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Whiteball, June 10. 1688.

HIS Day between Nine and Ten in the Morning the QUEEN was falely Delivered of a PRINCE at St. James's, his Majesty, the Queen Dowager, most of the Lords of the Privy Council, and Divers Ladies of Quality being prefent ; And about Noon the Council being met, it was Ordered that there should be a General Thanksgiving to be observed within the Cities of London and Westminster, and parts adjacent, on Sunday the 17th Instant, and 14 Days after in all other Parts of this Kingdom , And that Notice should be given of the Birth of the PRINCE to the Lord Mayor of London, that Bonefires and Publick Rejoycings might be made ; which was accordingly performed, after Firing of the Can-non of the Tower, with all the Demonstrations of the Extraordinary Joy, with which fo great a Bleffing, bestowed upon their MA-JESTIES, and all His MAJESTIES DOMINIONS, has fill'd the Hearts of His Subjects.

T H E following Address has been Presented to the King, which His Majesty received very Graciously.

To King James the Second, over England, Orc.

The humble Address of the People called Quakers, from their Yearly Meeting in London the fixth day of the Month called June 1688.

W E the Kings Loving and Peaceable Subjects, from divers parts of His Dominions being met together in this City, after our ufual manner, to infpect the Affairs of our Christian Society throughout the World, think it our Dury humbly to reprefent to Him the bleffed Effects the Liberty He has Graciously granted kis People (to worlding Gad according to there Conficiences) hath had both on our Parsons and Effates. For whereas formerly we had ever long and forrowful Lists broughs to us, from almost all parts of His Territorics, of Prifoners, and the societ, We blefs God and thank the King, the Gals are every where clear, except in Cafes of Tythes, and the Repairs of Parish Churches, and forme few about Oaths; And we do in all humility lay it before the King to consider the

hardhips our Friends are yet under for Conférence fake in those Respects, being in the one chiefly exposed to the present Anger of the offended Clergy, who have therefore laticly imprifued fome of them till death 3 and in the other they are rendred wery unprofitable to the Publick and Thinsselves, for both in reference to Freedoms in Corporations, Probates of Wills, and Testaments, and Administrations, Answers in Chancery, and Exchequer, Tryals of our Just Titles and Debts, proceeding in our Trade at the Custom-House, Serving the Office of Constables, &cc. they are disabled, and great advantages taken against them, unless the Kings Fervine on the our feature our felves He will ease us what He can.

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Now, fince it hath pleafed Thee, O King, to remeto to all Thy Subjects by Thy last Declaration thy Gracious Alfurances, in purjue the Establishment of this Christian Liberty and Property, upon an unalterable Foundation, and in order to it, to hold a Parliament in November next at farthest. We think our selves deeply engaged to renew our Alfurances of Fidelity and Affection, and with Gods help intend to do our parts for the effecting so Blessed and Glorious a Work. That so it may be out of the Power of any one Party to hurt another upon the account of Conscience, And as we firmly believe that God will never defert this Juss and Righteous Cause of Liberty, nor the King in maintaining of it, so we hope by God's Grace to let the World see we can homestly and heartily appear for Liberty of Conscience, and be invisiably true to our own Religion, whatever the folly or madness of some menson that account, may juggest to the contrary.

Constantinople, April 18. Since my last of the 27th of Feb. (which gave the relation of the Vifiers Death) Ifmael Baffa was made Visier, an ancient man of near 70 years of age, bred in the Seraglio a Page and Chiodar (or he that carries the Yamaluck, or Grand Signior's Veft for Rain) of the late Grand Signior, till fome years ago he came out of the Seraglio with a dead. Pay of 300 Afpers a Day, and continued long fo with-out any Imployment, till about 8 years fince the V.fier Kara Mustapha made him Nisangee Balla (i.e. he that puts the Grand Signior's Firm or Name to all Imperial Commands.) And in Sept. laft, in the beginning of the Diffurbances here, when Rageb Baffa fled, he was made Caimacan for 5 Days till Kuberli Ogle arrived. He began with great feverity to purge the Dregs of those ill humours which had diffurbed the Government. In the beginning of March all the Chief Servants of the Mutiniers, and feveral of the Spahi's and Janifaries that fided with those Mutiniers, were every night cut off and thrown into the Sea, to the number (as it's faid) of above 1000, by which the reft being terrified, the Soldiery was reduced to as exact an Obedience as formerly.

The 12th of March the Tefterdar (or Treasurer) who was first put into that Office by the Mutiniers, though afterwards they would have killed him, was imprifoned in the middle Gate of the Seraglio (where he still remains) and all his Estate feized and Conflicated. The Visier also sent for the Kia Bei (or Lieutenant General of the Janifaries) and Vested him as Bassa, but as

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bon as he was gone out he was feized and Imphiloned, and afterwards privately put into a Boat and Baniflaed to Myterine, Kuperh Oyle (who was also then turned out by the Mutiniers) had been fent to flay at the Dardanell's Cattles, where the Vifier looking on him as his Rival, and thinking him too near at hand, ordered Mustapha Baffa (the late Janifar Aga, who was fent from the Dardane "to Canea.) to return to the Dardanelli; and a Galley was fent to transport Kuperli to Canea.

The 16th of March feveral of the Mutimiers (among whom were the fecond Imbrahor, or Matter of the Houfe, the Kia of the Spehilar Agafi, and the Son of Pers Aga a Chief Ring-Leader) were taken and ftrangled, and their Bodics thrown out before the Seraglio Gate. Doyangi Shahan Aga, the Kia of Schlaus and his Hafnardar were impriloned in order to make Difcovery of Schiaufes Effate, but upon their giving fecurity to pay 120 Purfes they were freed. Shiban Aga the Cuftomer was also Imprifoned, and 300 Purfes demanded of him, but he having been to lately fleeced in all the turns, declared he was not able to comply, and fo remains still in Custody. In the mean time Teghen Bey (who went the laft year from Afia, to the Campagne in Hungary, carrying with him about 1500 men, and for that was made Baffa by S liman then Vilier) Commanding now the Turkith Forces about Soppia, happened to have fome Difputes with Zeni the Baffa of A.bania, for Yeghen having spoiled the Countries where he came, raifing Monies and exacting great Sums where it was to be had, at last thought fit to fend fome of his. Soldiers to raife Men and Money in Zem's Government, who prefently oppos'd and beat them away. Hereupon Teghen made great Complaints at the Port, fo that Zeni thought himfelf obliged to come hither to clear himfelf; but being purfued by Yeghen's inftances, the Visier, for fear of him, caufed Zem to be Strangled, and his Body exposed before the Scraglio Gate. This Zem was an Albanefe, and had a good Interest in that Country. It was now high time to confider of fending Forces into the Field against their Enemies, and frequent Divans, were held upon this Subject. The new Vifier was unwilling to remove from hence and go to the War; nor was it his Interest to foon to quit the Grand Signior till he had fettled himfelf and his own Creatures, and befides his great Age and want of Experience in there Affairs, the Preparations for the War this Year (by reafon of their Intertine Tumults and Divisions) being very fmall, it was not for the Reputation of the Grand Signior's Seal and the Prophets Standard to be exposed fo flenderly attended, fo that it was concluded to make the fait Yighen Visier of the Bench (which impowers him to carry 3 Horfe Tails) and to conftitute him Sardar or Generalifimo of Hungary. All this while Tighen had purfued his point of railing Money wherever he came, and thought fit to fend word of it hither, and believing fome Complaints might be made of him, and that it might be faid he had rais'd much more than indeed he had, he fent an account that he had taken about 1000 Puifes, not to put this Mony in his own Pocket, but for the Grand Signior's Service, defiring the Grand Vilier to fend him 1000 Purfes more to pay his Soldiers and buy Provisions, Sc. He got also feveral Soldiers of his Friends and Dependencies to come over to him out of Afia, which gave new fulpition that he defigned to fet up for himfelr; But the Vilier Ifmael thought by this new advancing him, to remove him farther off, and give him Imployment enough against the Imperialifis.

In the beginning of April, Kara Mustapha (Kia to Yezhen) came with Letters from Yezhen to the Visier, by which he recommended this Ria to be made Balla of Caramania, and that he might have orders to forward the Afiatick Soldiers for the War, which was granted, and the Ria was here preparing his Equippage to go to his Government, when (v.z.) on the ing more Money, Soldlers, and the Standard of their Prophet Mabamer to be feut him, and a Power to diff pole of all the Offices and Baffathips in those Parts, adding, that it was very fit the Grand Signior's Seals should be in the Army, as nearflary to keep the Soldiers in due Obedience. These Demands feem d to speak to plainly his Delign of being Vifier himfelf, that the 9th Inftant a great Council was held in the Seraguo, where it was refolved to take the Title and Office of Generalifimo from Yeghen, and to make him Baffa of Temesuraer, and to appoint Hassardar Hassan Bassa again Serasquier. They dispatch'd alfo 5 Capighee Pachis with these Orders, and in case Tegben should not obey them, then they had Hattesheriffes, or Imperial Commands, to the Boltangi Bachis at Adri mople and Romelia, to make Nefiran (that is to raife all the Country) against him and to take him. It was thought fit also to do all they could to hinder Nghen Kia from going over to Afia (where were many Malecontents of his Party) but he having removed his Lodgings on thee 11th inflant the Gates of the City were ordered to be fhut, and Guards fet, not permitting any one to go out; but that Evening the Kia furrendered himfell to the Vifier, and was immediately Imprifoned, and had been alfo ftrangled but that the Mufti interposed, as judging it better to flay and fee what effect those Orders of the Grand Signior would have upon Yeghen.

The 12th, The Solach Baches, with 10 or 12 Chambers of Janifaries, were fent from hence with feveral pieces of Cannon to guard an important Pals (called M. flaphu's. Bridge,) about & hours match beyond Adrianople, to ftop Teghen there, in cafe he Thould march towards this place, as it was given out he intended to do : And Merza Balla, with other Janifaries, was fent to Gallupoli, in cafe he should attempt to pass that way into Afia, whether it was also reported he had fent fome of his People with 400 Purfes of Money.

These Proceedings cause a general Disturbance in this City, many of the chief and sicheft Turks retire daily from hence, and most of them go to Cairo: The great expectation is whether Yeghen will obey the Command and go to Temefinaer, or make refiltance and get over to Afia, or march directly to this City ; all the Force he has with him is faid to be 4000 Horfe at most. It is generally reported, that Yeghen intends to declase for the late deposed Grand Signior or his Son, the truth whereof a little time will fhew.

About the latter end of March, the Prince of Tranfileania difpatched an Envoy with Letters for Schiaus Baffa, then Vizier, who being arrived in Walachia, and there hearing of Schiaus Baffa's being killed, he was forced to flay there till he received new Letters for this Vizier Ifhmacl, which he brought. They imported, That the Germans (by a force which he could not refift | having made themfelves Mafters of his Country, and drawing extraordinary Contributions from it, the Prince was not in a capacity to fend the ufual Tribute, and defired Affiftance from the Port against his and their Enemies. The Vizier accepted the Excuse, and encouraged Prince Abafti to perfevere in his Fidelity to the Grand Signior, affuring him, that though at prefent they could not fend any Succors, yet in a fhort time they fhould not be wanting : The Perfon bringing these Letters made no publick Appearance, but was both receiv'd and dimist very privately.

Constantinople; May 1. The Apprehensions of Inte-fline Diffurbances from Yeghen daily encreasing, and Ifmael Baffa being found to be a perfon not qualified for that great Employment, the Multi, with feveral great Men, both of the Law and the Sword, gave privately (by the hands of the Kiflar Aga, or chief of the black Eunuchs) a Petition to the Grand Signior, declaring, That they thought themfelves bound in Duty hun bly to represent to him, that Ifmael Basta was not a fit Man to be V fier; That these difficult Times required one proge to go to his Government, when (v.Z.) on the 1 to be viter; I hat these difficult Times required one 7th Infrant other Letters came from Teyben, domand. Vol the greateft Abilities and Experience; and that none Was

was better qualified than Mußlapha Balla. This advice the Grand Signior took, and immediately ent an Hattetheriffe, Sealed up, to Ifmael Vilier, ordering him to difpatch it prefently, by the Haffaki Aga, to Mußlapha Baffa, at the Dardmeli Caliles. The 19th of April, the Captain Biffa went out from

this Port with the afral Ceremonies, attended by a very flender Fleet, of no more than 15 Galleys, (initead of those great numbers they formerly had) to joyn in the Archapeiage with about 25 more, and 10 Men of War, which is all the Force they have now at Seas, and of these Galleys, fix were to go under the Command of Dervia Og'e, to the B'ack Sea.

That Evening Multarha Baffa arrived here, and the next Morning vifited the Vifier I/mael, and was vefted by him with a Sables Veft, as a Viller of the Bench ; 16mael believing that he was fent for only as a chief Counfellour, to give his Advice, as one of long Experience; and befides, hoped to prevail with the Grand Signior to fend him to command the Army in Chief, in the place of *Reyben*; But on the 22d, *I.mael* kept a great Divan in the Seraglio, where he expected that *Mafta*pha should have taken his place as a Vifier of the Bench; but he kept at home. The Divan being ended late, 1/mael returned to his Houfe, but about four a Cluck, coming out to eat, as he was fitting down, the Baltagee-Riafi of the Grand Signior brought him a Hattefheriffe, ordering him to deliver up the Seals, which he immediately did; and they being carried to the G. Signior, he fent for Mustapha, and gave them to him, vefting him with the usual Ceremonies. From the Seraglio M ftapha went to Ismael's House, where he mayd till an hour in the night, and after, going home, difpatcht away immediately eight feveral Couriers, to Teghen and the Baffa's in those parts, to countermand the Order's formerly fent.

The next day, according to the cuffom of new Vifiers, he vifited the Mufti with great Ceremony, and after freed Teghen's Kia from Impriforment, and allo the late Tefterdar, and Sheban Aga.

The 25th, a Mellenger arrived here with Letters from Yeghen to the deposed Visier Ifmail, and to the Mutit. It feens that, upon the Orders fent to raife the Nefiran against Yegher, the Country role, and block'd him up in Sophia, (or as others report, had encompassed him in a Marth where he lay encamped, not far from thence) but did not dare to attack him, though 3000 Men were the most he had with him. The effect of his Letters were to reprefent the Mifchief of fpilling Muffelman's Blood, for that he was refolved to fell his Life Dear; That he had declared to those that came to take him, That they should have patience only to expect an Anfwer of these Letters, which he was fending to the Port, and let his Meffengers pais : That he wondred what was the Caufe of this Commotion, he for his part having done nothing contrary to his Duty or his Allegiance to his Prince; and therefore he could not believe that it was his Imperial Majetty's Will, but if it were fo, he would come and lay his Head at his Feet, who might take it if he pleafed; But he would deliver it up to no man elie.

M stapha, now Vizier, received these Letters, and having read them, faid openly to the Man who brought them, Curfed be he who was the Caufe of this Difturbance; but that it should end in nothing, for that he had difpatcht Orders for the pacifying of all things, and that the next day he would fend him away with a Confirmation thereof. It appears now that Ifmael was the Caufe of all this: For Teghen writing, That if he had not more Men and Money fent to him, he could not poffibly march any farther against the Common Enemy, but must return to Constantinople; I/matel fearing his own fecurity, if he came hither, and that all the Malecontents would unite with him, had prevailed with the Grand Signior to fend those Orders against him; thinking his own Safety lay in Yzban's Destruction: And it

is now concluded, That Tach w bad no ill Intentions or Thoughts of cauting new Revolutions, the Forces with him being to very inconfiderable. Accordingly, the next day Teyken's Mellenger was depatche from hence, with Letters from the Viffer, declaring the Grand Signior had pardoned him, and that now he thould attend the Emperor's Service, as formerly. His Kia is also continued in the Batfathip of Caramania, but is not pentitued to go over into Afla, but is to return to the Wars, and fend his Mulfalam to his Government. That day also the Grand Signior (according to cultor) fent the new Vifier a Horfe with rich Forniture.

Thé late Vilier Ifmael is already cálled upon to refund, the Tefterdar demanding of him, for the Grand Signior, rooo Purfes, (which thakes 500 thoufand Dollars) which he took from the Balfa's, and the other Officers, for their Places. He is making his competition, having offered 500 Purfes.

Upon the Peace he attended Gount L/l.e when he came hither Arn-ballador Extraordinary from the Emperor, And atterwards he was Moxur-Aga (of Captain of the Guard) to Uffirf Balla, the Caimacan here, when the Viner was at the Siege of Cawl div; and when Makimt Aga wont to Camdia, to be Kia to the Viner, he was mide Moxur Aga to the Viner in that Siege; And after the return from Candia he was made Setti-fongee Bachi, and Zugargee-Beclu and Kin Bei, which are the principal Officers among the Jenifaries: After he was put out of the Kiabeis place, he continued Without Employment till Kara Maftapha (the Viner that belieged Vienna) made him Segmen Tachi, and afferwards Jahnar Aga; and when Count Caprara came hither from the Emperor in 1682 (to renew the Truce with the Port, though he could effect nothing, and re-Truce with the Port, though he could effect nothing, and re-turned with the Turkifh Aimy to Vicana at the Siege in 168 %) he was appointed to treat with him. At that Siege of Vienna he was Jan Lin-Aga, and when Kane Multapha was cut off, he he was appointed to freat with him. He affored his Excellency he would fee the Capitulations faithfully obferved; And that when ever the Engl Ib Merchants had any occafion to complain, he would take care Juffice fhould be done them

Vienna, June 3. The great News here, is, that the late Sultan Mahomet, with his Eldeft Son and Sultanets are ftrangled, which was occi fioned by the march of the Baffa of Natolia, and the feoret Enterprifes of others, to reflore the one, or advance the other to the Throne f and the formation of the Sultanet And And that T ghen Baffa, is with all his Accomplices, cut in pieces, there having been a Letter intercepted from the late Sultan in which he promifed to make him Grand Vifier, in cafe he would declare for him ; And it's faid he was tampering with the Army to that end. It's added, that a new Serasquier is appointed, to whom those Forces have fubmitted.

Vienna, June 3. The Duke of Lorrain being perfectly recovered, will now in few days begin his Jourhey for Hungary; most of the General Officers being already gone from hence. The 28th paft, arrived here an Extraordinary Courier from Transilvania, with the Act of Submiffion of the Prince and States of that Country, which you will have at length in our next.

Hague, June 15. The Count d' Av ux, Ambaffador Extraordinary of France, prefented the 10th Inftant a Memorial to the States General, as follows, That he was Commanded to let them know, That the King his Master, desiring nothing more than to preferve the Reage of Christendom, His Majesty was willing to prevent whatever might trouble st. And feeing nothing is more capable of diffurbing the publick Tranquility in the pre-fent Conjuncture, than if the Princes Neighbouring to the Electron of Colored Land Land Land Christen to the Electorat of Cologne, fould not leave the Chapter in an entire Liberty, to proceed Canonically to the Election of a new Archbifhop; That his Majefty in fuch cafe, could not refuse the Canons and Chapter the Affistance they might ftand in need of; for the prefervation of their Rights, and for the fecurity of the Places and Country that depend on that Electorate. And if any one shall go about to cause any Troops to march towards the said Electorate, under what pretence seever it may be, and to force the Canons and Chapter in any manner whatever, or 10 ule any force or violence against the Places or Country of the faid Arch-bistoprick: His Majesty will fend thither, (at the fame time) all the fuecor that shall be necessary to maintain those that have the Administration thereof, in all the Rights that belong to them. But if the States Neighbouring to this Archbifhoprick, do leave the Chapter in an entire Liberty to Choose a Fit and Worthy Perfon; And in cife there be no moving of Troops, either in the Em-pire, or in the Territories of this State, or in the Spa-nish Netherlands, to intimilate the fiid Chapter, Thole of His Marefty will not likewife do any thing that may be able to trouble the publick Tranquillity, or even give the least apprehensions to these that are well intentioned for the maintenance of the Peace.

London, June 7. We have advice from Buffora and Perfla, by way of Babylon and Aleppo, That the Englith E.ft-India Company hath been fuccessful in the War against the Mogul and the Syamers, by taking his Buffora and Perfian Fleet, bound for Surat, confifting of feven great Ships, and two finall ones all tichly laden, cn Board of which was very much Gold and Silver. They likewife took in the Red Sea, near Mocah, a new Ship, well loaden, of the king of Symi's, called in the Syams Language the Coveraign of the Seas ; and alfo the Streights Merchant, aptain Beer Commander, the laft Interloper that haunted the Coafts of India, contrary to His Maiefty's Pro-Mamation, and the Eufl-India Companies Charter. It is likewife prefumed the Red Sea Fleet, bound for Surar, fell into the hands of the English, and many other rich Prizes; But of this we expect Confirmation by the Companies Ships, which are daily expected from India.

Whitehall, June 8. The Sieur de Lente, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Denmark, had, the fixth Inftant, his Audience of Leave of the Queen: And this day the Abbot Rezirini, Envoy Extraordinary from the Duke of Modena; had his first Audience of Her Majeity, being both conducted by Sir Charles Cottrel Maiter of the Ceremonies.

Whitehall, June 10. The King was this Day pleaf-ed (by Her Ma)effice Bed-fide foon after her Delivery) to Confer the Honour of Knighthood upon Dr. William Waldgrave, Her Majefties Phyfician, and both their Majesties were then pleased to express the great fatisfaction they had in his Skill and particular Services to Her Majelty.
