*Her Majesty's Most Gracious Speech, delivered by the Lords Commissioners to both Houses of Parliament, on Wednesday, August 11th, 1869.*

*My Lords, and Gentlemen,*

**W**E are commanded by Her Majesty to dispense with your further attendance in Parliament.

Her Majesty announces to you with pleasure that She continues to receive from all Foreign Powers the strongest assurances of their friendly disposition, and that Her confidence in the preservation of peace has been continued and confirmed during the present year.

The negotiations in which Her Majesty was engaged with the United States of North America have by mutual consent been suspended; and Her Majesty earnestly hopes that this delay may tend to maintain the relations between the two countries on a durable basis of friendship.

Her Majesty has a lively satisfaction in acknowledging the untiring zeal and assiduity with which you have prosecuted the arduous labours of the year.

In the Act for putting an end to the Establishment of the Irish Church you carefully kept in view the several considerations which, at the opening of the Session, were commended to your notice.

It is the hope of Her Majesty that this important measure may hereafter be remembered as a conclusive proof of the paramount anxiety of Parliament to pay reasonable regard, in legislating for each of the three kingdoms, to the special circumstances by which it may be distinguished, and to deal on principles of impartial justice with all interests and all portions of the nation.

Her Majesty firmly trusts that the Act may promote the work of peace in Ireland, and may help to unite all classes of its people in that fraternal concord with their English and Scottish fellow subjects which must ever form the chief source of strength to Her extended Empire.

Her Majesty has observed with pleasure your general and cordial readiness to unite in the removal, through the Assessed Rates Act, of a practical grievance which was widely felt.

Her Majesty congratulates you on having brought your protracted labours on the subjects

of Bankruptcy and of Imprisonment for Debt to a legislative conclusion which is regarded with just satisfaction by the trading classes and by the general public.

The law which you have framed for the better government of Endowed Schools in England will render large resources of these establishments more accessible to the community, and more efficient for their important purpose.

It may reasonably be expected that the Act for the supervision of Habitual Criminals will contribute further to the security of life and property.

The measure which has been passed with respect to the Contagious Diseases of Animals will, as Her Majesty believes, add confidence and safety to the important trades of breeding and feeding cattle at home, without unnecessarily impeding the freedom of import from abroad.

By the repeal of the tax on Fire Insurance you have met a long-cherished wish of the community; and in the removal of the duty on Corn Her Majesty sees new evidence of your desire to extend industry and commerce, and to enlarge to the uttermost those supplies of food which our insular position in a peculiar degree both encourages and requires.

Her Majesty trusts that the measure for the purchase and management of the Electric Telegraphs by the State may be found to facilitate the great commercial and social object of rapid, easy, and certain communication, and may prove no unworthy sequel to that system of cheap postage which has passed with much advantage into so many countries of the civilized world.

*Gentlemen of the House of Commons,*

We are commanded to state that Her Majesty thanks you for the liberal supplies which you have granted for the service of the year, and for the measures by which you have enabled Her at once to liquidate the charge of the Abyssinian Expedition.

*My Lords and Gentlemen,*

Her Majesty reflects with pleasure that, in returning to your several homes, you may contemplate with thankfulness the fruit of your exertions in the passing of many important laws,

a portion of which we have now had it in command to notice.

During the recess you will continue to acquire that practical knowledge and experience which form the solid basis of legislative aptitude; and Her Majesty invokes the blessing of the Almighty alike upon your recent and your future labours for the public weal.

Then a Commission for proroguing the Parliament was read after which the Lord-Chancellor said:

*My Lords and Gentlemen,*

By virtue of Her Majesty's Commission, under the Great Seal, to us and other Lords directed, and now read, we do, in Her Majesty's name, and in obedience to Her Commands, prorogue this Parliament to Thursday, the twenty-eight day of October next, to be then here holden; and this Parliament is accordingly prorogued to Thursday, the twenty-eighth day of October next.

PRESENT.

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of "The Ecclesiastical Commission Act, 1868," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the first day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the 'Ecclesiastical Commission Act, 1868,' sections three and four, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme relating to the dean and chapter of the collegiate church of Saint Peter, Westminster, of which corporation your Majesty is visitor.

"Whereas the said chapter now consists of a dean and six canons, six canonries having been suspended under the provisions of an Act passed in the session held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the fourth Report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues.'

"And whereas the said dean and chapter have agreed with us that a scheme should be laid before your Majesty in Council, for carrying into effect a transfer to us of part of the property belonging to them for the considerations and upon the terms hereinafter set forth, which terms are in our opinion fair and reasonable; and the said dean and chapter have further agreed with us that such scheme should also comprise the incidental provisions hereinafter set forth, such pro-

visions being necessary for carrying into effect the said transfer.

"And whereas the lands, tithes, tenements, and hereditaments, which are particularly described in the schedule hereunto annexed and marked A, are part of the property of the said dean and chapter; and the said dean and chapter are also beneficially interested in or otherwise entitled to the sums of stock and cash particularly specified and set forth in the schedule hereunto annexed, marked C.

"And whereas we are in possession of certain lands, tenements, and hereditaments, particularly described in the schedule hereunto annexed and marked B, the whole of which are vested in us in fee simple, excepting small portions thereof, amounting to about twelve acres, which are held by us under leases at peppercorn rents, granted for terms of eight hundred years; and we are also in possession of the lands, tenements, and hereditaments comprised in the second part of the said schedule marked A, having acquired, by purchase and otherwise, certain leasehold and copyhold interests therein.

"And whereas by an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the eighth day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three, and duly published in the London Gazette of the twenty-sixth day of the same month, and made under the authority of the hereinbefore mentioned Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, and of another Act of the fourth and fifth years of your Majesty, intituled 'An Act to explain and amend two several Acts relating to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England,' provision is made for securing to the dean and canons of the said collegiate church, appointed subsequently to the date of the said Order the respective annual income of two thousand pounds for such dean and one thousand pounds for every such canon, it being by the said Order provided that the surplus decanal or canonical income calculated in the manner therein specified, shall be paid over to us, or that any deficiency in the amount of such income, shall be made up by means of payments out of our funds.

"And whereas two of the canons of the said church were appointed previously to the date of the said Order and are accordingly now receiving and are entitled to receive, so long as they may continue to hold their canonries, the same proportions of the capitular income as they would have been entitled to receive had such Order not been passed, that is to say, the Reverend John Thynne, Doctor in Divinity, commonly called Lord John Thynne, as the holder of a canonry to which he was appointed before the passing of the said Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty is entitled to receive the whole share of capitular income arising in respect of his said canonry; and the Reverend John Jennings, Master of Arts, as the holder of the canonry which by the same Act was annexed to the rectory of the parish of Saint John, in the city of Westminster, is entitled, under the provisions of the same Act, and of another Act passed in the Session of Parliament held in the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of your Majesty and intituled 'An Act to further amend the Acts relating to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England,' to receive two-third parts of the share of capitular revenue arising in respect of his said canonry, and we are satisfied after due enquiry that the shares of capitular revenue which the said John

Thynne and John Jennings are entitled to receive respectively as aforesaid, may be fairly estimated as exceeding on the average the annual incomes to which the future holders of their canonries will be entitled by the respective annual amounts of one thousand and five hundred pounds and six hundred and sixty-six pounds thirteen shillings and fourpence.

“And whereas the Right Reverend Christopher, Lord Bishop of Lincoln, was previously to the twenty-fourth day of February now last past, on which date he succeeded to his said See, the holder of a canonry in the said church and was entitled as such canon, under the provisions of an Order of your Majesty in Council, dated the third day of April, one thousand eight hundred and forty-three, and published in the London Gazette on the fourth day of the same month (which provisions will not affect any future canon of the said church), to receive five-sixths of the share of capitular revenue arising in respect of his said canonry, and we are satisfied that the share of capitular revenue which the said bishop was as such canon thus entitled to receive may be estimated as exceeding on the average the annual income to which the present holder of the same canonry will be entitled by the amount of one thousand and eighty-three pounds six shillings and eight pence annually.

“And whereas by the ‘Public Schools Act, 1868,’ provision is made for the payment by us to the governing body of Westminster School for the time being of a capital sum of fifteen thousand pounds and of an annual sum of three thousand and five hundred pounds, and it is by the said Act enacted that in consideration of the said payments all annual or other sums of money which if the said Act had not been passed would have been paid to Westminster School by the said dean and chapter after the twenty-ninth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight shall belong and be paid to us.

“And whereas we have accordingly paid to the governing body of the said school the said sum of fifteen thousand pounds, and are now paying to such governing body the said annual sum of three thousand and five hundred pounds in the manner prescribed by the said Act.

“And whereas, after due inquiry, we have satisfied ourselves that the income arising from the lands and hereditaments hereinafter proposed to be reserved or transferred to the said dean and chapter, and from the several annual payments proposed to be made to them by us, will suffice, after the appropriation of a certain part of such income in the manner hereinafter recommended to the maintenance of the fabric, establishment, and services of the said church, to provide for the present and future dean and canons the incomes to which they are respectively entitled under the provisions of the hereinbefore recited Acts and Orders in Council, and we are of opinion that the arrangement hereinafter set forth will be the most convenient mode of effecting for the future the purposes contemplated in the first hereinbefore mentioned Order of Your Majesty in Council.

“Now, therefore, with the consent of the dean and chapter of the Collegiate Church of Saint Peter, Westminster, testified by their having hereunto affixed their corporate seal, and with the consent of Your Majesty, as visitor, testified by Your Majesty’s sign manual, we humbly recommend and propose that all the

manors, lands, tithes, tenements, and hereditaments, and the sums specified in the Schedule marked C, annexed to this scheme, together with all other sums of stock and cash, if any, which belong either in possession or reversion to the said dean and chapter, excepting any right of ecclesiastical, educational, or other like patronage, the said Collegiate Church and the precincts thereof (with all buildings therein) designated the Parish of the Close of the Collegiate Church of Saint Peter, Westminster, and excepting also the lands, tenements, and hereditaments, particularly described in the two parts of the Schedule hereunto annexed, marked A, together with the benefit of the perpetual land-tax charged thereupon, which has been redeemed, shall upon and from the day on which any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be duly published in the London Gazette, be transferred to us in the manner contemplated by the said first-mentioned Act, and that we shall be entitled to the rents, profits, and proceeds thereof as from the twenty-ninth day of September, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, and that in consideration of and for such transfer, the lands, tenements, and hereditaments particularly set forth in the Schedule hereunto annexed, marked B, together with the benefit of the perpetual land tax charged thereon, which has been redeemed, and also all our estate and interest in the lands, tenements, and hereditaments, particularly set forth in the second part of the Schedule hereunto annexed, marked A, shall upon and from the day on which any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be duly published in the London Gazette, be transferred to the said dean and chapter in the manner contemplated by the said first-mentioned Act, and that the said dean and chapter shall be entitled to the rents, profits, and proceeds thereof, as from the said twenty-ninth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, and that in further consideration of and for such transfer, we shall surrender all right, and be excluded from all participation (in respect of the said suspended canonries or otherwise) to and in the proceeds of the estates and property to be retained by the said dean and chapter, or to be hereby or hereafter transferred to them as part of their permanent endowment, or in the money payments hereinafter mentioned; and that in further consideration of and for such transfer to us as aforesaid there shall be paid by us to the said dean and chapter by equal half-yearly payments on the twenty-fifth day of March and the twenty-ninth day of September in every year, the annual sum of nine thousand and nine hundred pounds, and that such payment shall continue until the said dean and chapter shall have been under the authority, provided by the said first-mentioned Act, put in possession in fee simple of real estates sufficient to secure to them a clear annual income irrespective of the income arising from the estates intended to be hereby reserved or transferred to them, and after allowing for rates, taxes, agency, and other outgoings, of nine thousand and nine hundred pounds.

“And we further recommend and propose, that in further consideration of, and for such transfer, there shall be paid by us to the said dean and chapter by equal half-yearly payments on the twenty-fifth day of March and the twenty-ninth day of September in every year, the following annual sums, until the several avoidances of the two canonries particularly hereinbefore referred to, that is to say, the annual sum of one thousand and five hundred pounds, until the avoidance of the canonry held by the said John Thynne, and

the sum of six hundred and sixty-six pounds thirteen shillings and four pence, until the avoidance of the canonry held by the said John Jennings, and that such two last-mentioned annual sums shall be paid over by the said dean and chapter to the said John Thynne and John Jennings respectively, and that there shall also be paid by us to the said dean and chapter for the said Bishop of Lincoln, the sum of four hundred and fifty-four pounds seven shillings and eleven pence, being a proportionate part of the before-mentioned annual amount of one thousand and eighty-three pounds six shillings and eight pence for the period which elapsed between the said twenty-ninth day of September one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight and the said twenty-fourth day of February now last past.

"And we further recommend and propose, that there shall also be paid by us to the said dean and chapter by equal half-yearly payments, on the twenty-fifth day of March and the twenty-ninth day of September in every year during the life of Charles St. Clare Bedford, Gentleman, their present chapter clerk, the annual sum of four hundred pounds (such last-mentioned sum to be by them appropriated and paid to the said Charles St. Clare Bedford, in respect of the profits which would have accrued to him on account of the management of the estates hereby proposed to be transferred to us), and that the first half-yearly payment in respect of each of the annual sums hereinbefore proposed to be paid to the said dean and chapter, for the period which elapsed between the said twenty-ninth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, and the twenty-fifth day of March now last past, shall be made immediately on the publication in the London Gazette, of an Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme.

"And we further recommend and propose, that as the consideration for the loss which the said dean and chapter have sustained by having abstained from renewing certain leases of the said lands, tenements, and hereditaments hereby proposed to be transferred to us, which became renewable prior to or upon the said twenty-ninth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, there shall immediately upon the publication of such Order as aforesaid, be paid by us to the said dean and chapter a sum of seventy thousand pounds (of which sum fifty-eight thousand and fifty seven pounds six shillings and four pence will be repaid to us, as the amount to which we shall become entitled in respect of our right to share in the capitular revenues according to the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Order of the eighth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three), and that the receipt or receipts of the treasurer for the time being of the said dean and chapter, shall be a good and valid discharge to us for all or any and every such sum or sums of money, as shall therein be expressed to have been paid to him by us under the authority of this scheme, when ratified as aforesaid.

"And we further recommend and propose that as a further consideration for such transfer to us as aforesaid a capital sum of twenty thousand pounds shall be set apart by us to be expended by the said dean and chapter to our satisfaction, in substantial repairs, restoration, and improvements of the said collegiate church and of the

buildings belonging thereto, and that interest after the rate of three pounds per centum per annum shall be allowed by us to the said dean and chapter, as from the said twenty-ninth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, upon the said capital sum of twenty thousand pounds, and on the balances thereof from time to time remaining in our hands, such interest to be also expended to our satisfaction in substantial repair, restoration, and improvement of the said collegiate church and buildings.

"And we further recommend and propose that, until the said dean and chapter shall have been put in possession in the manner hereinbefore mentioned of real estates calculated to produce the sum of nine thousand and nine hundred pounds per annum, the total annual income derived by them from all sources, excepting the three several annual sums hereinbefore proposed to be paid by us for the benefit of the said John Thynne, John Jennings, and Charles St. Clare Bedford respectively, shall be appropriated in the following manner, namely, the sum of eight thousand pounds per annum shall be applied to providing the incomes of the dean and canons, that is to say, the income of two thousand pounds for the dean, and one thousand pounds for each canon, and that the remainder of such total annual income shall be appropriated to the maintenance of the services of the said church, the repairs of the fabric thereof, and of the collegiate buildings, and to the payment of all the other expenses and liabilities chargeable upon the corporate revenues of the said dean and chapter, and that if the whole of such total annual income be not expended as aforesaid in any one year, the surplus thereof shall be accumulated and be applicable to making good deficiencies (if any) in subsequent years, and that when and as soon as the said dean and chapter shall have been placed in possession as aforesaid of real estates calculated to produce the annual sum of nine thousand and nine hundred pounds, the net income derived by them from such estates and from the estates hereby proposed to be reserved to, and to be transferred to them after payment of all outgoings and charges thereon, shall be annually divided by them into twenty parts, which twenty parts shall be appropriated in perpetuity as follows: that is to say, two of such parts for the income of the dean, six of such parts for the income of the six canons, and the remaining twelve of such parts, together with the income arising from the profits of the office of High Bailiff of Westminster, and from fees and any other sources, shall be applied to defray the expenses of maintaining the services of the said church, the repairs of the fabric, and collegiate buildings, and all the other expenses and liabilities chargeable upon the corporate revenues of the dean and chapter: provided always that if the whole of such twelve parts or of the income derived from the sources last mentioned be not in any year so expended the surplus thereof shall be accumulated and be applicable to making good deficiencies (if any) in subsequent years.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid in conformity with the said Acts, or either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament."

“ And also the sum of one thousand eight hundred and eighteen pounds and sixteen shillings Reduced three pounds per centum Bank Annuities, standing in the name of the Accountant General of the Court of Chancery, in trust ‘ Exparte the South Eastern Railway Company, in the Matter of the Charing Cross Railway Acts, 1859, 1863, and 1864, the account of the Dean and Chapter of Westminster, Land on lease to Thomas Coster for 40 years from Michaelmas, 1850.’

“ And also the sum of seven thousand two hundred and two pounds five shillings and seven pence, Reduced three pounds per centum Bank Annuities, standing in the name of the Accountant-General of the Court of Chancery, in trust ‘ Exparte the South Eastern Railway Company, in the Matter of the Charing Cross Railway Acts, 1859, 1863, and 1864, the account of the Dean and Chapter of Westminster, Land on Leases to Timothy Yeates, Richard Silvester Warrington, and Joseph Smith, for 21 years each from Lady Day 1855.’

“ And also the sum of nine thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight pounds and four shillings, Reduced three pounds per centum Bank Annuities, standing in the name of the Accountant-General of the Court of Chancery, in trust ‘ Exparte the Westminster Improvement Commissioners, in the Matter of the Westminster Improvement and Encumbered Estate Act, 1865, the account of the Dean and Chapter of the Collegiate Church of Saint Peter, Westminster.’

“ And also the sum of one thousand three hundred and sixty-three pounds twelve shillings and nine pence, Three pounds per centum Consolidated Bank Annuities, standing in the name of the Accountant General of the Court of Chancery, in trust ‘ Exparte the Dean and Chapter of Westminster, in the Matter of the Public Offices Act, 1865.’



“And also the sum of one thousand nine hundred and seventy-eight pounds and five pence, Bank three pounds per centum Consolidated Annuities, standing in the name of the Accountant General of the Court of Chancery, in trust ‘Exparte the Westminster Improvement Commissioners, in the Matter of the Dean and Chapter of Westminster.’”

“And also the sum of seven hundred and fifty-six pounds one shilling and seven pence, Three pounds per centum Consolidated Bank Annuities, standing in the name of the Accountant General of the Court of Chancery, in trust ‘Exparte the Dean and Chapter of Westminster, in the Matter of an Act passed in the Session 1847.’”

“And also the sum of one hundred and twenty-four pounds fifteen shillings and six pence, Three pounds per centum Consolidated Bank Annuities, standing in the name of the Accountant General of the Court of Chancery, in trust ‘Exparte the Great Northern Railway Company, the Dean and Chapter of Westminster.’”

“And also the sum of seven hundred and seventy pounds and thirteen shillings, Three pounds per centum Consolidated Bank Annuities, standing in the name of the Remembrancer of Her Majesty’s Court of Exchequer to the credit of ‘The Ordnance Account of the Dean and Chapter of the Collegiate Church of Saint Peter, Westminster.’”

“And also the sum of two hundred and fifty pounds thirteen shillings and seven pence, Reduced three pounds per centum Bank Annuities, standing in the name of the Accountant-General of the Court of Chancery, in trust ‘Exparte the South Leicestershire Railway Company, the account of the Dean and Chapter of Westminster.’”

“And also the sum of three hundred and fifty-four pounds fourteen shillings and two pence, Three pounds per centum Consolidated Bank Annuities, standing in the name of the Accountant-General of the Court of Chancery, in trust ‘Exparte the Board of Works for the Westminster District and the Dean and Chapter of the Collegiate Church of Saint Peter, Westminster, the account of the Dean and Chapter of Westminster.’”

“And also the sum of four hundred and ninety-two pounds six shillings and seven pence Reduced three pounds per centum Bank Annuities, standing in the name of the Accountant General of the Court of Chancery, in trust ‘Exparte the Commissioners acting under an Act entitled an Act for Consolidating the trusts of the several Turnpike-roads in the neighborhood of the Metropolis north of the River Thames, the account of the Dean and Chapter of Westminster.’”

“And also the sum of seven hundred and ninety-seven pounds fifteen shillings and six pence, Three pounds per centum Consolidated Bank Annuities, standing in the name of the Accountant General of the Court of Chancery, in trust ‘Exparte the Great Western Railway Company, the account of the Dean and Chapter of Westminster.’”

“And also the sum of four hundred and seventeen pounds sixteen shillings and seven pence, Three pounds per centum Consolidated Bank Annuities, standing in the name of the Accountant-General of the Court of Chancery, in trust ‘Exparte the Kettering, Thrapstone, and Huntingdon Railway Company, in the Matter of the Kettering, Thrapstone, and Huntingdon Railway Act, 1863, the account of the Dean and Chapter of Westminster.’”

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this

Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of London.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the fifth day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, in the words following; that is to say:—

“We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, sections six and eight, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for authorizing the sale and disposal of certain property formerly belonging to the sinecure rectory of Llansaintffraid-yn-Mechan;

in the county of Montgomery, and now vested in us.

“Whereas on the vacancy of the said rectory, which occurred on or about the fourteenth day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, by the decease of the Reverend Charles Ross Thoroton, the then sinecure rector, all the lands, tithes, tenements, and hereditaments theretofore belonging to the said sinecure rectory (except rights of patronage), became by virtue of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, absolutely vested in us for the purposes, and subject to the provisions applicable to other hereditaments vested in us.

“And whereas the lands, tithes, tenements, and hereditaments aforesaid, are now with the exception of certain portions thereof which have been annexed to certain benefices, in our possession, and not subject to any outstanding lease or grant, but part of the same are on account of their character or situation unsuitable or inconvenient to be held or applied for the purposes

for which estates vested in us are applicable under the acts by which our proceedings are governed.

“And whereas with a view to the advantageous appropriation of the said lands, tithes, tenements, and hereditaments, so in our possession as aforesaid, or of the proceeds thereof, for the ultimate improvement of our common fund, it is expedient that the said lands, tithes, tenements and hereditaments, or such part or parts thereof, as we shall at any time and from time to time think fit, should be sold or disposed of, and accordingly that we should be empowered to dispose of our interest in such lands, tithes, tenements, and hereditaments, or in any part or parts thereof, in such manner as shall appear to us advisable.

“Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose that we may be authorized and empowered, by instrument or instruments in writing, duly executed according to law, from time to time to sell or dispose of, and duly to convey, according to the provisions of the said Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's reign, all or any of the said lands, tithes, tenements, and hereditaments formerly belonging to the said rectory, and so vested in us and in our possession as aforesaid, with their appurtenances, and all our estate, right, title, and interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same, and his or their heirs, executors, administrators, or assigns, or otherwise as he or they shall direct or appoint, and for such consideration as shall

upon due calculation and inquiry appear to us to be just and reasonable, it being our intention to invest the proceeds thereof from time to time as occasion may arise, in the purchase of other lands, tithes, rent-charges, tenements, or hereditaments, or of some estate or interest therein, convenient to be held by us for the purposes of the acts by which our proceedings are governed as aforesaid, and in the meantime to invest the said proceeds in some government or parliamentary stock, or other public securities in England.

“And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament.”

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Saint Asaph.

## GENERAL ORDER OF COUNCIL

RELATIVE TO

### CONTAGIOUS AND INFECTIOUS DISEASES AMONG ANIMALS.

**A**T the Council Chamber, Whitehall, the 10th day of August, 1869.

By the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

**W**HEREAS by reason of the passing of The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1869 (in this Order referred to as the Act of 1869), and of the making of an Order of Council, bearing even date herewith, whereby all former Orders in force relative to contagious and infectious diseases among animals in Great Britain are revoked, it has become expedient to renew such of the provisions of former Orders as are intended to remain in operation, and to make some further provisions for better preventing the introduction or spreading of contagious or infectious diseases among animals in Great Britain:

Now, therefore, the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Act of 1869, and of every other

power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

#### *Preliminary.*

1. This Order may be cited as The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Order of August, 1869.
2. This Order extends to Great Britain only.
3. In this Order the term "master" includes any person having the charge or command of a vessel: Other terms have the same meaning as in the Act of 1869.

#### *Foreign Animals.*

4. Foreign animals shall not be landed except at such places, in such manner, within such times, and subject to such supervision and control, as the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Customs from time to time direct.
5. Subject to any Order of Council to the contrary (either of even date herewith or hereafter made) all the regulations of the Fourth Schedule to the Act of 1869 shall apply to cattle brought from any part of any of the countries comprised in the Schedule to this Order, and subject as aforesaid; all such cattle shall be slaughtered within ten days after the landing thereof, exclusive of the day of landing.
6. The landing of foreign cattle elsewhere than at a part of a port defined by Order of Council

as a landing place for slaughter, shall be subject to the following conditions:—

First. That the vessel in which they are imported has not, within three months before taking them on board, had on board any cattle exported from any port of any of the countries comprised in the Schedule to this Order.

Secondly. That the vessel has not, since taking on board the cattle imported, entered any port of any of those countries.

Thirdly. That the cattle imported have not, while on board the vessel, been in contact with any cattle exported from any port of any of those countries.

And foreign cattle shall not be landed elsewhere than at a landing place for slaughter, unless and until—

(1.) The owner or charterer of the vessel in which they are imported, or his agent in Great Britain, has entered into a bond to Her Majesty the Queen, in a sum not exceeding one thousand pounds, with or without a surety or sureties, to the satisfaction of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Customs, conditioned for the observance of the foregoing conditions in relation to cattle to be landed under this Order from the vessel; and

(2.) The master of the vessel has on each occasion of importation of cattle therein satisfied the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Customs or their proper officer, by declaration made and signed or otherwise, that none of the cattle then imported therein have been exported from any port of any of the countries comprised in the Schedule to this Order, and that the foregoing conditions have been observed in relation to all the cattle then imported therein.

7. Foreign animals landed from a vessel elsewhere than at a landing place for slaughter, shall not be moved therefrom or be allowed to come in contact with any other animals until they have been examined by the Veterinary Inspector appointed in this behalf by the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Customs; and according to the result of such inspection the following consequences shall ensue:—

(1) If the Inspector certifies that all the animals landed from the vessel are free from contagious or infectious disease, they shall thereupon cease to be deemed foreign animals.

(2) If the Inspector certifies, with respect to any one or more of the animals landed from the vessel, that it or they is or are affected with any contagious or infectious disease, all the animals then imported in the vessel shall be dealt with in such manner as the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Customs direct.

8. If a vessel arriving at a port has on board the carcase of a foreign animal (including a horse) which was taken on board for the purpose of importation, but has died on the voyage, the master of the vessel shall, immediately on arrival, report the fact to the Principal Officer of Her Majesty's Customs at the port.

No such carcase shall be landed or discharged from the vessel without the permission in writing of the Principal Officer.

The master, if the Principal Officer so requires, shall proceed to sea, and shall throw every such carcase overboard into the sea at such place, or at such distance from shore, at such state of the

tide, and within such time, as the Principal Officer directs.

9. Where it appears to the Principal Officer of Her Majesty's Customs at a port, with respect to any foreign animal (including a horse), or any hay, straw, fodder, or other article, brought by sea to the port, that contagion or infection may be thereby conveyed to animals, he may seize and detain the same, and he shall forthwith report the facts to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Customs, who may give such directions as they think fit, either for the slaughter or destruction or the further detention thereof, or for the restoration thereof to the owner on such conditions, if any (including payment by the owner of expenses incurred by them in respect of detention thereof), as they think fit.

#### *Discovery and Prevention of Disease.*

10. Every person having in his possession or under his charge an animal (including a horse) affected with a contagious or infectious disease, shall observe the following rules:—

(1) He shall, as far as practicable, keep such animal separate from animals not so affected.

(2) He shall with all practicable speed give notice to a police constable of the fact of the animal being so affected.

Such police constable shall forthwith give notice thereof to the Inspector of the Local Authority, who shall forthwith report the same to the Local Authority and to the Privy Council.

11. Where an Inspector finds any contagious or infectious disease to exist in his district, he shall forthwith make a return to the Local Authority and to the Privy Council of the number and description of all animals being on the farm or in the shed or other place where the disease is found, which he considers liable to be affected with the disease, distinguishing those that are healthy from those that are actually affected with the disease, and shall continue to make a similar return on the Saturday of every week until the disease has disappeared.

12. Where under Section Sixty of the Act of 1869, a horse or animal is buried, its skin shall be first so slashed as to prevent its being of any use. The Local Authority may, if they think fit, use for the purpose of such burial, any place on the premises of the owner of the horse or animal.

13. Where a Local Authority is authorized by licence from the Privy Council to destroy, under Section Sixty of the Act of 1869, horses or animals that have died or been slaughtered as therein mentioned, every such horse or animal shall be destroyed in manner following, namely,—the carcase thereof shall be disinfected, and shall then be removed in charge of an officer of the Local Authority, to a horse-slaughterer's or knacker's yard licensed for the purpose by the Privy Council; or other place so licensed, and shall be there destroyed by exposure to a high temperature, or by chemical agents. In every such case the Local Authority shall report to the Privy Council the fact and mode of destruction.

14. Where a Local Authority exercise the power of causing premises to be cleansed and disinfected, conferred on them by Section Sixty-one of the Act of 1869, the occupier of those premises shall give all facilities for that purpose.

15. A Local Authority may, from time to time, with the view of preventing the spreading of con-

tagious or infectious disease, make regulations for the following purposes, or any of them :—

For prohibiting or regulating the movement of animals (including horses), on to, from, and through, and the keeping thereof on, commons and wastes and commonable and other lands whereon there exists a right of common or other right in the nature thereof.

For preventing any person from driving animals (including horses) under his charge, or allowing them to be driven or to stray, into an inclosed field or place without the consent of the occupier thereof.

For preventing the propagation of any such disease by means of dogs, and for causing for that purpose stray dogs to be destroyed or otherwise disposed of.

16. Any officer authorized in this behalf by a Local Authority, or any constable or police officer, may stop and detain any animal (including a horse) which is being moved, or which he has reasonable grounds for suspecting is being moved, in contravention of the Act of 1869 or this or any other Order of Council, and may apprehend, without warrant, the person in charge thereof, and bring him before a Justice, who shall inquire into the case in a summary manner, and may, if satisfied that there are good grounds for so suspecting, by writing under his hand direct the animal to be detained, and the person in charge thereof to be brought before two Justices as soon as practicable.

On such person being brought before two Justices they shall adjudicate on the case in a summary manner, and if satisfied that the animal was being moved in contravention as aforesaid may direct it to be disposed of in conformity with the provisions of the Act of 1869 and this or any other Order of Council.

17. Any officer authorized in this behalf by a Local Authority, or any constable or police officer, may inspect any railway truck, cart, boat, or other vehicle used by land or by water, in which animals, (including horses) hay, manure, litter, straw, and other articles used for or about animals are usually or at the time of such inspection carried, and may examine the person in charge thereof, with a view to ascertain whether any animals or articles are being moved or carried in contravention of the Act of 1869 or this or any other Order of Council; and such officer may, if he has reasonable grounds for suspecting that such animals or articles are being moved or carried in contravention as aforesaid, apprehend, without warrant, the person in charge thereof, and bring him before a Justice, who shall inquire into the case in a summary manner, and may, if satisfied that there are good grounds for so suspecting, by writing under his hand direct the same to be detained, and the person in charge thereof to be brought before two Justices as soon as practicable.

On such person being brought before two Justices they shall adjudicate on the case in a summary manner, and if satisfied that the animals or articles were being moved or carried in contravention as aforesaid may direct the same to be destroyed or otherwise disposed of in conformity with the provisions of the Act of 1869, and this or any other Order of Council.

18. Any person having charge of any animal (including a horse) or thing that is being moved on a highway, railway, canal, navigation, or river, for the moving whereof a licence is requisite, shall on being so required by an officer of a Local

Authority authorized in this behalf, or by a constable or police officer, produce the licence (if any) for the moving of that animal or thing.

19. A constable or police or other officer, detaining any animal (including a horse) under the Act of 1869 or this or any other Order of Council, shall cause it to be supplied with requisite food and water during its detention; and any expenses incurred by him in respect thereof may be recovered in a summary manner from the person in charge of the animal or from its owner.

20. Any Inspector or other officer empowered to carry the Act of 1869 or this or any other Order of Council into effect may, if authorized in this behalf by general or special order in writing of the Local Authority, enter, for the purpose of carrying into effect the provisions of such Act or Order, any field, stable, cowshed, or other premises within his district, where he has reasonable grounds for supposing that any animal affected with cattle plague or sheep pox has been, or has been buried or otherwise disposed of.

If any person refuses admission to, or obstructs or impedes, or aids in obstructing or impeding, such Inspector or other officer, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

#### *Cleansing and Disinfecting of Pens, Trucks, &c.*

21. Every pen, carriage, truck, horse-box, vehicle, or boat used for the carrying of animals on land, or on a canal or inland navigation, shall be cleansed and disinfected once in every twenty-four hours during the time when it is used for any animal, in manner following :—

By sweeping out and effectually removing all dung, sawdust, litter, or other matter, from the pen, carriage, truck, horse-box, vehicle, or boat, and then by thoroughly washing the same with water, and then by applying to the floor and to all parts above the floor of the pen, carriage, or truck, and to the sides, floor, and ceiling of the hold of the boat, and to every other part of the boat with which animals or their droppings come in contact, a coating of limewash made up by mixing good freshly burnt lime with water, and containing in each gallon of limewash either one-fifth of a pint of carbolic acid, or one-fifth of a pint of cresylic acid, or four ounces of fresh dry chloride of lime, such limewash to be prepared immediately before use.

The sweepings shall be well mixed with quicklime and effectually removed from contact with animals.

#### *General Provisions.*

22. If any person fails to give, produce, do, or observe any notice, licence, thing, or rule, which he is by this Order or any regulation of a Local Authority thereunder required to give, produce, do, or observe, he shall in every such case be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

23. Every Local Authority shall send to the Privy Council, a copy of every order or regulation made by them under the Act of 1869 or this or any other Order of Council.

24. Every Local Authority shall forthwith after the making of this Order report to the Privy Council the names and addresses of their Inspectors, under Section Twelve of the Act of 1869, and the districts or parts of districts for which such In-

spectors are appointed to act, and shall from time to time forthwith report to the Privy Council any changes therein.

25. A Local Authority shall provide and supply, without charge, printed copies of documents or forms requisite under this or any other Order of Council.

26. Every regulation made by a Local Authority under this or any other Order of Council shall (where no other provision is made for the publication thereof) be published by advertisement in

a newspaper circulating in the district of the Local Authority.

27. In proceedings before Justices or other legal proceedings under this or any other Order of Council, a Local Authority may appear by their clerk, or by any agent authorized by them in writing under the hands of two or more of their members, and a Railway Company or other body corporate may appear in manner provided by section One hundred and seven of the Act of 1869.

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### ORDER OF COUNCIL FOR METROPOLIS

RELATIVE TO

### CONTAGIOUS AND INFECTIOUS DISEASES AMONG ANIMALS.

**A**T the Council Chamber, Whitehall, the 10th day of August, 1869.

By the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

**W**HEREAS by reason of the passing of The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1869 (in this Order referred to as the Act of 1869), and of the making of an Order of Council, bearing even date herewith, whereby all former Orders in force relative to contagious and infectious diseases among animals are revoked, and of another Order of Council also bearing even date herewith relating to contagious and infectious diseases among animals in Great Britain, it has become expedient to renew such of the provisions of former Orders relating to the Metropolis as are intended to remain in operation, and to make some further provisions for better preventing the introduction or spreading of contagious or infectious diseases among animals in or through the Metropolis:

Now, therefore, the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Act of 1869, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

#### *Preliminary.*

1. This Order may be cited as The Metropolitan Contagious Diseases (Animals) Order of August, 1869.
2. This Order relates to the Metropolis only; and the provisions thereof are supplemental to and not in substitution for those of The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Order of August, 1869.
3. In this Order, words have the same meaning as in the Act of 1869.

#### *Foreign Cattle.*

4. With respect to foreign cattle landed in the port of London, the following regulations shall

have effect, in addition to those contained in The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Order of August, 1869:—

1. If the place of landing is a landing-place for slaughter defined, as in that Order mentioned, and is not within the Metropolis, the cattle shall, unless slaughtered at the place of landing, be removed thence by railway to the Metropolis, and not otherwise or elsewhere.
2. They shall be brought along the railway in trucks appropriated for foreign cattle, and having a red stripe two feet wide all round to distinguish them as so appropriated, which trucks shall, after each occasion of use, be cleansed and disinfected in manner provided by Article Twenty-one of that Order.

5. Foreign cattle brought within the Metropolis shall be forthwith taken, either to lairs licensed in that behalf by the Privy Council, or to the Metropolitan Cattle Market, and in either case shall be slaughtered within ten days after landing, exclusive of the day of landing, and, until taken to be slaughtered, shall be kept in lairs licensed in that behalf by the Privy Council.

#### *Movement of Cattle.*

6. Cattle shall not be moved along a highway, thoroughfare, or public place within the Metropolis, or be moved out of the Metropolis, except in the cases described in and in conformity with the provisions of this Order.

7. Cattle may be moved along a highway, thoroughfare, or public place within the Metropolis with a licence of the Commissioner of Police.

8. When cattle are brought to the Metropolitan Cattle Market, the person bringing them shall deliver the licence under which they have been moved to the Officer of the Market appointed to receive it, and it shall be retained, numbered, and carefully preserved by such Officer.

9. Cattle sold or exposed for sale in the Metropolitan Cattle Market shall not be moved therefrom, except with a market pass (in the form set forth in the first Schedule to this Order, or to the like effect), to be given to the purchaser or owner desiring to move the same by an Officer of the Market appointed for the purpose.

10. Cattle may (without a licence) be moved along a highway, thoroughfare, or public place within the Metropolis, from part to part of the same farm, or to water, for a distance, in either case, not exceeding five hundred yards.

11. Cattle brought into the Metropolis by the following railways, namely:—

- Great Northern;
- Great Western;
- London and North-Western;
- London and South-Western;
- Midland;

may be moved within and out of the Metropolis by the respective routes described in the second Schedule to this Order under the names of those railways respectively, on the following conditions:—

- First. That cattle so moved shall not, while within the Metropolis, be taken out of the wagon in which they are brought into the Metropolis.
- Secondly. That if any cattle so moved, accidentally, or otherwise, while within the Metropolis, leave or are taken out of the wagon in which they are so moved, they

shall not be placed again in the same or any other wagon on any railway within the Metropolis, and shall not be moved out of the Metropolis.

12. Where a person occupies a farm situate partly within and partly without the Metropolis, or any other contiguous premises so situate, he may, with a licence of the Commissioner of Police of the Metropolis, move from one part of such premises to another cattle which have been in his possession for twenty-eight days or upwards before the date of the licence, and have been marked in such manner as the Commissioner of Police directs.

13. Where a person being the owner of a head of cattle within the Metropolis which has been in his possession not less than eight weeks, or of a calf, within the Metropolis, which is not more than fourteen days old, and which is born from a cow which has been in his possession not less than twenty-eight days, is desirous of moving the same out of the Metropolis, he may give notice of such his desire to the Local Authority, by writing, stating the following things:—

1. The fact of the requisite possession as aforesaid.
2. The name and residence of the owner of the animal.
3. The name of the person to whom, and the place to which, the animal is to be sent.
4. A description of the animal, stating its sex, breed, age, distinctive marks, and other particulars sufficient for identification.

14. On receipt of any such notice, the Local Authority shall, unless there appears to them good reason to the contrary, and on being satisfied of the fact of possession for the requisite time, proceed, as soon as may be, to cause their Inspector to visit the cow-shed or place from which the animal is desired to be moved, at the times following:—

1. In all cases, within three days after the receipt by the Local Authority of the owner's notice: and again
2. In the case of an animal other than such a calf as aforesaid, at the expiration of twenty-eight days from the day of the first visit (both days inclusive): but
3. In the case of such a calf as aforesaid, at the expiration of seven days from the day of the first visit (both days inclusive):

and to report to the Local Authority on the state of health of the cattle in the cow-shed or place aforesaid.

15. If in the case of any animal, the Inspector, on each such visit, is satisfied and reports that it and all other cattle in the cow-shed or place aforesaid are free from contagious or infectious disease, and that such animal has not, since the Inspector's first visit, been in contact with any cattle other than those in the cow-shed or place aforesaid, the local authority shall inform the owner thereof, and shall communicate the owner's notice and the Inspector's reports to the Commissioner of Police of the Metropolis, and if the cow-shed or place is within the City of London, or the liberties thereof, then also to the Commissioner of Police of the City.

Thereupon, the animal may be moved out of the Metropolis at such time within three days after the second visit of the Inspector, and by such route, as in each case the Commissioner of Police of the Metropolis prescribes, on the identity of the animal to which the notice and reports relate being shown to the satisfaction of that Commis-



sioner of Police, or of an Officer of the Metropolitan Police Force appointed by him for the purpose.

16. Nothing in the foregoing provisions of this Order, authorizing movement of cattle, shall interfere with the operation of any provision of the Act of 1869 or of any Order of Council prohibiting or regulating the movement of cattle affected with a contagious or infectious disease.

*Markets, Sales, and Exhibitions.*

17. No market, fair, auction, sale, or exhibition of cattle shall be held in the Metropolis, except under licence from the Privy Council.

If any person holds a market, fair, auction, sale, or exhibition, in contravention of this Order, or fails to comply with any of the conditions, provisions, or regulations of any licence for the holding of a market, fair, auction, sale, or exhibition, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

If any cattle are sold, or exposed or put up for sale, or exhibited, in contravention of this Order, the seller and the purchaser thereof, and the auctioneer, if any, putting up the same for sale, and the person exposing the same for sale, or exhibiting the same, shall each be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

18. Cattle exposed for sale in a market in the Metropolis, licensed by the Privy Council for the sale of cattle for immediate slaughter, may be kept alive for ten days after such exposure, exclusive of the day of such exposure, but no longer; but this Article shall not interfere with the operation of any provision of this or any other Order of Council relative to the slaughter of foreign cattle.

*Slaughter-houses.*

19. The proprietor of a slaughter-house in the Metropolis shall not receive for slaughter any cattle, without receiving from the person delivering such cattle to him, or from the owner thereof, the market pass or licence of the Commissioner of Police under which they have been moved.

20. On the Saturday of every week the proprietor of each slaughter-house in the Metropolis shall deliver to the chief officer in charge of the police station of the district in which the slaughter-house is situate all the market passes and licences received by him during the week, and such officer shall give a receipt for the same signed by him to the proprietor.

*Foot-and-Mouth Disease.*

21. The following provisions shall apply to cattle becoming affected with foot-and-mouth disease in the Metropolis:—

1. If they become affected while in a lair they may be moved therefrom with a licence of the Commissioner of Police to a slaughter-house designated in the licence.
2. If they become affected while in the Metropolitan Cattle Market they may be moved therefrom with a market pass to a slaughter-house designated in the pass.

*Infected Places.*

22. Any dung of animals, and any hay, straw, litter, or other thing, commonly used for food of animals or otherwise for or about animals, may be moved out of an Infected Place within the Metropolis (but not out of the Metropolis) with a licence signed by an officer of the Local Authority appointed in that behalf certifying that the thing moved has been disinfected, but not otherwise.

*General Provisions.*

23. If any cattle or thing are or is moved or dealt with in contravention of this Order, the owner thereof and the person directing or permitting such moving thereof or dealing therewith, and the person or company in charge of or removing or conveying the same, and in the case of cattle brought into the Metropolis by railway and by this Order authorized to be moved out of the Metropolis by railway, the railway company by whose railway the cattle were brought into the Metropolis, shall each be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

24. If the proprietor of a slaughter-house fails to comply with any provision of this Order, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against this Order.

25. The Commissioners of Police of the Metropolis and of the City of London respectively (who respectively are in this Order referred to as the Commissioner of Police), are hereby empowered from time to time to grant licences for the purposes of and in conformity with this Order, and if they think fit to revoke any such licence granted by them respectively.

Every licence for movement so granted shall state the number and description of the cattle licensed to be moved, and the place of their destination.

26. Every licence of the Privy Council for the holding of a market or for lairs, and every licence for the movement of cattle, or for any other purpose, granted before the making of this Order by the Commissioner of Police, or by the Local Authority, or any of their Officers on their behalf, or by any other person authorized to grant the same, and in force at the date of this Order, shall continue in force thereafter as if this Order had not been made, and shall be available in like manner, to all intents, for the purpose for which it was granted, as if it had been granted under this Order.

27. The Metropolitan Board of Works shall cause this Order to be published in a newspaper circulating in the Metropolis; and the Mayor, Aldermen and Commons of the City of London shall cause a copy thereof to be affixed in a conspicuous place in the Metropolitan Cattle Market; and the Commissioners of Police respectively shall cause a copy thereof to be affixed in a conspicuous place at each police station.

THE Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1869, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do hereby define the parts of the Port of London within which foreign cattle may be landed for slaughter, as:—

- (1.) Thames Haven; which is hereinafter referred to as the landing-place No. (1.) and for this purpose shall be defined to be as follows:—

All that space in the parish of Fobbing, in the county of Essex, the property of the London, Tilbury, and Southend Railway Company, at the Thames Haven station of that Company, lying between the River Thames and a line commencing at a point on the River Thames at the south-western corner of the property of the said Railway Company, near the Thames Haven station, and running in a north-westerly direction for a distance of six hundred and ten yards along the fence or boundary between the property of the Railway Company and lands of Mr. Samuel Sharp, thence in a north-easterly direction along the eastern side of the carriage-road across the Thames Haven Branch of the London, Tilbury, and Southend Railway, to the northern fence of the railway, thence in a south-easterly direction along the fence or boundary between the property of the London, Tilbury, and Southend Railway Company and lands of Mr. Samuel Sharp, to the River Thames, at a point two hundred and eighty yards to the eastward of the new pier at Thames Haven, which space is coloured green on the plan thereof deposited for the purposes of an Order of Council of the eleventh day of October, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, at the Privy Council Office, copies whereof are deposited at the Offices of the Clerk of the Peace for the county of Essex, and of the Metropolitan Board of Works.

- (2.) The landing-place which is commonly called Odams's Wharf, and which is hereinafter referred to as the landing-place No. (2.) and for this purpose shall be defined to be as follows:—

All that space on the Plaistow Marshes, near the Victoria Docks, in the parish of West Ham and county of Essex, bounded on the north-eastern side, for a distance of two hundred yards or thereabouts, by the old line of tramway or railway from London to North Woolwich, on the south-western side, for a distance of two hundred yards or thereabouts, by the River Thames, on the north-western side by premises used as a sugar bakery, in the occupation of Mr. James Duncan, and on the south-eastern side by the wall forming the north-western boundary of the premises in the occupation of the London Wharfing and Warehousing Company, which space is coloured pink on the plan thereof deposited

for the purposes of the said Order at the Privy Council Office, copies whereof are deposited at the Offices of the Clerk of the Peace for the county of Essex, and of the Metropolitan Board of Works.

- (3.) The Victoria Docks, which is hereinafter referred to as the landing-place No. (3.), and for this purpose shall be defined to be as follows :—

All that space situated at the Victoria Docks, in the parish of West Ham, in the county of Essex, bounded on a portion of its south-western side by the River Thames, and on all other sides and parts by a line commencing on the River Thames at the North-west Pier of the Entrance Lock of the Victoria Docks, and running in an easterly and northerly direction along the boundary fence of the Victoria Docks, to the extreme north-western corner of the Dock property, near the Tidal Basin Station of the North Woolwich Railway, thence eastwards for a distance of three hundred and seven yards along a continuation of the said boundary fence, to the north-western corner of the Tobacco Warehouse, thence in a southerly direction by a straight line along the western wall of the Tobacco Warehouse, and along the eastern wall of the Tidal Basin, and by a continuation of the same straight line to the fence forming the southern boundary of the Dock premises, thence in a westerly direction along the last-mentioned fence to the River Thames, at the South-east Pier of the Entrance Lock of the Victoria Docks, which space is coloured green on the plan thereof deposited for the purposes of the said Order at the Privy Council Office, copies whereof are deposited at the Offices of the Clerk of the Peace for the county of Essex, and of the Metropolitan Board of Works.

- (4.) The landing-place, which is commonly called Brown's Wharf, and which is hereinafter referred to as the landing-place No. (4), and for this purpose shall be defined as follows :—

ART. 1. Produce of all kinds and from every country can be imported by all flags into the various French possessions beyond the sea where the Act of Navigation of the 21st September, 1793, is still in force.

Produce loaded in these same possessions can be exported for any destination and by any flag.

ART. 2. The Minister of Marine and of the Colonies is charged with the execution of the present Decree, which shall be inserted in the "Bulletin des Lois."

## LOCAL GOVERNMENT ACT, 1858.

ORDER SETTLING THE BOUNDARIES OF A DISTRICT, TO BE STYLED THE DISTRICT OF MIDDLEWICH, IN THE COUNTY OF CHESTER, FOR THE PURPOSES OF THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT ACT, 1858.

WHEREAS a Petition has been duly presented to me as one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State from ratepayers resident within the town of Middlewich, in the county of Chester, praying me to settle and fix the boundaries of a district to be styled the "Middlewich District," for the purposes of the Local Government Act, 1858.

And whereas the said Petition was duly signed as required by the said Act, and set-forth likewise the proposed boundaries of the district sought to be formed under its provisions; and inquiry has now been duly made by Arnold Taylor, Esquire, the Inspector appointed by me for such purpose, and he has reported to me thereon.

Now, therefore, I, as one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State as aforesaid having taken the said Petition and Report into consideration, do hereby, in pursuance of the powers vested in me by the Local Government Act, 1858, make order as follows:—

1. That from and after the date of this present Order, the boundaries hereinafter set-forth and described and delineated on the plan referred to in, and accompanying, the said Inspector's Report to me, bearing date the 11th day of August, 1869, form and constitute the boundaries of the district to be called the Middlewich District, for the purposes of the Local Government Act, 1858, and that the parts included in such boundaries so described and delineated, shall, for the purposes of such Act, be deemed to be a place having a known and defined boundary, and may adopt the said Act accordingly.

The aforesaid boundary commences at the point A on the map accompanying the Inspector's Report, on the southerly side of the branch line of the London and North-Western Railway Company from Crewe to Middlewich and Northwich; thence it passes in a southerly direction along the easterly boundary fence of the property belonging to Mr. Morton Wood, and known as the Newton Farm Estate, to the point B; thence around the building and premises of Newton Farm and along the easterly boundary fence of the orchard and garden belonging to such farm

to the south side of the occupation road leading from Wood's Farm to Brook's-lane, and known as Poverty John's-lane; thence along and including such lane to the point C; thence in a southerly direction along the easterly boundary fence of the property belonging to Mr. Benjamin Llewellyn Vaudrey to the point D; thence around the garden and premises of the North Staffordshire Railway and Canal Company, known as King's-lock and numbered 97 on the tithe map of Newton parish, and crossing the Trent and Mersey canal and the Sandbach and Middlewich turnpike-road, and including the property numbered 134 on such tithe map and known as Bunn's-cottages, to the point E on the southerly side of such last-named turnpike-road; thence in a westerly direction along and including the Chester and Ellesmere canal to the point F on the west side of Fleff-lane; thence in a northerly direction along and including such last-named lane to the point G, at the south-east corner of the property numbered 168 on the tithe map of Newton township; thence in a westerly direction along the southerly boundary fence of such last-named property and crossing Wood's-alley to the point H; thence in a north-westerly direction along the southerly boundary fence of the Newton Hall estate to the point I, on the easterly side of the road leading from Middlewich to Nantwich and known as The Wallenge; thence crossing such last-named road in a westerly direction, and along the southerly boundary fence of the property numbered 154 on the tithe map of Newton township to the point J; thence along the boundary fences separating the properties numbered 154, 155, and 157, from those numbered 162, 161, and 158, on the tithe map of Newton township to the point K, on the southerly side of the road leading from Middlewich to Northwich, thence easterly along, but excluding such last-named road to the point L on the westerly side of Croxton-lane, thence along and including such lane to the point M, thence in a north-easterly direction along and including Fenney's-lane, and the properties known as the Big Lock, and the property belonging to Mr. Holland to the point N on the south side of the Trent and Mersey Canal; thence in a northerly direction along and including such canal to the point O on the northern side of a foot-path leading to Ravenscroft; thence in an easterly direction along and including such foot-path to the point P; thence in a southerly direction along and including the works and premises belonging to the Trent and Mersey Canal Company to the point Q; thence in an easterly direction along and including a stream known as Pickering's Waste Water Stream to the point R, on the westerly side of the Crewe and Northwich branch of the London and North-Western Railway Company; thence along but excluding such line of railway to the point S; thence crossing such railway at the Syphon Pipe between the Mill Stream and Pickering's Mill to the easterly boundary fence of the Railway Company's property at the point T; thence in a south-easterly direction along and including the Railway Company's Station, station-yard, and other premises and line of railway to the point U, thence crossing such Railway Company's line and property in a westerly direction to the starting point at A, so completing the boundary of the proposed Town District of Middlewich.

2. That Mr. Charles Frederick Barker, Solicitor, Middlewich, be Summoning Officer, and take forthwith all such steps as may be necessary under the hereinbefore recited Local Government Act, for convening a meeting of the ratepayers of the said district of Middlewich to decide

as to the adoption of the Local Government Act, 1858, within the boundaries of such district as fixed and settled by this present Order. And in case of the failure or inability of the said Charles Frederick Barker to discharge such duty of Summoning Officer, that Mr. David Harding, Clerk to the Burial Board of Middlewich, act in his stead.

### SEA COAST BETWEEN HORNSEA AND SPURN POINT.

#### REMOVAL OF SHINGLE PROHIBITED.

WHEREAS it is enacted by the 54 Geo. III., cap. 159, sec. 14, that "in order to prevent damage being done to the shores or banks of the ports, harbours, or havens in this kingdom, no person or persons shall take any ballast or shingle from the shores or banks, or any portion of the shores or banks of any port, harbour, or haven of this kingdom, from which the Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral of the United Kingdom for the time being shall find it necessary, for the protection of such port, harbour, or haven, or the works thereof, by Order under their hands, or the hands of any three of them, or the hands of his or their Secretary, and published in the London Gazette, shall prohibit the taking or removing of such shingle or ballast, upon pain of forfeiting for every such offence the sum of ten pounds:"

And whereas it is further enacted by "The Harbours Transfer Act, 1862" (25 and 26 Victoria, cap. 69, sec. 16), "that from and after the 31st day of December, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, sections fourteen and sixteen of the Act of the fifty-fourth year of King George the Third (chapter one hundred and fifty-nine), 'for the better regulation of the several ports, harbours, roadsteads, sounds, channels, bays, and navigable rivers in the United Kingdom, and of His Majesty's docks, dockyards, arsenals, wharfs, moorings, and stores thereon, and for repealing several Acts passed for that purpose,' and all provisions in the said Act contained relative thereto, shall be read and construed as if the Board of Trade were named in the said sections instead of the Admiralty:"

And whereas the Board of Trade have found it necessary, for the protection of the harbour or haven of the River Humber, and of the shores and banks thereof, and of the works thereof, to prohibit the taking or removing of any shingle or ballast from the shore or bank hereinafter specified:

Now the Board of Trade do hereby, by this Order, under the hand of their Secretary, prohibit all persons from taking or removing any description of shingle or ballast from the shore or banks, or from any portion of the shore or banks between Hornsea and the extreme of Spurn Point at low water.
