in the churchyard, except in family vaults which can be used without baling out water, and except in family graves which can be opened to the depth of five feet without the exposure of coffins or the disturbance of remains; and that at least a day's notice of any intended burial be given to the Surveyor of the Toxteth Park Local Board of Health.

GUIBOROUGH.—Forthwith wholly in the church of the parish of Guisborough, in the county of York; and on and after the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-two, in the churchyard, except in family vaults and walled graves existing on the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, in which each coffin shall be embedded in charcoal and separately enclosed by brickwork or stonework properly cemented, and except in other graves for the burial of the widowers, widows, and parents of those previously buried therein.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the twentieth day of September next:
